At the time I returned for my 50th class reunion two years ago, and again last year, I was very much impressed by the Showboat Gamblers. Could this be the college band I had played in over fifty years ago?

Just recently I read Greg Wright's article on the Gamblers in the NEMOSCOPE. I'd really like to show the band personnel that they do indeed have a rich background of traditions! What they are, and what they do, may be different from the student bands of the latter 1920s, and the first faculty-directed College Band of 1930, even the first Varsity Marching Band that Karl Webb produced in 1933. But certainly they are connected by many traditions! The early bands were not formed to provide entertainment at halftime of home football games. They did not emphasize "sliding steps," nor have the big, varied repertoire of music that the Gamblers have. Those bands were but part of the combined effort of many to arouse enthusiasm. Cheerleaders, pep squads, song-leaders, card-display sections, pep assemblies in Kirk Auditorium; parades, pep rallies out on Kirk Field and Stokes Stadium beginning in 1930; bonfires, and "snake dances"; all were for building up support for the Bulldog team! Even a mascot, a live Bulldog, was brought to the games!

The student bands that appeared on campus during the 1920s "paved the way" for the College Band of 1929. Financial support, a faculty member as the director, a place in the college curriculum, and college credit was given. Four years later, the first Varsity Marching Band made its appearance. This band then was the forerunner of the Marching 100, and the Purple and eventually, the Showboat Gamblers, as organized in 1979.

Mitau Award means Northeast is No. 1

Elsewhere in the NEMOSCOPE you will read about Northeast winning the G. Theodore Mitau Award for innovation and change in higher education. The award from the American Association of State Colleges and Universities in many ways is a milestone in the life of your university and cannot be overemphasized.

As Hilburn Fishback, president of the Board of Regents, said at the community recognition banquet for the University: "It's like winning the World Series, only this time there were 357 teams involved rather than 24." In short, your university currently sits atop other AASCU-type institutions for what's happening in academics.

As Mr. Fishback said, it's tantamount to winning

the World Series, the Super Bowl, the Olympics, the Boston Marathon, or whatever you wish to call it, of college academics. What's happening here with value added (see Vol. #36, No. 3, NEMOSCOPE) is at the forefront of the nation.

Letters come in daily from other colleges to President McClain's office asking about value added. A short film explaining the program has been produced and a book published by AASCU will soon be available about Northeast and the value-added program. This spring, Gov. Bond recognized the program in his written budget message to the legislature and recommended Northeast for additional funding to carry on the work of value added.

Obviously we are proud of this achievement and

hope you as alumni are proud too. The award "adds value" to your degree as recognition from the Mitau Award shines on all of us associated with Northeast.

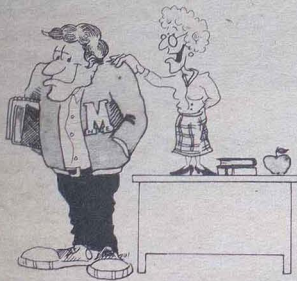
More important perhaps is that Northeast is one of the few schools in the nation which is objectively evaluating the quality of undergraduate education.

As President McClain told a group of parents of high school seniors the other day, "We want a degree from Northeast to stand up against degrees from any other college or university in the country. That's what value added is all about."

Around 750 high school seniors and transfer students visited NMSU during VIP weekend in late January. Students from as far away as Wisconsin and Ohio participated in the weekend, designed to give the students a taste of college life. The visitors went on campus tours, attended the basketball game against Central Missouri State and stayed overnight in the residence halls.



The list of the 10 most popular majors on the University campus has remained fairly consistent over the last 10 years. This year's list is headed by business administration, with 892 students seeking that degree, which is twice as many as any other major. The next nine are accounting, elementary education, biology, computer science, industrial technology, criminal justice, nursing, mass communication and general agriculture. Dave Rector, director of computer services, said the only change in the list in the last 10 years is that computer science and industrial technology have replaced psychology and special education.



NMSU was one of the big winners in the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education's recent regional competition. The University's Public Relations/Publications staff won the Runner-Up Sweepstakes Award for District VI, which consists of more than 200 colleges in Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wyoming. The winner of the Sweepstakes Award was the University of Kansas (Lawrence).

Big winners for NMSU included CAMPUS, the getting-ready-for-college newsmagazine, which received a first-place Certificate of Exceptional Achievement in the university tabloids category and a second-place Award of Excellence in the admissions category for direct mail. CAMPUS is mailed to high school juniors and seniors in Missouri, Iowa and Illinois five times a year.

NMSU received another Certificate of Exceptional Achievement in the electronic media category for a videotape on the University's Value-Added Model of Assessment. The videotape features narration by actor Vincent Price and interviews with students and faculty members.

NMSU's new Alumni Directory is in its final stages of production, and should be available in early April. Alumni who contributed \$15 or more to the NMSU Development Fund will have the Directory delivered to their homes. Alumni and friends of the University may order the Directory after March 1, but the minimum gift to the Fund will increase to \$30.



Northeast graduates swept all four categories of the South Central Iowa Band Association Jazz Festival, held in December. Larry Green ('68) directed the jazz band from Valley High School in West Des Moines, Iowa, first-place winners in Class AA. Other winners included: Pella (Iowa) High Schools, directed by Dick Redman ('76) in Class A; North Polk High School in Alleman, Iowa, directed by David Cunningham ('80) in Class B-C; and Valley High again for Second Class Band, directed by Steve McCombs ('74).



Classical pianist Dmitry Feofanov ('81) performed at his alma mater in late January. Feofanov was born in the Soviet Union, where he began studying the piano at the age of 5. He earned his undergraduate degree at conservatories in Moscow and Leningrad.

After earning his master's degrees from NMSU and the University of Illinois (Urbana), Feofanov began teaching at the University of Kentucky (Lexington). He is still teaching there, but he also presents concerts across the United States. He was a top prizewinner in the International Piano Competition and Festival at the University of Maryland in 1982.

Feofanov performed selections from Bach, Haydn, Brahms, Prokofiev, Chopin, Liszt, and Rachmaninoff in Baldwin Hall Auditorium on the NMSU campus.



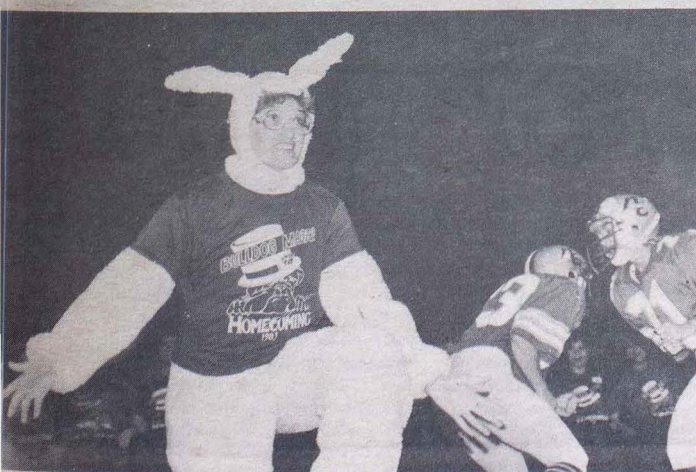

And the winner is... Northeast!

The value-added program at Northeast recently received national recognition by receiving the G. Theodore Mitau Award for Excellence and Innovation in Education from the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. This award is the highest honor AASCU bestows upon its member institutions.

University President Charles McClain received the award on behalf of Northeast at AASCU's annual meeting in San Diego last November.

McClain conceptualized the value-added program during the 1974 academic year, four years after he began his presidency at Northeast. Basically, the value-added program provides statistical evidence that the University has affected a positive change in a student's knowledge, attitudes, values and thinking skills. These statistics are collected through the comprehensive use of surveys and periodic testing.

"Great ideas cannot be stopped. Its time has come, and whenever an idea is sound, it keeps on growing," McClain said.

The Value-Added Model of Assessment has indeed grown to the point of national recognition and McClain foresees further growth in its future.

"I hope that we (the University) do the appropriate things to make our students more competitive. We should be discontent with substandard results from our students," McClain said.

Northeast was chosen by presidents of AASCU member institutions to share the Mitau Award with Cleveland State University's Alternative Education Program.

Allan Ostar, president of the ASSCU Board of Directors, said, "Although the programs are very different, the subcommittee feels that both are truly outstanding and merit this honor. It also seems very appropriate to honor two programs that demonstrate innovative approaches to two ongoing concerns of all AASCU institutions: quality education and public service."

The two universities were chosen from a field of 69

nominations this year. The Mitau Award was established in 1979 as a memorial to Ted Mitau for his contributions in promoting educational innovation and excellence as well as a means to recognize and encourage innovative responses to changing educational needs.

In addition to the award, AASCU is publishing a book on Northeast's program. The publication discusses the University's program, offering a guideline for other institutions which might choose to implement value added.

What will all this recognition do to the program? McClain said he hopes it will hold Northeast to maintaining the program and its high-quality standards of excellence.

"Some companies admit that they rank universities and pay beginning employees on the basis of that rank. Once we have documented proof of the quality of our graduates on a national level, we can sit down with any employer and have valid proof that shows why we should be ranked higher," McClain said. "This concept is very valuable to our prospective graduates and those upwardly mobile in their careers."

"I hope it will seal the University's commitment to it (value added)," McClain said. "With the present economy, it would be tempting to lower standards to concentrate on numbers."

Another important outcome of the recognition received involves the state's support of the program. Gov. Christopher Bond recommended that Northeast receive \$519,565 during the 1984 fiscal year to continue its value-added program. This support enables the University to concentrate on quality rather than only the quantity of students. At a time when state funding for higher education is being drastically cut back, the Governor's recommendation is particularly encouraging.

McClain said graduates will be seeing the effect of Northeast's value-added program in the job market.

"Some companies admit that they rank universities and pay beginning employees on the basis of that rank. Once we have documented proof of the quality of our graduates on a national level, we can sit down with any employer and have valid proof that shows why we should be ranked higher," McClain said. "This concept is very valuable to our prospective graduates and those upwardly mobile in their careers."

McClain also said graduates should watch what is occurring with admission and academic standards at their alma mater. Just as proof of higher quality can be advantageous, a lowering of standards can deflate a university's credentials.

"Universities and colleges should have an enormous amount of academic freedom, but at the same time, must be held accountable," McClain said.

Northeast can be held accountable through its results of external measurements of its present students and its graduates.

"It's a new day for this University and our sister universities and we need to know that we'll meet the expectations of this new day," McClain said.

Greeks Honored by Nationals



Two University Greek social organizations have won national awards in recent months. Delta Chi fraternity and Delta Zeta sorority both were honored, and several NMSU Greeks have also won individual awards.

The Delta Chi chapter received the President's Cup, given to the national fraternity's outstanding chapter at the small-college level. The Cup, given at the national convention in August, honors outstanding achievement in academics, service, leadership, extracurricular activities and fraternity programs.

The Delta Zeta chapter received the Founder's Award at the sorority's biennial convention held in June. It is one of the two highest awards given by the national organization, and is given on the basis of excellence in membership and finance, cooperating with all national requirements and programs, as well as leadership in academics and service. The chapter was honored with a set of silver candlesticks, used in the Founders ritual on the NMSU campus in October.

Several individuals have also been honored recently by their national organizations. Carl Mueller ('83) was given the Ellsworth Dent Man of the Year Award, presented annually by Sigma Tau Gamma's national organization. Mueller is now attending graduate school at Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

Senior John Adams won Sigma Tau Gamma's Stan Musial Sportsmanship Award for 1983-84. The national honor is awarded to individuals who have demonstrated excellence both on the playing field and in the classroom. Adams has been a member of NMSU's varsity basketball team for the past two seasons and also carries a 3.91 grade point average in the business management program.

Pi Kappa Phi awarded its National Founder's Scholarship for 1983-84 to NMSU senior Jim Prewitt. The award of \$1,000 is given to men who have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement, leadership in the local chapter and service to the community. Prewitt is the president of NMSU's Interfraternity Council.

The name is different, but the spirit and determination are the same. It used to be called the debate team at NMSU, and it was recognized as one of the top ten in the United States. Now it is called the forensics team, and it is quickly re-establishing itself as one of the best programs in the Midwest. Why the team had to re-establish itself and how it did so is a tribute to Nancy Goulden, the team's coach, and to the members themselves.

NMSU has a long and rich tradition in debate and speech. Several debating clubs began on the University campus around 1900. Throughout the years, some sort of debate team or club functioned on campus, although they were usually disbanded during wartime.

By the late 1970s, the debate team was recognized as one of the best college squads in the country, thanks in large part to its coach, David Buckley. Then all that work was undone on the night of Sept. 15, 1979.

While on a trip to a tournament at the University of Missouri-Columbia, some members of the debate team loaded more than 140 volumes of government documents from the UMC Library in laundry bags. The bags were then dropped to the ground from a second-story window, loaded into vehicles and brought back to Kirksville with the team.

A member of the team told University officials of the incident and they found the stolen books. Team members protested they only took the documents because the materials weren't available at NMSU. But two team members dropped out of school, three were placed on disciplinary probation and Buckley was suspended without pay. He eventually resigned, and the team fell into a state of limbo.

Goulden still refers to the incident as "The Great Disgrace." She also says it caused the present team quite a few problems at first. "In the past, there were some remarks made by members of other teams, and the state didn't travel at all in Missouri. We went out-of-state for our competition," Goulden said.

"We used to travel just outside of Missouri, because you could tell there were still some personal feelings on the part of some judges in the state," senior Rusty Smith said. "They still remembered the incident. But now we're getting a good reputation again. It's almost like we're creating an all-new team from an all-new university."

Goulden said the change from debate to forensics, which involves several individual events in dramatics, interpretive readings and extemporaneous speaking, was something that just happened. "Under William Corbin (a former coach), the team just branched out. It wasn't any formal decision; that just seemed to be where the students' interests were," she said.

This year's squad has already placed second overall in two individual events tournaments. The debate squad won the first trophy in three years, and junior Shawn Cassidy has already qualified for the national tournament in prose reading, the first national qualifier ever from NMSU. Cassidy and Smith have finished first in two tournaments in the dramatic duet category, and if they win one more tournament, they will qualify for the national contest.

Both Smith and Cassidy enjoy doing the routine. "Most of my preparation is looking for pieces to perform and then working on the role I'm playing. I really enjoy it," Cassidy said. "It's like wine-tasting; it's a cultural experience. You get exposed to some great writing."

Of the piece that has won the two tournaments, Smith said, "Shawn found it, and he approached me about doing the duet with him. When I first saw it, it

really didn't seem to be that special, but the more we looked into it, the more I realized we could really have something good. This is my last year here at the University. It's my big shot, so to speak, and I really hope it pays off."

Not only has the team grown from 10 students two years ago to 25 this year, but the majority of the team is young. "We have a number of freshmen, but most of our students have some previous public-speaking experience," said Goulden. "They may not have been part of a team in high school, but they made a speech or entered a contest, and that sparked their interest."

Goulden's coaching keeps the team's interest up. "Nancy is an exceptional, fun lady," Smith said. "She's not only your teacher; she's your best friend. She's always behind you, encouraging you."

The team and coach are also appreciative of the support from others on campus. "This is a very close, friendly campus," Smith said. "I think the same is true of our team. If you want to join the team, you become a part of our family. At some of the larger schools, people are so competitive just at earning a place on the team that sometimes they don't support other team members the way they should at tournaments."

"I think this administration gives us an unusual amount of support, whereas many universities just don't support forensics squads because they see it as a large expense for only a few students," Goulden said.

The team continues to develop. The debate part of the squad is continuing to improve under Goulden's coaching, more and more theatre majors have expressed interest in the individual events and high school students often inquire about the forensics scholarships available at the University. In late January, Northeast hosted its first forensics tournament in years, yet another step in rebuilding its reputation.

"I don't think the incident under David Buckley has had any lasting effect," Goulden said. "To the students on the squad this year, it's ancient history."

"We've got plenty of newcomers, and we're getting better each time we compete," Cassidy said. "This school used to be one of the top ten in the country, and I think we're starting to regain that recognition."

One of "12 Beauties" remembered

Dora Cavett was one of the original "12 Beauties" in the 1902 Echo. In later years, she lived in Palm Springs, Calif.



Twenty years prior to the naming of the first Echo Queen, a predecessor appeared in the first issue of the Echo in 1902.

In that issue, a group of 12 women in turn-of-the-century garb was pictured, and the caption underneath read "The Twelve Beauties." These women might be considered as the forerunners of the Echo queens.

One of these beauties, Dora Edwards Cavett, died May 5, 1983, at the age of 104 in the home of her son Sam Cavett in Palm Springs, Calif.

Cavett attended the Kirksville Normal School from 1898 to 1902. She then married her husband, Sam Cavett Sr. and had three children—Clayton, Christine and Sam Jr. Sam Cavett Jr. and two grandchildren are the only survivors of the oldest Echo beauty.

Before moving to San Jose, Calif., in 1946, Cavett was a resident of Kirksville and was politically and socially active. Upon appointment by the governor, Cavett filled the unexpired term of Adair County treasurer following her husband's death in 1941.

Her activities in California included the Sojourner's Club, the Mother's Home Club and the Desert Blind Association, of which she was the oldest member. She'd been blind for several years before she died. She was frequently seen around Palm Springs, and often rode in her rather distinctive vehicle—a 1918 Milburn Electric Brougham.

As one of the oldest Echo beauties, Cavett managed to outlive even the 50-year reign of her successors, the Echo Queens.

Queen for a year

The first big name was Cecil B. De Mille in 1928. Then later there was Tyrone Power, Kay Kyser, Bob Hope and Bing Crosby. A good 25 years later there was Johnny Carson and Dick Cavett. Oh, and in 1948 there was our President—Ronald Reagan.

Most everyone would easily recognize these big-name celebrities, but most everyone wouldn't recognize that each of these celebrities has played an active part in creating NMSU's history.

The names listed above were among the more famous of the celebrity judges of the Echo Queen.

The Echo, the school's yearbook, was first published in 1902. The Echo first bestowed the honor upon Beulah Way in 1922. The queen had no duties and was chosen primarily on the basis of beauty.

The process of selection varied quite a bit over the years. In 1922, the student body elected Way to receive the honor over five other candidates representing various student organizations.

During the first few years of Echo royalty, it seems that the students chose the queen. Celebrity judging first began in 1928 when photographs of the college's 12 prettiest girls were sent to Cecil B. De Mille, the famous movie director, for appraisal. That year, four queens were chosen for the title, one from each class.

For 49 consecutive years—with the exceptions of 1923 when no queen was cited and 1924, 1927 and 1928, when more than one queen was cited, the Echo bestowed its title upon one beautiful coed.

Current faculty members who are alumni of the University remember the honor well. Dona Truitt, assistant professor of English at NMSU and Echo Queen of 1947, remembered being selected by Bob Hope. "It was a tremendous honor and very exciting," she said.

In the case of Truitt's selection, two candidates and one alternate were selected by each class. Then eight photographs of the candidates were sent to Bob Hope who chose the prettiest girl to reign as queen. This seemed to be the most common process of selection.

In 1949, an interesting addition was made to the process when Francis Dant was named the first Echo king. For the next 15 years, until 1966, both an Echo King and Queen were named. The reason for the sudden addition of a male counterpart as well as the

demise of the Echo King title is not explained in the school's publications.

An annual spring formal, first referred to as the Junior-Senior Prom and later known as the Echo Dance, was the gala event of the year at which the Echo queens and later the kings and queens were crowned.

Les Brown, Jimmy Dorsey and Ralph Martier were just a few of the big-name band leaders who entertained at these formals and crowned the Echo royalty.

Although the reason for the termination of Echo royalty titles isn't clear, current faculty members have their opinions. Gina Myers, assistant director of admissions and one of the Echo Queen candidates in 1971, felt the tradition might have ended because of a changing society.

"The selection of Echo Queen was definitely a beauty pageant. Judges (in 1971) chose the girl who was going to be the most photogenic. In the '70s, I think this was seen as discriminatory and pageants were eschewed. There was more of a focus on women cultivating their mind and talents than on having a pretty face," Myers said.

Deb Shrout, current Echo advisor, felt that an increased emphasis on journalistic principles and a changing campus life might have led to the termination of Echo Queen.

"Yearbook staffs now are interested in being journalistically sound. Staffs now feel they have more important things to cover. Of course, if there is a queen, our staff would want to cover it, but we're not in it to create the event," Shrout said.

Referring to the changing campus life, Shrout said, "Queens centered around formal dances, and that's no longer a big part of campus life. As things changed, queens didn't have such prominence any longer."

The celebrities have probably forgotten flipping through photos of NMSU women in search of the prettiest face. But the women they picked will long remember the celebrity judge who inducted them into NMSU royalty, and alumni often take down their old yearbooks to glimpse again at the Echo Queens and the stars who judged them.

Caught in the act



Pat Severns

As a teenager growing up in Memphis, Tenn., Pat Harris did a lot of local television, radio and stage work, with a small amount of film work thrown in. "I thought everyone interested in this profession did as much as they could," she said. At 17 years of age, Harris headed north to begin her college education at the University of Iowa in Iowa City, pretty sure of what she wanted to do with her life.

"The best laid plans..." as the saying goes, and Harris married James Severns, now professor of dramatics at NMSU, and left school to become a housewife and mother to three children. After moving to Kirksville in 1958, Mrs. Severns began acting again, using her maiden name on stage. Severns worked at the Ice House Theater in Hannibal, Mo., for several years and started the Traveller's Community Theater in Kirksville. She also started school again at NMSU and graduated in 1966 with a bachelor's degree in English.

Now a part-time instructor of speech at the University and with her children grown up and on their own, Severns has time to take a renewed interest in her drama career.

"I had to spend a lot of time re-learning the ropes and unlearning things I had learned when I was younger," Severns said. "When I worked in Memphis, radio and T.V. was live."

Severns obviously has what it takes to "get back into the swing of things." The actress recently performed in two television productions. Severns appeared in two scenes on the television series, "The Mississippi," starring Ralph Waite, a former star on "The Waltons." Severns' agent obtained an audition for her and she was cast in the role of "the villain's wife" after a second audition.

Severns' role took a day and a half to shoot on location in Kimswick, Mo., a small Mississippi River town south of St. Louis.

Severns also appeared in the ABC docu-drama, "The Day After," which was aired late last November. The television production dramatized the effects of a nuclear attack on Kansas City and Lawrence, Kan.

Severns said the movie used a lot of amateur actors and 3,000 to 4,000 people auditioned each of three days in Kansas City for minor roles.

"If I hadn't been in Kansas City that day, I wouldn't have auditioned," Severns said.

Severns also said that shooting with a cast as large as the one used was "organized mayhem."

"I found that (mayhem) very scary," Severns said.

Severns' role was that of one of two ladies nearest a supply truck right before a food riot.

"Behind the black actress and me were eight well-trained stuntmen and women, with about 100 untrained extras behind them," Severns said. "When the riot began, she and I had to jump under the truck to avoid being literally crushed."

Although filming her role took only one day in Lawrence, Severns said she came home with several bruises.

"Amateurs are scary in acting. I found it very frightening to work with them," Severns said. "It was dangerous. They had a special tent set up on location for the injured."

Despite a somewhat bad experience, Severns is enjoying her move back into the acting world. She is still active in community and University productions and keeps busy teaching as well. As for the future, Severns hopes to someday work with a good repertory company, as either a resident or in performing roles.

One of America's favorite daytime dramas is "All My Children," referred to fondly by avid viewers as "All My Kids." One 1978 graduate of NMSU plays a minor part in front of the cameras. Christie McGinn, formerly of Ballwin, Mo., portrays Irma on the "All My Children" set in New York City.

McGinn left NMSU with a bachelor's degree in theatre and headed straight for the Big Apple to make her way into show business.

"I started off doing a lot of technical things to get to know people here," McGinn said. She worked with studio film, children's theatre, showcase theatre or "off-off Broadway productions." She also had a bit part in Al Corly's short-film production of "Fat," featuring songs written by Carly Simon.

About one year ago, McGinn began working on the "AMC" set as a background extra. Since then, she has worked her way up to the part she now has. Irma occasionally works in the Glamourama.

McGinn said her character is fun to perform. "I've done it (performed her role) basically from me. Irma is shy and nervous and I portray that in a nervous situation, along with the help of lights and camera angles," McGinn said.

McGinn said Irma's character and role is not strictly scripted or directed, so she does a lot of interpretation on her own. She hopes the character will become

more prominent in the future.

What are the other actresses and actors on the "AMC" set like? "There are different degrees of popularity with the different people on the 'All My Children' set," McGinn said. "There are no stars once you're taping. Everyone works together. It's a group of people trying to get to know each other."

McGinn knows one of the other "AMC" performers quite well. Barbara Hooyma, McGinn's roommate, plays the part of Ethel, also an employee of the Glamourama. McGinn met Hooyma on the show when both actresses were extras. About a year after Hooyma was cast in Ethel's role, McGinn began her role as Irma.

Since McGinn's role is only minor, she shoots only once or twice each month. To shoot the equivalent of one soap opera day, the cast begins at 7 a.m. with a walk-through with the script. At 10 a.m., it's the cameramen's turn to walk through the episode. After lunch, the cast runs through a dress rehearsal, followed by the actual taping of the show from about 4 p.m. until 9 p.m. or later.

Since McGinn is needed infrequently on the set, she works around her "AMC" schedule, selling tickets for various Broadway productions.

McGinn said the toughest part about her job is adapting to working with the television medium.

"My expertise is basically stage. It's harder (working with television) because you're learning camera angles and lights and don't need to project since the microphone is right above your head," McGinn said.

McGinn also said that in television productions, an actress is trusted to do more of what she wants to do as opposed to stage where the director tells her exactly what to do.

McGinn attributed some of her success to her education at NMSU. She said that although her experience here did not prepare her for auditions, it did prepare her for the logistics of the field and the everyday routine.

"I met the people I have met because I did everything in college," McGinn said. She said her experience in the technical area of production, stage managing and acting makes her versatile enough to find a variety of positions with productions.

"Your education is important because you need the practical experience," McGinn said. "You need the self-confidence and the strength of yourself because in the end, you only have yourself. You either make it or go home." McGinn also said that "making it" included not only getting roles, but adapting to a city like New York and its people.

McGinn used to audition on her own but now works with an agent. She also utilizes trade papers and sends out postcards, pictures and other items to prospective employers.

"Auditions are fewer and farther between than they used to be," McGinn said. "After seeing some 400 people at one audition, I decided to use an agent to set up auditions for me."

McGinn said she hopes her soap opera role will get bigger and has her eyes set on theater roles and commercials, so she can become more widely known and more financially stable.

"I want to do and learn all of it," McGinn said. Why does she compete in such a tough business? "This (acting) is what I want to do."

Teacher bridges two cultures

WANTED: A teacher, not a miracle worker. A college grad looking for adventure yet willing to live in relative isolation. Competitive salary. Low rent. High turnover. Apply to the Ganado Indian Reservation.

Lif it sounds like a challenge, it is, but it can be a rewarding one. So said David Lindley ('71), who has taught in the Ganado Public Schools for nine years. The high school students Lindley teaches are Navaho Indians, born and raised on a reservation the size of West Virginia, with a population of 150,000 to 175,000. The Navahos, renowned for handcrafting wool rugs and turquoise jewelry, are the largest Indian tribe in the U.S.

Bridging the gap between two cultures makes Lindley's job unique. "The students are confused about what to believe in. For example, there's a sign in town that says 'Navahos walk in beauty' and shows a picture of a rainbow. On the ground beneath it are liquor bottles and cans. When I mention this to the students they recognize the contradictions in their culture. They don't know which world they're supposed to walk in and they can't figure out how to walk in both," Lindley said.

Although young Navahos are very aware of modern American culture, tradition is still an integral part of their lives. He says there is high absenteeism among students who stay home to take part in traditional Navaho ceremonies and if a student is sick, he may go to a doctor or may call in the medicine man.

Fourteen-year-old Lamardo Tsinajinnie (a clan name) speaks fluent Navaho but follows Navaho customs to a lesser extent since he was adopted by Lindley seven years ago. "I still keep him tuned into the Navaho culture and language," Lindley said. Still, he would like his son to see an alternative lifestyle someday and plans eventually to move back to Missouri, perhaps to St. Louis where he taught for several years. "Some people would say I'm robbing Lamardo of his culture, but with 14 years on the reservation under his belt, he has a good feel for the culture."

The fact that Lindley can't retire on the reservation

because Anglos are not allowed to own land or a house there is another reason he will soon be compelled to leave. In addition, he wants his son to take a look at Northeast, a school he believes has fully prepared him for his teaching experiences thus far.

The silver arch and bustling city life of St. Louis will be a sharp contrast to the high desert land of Ganado, which is characterized by mesas, canyons and ponderosa pine forests. Certainly the rent in St. Louis will be higher than the \$35-a-month Lindley now

pays for a two-bedroom apartment. Nor will they see any traditional Navaho dwellings, called hogans, among the suburban homes. Hogans are one-room, six-or eight-sided houses made of wooden planks and mud. Many Navahos own hogans for ceremonial purposes as well as a frame house or trailer.

The Navahos still depend largely on raising sheep and cattle for their livelihood; however, there are some jobs in forestry, coal mining and tourism, if there are any jobs at all. High unemployment is recognized as one of the biggest crises facing today's American Indians. The exact figure is debated by tribal leaders, but some say seasonal unemployment may be as high as 70 percent in Ganado. Lindley said

the limited employment opportunities cause motivational problems for young students. "The incentive for getting an education is limited; they may not see the immediate value of having an education," he said.

Lindley said some of the situations faced by teachers in city ghettos, such as the family disruptions caused by the poverty and alcoholism related to unemployment, are also faced on the reservation. He believes it would help if the government would allocate more money to the reservations and allow them the sovereignty to spend it. "However, it's going to take more than money to solve their problems," he said.

"New teachers who come to the reservation with grandiose ideas of saving the best of the past and applying it to the future are often disappointed," Lindley said. "To teach here you can't get discouraged. Anyone who is here for a number of years learns a lesson in the tolerance of someone else's feelings and beliefs." Many Navahos hesitate to become socially involved with Anglos and view them with a mixture of awe and distrust. "A new teacher has to give students time to warm up. They don't reach out and grab you right away," he said.

After getting to know them through teaching geography and native American history, coaching wrestling and coordinating student activities at the high school, Lindley has found the temperament of the Navaho students to be ideal. "I've been here nine years because of the students. Teachers anywhere will say that but the students here certainly are unique," he said.

Nonetheless there is an extremely high turnover of teachers on the reservation. "Some just can't adjust to the isolation," Lindley said. "Some discover they can't be miracle workers and they become disenchanting. This is a place for someone looking for a teaching adventure. It's a good place to become acquainted with education."

Two NMSU professors die

Former NMSU instructor Craig McKenzie died Nov. 6, 1983, of stomach cancer in The Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. McKenzie, 28, taught broadcasting and mass media classes at the University during the 1981-82 academic year.

McKenzie had undergone several different therapies at Mayo, and hoped to return to teaching at the University. NMSU granted him a leave of absence for a year, and didn't replace him until the present academic year. But his condition began to deteriorate in September, 1983.

Edwin Carpenter, head of the Division of Language and Literature, said McKenzie was an excellent instructor. "He had a lot of potential, and I think he would have been an outstanding teacher given a life

to do it in," Carpenter said. "It was a loss all the way around."

Jim King, instructor of mass communication, said McKenzie's dedication to teaching impressed him. "He did a thorough job; he prepared such detailed lecture notes. Students learned from him, they knew it, and they appreciated it," King said.

McKenzie earned his bachelor's degree at Western Illinois University. Before coming to NMSU, he worked as program director at radio station KFIL in his hometown of Preston, Minn.

McKenzie is survived by his wife of two years, Susan Margaret, and her eight-year-old son Jason by a previous marriage.

Dr. Robert J. Peavler, professor of physics, died on Oct. 14, 1983, in the University of Missouri Medical Center, Columbia, Mo. The 59-year-old Peavler had entered the Medical Center only one day earlier.

Peavler had taught physics at the University since 1964. He founded Northeast's Amateur Radio Club in 1967, and continued to serve as its adviser until his death.

Peavler was also a member of the American Radio Relay League, in which he held several offices, including Section Communication Chief. He was a 19-year member of the Northeast Missouri Amateur Radio Club and was serving as its president at the time of his death.

Peavler was born in Wittington, Ill., and raised in the West Frankfort, Ill., area. He earned his bachelor's

degree in 1947 at Southern Illinois University. In 1949, he received his master's degree from the University of Illinois and his doctorate from Purdue University in 1953.

Before joining the University faculty, Peavler was an engineer for the Westinghouse Corp. for seven years. He also headed the Department of Chemistry at Ottawa (Kan.) University, and was a physicist at the Midwest Research Institute for two years.

Dr. Peavler also worked for Plenum Publishing Co. in New York City as a Russian translator. He was a former officer of the American Association of University Professors.

Peavler is survived by his wife of 26 years, Dorothy; two sons, James Thomas and Robert David; and one daughter, Emily Ruth.

Goalie wins All-American status

Fall athletes honored

The beginning of 1984 brought several honors for participants in fall sports at the University. In addition to Stan Dippel's All-American recognition and the soccer team's success (see above), several members of the football, volleyball and cross country teams won awards.

The men's cross country team ended a banner season by finishing 17th at the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division II national meet. The team had finished second at the regional meet, and won the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship. The leading runners for the team were three seniors, Todd Arnold, Bryan Trickey and Tommy Hill.

The women's cross country squad finished third in the MIAA race, behind Southeast Missouri State University and Central Missouri State University. The team then finished in fourth place at the regional meet. The leading women runners included seniors Cindy Trickey and Vicki Kijewski and freshmen Karen Eads and Cheryl Mitchell.

Three NMSU football players received national honors. Center Mike Yancey was named to the Associated Press Little All-America second team, while quarterback Tom Hayes and wide receiver Rich Otte were given honorable mention. All three were seniors and they served as the Bulldogs' captains last fall.

Yancey was an MIAA first-team selection twice in his career and was the first NMSU player to be chosen first- or second-team All-American since Eric Holm made the second unit as a wide receiver in 1980.

Hayes owns 15 school and conference records and was named the MIAA's most valuable player for a record third consecutive season. Hayes threw for 34 touchdowns and almost 5,000 yards in his three-year career at the University.

Otte holds four school and three conference records and led all 1983 seniors in Division II career receiving. He was a three-time unanimous MIAA all-conference pick. Otte finished his career ranked eighth on the all-time Division II list in career pass receptions as he caught 202 passes for 2,821 yards.

The volleyball team ended its season with a 30-10 record, the best in the team's history. The squad finished second in the MIAA with a 10-5 conference mark. Senior Tracy Ivanovsky was a first-team MIAA selection and was nominated for the All-American team. Junior Maggie Egofske and sophomore Julie Canull were named to the MIAA's second team.

Stan Dippel didn't have hundreds of fans cheering him on each time he made a save but he did it over and over again last year, leading his team to a winning season and earning All-American honors for himself. It was the first time since soccer became an intercollegiate sport at NMSU in 1979 that a Bulldog player was named to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America Division II All-American team.

"Speaking for the whole team, we're all proud of him. When I first came to NMSU I never dreamed anyone would get All-American recognition. Even conference recognition seemed great," tri-captain Jeff Diersen said.

Dippel, a sophomore goalkeeper from St. Louis, allowed an average of only one goal per game and recorded six shutouts and 113 saves in 1983. Dippel's skill combined with that of his teammates produced an overall record of 10-6-2 and a share of the MIAA championship with the University of Missouri-St. Louis. "We peaked this year," said Dippel. "We almost went to the nationals." Dippel and teammates Dan Basler and Dan Hogan were also chosen to the NSAA All-Midwest Team, the first step toward selection as an All-American.

The goalie credits the team's success to the leadership of Coach John Guffey, who was named Conference Coach of the Year and NCAA Division II Midwest Region Coach of the Year for the second consecutive year. "Coach Guffey's biggest asset was his relationship with the players. We felt comfortable with him, yet respected him," Dippel said, adding that the team was sorry to see him go after the 1983 season. Guffey left to assume duties as Director of Community Relations and Special Events at Cardinal Newman College in his hometown of St. Louis.

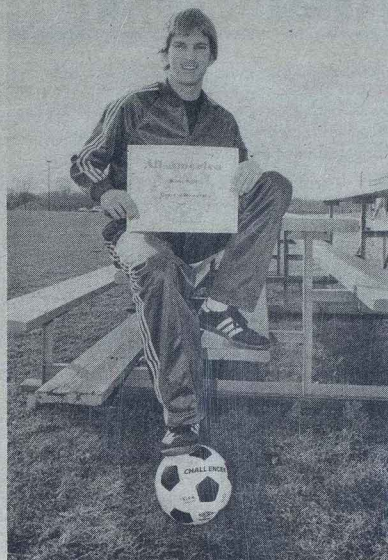
"The honor (Coach of the Year) is a tribute to the players and their hard work. They were very coachable and when you have a group that's willing to work, coaching is much more satisfying. I think by winning the award, combined with the program's accomplishments, the rest of the nation knows we have a good program here," Guffey said.

Both Guffey and Dippel received their honors in January at the National Soccer Coaches Association of America Honor Awards Convention in Philadelphia.

Despite the NMSU soccer team's impressive record of achievements, it is not among the top spectator sports at Northeast. Dippel said the lack of a crowd can be disappointing. "You can perform better when people are rooting for the team. It's a fun game to watch but people don't understand the rules." Dippel feels that will change because soccer is a growing sport in America. However, if soccer is going to develop at NMSU, Dippel believes some soccer scholarships will have to be established.

With more than two years of college left, the business administration major doesn't yet know if he will continue to play after graduation. "Professional ball is a dream. If I can, I'd like to play."

Dippel took up soccer at the age of six but didn't play goalie until he was a high school junior. At that time, he didn't plan to attend college until Guffey recruited him. "Even if I wasn't playing soccer I would be glad to be here in college, for the education and the friends."

University sued for scholarship

An Illinois jury recently ruled against the University in a case involving an oral contract to give a football scholarship to an Illinois student.

The jury awarded damages of \$8,600 to Jeff Fishel, a student of Milliken University in Decatur, Ill. Fishel said former Bulldog football coach Bruce Craddock had promised him a full-ride scholarship for the 1982-1983 academic year.

However, when a statement of athletic aid was issued in June 1982, it stated Fishel would only receive \$960 for out-of-state tuition. Fishel stated he tried to contact Craddock several times to clear up the matter. When he was unable to do so, he decided to play football at Milliken.

University General Counsel Ray Klinginsmith said the University is uncertain whether it will file a motion for a new trial.

"In order for us to have breached the promise, Fishel would have had to come back to school in the fall of 1982, and then been denied the full scholarship," Klinginsmith said. "He didn't give the University enough time to make good on the promise. He went somewhere else before telling Craddock even though there were six weeks before the season started."

"If we were not going to give him what we promised, which we were ready to do anyway, he could have then sued us for the difference," Klinginsmith said.

As a result, Klinginsmith said the University should not have to pay Fishel anything.

"We believe he received a promise of scholarship, but there was no time frame designated even though he received a \$960 statement. We were ready to provide the full scholarship," Klinginsmith said.

If the University files a motion for a new trial, it will be up to the circuit judge of the county in which the trial was held to grant or deny the request. If the motion for a new trial is granted, the case will be settled in a new trial. If the motion is denied, the University will either pay the \$8,600 or appeal to a higher court.

DIVISION UPDATE: EDUCATION

With all the media coverage of the failures in this nation's public schools, Missouri has taken a definite step to guarantee the minimum competencies of prospective teachers. Starting July 1, prospective teachers must have scored an 18 or better raw score on the ACT or an 800 or better on the SAT to gain admittance for the first time to a teacher training program at a Missouri university.

Loren Grissom, director of student teaching, said, "We must deliver to the profession, on the average, a higher-level teacher candidate than possibly we have been delivering. On a state-wide basis we need to be concerned about who goes into teaching, and we need some certainty, some assurance, that every person is qualified."

"We (divisions of education) don't want to be in the business of remedial education for four years," Dan Ball, head of the Division of Education, said.

He also said this law should not hurt enrollment very much, but rather it would strengthen enrollment. Students in teacher education will be less likely to flunk or drop out; the image of teachers should improve; and good students attract other good students to the program.

"It (the law) may affect other schools (in enrollment) more, but Northeast already has such high standards that I think our people, for the most part, will meet it," Grissom said.

Gordon Richardson, professor of education, compared the new law to the existing grade point average requirement for entrance into the program. "It (the

GPA standard) has caused some of the marginal ones to reconsider and choose something else. And I think that's what is going to happen with this (new requirement). There will be a few people who really want to become teachers and just don't have the ability to pass these tests; we will lose a few, but I don't foresee any great numbers dropping out."

For those students who do not meet the test score requirements, the tests can be retaken to improve the score. "Since it's an achievement test, people can achieve, they can improve their score," Ball said. "If you don't know how to write and you want to be a teacher, you need to learn to write a little before you can get into the program."

"They (the students not admitted) will be very disappointed, but it's humane, at least, to do it early," Grissom said. Problems can be identified and worked on before the test is retaken.

The law's call for measuring minimum competencies is "foundational, . . . an excellent beginning point in the selection process," Grissom said. "A lot of factors, including personality and love for children and young people, all of these have to be considered, too."

A standardized test score may not be the ideal way to measure competencies, but "it's probably the best measure we have," Grissom said. The tests measure two areas which he said are important to this foundation: communication skills (reading, writing, listening, speaking, although the latter is probably not measured that well on a standardized test) and grasp of general and specialized knowledge.

Grissom relates two other areas to these former measurements.

Sensitivity and skill in human relations is a necessary quality for teachers. "To the extent that a person is a skilled communicator and an informed person, that person would undoubtedly be more resourceful in responding in a classroom to all the personality types," and "better able to pick up and use the feedback that's available in a classroom," he said.

The other related area involves professional involvement through necessary preparation and research. "I believe that the people who are successful and score the minimum score, and we hope a lot above, would be the people who will do the reading, the study, the research, and do the professional participation essential to continuous development," Grissom said. "There's no way we can do the job here in four years...we really fail if our BSE graduates feel they've arrived."

The education faculty seem pleased with the new law. "This is probably one step toward answering the charge that we're placing inept people out in the classrooms," Grissom said. "The press tends to get carried away maybe with the changes, but there's too much truth in the stories."

Richardson said, "I think this law and the type of person who plans on going into teacher education will help upgrade the confidence of people in education."

Ball said, "I'm proud to see Missouri put some teeth into teacher education."

Assistant Professor of Music David McKamie said he found his first semester an adjustment process in making the transition from student to teacher.

"Right now I'm just trying to adjust to a new situation," McKamie, a classical pianist, said.

McKamie received his doctorate from the University of Kansas last year and was hired at NMSU to replace former Professor of Music Frederic Kirchberger. Kirchberger is now retired and lives in Vienna, Austria.

McKamie said he finds NMSU a progressive place. "The overall atmosphere is very supportive. It gives me a chance to work on my own as well as teach," he said.

"It's neat to find someone (McKamie) who appreciates the whole NMSU picture," said Dale Jorgenson, head of the Division of Fine Arts. "It's one of the happiest marriages of institution and new faculty we've had."

McKamie, 30, has been studying piano since the age of five. He grew up in Waco, Texas, where his father taught piano at Baylor University for 20 years. His mother is also a pianist. Between instructing three lecture classes, teaching 15 piano students and practicing 20-25 hours a week, McKamie still manages to find time to perform.

He gave two faculty recitals last semester and accompanied other recitals. He also won several small statewide competitions. He plans to give solo performances in St. Louis and Memphis this summer.

"I'm very performance-oriented, but I've always enjoyed teaching and that really has been something I've always anticipated doing," McKamie said. "I'd like to be able to perform more, and have a nice balance between performing and teaching."

McKamie is also active in judging auditions for the National Guild of Piano Teachers, which he has been doing for the past five years. He and his wife will spend 10 days in Memphis this June judging auditions.

"I'm real interested in attracting top-level piano students here," McKamie said. "One of the best ways to do this is to get out and perform and meet private teachers throughout the state by judging auditions."

DIVISION UPDATE: HPER

Today in America there is a movement toward movement—the kind that moves armchair athletes to hit the pavement or the hardwood floor of the local gym in search of aerobic fitness. Unfortunately, the road to physical fitness can lead to injuries among amateur and professional athletes alike. Thus the fitness boom in the last decade has led to a dramatic increase in sports research and sports medicine in the nation and in Northeast's Division of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Since 1977, extensive research into the fitness of NMSU students has been conducted in the Human Performance Laboratory in Pershing Building. Dr. Jerry Mayhew, director of the Lab and associate professor of physical education, has had numerous papers on fitness research published in physiological and coaching journals.

Now students interested in going into the field of fitness research have the opportunity to get a master's degree tailor-made to suit their interests. The newly implemented sport science option includes classes in

exercise physiology, the sociology of sport and medical aspects of sports. It also requires a specialization of individual study in HPER or a thesis.

Graduate student Peggy Powell, one of the first students to take advantage of the new sport science option, is writing a thesis based on her research in the Human Performance Lab. Powell received her undergraduate degree in P.E. and health from Graceland College in Lamoni, Iowa. However, her interest in exercise physiology brought her to NMSU. "A lot of universities don't have this track (sport science); that's why I chose Northeast." She hopes her degree will lead to a job in commercial fitness, with a major company such as IBM.

Powell's graduate research deals with imbalances in the strength of an athlete's knees. By measuring the size of the knee muscles and using a Cybex machine to measure the strength of each knee, Powell hopes to determine if muscle strength imbalances contribute to knee injuries. If they do, a training program can be developed to strengthen the weaker muscles and pre-

vent injury.

For students interested in applying such research to student athletes, HPER is now offering a new athletic coaching option in its master's degree program. "The majority of people who get a master's degree in P.E. at NMSU want it for coaching," Bill Richerson, HPER division head, said. Prior to the implementation of the sport science and coaching options, graduate students in P.E. had a choice of two options: physical education teacher or administrator, or sports administration.

Sometime in the future, sports medicine may become a fifth master's degree option at Northeast. Currently the program proposal is undergoing review by the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine. If approved by NMSU and KCOM, it will become one of the first sports medicine programs in the U.S. to be jointly offered by a university and a college of medicine. The sports medicine option would be open only to KCOM students who want to obtain a master's degree in sports medicine in addition to a D.O. degree.

DIVISION UPDATE: LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE

The Language and Literature Division at Northeast provides a service to its students and faculty that very few universities offer. It provides more than 22 computer programs targeted at various areas of difficulty with English grammar, sentence construction, spelling and punctuation. Only one man is responsible for the programs, for computer-assisted instruction (CAI) is rare in the area of English. Heinz Woehlk, assistant professor of English, designs and programs all of the English CAI.

Woehlk calls himself a "computer convert" who started this project with no prior experience or even desire to work with computers.

"Dr. Carpenter (head of the Language and Literature Division) asked me to attend a conference in Louisiana on computer-assisted instruction. At the time, I wanted little or nothing to do with computers," Woehlk said.

Woehlk said that although the conference had actually little to do with computer-assisted instruction, he became excited about computers and began learning how to use them on his own.

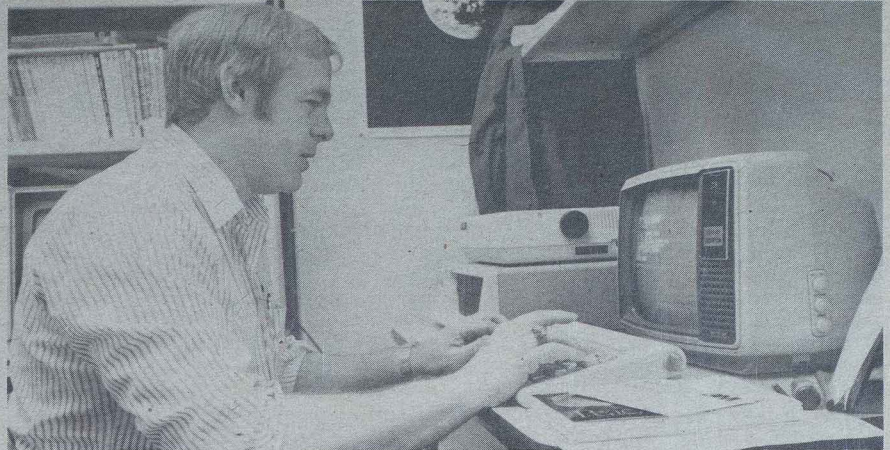
Woehlk said that creating the programs and feeding them into the computer takes approximately the same amount of time required to teach two courses during a semester.

Computer programs in such areas as mathematics, engineering and science can usually be purchased from authors in the field. Woehlk said there are very few English programs marketed.

"I've probably written the equivalent of two books," Woehlk said. So why does he do it? He said it's fun.

"It (computer designing and programming) allows me to be intellectually stimulated in a different area," Woehlk said.

"We're in the unique position of being able to generate our own software," Woehlk said. "No universities around here and very few universities around the country have computer programs for English."

Students are not required to use the programs. However, if, for example, a composition student repeats a particular error or several errors, his or her teacher may suggest specific programs. The student's name and score for the program is recorded for the teacher. That way, the teacher can find out whether or not the student requires additional work.

"The computer provides patience and time so that a student can go at his own pace and learn through repetitious drills," Woehlk said. He also said these qualities are often lacking in instructors. The programs also free the teacher from being forced to teach simple mechanics in courses in which students should already know them.

Some of the programs have been available since Jan. 1, 1982. Since the beginning of the fall 1983 semester last August, more than 3,485 students have completed lessons on the programs. Some 7,766 students have completed lessons since the program's inception.

The Language and Literature Division plans to install 10 IBM P.C. Jr. computers in the Reading and Writing Skills Center and in the Language Lab. Woehlk projected the division will eventually provide about 26 computers, when the funds for the project become available.

In preparation for the new computer system, Woehlk said all the current programs will be revamped. This time, however, he will have some assistance with the actual programming, Jody Helton, graduate student; Pam Inlow, sophomore; and Christine Hagen, freshman, will help feed the information into the computer system.

The Language and Literature faculty has approved the concept of offering an upper-level course for computers in English. Woehlk said the purpose of such a course would be to provide English majors with a familiarization of computer hardware as well as some programming information.

So said Sina Cochran Vaughn ('16), reminiscing about her days on the University faculty. Vaughn was an associate professor of public health at Kirksville

State Teacher's College from 1924 to 1929.

The 92-year-old former nurse and teacher now lives in St. Louis. "I keep house for my daughter, Suzanne ('51), also a nurse, I do lots of gardening, and I do crossword puzzles to keep busy," said Vaughn.

Her parents moved into Kirksville in 1906 just so

Vaughn and her three sisters could attend KSTC. "We all really enjoyed the college. We learned some very interesting things there," she said.

Vaughn returned to Kirksville after earning her registered nurse degree at Johns Hopkins University (Baltimore) in 1922. She was a head nurse at Grim-Smith Hospital for two years before joining the KSTC faculty.

"I enjoyed the students," she said. "They were very nice. There weren't very many at all in my nursing classes, but the public health classes were larger, about 25 to 30 students, I'd say."

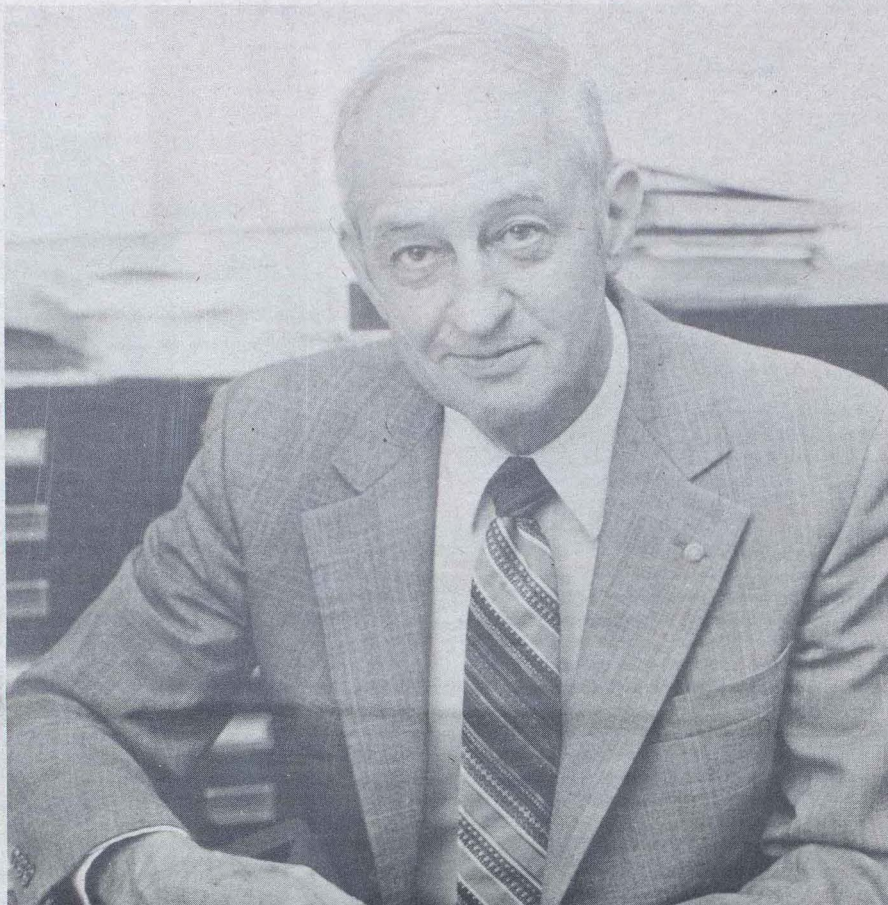

In the next few years, Dean Rosebery, head of the Science Division, will conduct some scientific research outside the laboratory. He will do this by talking with scientists throughout the U.S. while serving as president of a national science organization. "It's a great opportunity to meet with a lot of scientists and get up-to-date on issues in the frontiers of science," Rosebery said.

Last summer Rosebery was voted president-elect of the National Association of the Academies of Science by delegates to the national convention. His main duty as president will be to serve as a liaison between the state academies of science and the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the parent science organization in the U.S. Besides presiding over national meetings, Rosebery will encourage activities among the state academies of science and junior academies of science for students.

In contrast to many learned societies, science academies embrace all the scientific disciplines. They promote cooperation between academic and industrial scientists; provide youth science opportunities; conduct meetings for the presentation of scholarly papers; have active technical publications programs; provide science advice to public policymakers; and improve science and mathematics education through work with boards of education, state and federal education departments, teachers, students and administrators.

The NAAS also fosters public understanding of science through publications and support of science museums and technology centers. Many academies of science are strategically placed to carry out national programs at the grassroots level. Missouri's Academy of Science office is located at NMSU.

"It's really rather thrilling," Rosebery says of the opportunity to exchange ideas with other scientists. President (Charles) McClain promotes professional activity," he says. "It's important to get out of Kirksville and see what the rest of the world is doing."

Her adviser said to find something she was interested in. It was only natural she should turn to her husband.

As an Olympic competitor, Larry Young and other Olympic hopefuls found difficulties in the support areas of money and organization in track and field. So when Candy Young, NMSU's assistant professor of political science, needed a thesis for her dissertation, she decided to investigate government intervention in the Olympic effort.

She was in graduate school during the mid-'70s. He had two bronze medals behind him from '68 and '72 that he walked away with—literally. Larry Young is a race-walker.

"He thinks he could have gotten a silver," Candy Young said. "He went into the Olympics without ever being challenged by a real competitor. It was a self-initiated effort."

Young explained that the rules of track and field organizations, such as the Amateur Athletics Union and the National Collegiate Athletic Association along with various Olympic committees or commissions, are often almost contradictory to each other. This hinders athletes rather than providing them with a clear path to follow. In the early '60s, for example, the NCAA wasn't going to let student athletes go to the Olympic trials. "The athletes got caught in the middle," Young said.

Wanting our best athletes to be in the '64 games, Young said President Kennedy felt it necessary to have an arbitration board formed and composed of NCAA and AAU members and headed by none other than Douglas MacArthur. Young said that there was still "constant bickering before the games."

Young said a focus of her paper is on the four attempts on the part of the U.S. government to make regulations involving track and field organization. The last attempt was successful and known as the Amateur Athletics Act of 1978.

Young argues that politics can not help but be involved in the Olympics since nationalism is stressed. Gestures demonstrating this point include the flag-raising ceremonies (raising national flags, not an official Olympic banner) and the playing of the gold medalist's national anthem.

"The games have been structured in a nationalistic way," she said. "Nationalism has taken over."

Politics in the Games was never more prevalent than in the summer of 1980 in which the U.S. boycotted the Games to protest Russian military action. Young said her husband had begun training for the '80 Games but "decided to hang up his shoes since it didn't look like we were going anyway."

Despite the effect of the boycott hitting close to them, the Youngs supported the action.

"Obviously, it was primarily a symbolic action," she said. "The Soviets were using the Games to gain prestige. They were going to make it a showcase...a showcase of the Soviet Union. The Olympics are a unique propaganda tool for the host nation, and to ice the cake they were going to win. We put a black mark on their party."

Looking ahead to the Summer Olympics in July, Young said, "We have the best organized team in the history of this country. Performances will reflect new organization of the U.S. Olympic Committee and their ability to raise money. This particular set of Games is an example of how a country can have successful Games without having to build exorbitant structures." Young said in comparison to Russia and other previous Olympic settings, the construction going on in Los Angeles is quite minimal.

The Olympics, as Young sees it, contributes to both international peace and conflict. Of international tensions that exist between nations, Young said, "the Olympics were formed to deal with it." What does it hurt, she defends, to see a Nadia Comeneci or an Olga Korbut and have an admiration for them. "We see

communist-nation athletes in a positive light, and that can't be all bad," she said.

Young presented her dissertation at the U.S. Olympic Association conference last May, and it should be published this spring.

She will be watching and evaluating the effectiveness of the new structure of the Olympics' management at this year's Games. And Larry Young? He'll be watching, too.

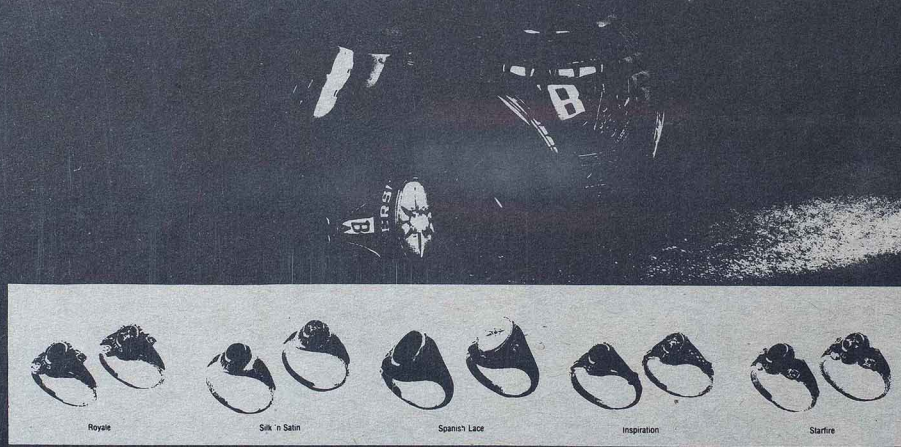

1983 Tel-Alumni collects more than \$100,000



David Clithero ('83) of the Alumni Office explains calling procedures to volunteers at the Tel-Alumni phon-a-thon. The 1983 campaign netted more than \$100,000, lifting the University over the halfway mark in its Project 1990.

The 1983 Tel-Alumni campaign eclipsed its goal of \$83,000 and established a record pledge total of \$104,650.

Tel-Alumni is the yearly campaign phon-a-thon for Operation 1990 which proposes to raise \$2 million in private support for NMSU by the year 1990. Since its inception in 1980, this program has continually grown in alumni support. In 1980, \$54,281 was pledged; \$60,228 in 1981; \$77,900 in 1982; to the present mark of contributions pledged.

Though this year's project, held from Oct. 23 to Nov. 17, was similar in many respects to those in the past, it was conducted with a few new wrinkles.

For the first time, divisions were offered the oppor-

tunity to contact their graduates. If desired, money contributed by these graduates could be earmarked for their respective divisions. The divisions of Business and Home Economics participated and attained pledge totals of \$28,526 and \$2,410, respectively.

In addition to a year's subscription to the NEMOSCOPE, any alumnus who donated \$15 or more reserved a copy of the first NMSU Alumni Directory, an address listing of every graduate. An advance drive, conducted from August to mid-October to announce the directory, netted \$31,000 in contributions before the first call was ever placed.

As of Jan. 25, \$110,188.85 had been received from pledges, elevating Operation 1990 over the halfway

mark to \$1,097,867.50. This money has been set aside for educational program improvements, faculty support, financial aid and scholarships.

The financial aid and scholarship programs illustrate the impact of Operation 1990 at Northeast. Since Dec. 31, 1979, the Student Memorial Fund has grown from \$138,588 to \$263,423 on Dec. 31, 1983. The number of endowed Alumni Scholarships has increased by a total of 30 in that span of time; in addition, existing scholarships have been greatly enhanced. An outstanding example of this enhancement is the Joseph Dolan Scholarship; initially a single \$50 stipend, it has now grown to two \$200 awards.

Project 1990 continues

The second phase of Project 1990 has been initiated, as NMSU pursues support from the corporate world.

Many companies establish separate entities, known as foundations, to handle their philanthropic activities. Each foundation has a philosophy with rules that serve as the basis for their funding decisions.

NMSU is presently reviewing the policies of several foundations to determine the feasibility of attaining corporate support. Factors that are taken into account are the personal and geographical relationships between Northeast and the foundation, along with matching an educational need or project with the philanthropic guidelines.

Once prospective foundations are identified, a proposal for funding must be prepared and forwarded, outlining the purpose and the monetary need of the project.

Though the percentage of projects funded to those proposed is quite small (less than 25%), NMSU has set as its goal to receive at least two grants of \$1,000 or more by December 31, 1984.



Top callers named

An awards luncheon was held on Dec. 2 to recognize the outstanding volunteers of the 1983 Tel-Alumni Campaign.

Sophomore Mary Ann McMasters was the top individual caller, receiving \$2,033 in pledges. As top caller, McMasters was given a \$620 scholarship, courtesy of Laughlin Hospital and the Kirksville Osteopathic Health Center.

Senior Andie Norton placed second and was awarded a \$400 award, sponsored by the NMSU Alumni Association. Norton also recorded the highest single pledge of the drive, \$1,000. "I was shocked, really (when I received the pledge)," Norton said.

A \$250 scholarship, also donated by the Alumni Association, went to Melanie McCully, the third highest caller. "I was surprised," the sophomore said. "It's not every Friday afternoon you get \$250 handed to you."

Finishing fourth in the competition, with a total of \$1,460, was Tim Boozan, a senior. He was awarded a free night at the Granada Royale Hotel in Kansas City, compliments of International Tours Travel Center of Kirksville.

The top callers attributed a lot of their success to talking with alumni rather than just asking for money.

"I led into it and explained about the project," McCully said.

"I just talked to them one on one, instead of sounding like a recording," Norton said.

Organizations receiving the most pledges were Student Activities Board with \$4,053, Sigma Tau Gamma with \$3,894, Delta Chi with \$3,250 and Delta Sigma Pi with \$3,168. Each organization received a trophy and the top three groups were awarded a free rental of Theta Psi, Kimble's Place and the Atlas Club, respectively.

Refreshments and nightly prizes, donated by area merchants, were provided each evening.

The few, the proud, the outstanding

U.S. Marine Corps Officers Candidate School.

The sound of it makes you think of boot camp—rigorous workouts with push-ups galore, and enough school work for two good students. Only one person can finish with the highest award in the nation, and that person was NMSU senior Rick Grabowski.

When he started, Grabowski knew of the hard work. He had gone through basic camp in the enlisted U.S. Marine Corps, and had continued for four years. When he finished and returned to Officers Candidate School (OCS), Grabowski was on top.

During the 10-week course at Quantico, Va., last summer, Grabowski took a variety of subjects. There were courses in physical fitness, infantry skills, land navigation, military customs and courtesy, and a writing course. "We had to do a paper every week," Grabowski said.

Special recognition is given to the candidate who demonstrates outstanding traits as a leader. The United States Marine Corps' Commandant's Award began in 1957 to recognize those candidates at OCS in the areas of leadership, academics and physical fitness.

"When I got there, I just wanted to get through it," Grabowski said. "About halfway through, I saw I had a chance for the award. It made me work harder. My prior experience in the service helped out quite a bit."

The award is earned by one candidate from each of five different level training courses during the summer. College freshmen and sophomore candidates attend two sessions of six weeks for two consecutive summers. College juniors, such as Rick, attend an intensive 10-week course for one summer because they are nearing the end of their college career. There are five courses each summer, each having a Commandant's Award recipient.

The leadership abilities test determines 50 percent of the score, with the academic and physical fitness abilities tests determining the remaining 50 percent of the score. The scores are combined, and the highest overall score in each course wins.

Grabowski ranked as the highest recruit with the highest overall score in the OCS with a 98.14 percent. He also had the highest overall score in leadership and academics categories. "They (the five recipients) aren't ranked together, but if they were, Rick would be the number one man in the nation out of all five," Captain Clem Matylinski, a U.S.M.C. selection officer, said.

The award consists of a traveling trophy, the same one presented to the recipient's university each year, and a personal trophy. Grabowski was presented the traveling trophy in December by U.S.M.C. General Charles "Bus" Bishop. Other recipients attend Georgetown University (Washington, D.C.), Purdue University (West Lafayette, Ind.), the University of California-Berkeley and Montgomery Community College-Rockville, Md. "He was up against some pretty stiff competition," Matylinski said.

Grabowski is a criminal justice major and he plans to graduate in May. He previously attended Southeast Community College in Burlington, Iowa, transferring to NMSU in 1982. After graduation, he plans to attend a six-month Basic School at Quantico, and then go to a basic air school in Pensacola, Fla. "OCS is just the basics. TBS (The Basic School) is where the polish comes in," Grabowski said.

After basic flight school, Grabowski plans to attend an advanced flight school. "I'd like to go into advanced flight school, but it really doesn't matter where I go," he said. "If they'd give me a kite, I'd fly it."
