THREE PERFORMANCES will be presented by the 1000 Hills Summer Youth Program as part of the camps scheduled this week. The High School Cheerleading and High School Pom-Pon Camps will present a demonstration at 10 a.m. Friday in Stokes Stadium. The Gymnastics Camp will present a program at 10 a.m. Friday in the Girls' Gym in Pershing Building. The Junior High and High School Piano Camp will perform at a final piano recital and honors program at 1 p.m. Friday in the Little Theatre in Baldwin Hall. The University community is invited to attend these performances.

A HORN CHOIR CONCERT featuring Morris Secon, first horn player for the Rochester Symphony, will be at 3 p.m. Friday in front of Kirk Memorial. Secon will play an Alpine horn, a post horn and French horn from 2 to 15 feet in length. Secon is the guest clinician of the first Midwest Regional Horn Workshop at NMSU. Workshop participants also will perform at 10 a.m. Thursday at the Adair County Nursing Home, 316 S. Osteopathy. On Friday, they will present a program at 10 a.m. at Village '76, 100 Valley Forge Drive. No admission will be charged at any of these performances.

MORRIS SECON, guest clinician for the Midwest Regional Horn Workshop, will be interviewed at 9:07 a.m. on the "Area Scene" program of KIRX-AM. He will discuss his work as first horn player of the Rochester Symphony in addition to the unusual programs he has performed for schools, nursing homes and prisons.
