Volunteers raise \$54,000 in pledges



Over \$30,000 of the \$54,281.50 pledged during the Tel-Alumni '80 campaign had been received by Christmas, Thomas R. Shrout, Jr., director of external relations, said. The money is to be used for the University scholarship program.

Many of the University faculty memorial scholarships were indicated by alumni when they sent in their checks. The Joseph P. Dolan, Joseph L. Mitch and William Unger scholarships were three that many alumni wished to have their gifts support.

During the Tel-Alumni campaign, student volunteers from various campus organizations called NMSU alumni all across the country. During their conversations they attempted to bring the alumni up-to-date on what had happened at the University since their graduations, check their addresses and places of employment and ask them if they could make a gift to the University scholarship fund. Over 3,000 alumni pledged money to the University, ranging in amount from \$1 to \$250, Shrout said.

In addition to the money pledged, many alumni indicated that they would like to help support the program but did not indicate a specific amount. Many of these people are also responding with gifts, Shrout said, possibly resulting in more money collected than the pledge total.

The cost of the Tel-Alumni campaign, including long distance charges, is expected to be around \$15,000. It was one of the most successful fund raising efforts ever at the University. The program is expected to continue next year, Shrout said.

The basic planning for Tel-Alumni '80 was completed by the Alumni Of-

fice last summer. The final step in making the project a success occurred when the Student Senate agreed to assist with the project. Senate president Barb McMasters served as the student chairman of the campaign, and other senators served as weekly chairmen, nightly chairmen and volunteer callers. Student Senate members also recruited volunteers and prizes and contributed to the final planning stages. "We couldn't have done it without them," Shrout said.

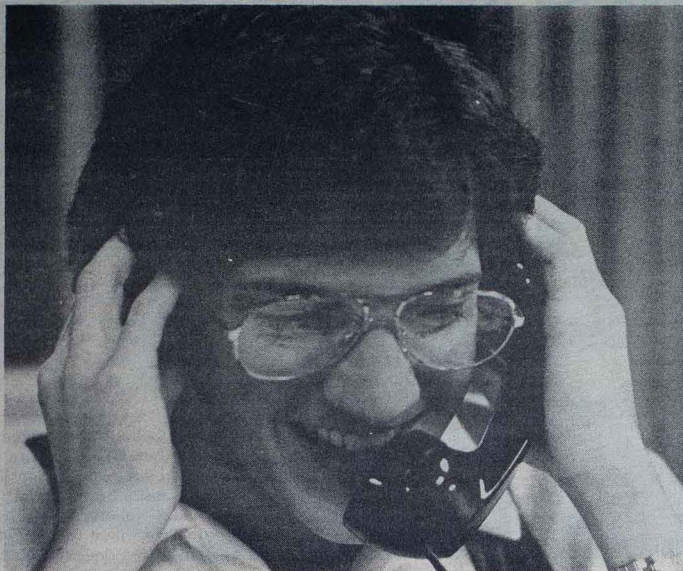
Delta Sigma Pi business fraternity was the top calling organization during the Tel-Alumni '80 campaign with a total of \$2,445 pledged in one evening. Alpha Sigma Alpha social sorority was next, followed by The Society of Professional Journalists, Sigma Delta Chi. Top individual callers were Mike Blevins, with a one-night total of \$408; Ken Alleman, with a one-night total of \$405; and Greg Geels, with a total of \$400.

Although no goal had been set prior to Tel-Alumni '80, Shrout said the campaign was highly successful—not only from a financial standpoint. Updated addresses and biographical files of NMSU alumni were an additional bonus of the program. In addition, Tel-Alumni '80 gave the alumni a chance to have some first-hand contact with the University which is not otherwise possible, he said.

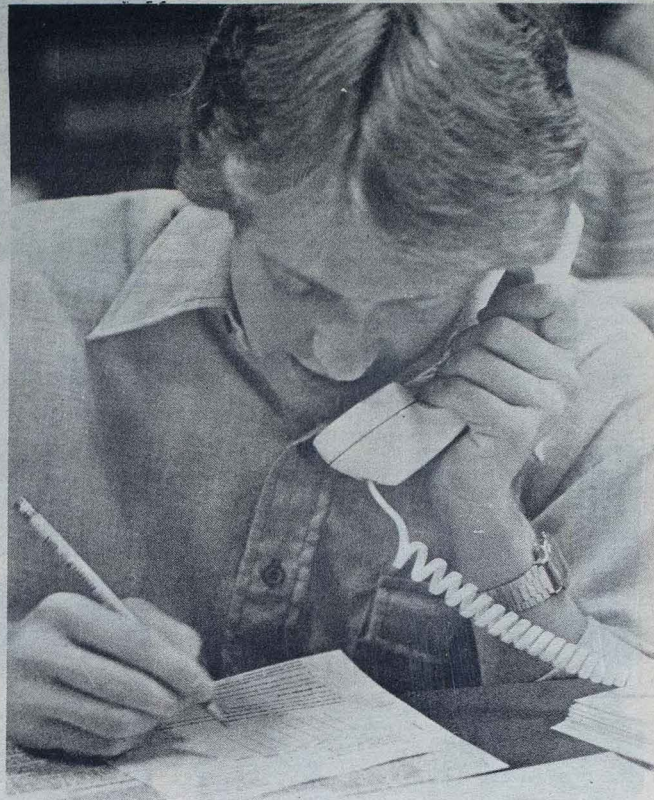
The reaction of both the student callers and the alumni has been overwhelmingly favorable, Shrout said. Many alumni appreciated the opportunity to talk to a student currently attending NMSU while the students found the calling to be a fun and rewarding experience.

A true businessman

His efforts are top dollar

John Nollen, a senior business administration major from Burlington, Iowa, thinks he may enter the insurance field upon graduation in May. If his success during the Tel-Alumni '80 campaign is any indication, that may be a wise choice indeed.

Nollen was the overall top money raiser during Tel-Alumni with \$851 pledged. His one-night high total of \$380 was the fourth best during the four weeks that students called NMSU alumni.

The secret of his selling success? "I tried to make it one-to-one," he said. Rather than using the sample conversation provided to the callers, Nollen personalized his calls. He asked questions, carried on conversations and tried to get across the idea that whatever the alumni could afford would be greatly appreciated.

Nollen called first for Delta Sigma Pi business fraternity, the overall best money-raising organization with a one-night total of \$2,445 pledged. He returned later when Delta Sigma Pi competed against a group of all-stars from various organizations and for a final time on the last night of the campaign.

Nollen said the success of Delta Sigma Pi can be attributed to the type of people in the organization. The Delta Sigma Pi members are generally outgoing, personable and enthusiastic. "We've got a lot of ambitious people," he said.

Although he is a senior and would not be able to participate in another campaign, Nollen thinks the project should be done again next year. "A lot of people were receptive," he said.

A number of the alumni that Nollen talked to on the phone had children who had received scholarships or other financial help. These people were willing to help out other students with whatever gift they could afford, he said.

During the three nights that he called, Nollen spoke to alumni in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Florida, New York, California and Hawaii. On the last night one of his Hawaii calls proved especially rewarding. Another caller had attempted to get through several times before she gave the calling card to Nollen. On his first try he got through to Hawaii and received a \$50 pledge. To top it off, the pledge was worth another \$50 because the alumnus worked for a matching gift company.

Next year John Nollen will not be around to repeat as the top Tel-Alumni money-raiser but will be an alumnus himself. What would happen if he were to receive a telephone call next November from a student volunteer at NMSU?

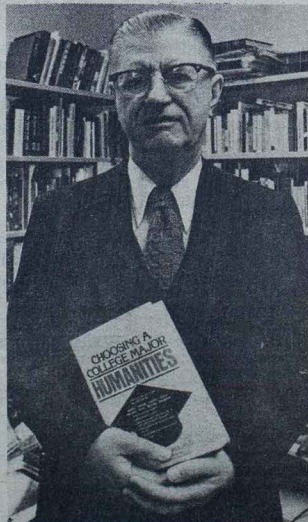


Gallery displays Artwork by Texan

NMSU professor's book Has all of the answers

What things should be considered when choosing a college? How does one decide on a major field of study? What careers do various majors lead to?

"Choosing a College Major: Humanities" is one of a new series of books published by David McKay Company, Inc., of New York, and written by educators considered expert in various areas of study.

The series includes a reference for education majors by Harry Miller of Hunter College, N.Y., and one for business majors by Arthur R. Pell of New York University.

Dr. Karel's book on the humanities is intended as a guide for students majoring in history, English, classics, speech, fine arts, music, religion and philosophy.

"Humanities is any subject which can be taught so that you understand human beings better," Karel says.

The books are available at most educational outlets and through high school and college guidance counselors. They are available in both hardcover and paperback.

On a clear day he can see Mount St. Helens

Mr. and Mrs. Major Ragland rose early on the morning of May 18, 1980, looking forward to a peaceful day of fishing. They were vacationing in Prineville, Ore., about 200 miles away from their home in St. Helens.

By 8 a.m. they were in the middle of a small lake, dangling their baited poles. Then they heard what Ragland said sounded like a sonic boom. Looking around, he said, "all we could see was the big haze to the north of us."

Immediately he began rowing toward the shore, where people who knew where he lived were waiting to tell him what had happened. Mount St. Helens, the volcano that from the Raglands' front window "looks like you can just reach out and touch it," had erupted.

Having studied science as an undergraduate at Northeast Missouri State Teachers College, Ragland (1929) took the natural disaster in stride. He and his wife returned to their St. Helens home, just 29 miles from the mountain, a few days after the eruption.

They were confronted with a yard full of volcanic ash.

"I could've filled a pickup full," Ragland said. The city workers had to come and haul the ash away. Nevertheless, "We've been very fortunate here in St. Helens as the wind has been from the west." The industrial community with a population of 6,000 was less affected by the catastrophe than cities to the north and east of the mountain.

"Where we are it has given us, perhaps, a little bit of apprehension," Ragland said, "but it has had very little affect. . . with the exception of the ash falling on the ground. . . and dust storms for several weeks after. . ."

"Before the eruption it was a big resort area," Ragland said. "It was one of the beauty spots of the Northwest."

"We spent weeks there every summer up on the mountain. We usually stayed in the forest campground this side of the lake. Fishin' was good there in July."

Now the Raglands cannot get any closer than 21 miles from the mountain. That is where the "red zone," or danger area, extends—only eight miles from their home. But, he said, "So far as the feeling here is concerned, there is no fear in particular. I don't think there is any anticipation of danger any more."

Even so, the mountain is not inactive. "Yesterday (Dec. 10, 1980) there was an eruption of steam," Ragland said. "It's a spectacular sight." The steam and dirt go several thousand feet (sometimes as high as 19,000) into the air—sometimes straight up and sometimes in all directions.

If the volcano should become threatening again, a warning will be sounded. People were advised, however, to leave the area before the first big eruption occurred.



"People had adequate warning to get out, but they didn't heed it," Ragland said. In fact, some people went so far as to sneak past the Washington patrolmen in order to get to the mountain.

By Ragland's count, about 50 people had died and 40 were still unaccounted for as of mid-December. Most of the dead people were scorched by the hot winds or suffocated by ash and dust, he said. They were unable to escape because the ash clogged the carburetors in their cars, causing the engines to stall.

Escape by foot was all but impossible. "It wasn't just one blast," Ragland said. "It kept coming during the eruption. Volcanic ash is very abrasive."

Ragland told of the experiences of one man who was just outside of the danger zone when his car broke down. He stayed inside his car until he could safely escape later. "If he reached out his hand from his face, he couldn't see his hand; the dust was so thick."

"At the time the mountain erupted the first time, within several miles it was dark as midnight."

Fortunately for the Raglands, "We did not lose any close personal friends." They were acquainted, however, with Harry Truman, the resort owner whose fatal decision to stay at his lodge was widely reported. "I trust the mountain," the 83-year-old Truman had said. "I am part of the mountain."

Ragland said he has heard of plans to make a movie based on Truman's life, to be titled "Mount St. Helens."

The May 18 eruption and subsequent activity of Mount St. Helens has not had a radical impact on the lives of the retired Raglands. There are still some seismic tremors that move the lava under the mountain, and Ragland has no way of knowing whether or not the volcano will again explode. But the rains have settled things somewhat.

"This is a thing of the past now."

Students and friends pay tribute To Ruth Burton Lester (1928)

Although she graduated with a major in health, throughout her career she taught English and art. She directed school plays, created uniforms for girls' basketball teams, and designed several of the homes she lived in over the years. For six years she headed the department of visually handicapped in an Anaheim, Calif., school. She was a homemaker, wife and mother.

In January of 1980, Mrs. O. E. (Ruth Burton) Lester died after living what can only be described as a full and varied life.

She and her husband, both from Hale, graduated together from Kirksville State Teachers College in the summer of 1928.

"Kirksville was a wonderful place," Mr. Lester recalls. "We worked our way through school—I made 25 cents an hour. She worked for 10 cents an hour in the college library—I worked on the campus doing gardening."

After graduation, the Lesters spent several years in Iowa—she as an English teacher, he as superintendent at different schools.

During those years, Mr. Lester took

10 basketball teams to the state tournaments. Mrs. Lester, in the meantime, made sure that the teams were the best-dressed teams in competition.

"The Oakland girls were splendid in their white satin-knife-pleated skirts," states an article from an old issue of the Des Moines Register. "Mrs. O. E. Lester, wife of the coach, pressed all 12 of the skirts, put an hour and 15 minutes labor into each one."

The article was read last August during ceremonies dedicating a plaque in Mrs. Lester's honor at the Oakland (Iowa) Elementary School, where she taught during the 1950s.

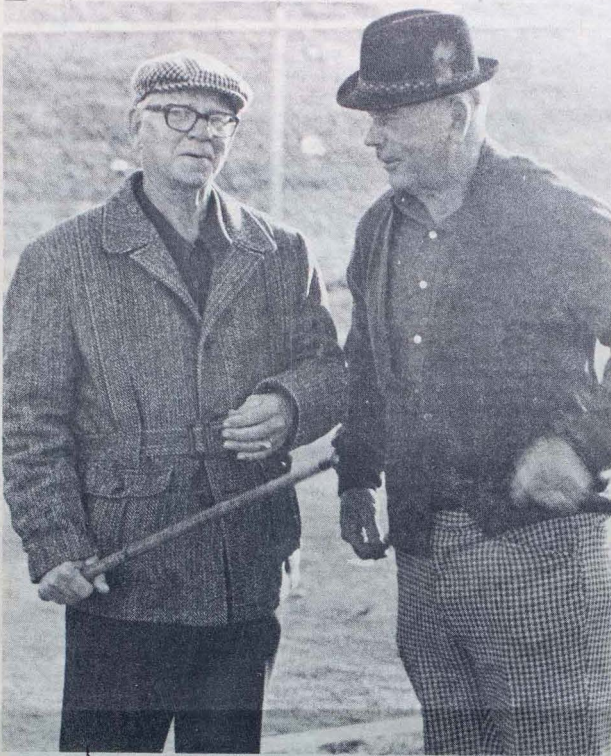
Though the basketball uniforms are Mrs. Lester's most well-known accomplishment, she is also remembered for her other talents, including the art of making her students live up to their potential.

In a tribute to Mrs. Lester during the Oakland dedication ceremonies, a former friend said, "When Mrs. Lester was in a group one wanted to stand a little straighter, speak a little better and try to meet her standards."

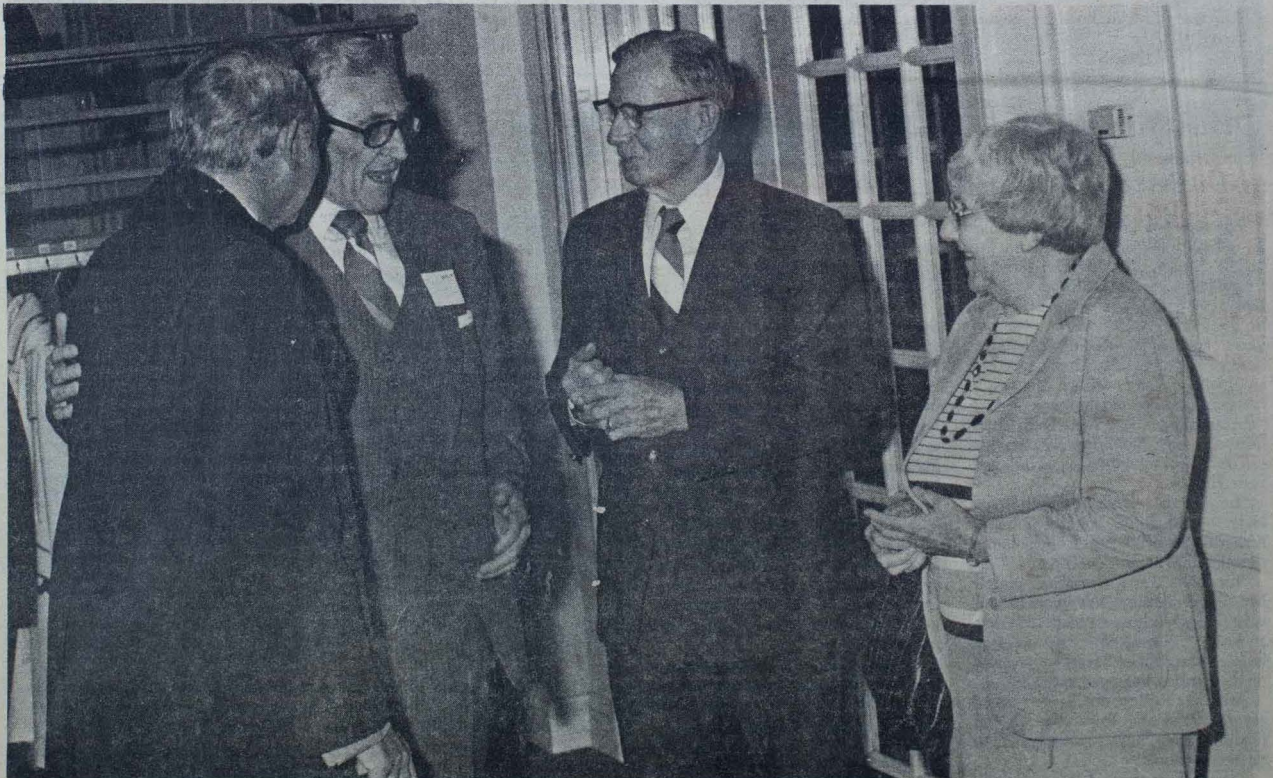

Alumni hear 'the truth' According to P. O. Selby

President Charles J. McClain introduced Dean Emeritus P. O. Selby to guests at the 1980 Homecoming alumni banquet as "a prolific author of local history."

The oldest living faculty member (emeritus) at 91, Dr. Selby qualified that description by saying, "Usually when I have to speak to a group like this I avoid the truth as much as I can. But tonight I am going to break the rule and I'm going to stick to the truth."

Here, as Selby recalls, are a few of the highlights of the truth about the years during the presidencies of Drs. John R. Kirk, Eugene Fair and Walter Ryle:

"John R. Kirk became president of this school in 1899. He had graduated some 20 or 25 years ahead of that from this school, so he knew it. As a matter of fact, the school was about the same in 1899 as it was in 1870, but it was mighty different when he got through with it.

"In 1912, Dr. Kirk was in slight trouble in a way. He had as his secretary his daughter, Miss Elsie, who was a very efficient person. But she had offended

the Board of Regents at that time, so they told Dr. Kirk, 'You've got to get you another secretary and let her go.' And they suggested he might want a male secretary, so they got me."

By the time Eugene Fair replaced John Kirk as president in 1925, Selby was a member of the business education faculty. Fair made several changes during his administration, including the instigation of academic divisions and the addition of a business manager.

"There had been no business manager (before that)," Selby said, "unless you'd call me that, and I never was called a business manager. I just wrote the checks, and somebody else had the money."

During Walter Ryle's 20 years as president of Northeast, Selby was asked to take the position of business manager three times. "And three times I refused," he said. "But when he offered me the place as dean of instruction, I accepted. That was in 1954, and I stayed with that until 1960. Six wasted years," he said, straying from the truth he had promised the audience.

"I think of Oliver Wendell Holmes and what he said," Selby concluded. "And if I should live to be the last leaf on a tree in the spring, let them smile as I do now at the old forsaken bough, for I cling."

Professor of history has interesting history of his own

During 30 years as a member of the NMSU faculty, Dr. Gilbert Kohlenberg has served both the University and the Kirksville community in many varied capacities. From the Social Science Division head, to full-time teacher, to chairman of the Lyceum committee, Kohlenberg has contributed more to the betterment of the University community during the past 30 years than many have in a lifetime.

Kohlenberg was named to the faculty in 1950 as an associate professor in history. He was promoted in 1955 to



full professor and named head of the Social Science Division.

Serving as division head until he resigned the position in 1979, Kohlenberg's impact on the programs included in that division will be felt for years to come, President Charles McClain said at a special division meeting held in Kohlenberg's honor. "Dr. Kohlenberg has performed yeoman's service to this institution in his nearly quarter of a century as head of the Social Science Division. We are indebted to his quest for quality among the various social science disciplines."

Kohlenberg says, while he enjoyed his position as division head, "a time had come to step down and go back to full-time teaching." Even while performing his administrative duties as head of the division, Kohlenberg took on a part-time teaching load, in addition to many University and civic responsibilities.

Among those responsibilities is his chairmanship of the Lyceum committee. Kohlenberg became chairman of the committee just two months after it began in 1960. During his tenure as coordinator of the series, such stars as Mac Davis (1973-74), Chuck Berry (1975-76) and Harry Chapin (1976-77) have appeared onstage.

"We have been in this business long enough, our school has, that we have a

relationship built up with a variety of booking agents," Kohlenberg says. This relationship has brought the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra to NMSU 16 times and Vincent Price on four occasions.

Behind-the-scene experiences with many of the top attractions of past Lyceum programs have provided Kohlenberg with both good and bad memories. He remembers the difficulty during the 1962-63 series in working with Hal Holbrook (although Holbrook's performance was excellent), and he also remembers the capacity crowd brought in by outstanding lecturer Eleanor Roosevelt (1960-61). "She was that kind of person, not so much what she said, but who she was that really brought in the people," Kohlenberg said.

Through all the work and worry of the past 20 years as Lyceum chairman, Kohlenberg has also been involved in many community organizations as well. He was named Kiwanis Man of the Year in 1969 and remains a member of that organization. He served as vice chairman of the Kirksville Planning and Zoning Commission during 1978-79, and presently serves as chairman of the Kirksville Citizens Advisory Committee.

As an educator, Kohlenberg's involvement in various professional associations is vast. He has been named to "Who's Who in American Education," "Directory of American Scholars" and "Who's What and Why in Missouri." In 1974, he was named as an honorary member of the American Academy of Human Sciences.

Ruth Towne, professor of history and the only current member of the social science faculty who has served with Kohlenberg his entire term, says that Kohlenberg is a modest and unassuming man concerning his many accomplishments.

After 30 years, Towne says she and Kohlenberg still carry on a daily coffee break tradition which finds them in the Student Union Snack Bar each afternoon.

Kohlenberg was educated at Shurtleff College, Alton, Ill., and graduated from there in 1940 with honors. He received his master's degree in education in 1942 from Washington University, St. Louis, Mo. In 1951, Kohlenberg received his Ph.D. in history from the University of Illinois, Champaign.

Kohlenberg's wife, Mary Jane, also teaches at Northeast. She is an assistant professor of mathematics. They have two daughters, Gail and Mary.

With more than 30 years of teaching behind him, and more to go, Kohlenberg says he finds a "certain sense of satisfaction" from seeing former students graduate into the world and make good. Some of his former students, he says, have gone on to become faculty members at other universities, and many have found success in the business field.

Kohlenberg says he will never tire of teaching, or of being chairman of the Lyceum committee. "One of these days I'll probably retire here, and no longer be chairman, but I'll never get tired of it. I enjoy it very much."

Freshman class possesses a special quality

A feeling is going around the faculty and staff on campus that the freshman students at NMSU this year are, well, just not like most freshmen before them. The overall quality just seems to be a little higher and their attitudes a bit different.

"They're more concerned about where they're going—their future," Marianna Giovaninni, freshman counselor, said.

The idea of better quality students is well-founded, Terry Taylor, director of admissions, said. The high school class ranking of the average NMSU first-time freshman for fall 1980 was at the 70th percentile. This compares to an average ranking at the 64th percentile for fall 1979 freshmen, which was the highest among all the regional state universities. Although 1980 comparisons are not yet available, Taylor is confident that the 1980 freshmen will rank above those at the other regional state universities.

Not only is their class ranking impressive, but the ACT composite score of the 1980 freshman class is expected to improve. In 1979, the average NMSU freshman score on the American College Testing program was 18.7, which is about 52 percent. This average score put NMSU right at the 1979 national average on the ACT

test, Mike Hughes, director of testing, said. The final average ranking of the 1980 freshmen will not be available until spring, but it is expected to be appreciably higher, he said.

An indication that the present freshmen are more concerned with getting the most out of their education is the reduced number who have moved out of the residence halls. By Dec. 10, 1980, only 74 students had moved out of the halls (which often indicates that they have quit school), compared to 141 at the same time a year ago. Bob Weith, assistant housing director, said the increased hall retention is due to higher quality students and better housing arrangements.

In 1979, some freshmen were housed at a motel until room could be found for them in the residence halls. In 1980, freshmen were allowed to seek off-campus housing after the halls had filled.

Weith said that 1,500 spaces will be reserved for freshmen students for fall 1981. Any 1981 freshman who wants to be sure of a space in the residence halls for next fall should have his housing contract turned in by March 1.

Prospects for the 1981 freshman class are also encouraging, Taylor said. Applications were up about 14 percent as of the first of December.

If the University can attract a high school senior to campus it seems that the student is more likely to enroll, Taylor said. To bring these students to campus, a number of programs have been used in recent years. Among the most successful efforts have been the VIP weekends, during which students are invited to spend a weekend on campus. During VIP weekends, the prospective students stay in residence halls with NMSU student volunteers. In addition, they have the opportunity to meet with University professors and administrators, as well as attend a football or basketball game, a dance, movie or other activity.

A new variation on the VIP weekend was added this year. The President's Distinguished Scholar weekend offered outstanding high school seniors the opportunity to take a standardized test resulting in the top two students receiving full-ride scholar-

ships to NMSU. While they were on-campus for the test, these students attended the same type of activities as are usually scheduled for VIP weekends.

"The response was favorable beyond any advanced impressions," Taylor said. In all, 239 top students from many different high schools took the test, including several potential students who might not have come to Kirksville otherwise. The test proved to be very competitive, and the reaction from the students who attended has been very good, Taylor said.

Four generations and 100 years later. . .

NMSU: The college of her (and her ancestors') choice

Sophomore Beth Morrison came to NMSU not only to help start some new traditions, but to continue one built in 1880.

When Beth left her native Colorado this fall, she became her family's fourth generation NMSU student.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Morrison of Colorado Springs, along with her grandfather, Ray Cooksey, and her great grandfather, Ulysses Sherman Cooksey, all at one time attended NMSU.

The late Ulysses Sherman Cooksey deserves the credit for starting such a unique family tradition. Unfortunately, Ulysses was forced to leave NMSU in 1880 when he contracted polio. He had planned to attend law school; however, his bout with polio required a year's hospitalization. Eventually, he went on to teach school for 30 years.

The late Ray Cooksey followed his father's footsteps into the field of education, although not by choice. Originally a pre-med major, Ray left NMSU to help take care of his polio-stricken father. After this, Ray taught school for 20 years. As a collegiate, he appeared in the campus production of the Mikado.

Beth's mother, Lois Cooksey Morrison, graduated from NMSU in 1952 with a degree in elementary education. Mrs. Morrison attended school only in the summer and taught school in Milan

during the winter. Presently, she teaches kindergarten in Colorado Springs.

Ralph Morrison was a 1953 NMSU graduate with a B.A. in business and a minor in speech. As a collegiate, Morrison was active in Sigma Tau Gamma social fraternity and appeared in the campus Mikado as had his father-in-law. Morrison is currently the principal of Helen Keller Elementary School in Colorado Springs.

Beth Morrison is the newest link in the chain of family tradition. Unlike the rest of her family, Beth chose to major in pre-law rather than education. A 1979 graduate of Palmer High School in Colorado Springs, she attended the University of Colorado at the Colorado Springs campus. At the end of the year, however, she decided it was time to carry on the family tradition.

So far, it's been a decision she hasn't regretted. "I have a special reason for going here; my family likes it," she said. "Already, I love it here."

"Everyone here wants to communicate and the administration wants to make this a good learning atmosphere and at the same time a friendly place, and in my opinion, they're doing a good job."

Beth's decision to attend Northeast was entirely her own and was met with approval from her parents and her

grandmother, Mrs. Ray E. Cooksey of Trenton.

"My grandmother was especially supportive and helpful," Beth said. "It was a very big value to her that I would be experiencing and enjoying the same things my parents did and my grandfather did."

Beth's father played the trumpet in the NMSU marching band, and the musical sounds which often float through Baldwin Hall bring memories. "When I hear the sounds of trumpets coming from the practice rooms, it makes me think of him," she said.

When the start of school rolled around, Beth's parents accompanied her to Kirksville. "It was kind of like a

nostalgia day for our family," Beth said. "We drove through town and walked around campus; I think they enjoyed coming back."

Beth's decision to attend NMSU means more than just family tradition. It means the opportunity to understand and experience some of the same things her parents and grandfathers did while they were in college. "It helps me to understand what they're like, where they're coming from and how they grew," she explains.

Beth Morrison is finding happiness in a family tradition that proudly spells NMSU. "It's a very special place to be," she said and smiled.

Eric Holm overcomes Partial loss of vision

Three years ago Eric Holm, senior wide receiver, did not know if he would be able to continue his collegiate football career. A damaged retina had left him with 25 percent vision in his left eye. Yet, Holm did not let that stop him from having an outstanding college football career that ended with him being named to the Associated Press Little All-America second team in December.

Holm finished third in the nation in the NCAA Division II receiving statistics, and finished first in the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association in the same category by a wide margin. He broke the single-season receiving mark at Northeast formerly held by Mike Berentes, who had 48 receptions in 1970, and set a new MIAA record when he hauled in four touchdown passes against Lincoln University. Holm finished the season with 74 catches for 900 yards and eight touchdowns, which gives him the new MIAA single-season receiving record.

The boyish Holm, often seen around campus wearing faded denim carpenter pants and a pair of well-worn white Nike athletic shoes, has played football with only one good eye since his freshman year at NMSU. "My freshman year in football here, toward the end of the year, the sight in my left eye was kind of deteriorating and I didn't know how serious it was," Holm said. "I kept mentioning it to my dad, and he made me an appointment to get it checked."

Doctors informed Holm that he had a detached retina and that surgery was needed if he even wanted a chance to regain vision in his left eye. By the time it was evident that surgery was needed, the retina was well-deteriorated and the doctors expressed little hope of

Holm ever seeing with his left eye again. His eyesight became so poor that he was forced to begin pitching for the NMSU baseball squad; his vision had declined so badly that he could no longer play the outfield adequately. "They didn't know how it happened," he said. "It could have happened by something as simple as getting hit in the head."

Holm went ahead with the surgery, but, as expected, the left eye was too far gone to be saved. "I can just see light and dark," Holm said.

"The doctor said I probably shouldn't try to play football anymore because if something happened to the other eye I'd really be in trouble. He said it was up to me, and I never really considered not playing," he said.

His parents showed concern about the matter, however, and displayed skepticism at their son's decision. "My parents were scared at first," Holm said. "Then after the initial shock they went along with my decision and didn't worry."

At the urging of his parents, the flanker started wearing protective glasses to protect his good eye while playing football. He said the loss of his left eye no longer bothers him. "I don't remember what it's like to see normal," he said. "I don't know whether it bothers me or not."

Holm admits that it bothered him at first because of the thought that he could no longer see in one eye, but kept it to himself even during football. "I hated to use it as an excuse."

Over the summer after the operation, Holm got out of shape because he was laid up for six to eight weeks while the eye healed. He was restricted from any activity that might jar the eye in any way. In his sophomore year of football, his first after the operation, Holm returned 38 punts for a 6.7-yard average and also returned 19 kickoffs for a 17.5-yard average. "The next summer I ran a lot and got in good shape, and it helped me a lot."

During his junior year he earned a starting position in the Bulldog lineup as flanker and caught 32 passes for 346 yards and one touchdown. This was good enough for him to earn honorable mention on the MIAA All-Conference team in his first year as a starter.

Against the University of Akron (Ohio) in the 1980 season opener, Holm caught 10 passes for 159 yards and one touchdown which put him at the top of the NCAA Division II stats. Akron Head Coach Jim Dennison said of Holm, "We have played excellent passing teams and have seen a lot of good receivers. Out of all the Division I schools we have played, he's one of the best ones we've seen."

Against the number two team in the nation in Division II, Eastern Illinois University at Charleston, Holm had eight catches for 103 yards and one touchdown. "We have the best secondary we have had here in quite a while," EIU Head Coach Darrell Mudra said. "To get 100 yards against our defense is quite an achievement."

For Eric Holm, achieving things on the football field that he should be unable to achieve is the trademark of a great season and outstanding career at NMSU.

Basketball women divide first 10 encounters

Putting together two good halves and reducing their rate of turnovers and personal fouls are areas the NMSU basketball women will focus on in the early stages of 1981.

"I've emphasized the importance of playing two good halves and reducing our turnover rate," commented Coach Mary Jo Murray. "We were too inconsistent before Christmas, especially in the offensive department." The team split its first 10 games.

Murray pointed out that the Bulldogs had not been out of contention during any of their five setbacks, with the widest margin of defeat being six points. Two of the losses were by a total of three points.

"We lack height (with a starting lineup averaging only 5-7), so we have to rely on quickness and aggressiveness," Murray continued. "Larger teams have posed problems for us."

After the first eight games, junior center Carol Jarrard (Washington, Iowa) is Northeast's scoring and rebounding leader with averages of 20.8

and 13.0, respectively. Jarrard set a new school record with 28 rebounds against Missouri Western on Dec. 13.

"Carol's offense and defense have been excellent so far this season," Murray said. "I hope she can get more consistent help in the rebounding department."

Senior forward Sharon Witthoft (Washington, Iowa) is second in scoring and rebounding with 13.6 points and 7.5 caroms. However, she has not yet regained the consistency she enjoyed before she underwent knee surgery late last season, according to her coach.

Marlys Welker (Williamstown-Canton), a probable starter when the season began, is still nursing a hyperextended knee. The 5-6 senior guard played briefly in only one game before the holidays.

Other starters and their scoring averages are senior guard Cathy Minor (Columbia-St. Joseph LaFayette), 9.3; senior guard Lisa Jacques (Kirksville), 6.1; and senior forward Denise Stone (Macon), 5.3.

Transfers boost 1980 team effort

Coach Willard Sims hoped only for survival in the early going for the Northeast Missouri State men's basketball team; however, they did a little better than that in the first month of the campaign.

The Bulldogs, picked to finish fifth in a pre-season Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association poll of coaches, completed the 1980 portion of their

schedule with a 3-3 record. Only three players returned from last year's squad that occupied the conference cellar.

"Our pre-season goal was to be at least at the .500 level or a little better by January," the coach said. "It wouldn't have taken much for us to have won a couple more games. We lost to Central Arkansas by one point and to Eastern Illinois by two. But our

non-league schedule is probably the toughest I've seen here since I became head coach 10 years ago. Overall, I think we're a little bit ahead of where I thought we'd be at this stage of the season."

One of the December victories was a 90-64 verdict over Lincoln University that gave the Bulldogs an early 1-0 lead in the MIAA standings.

The Bulldogs allowed only 69.7 points per game, while averaging 73.7 points in the first six encounters.

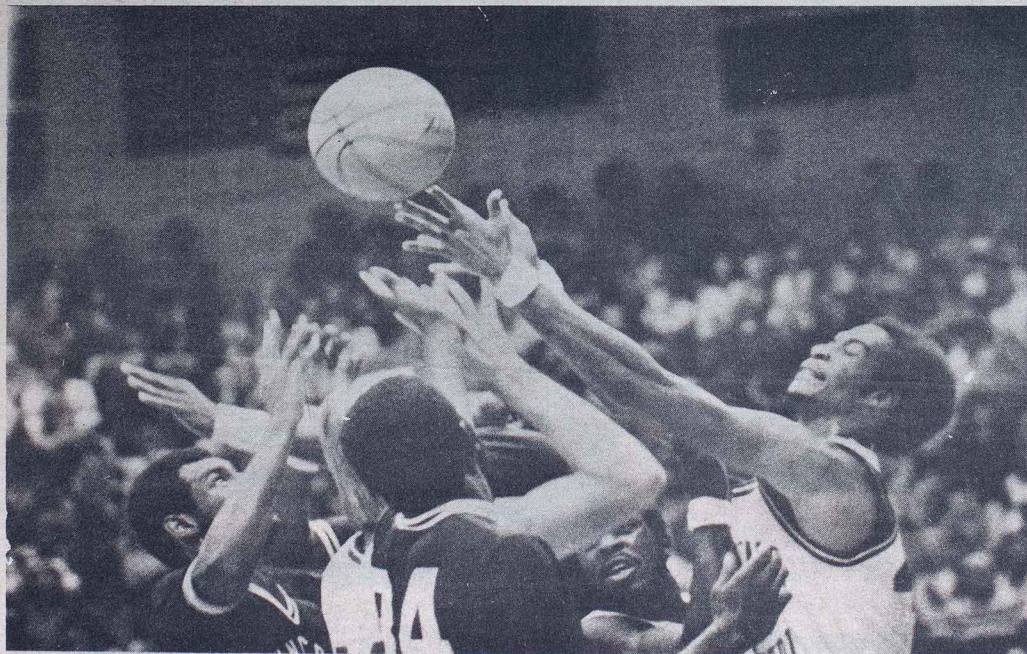
Sims' lineup has been composed of 6-6 senior All-America candidate David Winslow (East St. Louis, Ill.-Public), 6-4 senior Kent Hackamack (Hannibal) and 6-6 junior Johnnie Wesley (Chicago-Manley) at the three forward slots and 6-1 junior Leroy Carter (Maywood, Ill.-Proviso East) and 6-0 sophomore Gary Bussard (Olney, Ill.-East Richland) on the backline.

Wesley, a transfer from Triton (Ill.) College where he was his conference's Most Valuable Player, currently tops NMSU scorers with a 15.2 average. He is followed closely by Winslow and Carter with 15.0 averages apiece. Carter was Wesley's teammate at the Illinois junior college.

Hackamack, making a strong comeback after surgery on both knees the past three years, is enjoying his best season in a Bulldog uniform. He is scoring at a 10.3 clip, and Bussard, performing more a role of playmaker than scorer, is averaging 6.7 points.

Sims said several reserves have been productive in early games. Mark Campbell (Collinsville, Ill.), 6-1 freshman guard, has averaged 5.2. The top frontline performer off the bench has been 6-4 junior forward Chris Carlson (Evergreen Park, Ill.) with a 3.3 scoring average and 2.2 rebounding figure.

"I'll be looking for more consistency from the players after the first of the year," Sims said. 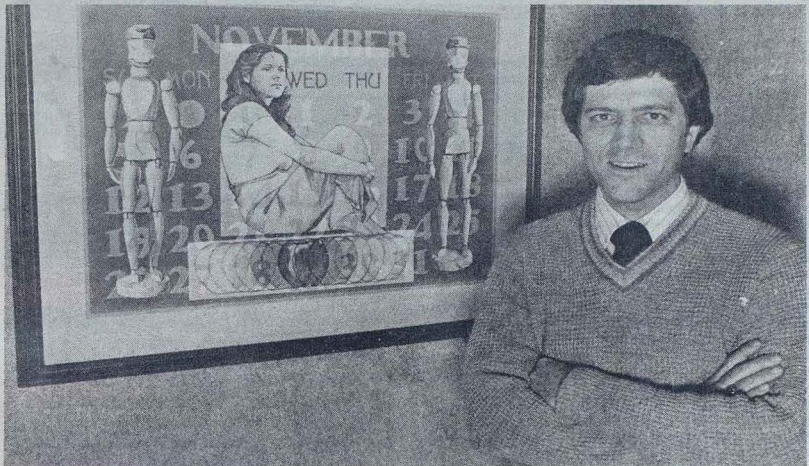

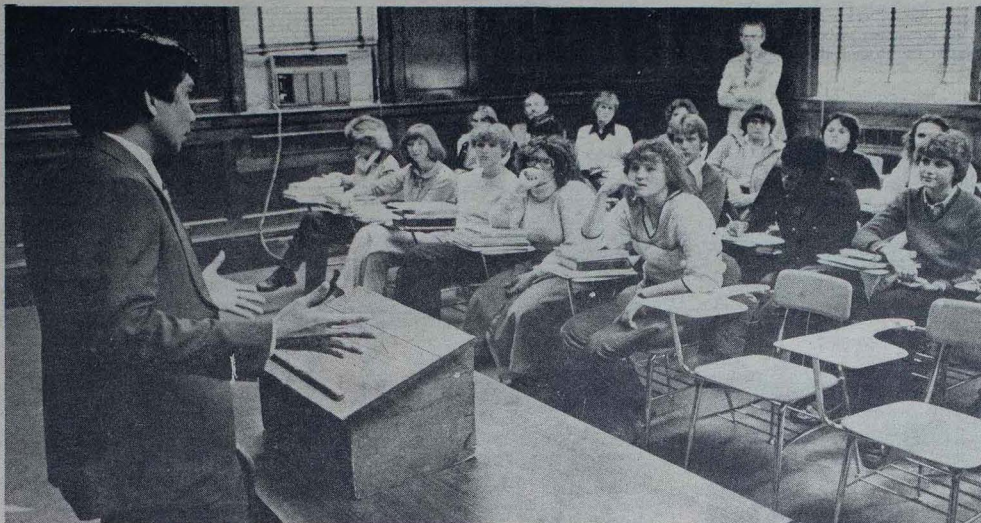

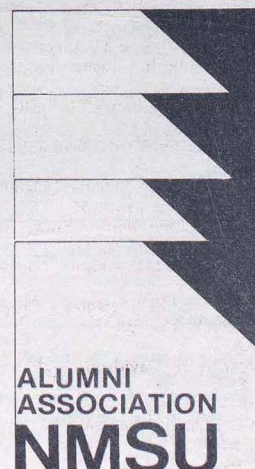

Alumni return, aid students in career plans

In addition to the efforts being made to contact NMSU alumni, various programs at the University today are attempting to make use of the knowledge and willingness to help that alumni provide. One of the most suc-

cessful of these programs has been the Operation Alumni (OPAL) project begun in the spring of 1980 by the Career Planning and Placement Center.

As part of an effort to better prepare NMSU students to enter the business and professional worlds, the OPAL program provides a link between students and alumni employed in various occupations. Over 50 alumni have supplied the Career Planning and Placements Office with job descriptions, advice on pursuing careers in their fields and their likes and dislikes about their current jobs. In addition, these alumni have agreed to serve as contacts and advisers to students through correspondence, telephone calls, personal visits and arranging internships for qualified students.

Ricki Trosen, special services counselor, said the response from alumni and students has been encouraging thus far on the project. The program has been largely in the organizational stage and will be fully operational for the first time this semester. Plans to advertise the OPAL services to the students on campus are being made, and Trosen expects that this semester it will "really start to be a useful thing."

More alumni who would be interested in advising current students about the job outlook in their fields are needed. Alumni contacts in the fields of mathematics, science and other non-teaching fields are desired. Business areas such as computer work, retailing, marketing and management are especially needed, Trosen said.

NMSU alumni also played an important part in the Career Fair held in November. Jim Tillman (B.S. 1980) an underwriter for State Farm Insurance Co. in Columbia; Tricia Peters (B.S.

1978), a supervisor at Bergner's Department Store in Quincy, Ill.; Pat Kellison (B.S.E. 1978, M.A. 1979), a counselor for the Green Hills Counseling Service in Trenton; Ken Glascock (B.S. 1979), an auditor in the State Auditor's Office in Jefferson City and Linda Neville (B.S.E. 1980), a teacher in Ottumwa, Iowa, school district; served on a panel discussing the adjustment from college to the world of work. Forty-five employers were present at the Career Fair, and about 1,100 students attended the three days, Trosen said.

The **Durward DeWitt Scholarship** went to Kathy Schlueter of Bosworth and Brenda Grote of Curryville. Durward DeWitt is a 1925 graduate of NMSU who is currently residing in St. Joseph. The scholarship goes to students with a 2.0 or better grade point average who are involved in Future Farmers of America, Future Homemakers of America or 4-H. Winners must be Missouri natives. The **Kaylarian Scholarship** was presented to Valerie Hayes of Chicago. The Kaylarians are former NMSU students. Victor graduated with a bachelor of science degree in 1968. The scholarship is awarded yearly to a minority student with good character, leadership, service and scholarship qualities who demonstrates financial need. Joey Martin of Glenwood received the **Col. Robert L. McKinney Scholarship** for the academic year. Col. McKinney graduated in 1936 with an A.B. and served as private secretary to President Ryle in 1938. In 1965 he retired from the U.S. Army to become head of the Division of Public Relations and Information Services. The scholarship is given to a sophomore, junior or senior with at least a 2.5 grade point average.

Iowan to receive scholarship From 1928 grad's \$5,000 gift

A graduating senior from the Pleasantville (Iowa) High School will be the recipient of the **Oscar T. and Opal L. Huffman** scholarship beginning in the fall of 1981 or fall of 1982, President Charles J. McClain announced.

Mrs. Huffman bequeathed \$5,000 in trust to the University upon her death in October 1979 to be used for the scholarship. She was a 1928 graduate of Northeast and retired in 1967 after teaching English at the Pleasantville schools. At the time of her death, she was serving the unexpired term of her

husband as Director of the Northeast Missouri Rural Telephone Company. Mr. Huffman had been superintendent at the Pleasantville Schools and also retired in 1967. He died in November 1973.

The will stipulates that the income from the trust be given annually "to a student entering Northeast Missouri State University from the Pleasantville School System who plans to enter a course of study calculated to result in becoming a teacher in the elementary or secondary school system in the state of Missouri."
