"THE INVISIBLE MAN" will be discussed at the first meeting of the Summer Book Reading Group at 7:30 tonight in 307 Administration/Humanities Building. The novel is considered the best "black novel" written and a classic of American Literature.

THE 1000 HILLS PERFORMANCES of the 1000 Hills Summer Youth Camp will feature a gymnastics demonstration at 10:30 a.m. Friday in Pershing Arena for students grades 1-7. In addition, the Junior High Band Camp will perform at 1:30 p.m. Friday in Baldwin Auditorium.

THE INCREDIBLE ELIZABETH and Robert Evers will present a program on extrasensory perception and other psychic phenomena at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. This entertainment is sponsored by the Arts in the Park series of Student Activities. Evers is an experienced performer who discovered the fantastic possibilities of the human mind while under hypnosis. Elizabeth attributes her incredible abilities to the development of her concentration through hypnosis. Together they present an exciting show featuring lightning mental calculations, super memory feats, mental power movement, amazing recovery of hidden objects and time regression under hypnosis. No admission will be charged.

A HOLOGRAPHY WORKSHOP will be offered from 12-3 p.m. July 10-28 through the Science Division. The workshop is designed to let students make their own holograms (three-dimensional pictures made with a laser light) as well as present the basic principles of holography. The course carries three hours of undergraduate or graduate credit. No previous courses in physics or mathematics are required although they would be helpful. Several art majors have taken the workshop and performed very well in it. A minimum of 18 students is required to hold the workshop.
