Lynch Named Men's Soccer Coach

Capt. Mike Lynch, assistant soccer coach at Air Force Academy since 1988, has been selected as the new men's head soccer coach, effective Aug. 10. The announcement was made June 12 by NMSU Athletic Director Alan Graham.

Lynch, 30 replaces Dave Poggi, who served as coach the past seven years. Poggi resigned this spring to accept a position as head coach at Wisconsin-Green Bay.

As assistant coach at Air Force Academy Lynch has been responsible for the planning, programming, budgeting and recruiting for a nationally ranked Division I soccer program.

He has taught classes in physical education and coordinated scheduling and logistics requirements for 38 intercolle-

giate teams at the Academy. He was selected as the top instructor in the Department of Physical Education for the spring semester of 1990.

Lynch is a 1984 graduate of the Academy with a bachelor's degree in history. He played soccer for the Academy earning all league recognition four years, all-region accolades twice, MVP honors twice and served as team captain. Lynch was a member of the U.S. Armed Forces National Team in 1984.

Before returning to the Academy to become assistant coach, he spent four years as project manager for several military aircraft and missile development programs in Dayton, Ohio. While stationed in Dayton, Lynch was an assistant soccer coach at Fairborn High School, his alma mater where he made all-state

team as a player in 1978 and 1979.

He received a master's degree in administration from Central Michigan University in 1989 and has a National A Coaching License from the U.S. Soccer Federation.

"I'm excited about my new opportunities," he said. "There is a strong tradition, regarding soccer and academics at NMSU and I hope to maintain it."

Graham indicated NMSU is fortunate to have Lynch as the new coach.

"He's played and coached under Lou Sagastume, one of the top coaches in North America, and has been an outstanding faculty member," Graham said. "We fully expect soccer to continue to flourish under Mike's guidance."

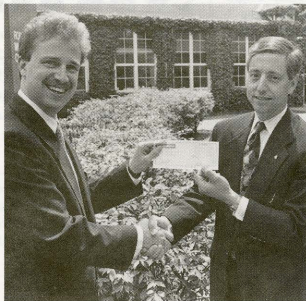
