# Red Cross strikes vein at NMSU

"Percentage-wise NMSU is the most outstanding giver in the Midwest," Bill Martin, executive director of the Adair County chapter of the American Red Cross, said.

Upholding that reputation, the University bloodmobile conducted its most successful summer blood drive Tuesday.

With the combined recruiting efforts of Alpha Phi Omega, national service fraternity, and the Ryle Hall residence staff, 137 people donated blood, well exceeding the goal of 100 that was set for the drive.

Janette Trisler, member of APO, credited the good turnout to active recruitment. "We set up tables in the Union and A/H, but we didn't just sit there and wait for the people to come to us. As people passed, we voiced our opinion on giving blood.

"At the end (of the registration period), we even went to offices trying to talk people into donating. Giving blood is something we feel strongly about. I think that made the difference," Trisler said.

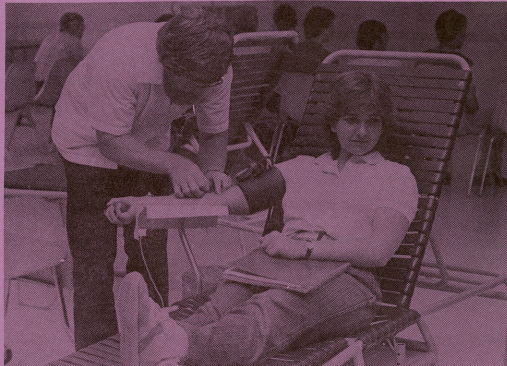
Bloodmobiles often rely on donors becoming regular givers. Looking at the needle in his outstretched arm, Scott Ewing, senior, said, "This makes a gallon for me. It's my eighth time here, and I'm sure I'll be back."

Liz Mossop, academic adviser in the business division and donor at the bloodmobile, felt that donors benefited from the experience.

"It doesn't cost anything but just a few minutes of your time. Then you feel good the rest of the day because, like they say, you're saving a life," Mossop said.

Harold Wigal, member of the local Red Cross blood committee, wished more people had that attitude. "Only 5 percent of the people in the U.S. that can give blood do," Wigal said.

While few give, he said, the need is great. "In our district alone there are 146 hospitals that need 900 pints of blood a day."



In appreciation of the University and the community's generosity in their donations, representatives from the St. Louis American Red Cross honored the Adair County chapter, Thursday.

Martin emphasized that it is the combination of the University and the community that makes for the successful blood drives. "Members of the University participate in the community blood drives, and those in the community go to the University to donate," he said.

The next community blood drive will be Aug. 28. The location is still unknown. The next University bloodmobile, sponsored by the ROTC, will be held Sept. 17-18.
