## Rhodes Named to Board



Mary Rhodes, a partner in the law firm of Clayton, Stine and Rhodes in Hannibal, Mo., was named to a six-year term on Northeast's Board of Governors by Gov. Mel Carnahan. Her appointment is contingent on confirmation by the Missouri

Senate. Rhodes will replace Kim Ahrens whose term on the Board expired Jan. 1. "I'm delighted to appoint Mary to this important position," Carnahan said. "She has an outstanding commitment to higher education," he added.

Rhodes graduated from Northeast in 1980 with a double major in mass communication and home economics. She received her Juris Doctorate from the University of Missouri-Columbia School of Law in 1983.

From 1983-84, Rhodes served as a law

clerk for Judge George Gunn Jr. of the Missouri Supreme Court. She has also served as a legislative intern for Rep. Gary Sharpe in Jefferson City, Mo., and for Rep. Harold Volkmer in Washington, D.C. She also has worked as an administrative aide in research and public relations for Sen. Norman Merrell.

In February 1988, Rhodes became the second woman president of the Hannibal Chamber of Commerce. Rhodes' other activities include the Hannibal Industrial Council, United Way, the Business and Professional Women's Club and PEO Chapter BR. She has served as the Marion County Port Authority commissioner, the Young Lawyers Section Council district representative and as secretary of the United Way Board and chairperson of its Professional Division. She has served on the Foresight Committee-Family Law Section for the Missouri Council on Women's Economic Development and Job Training and on the Missouri State Senate Reapportionment Commission. Currently, she is a member of the Missouri Job Training Council.

Rhodes has been named Missouri Outstanding Young Female Democrat, BPW Young Careerist and Outstanding Young Woman in America.



## Serial Killer Expert To Present Lecture

The real life hero of the movie *Silence of the Lambs*, Robert K. Ressler, will make a presentation at 7 p.m., Feb. 25 in Baldwin Auditorium. Admission is \$2, \$1 with an SAB sticker and \$3 for the general public. Tickets are available in the Student Activities Board office, SUB.

Having coined the phrase "serial killer" himself, Ressler worked with the FBI for 20 years and is considered one of the nation's top experts on the topic of serial killers.

In order to learn what is behind crimes of often extreme violence, Ressler began a series of extraordinary interviews with captured serial killers. He has interviewed killers such as Charles Manson, Ted Bundy, David Berkowitz (Son of Sam), Edmund Kemper,

## West African Scholar to Visit

Anthonia Kalu, associate professor of black and women's studies and coordinator of the Black Studies Program at the University of Northern Colorado-Greeley, will give three lectures on campus this week.

A prominent literary scholar and Nigerian feminist, Kalu will discuss women's roles in and the literature of Africa. Her schedule of programs includes two presentations on Feb. 8: "Chinua Achebe and 'Things Fall Apart'" at 12:30 p.m. in the SUB Alumni Room and "Literature and Liberation in Africa" at 7:30 p.m. in Ryle Hall main lounge. She will conclude her visit with the presentation "Women in Contemporary Africa" at 1:30 p.m., Feb. 9 in the SUB Tangerine Room.

Ressler and others used the knowledge they gained from the interviews and from crime reports, autopsies, and accounts of victims to prepare the profiles that have played a key role in

helping to solve major crimes across the country. A former faculty member in the FBI

Academy of the Behavioral Science Unit, Ressler was one of the founders of the National Center for the Analysis of Violent Crime at Quantico. He also helped pioneer the computerized Violent Criminal Apprehension Program (VICAP), the computer network of unsolved crimes around the nation, which is also the elite program made famous in the movie *Silence of the Lambs*. Even while he managed the Bureau's VICAP, he was called upon for his profiling expertise.

Shortly after John W. Hinkley was arrested for attempting to assassinate former President Ronald Reagan, the FBI asked Ressler to prepare a profile of Hinkley. He found that Hinkley's assassination attempt may have been sexually motivated.

Now in business for himself as a consultant, lecturer and expert witness, Ressler operates Forensic Behavioral Services out of his Virginia home.
