

Business and accounting academic honor society establishes Northeast chapter

The national organization of Sigma Beta Delta has established a chapter at Northeast Missouri State University. Sigma Beta Delta is an honorary society that recognizes business, management and administration students for personal and professional improvement.

According to Sandra Fleak, associate professor of accounting and president of the chapter, Sigma Beta Delta was formed last year and Northeast is the first and only school with the charter organization in Missouri.

Sigma Beta Delta is open to any full-time member of the Business and Accountancy instructional staff and to business majors who have achieved at least junior status and who are in the upper 20 percent of their class.

On June 30, 1994, 32 undergraduate students, one graduate student, and 11 faculty members were inducted into the charter chapter of Sigma Beta Delta at Northeast. James H. Bearden, national president of Sigma Beta Delta and the director of the Center for Leadership Development at East Carolina University, attended the induction to present the charter to the Northeast organization. President Jack Magruder was also extended an honorary membership to the organization.

"This is a very good thing for the University and particularly for the students," said Robert Dager, head of the Division of Business and Accountancy.

Fleak was inducted as chapter president, Daniel Tracy, assistant professor of business administration, was inducted to serve as chapter vice president and Stephen Allen, assistant professor of business education, agreed to serve as Chapter Secretary and Treasurer. ☛

Lyceum to present holiday classic

The lavish Christmas musical *Babes In Toyland* will be performed at 2 and 7 p.m. on Nov. 19 in Baldwin Auditorium. The Lyceum Series features this new version of the Victor Herbert operetta that opened in New York to rave reviews in 1933.

Curt Wollan, director of such successful national tours as *Steel Magnolias* and *Driving Miss Daisy*, has mounted this tour in Minneapolis using all new sets and costumes and a fresh young cast.

The tour will use Herbert's music and additional tunes from his other operettas, but the book has been rewritten by William Mount-Burke and Alice Hammerstein Mathias. The original, like the plotting for many musicals of its day, resembled a "Nordic saga" in its many acts and scenes. Herbert and Glen MacDonough devised a story and made the music and lyrics fit the storyline, a ground breaking move.

The new version, in an earlier production mounted by the Light Opera Of Manhattan, played for many years in New York but never toured. It begins with the Cassidy kids taking the train to Toyland to escape their strict parents. The wonderful toys and the kindly toymaker welcome them, but a detective hired by the family to return the children, plots to steal the toymaker's plans. There is great melodrama here, and for a time, the audience fears the detective's corrupting influence.

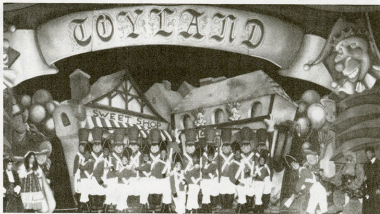
The moral, that parents and children can live happily with trust and respect, is timeless and as poignant today as it was in the Victorian era of its original. The ending is a big happy full-cast finale.

Revolutions of the very first production were mounted in 1929 and 1930. In 1934 there was an extravagant film version, radically adapted to feature Laurel and Hardy. Bandleader Tommy Dorsey planned a "swing" version in

1939 but nothing came of it. Other revivals surfaced in 1944 and 1953.

A second film version was done as a television special in 1954, featuring Dennis Day, Jack E. Leonard, Wally Cox and Dave Garroway as Santa Claus. In 1961 Walt Disney released a third film version, starring Annette Funicello and Tommy Sands with Ray Bolger and Ed Wynn.

"Duty, Honor, Country (and Silence)"



Dirk Selland

The only openly homosexual sailor serving in the Atlantic Naval Fleet will share his experiences Nov. 14 as part of the Ryle College Lecture Series. U.S. Navy Lt. j.g. Richard Dirk Selland presents "Duty, Honor, Country, (and Silence)" at 8 p.m. in Ryle Hall main lounge. Selland's presentation is sponsored by Ryle North Residential College, Ryle Hall Senate and Prism.

Encouraged by President Bill Clinton's vow to lift the ban on gays in the military, Selland told his commanding officer that he was gay in January 1993. The 26-year-old lieutenant hoped the commander would help alleviate the ridicule and verbal assaults of shipmates. Instead, he was transferred from his post on the fast-attack submarine U.S.S. Hammerhead to his current post on shore duty. The Navy formally discharged the lieutenant without allega-

tions of misconduct Sept. 30, 1993.

Selland, who had received high marks from superior officers on evaluations, filed suit against the Navy in U.S. District Court, Washington, D.C. The court issued a temporary injunction halting Selland's discharge until the suit is decided.

Selland has addressed the military and societal roadblocks faced by homosexuals on *Nightline*, *Larry King Live* and *Good Morning America*. He has been profiled and interviewed by *Newsweek*, *The Wall Street Journal* and *The Washington Post*.

In May 1993, Selland was one of only two naval officers to testify before the Senate Armed Services Committee in support of lifting the ban on gays in the military. Following these hearings, the committee created the "don't ask, don't tell" policy. The policy discourages investigation of allegations of homosexuality unless the person discloses it or violates applicable conduct codes. ☺
