REGISTRATION FOR SECOND SESSION summer classes at the University is scheduled for 8 to 10:30 a.m., today, in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building.

The last digit of a student's Social Security number determines his registration time. Those with digits 1, 2, 3, 4 should register at 8 a.m.; 5, 6, 7 at 9 a.m.; and 8, 9, 0 at 10 a.m. Students may enter any time after their number is scheduled.

Classes for Monday will meet for one hour according to this special registration day schedule: Period 1 (7:30-9:20 a.m.) meets 1-1:50 p.m.; Period 2 (9:30-11:20 a.m.) meets 2-2:50 p.m.; Period 3 (noon-1:50 p.m.) meets 3-3:50 p.m.; and Period 4 (2-3:50 p.m.) meets 4-4:50 p.m.

Final examinations for the second summer session will be held August 12. Summer Commencement is set for 7:30 p.m. August 12.

SESSION II OF THE 1000 HILLS SUMMER TWEEN CLUB begins today. TWEEN CLUB, a comprehensive recreational program for boys and girls ages 6-14, is designed to provide "fun through learning."
