REGULATION OF INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS will be the topic to be debated by the Japanese International Debate Team at 7:30 tonight in the Little Theatre in Baldwin Hall. NMSU debaters will oppose the team. Earlier in the day, a reception will be held at 3 p.m. in the Alumni Room of the Student Union for the Japanese team. Sponsors for the debate are the Language and Literature Division and the University debate program. The event is part of the International Debate Series tour arranged by the Speech Communication Association.

Dr. Henry Bamman, a 1946 NMSU graduate and professor of education and director of reading at California State University-Sacramento, will present the lecture. PIANIST RICHARD COLLINS will play in concert at 8 p.m. Wednesday in Baldwin Auditorium. His program will feature selections that are examples of the beginning of modern music. He also will present a workshop session at 4 p.m. in the Recital Hall of Baldwin Hall. Collins then will discuss the Charles Ives sonata that he will play in the evening.
