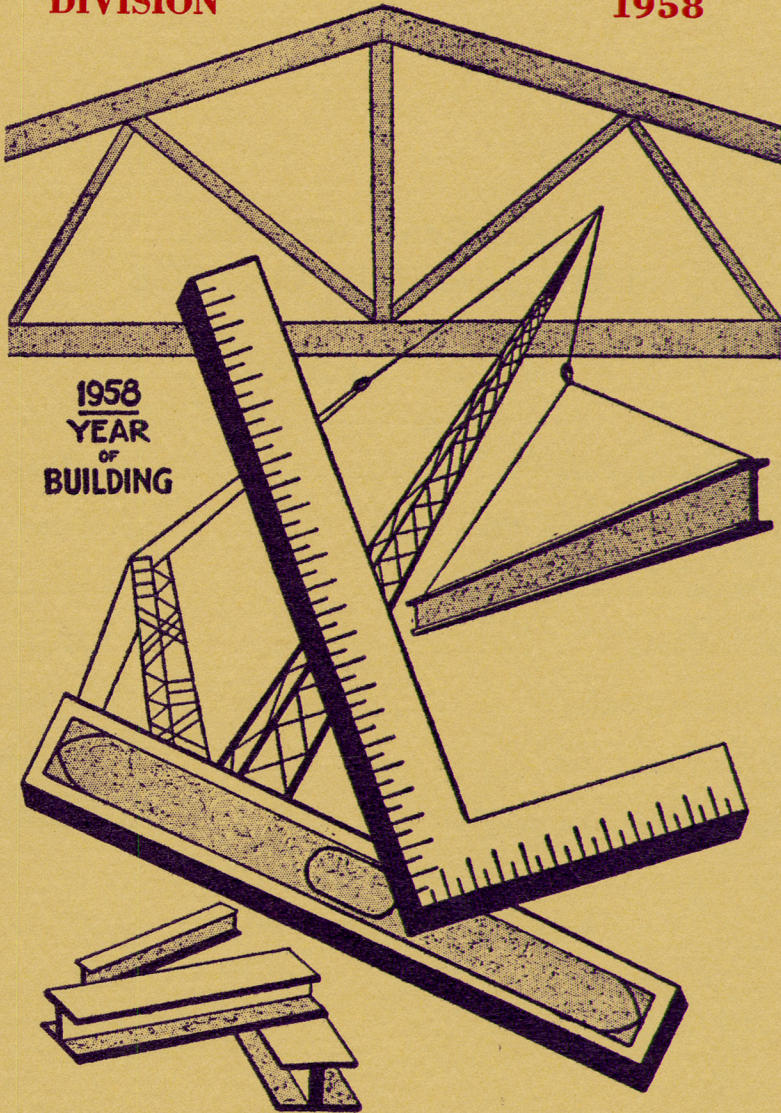

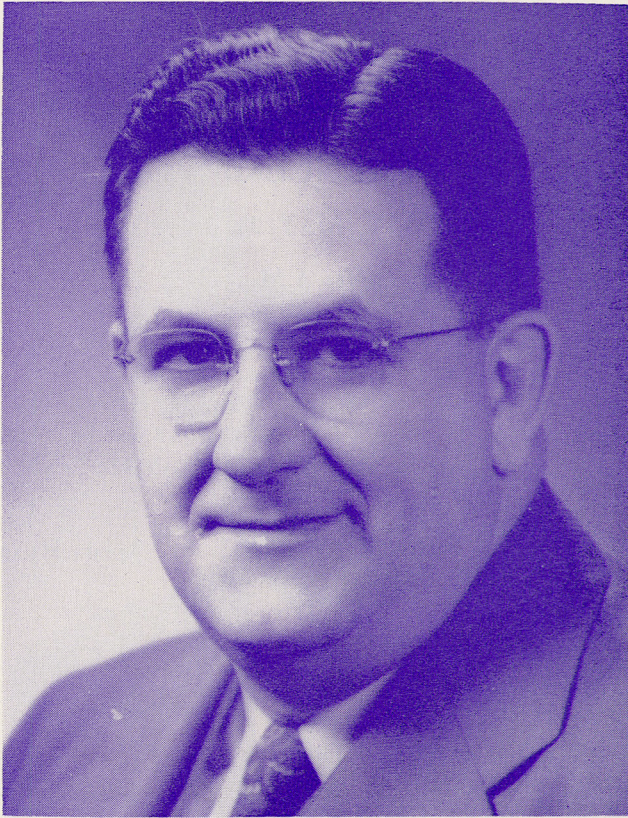

EDWARD V. LONG

Lieutenant Governor Edward V. Long, official representative of the Governor at the cornerstone laying, is a native of Lincoln County. His education was in Lincoln County rural schools, Eolia High School, and the University of Missouri. He is a trustee of Culver-Stockton College.

Mr. Long began the practice of law at Bowling Green in 1936 and was prosecuting attorney for Pike County for four years. From 1941 to 1945 he served as city attorney of Bowling Green. From 1945 to 1957 he was state senator from the Twenty-first District, consisting of Audrain, Callaway, Cole, Lincoln, and Pike Counties. In the Sixty-fifth General Assembly he was majority floor leader and in the Sixty-eighth General Assembly he was the senate's president pro tem. He is president of the Canton State Bank; the Farmers State Bank of Greenfield, Illinois; of Long & Company; the Tower Loan Company; the Federal Loan Company; and the Long Theatre Company. He owns and operates several farms in Missouri.

Mr. Long has been a district governor of Rotary International; is a member of the Baptist Church, the Masons, the Odd Fellows, the Elks, Sons of the American Revolution, and the Missouri Bar Association. He was married to Miss Florence Secor in 1935; they have one daughter. He maintains a law office in Bowling Green and resides at Brookhill Farms, Clarksville. In Mr. Long's first year as lieutenant governor he spent more days as acting governor than any previous occupant of the office had done in a term of four years.

JOHN M. DALTON

John M. Dalton, serving his second term as Missouri's attorney general, was born in Vernon County, educated in Columbia, and is now a resident of Kennett in Southeast Missouri. He is a cotton and soybean farmer and was a member of a law firm in Kennett.

He was graduated from the University of Missouri School of Law with an LL.B. degree. His fraternities were Phi Gamma Delta (social) and Phi Delta Phi (legal).

The Attorney General was for twelve years a member of the Board of Education at Kennett. He is a former governor of Lions International, a Mason, a past president of the Board of Visitors of the University of Missouri, a past president of the National Association of Attorneys General, and is an elder in the Presbyterian Church. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of Westminster College, the Board of Curators of Stephens College, and the Governor's Committee on Interstate Co-operation.

In 1925 Mr. Dalton married Miss Geraldine Hall, of Dunklin County. They have a son, John Hall Dalton, who practices law at Kennett, and a daughter, Mrs. John Walton Hyland, of St. Louis.

As Missouri's attorney general, Mr. Dalton has been vigilant in reducing the costs of running his office; has recovered for the state over two million dollars in delinquent taxes and various penalties. He has been most vigorous in actions to see that county officials carry out their responsibilities and give the people fair and impartial law enforcement.
