ANY SENIOR who has not taken the senior test and is planning to graduate at the end of the summer session should get in touch with the Testing Office, 103 Administration/Humanities Building. The test will be given twice each five-week term in 103 A/H. The first term's test dates are 3:30 p.m. Tuesday and 1:30 p.m. Thursday, June 28. During the second term the test will be given at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 11, and 3:30 p.m. Monday, July 23.

High School

How can a student get college credit before graduating from high school? Through the High School Honors Program at Northeast Missouri State University.

The program allows superior high school sophomores and juniors to earn college credit by taking summer classes at the University. The students either commute to classes or live on campus in University residence halls.

Up to 12 semester hours of credit may be earned in 10 weeks each summer.

Interested students send applications and letters of recommendation to the Dean of Instruction's Office during the spring.

Marianna Giovannini, freshman counselor, said many of the high school students who come to NMSU through the program learned about it by word of mouth--other students in their high school or their counselors.

Classes taken by this year's students include U.S. History Survey, English Composition, Human Behavior, Piano, Short Story, Business Communications, Elementary Accounting, Fortran Programming, Horseback Riding, Biological Inquiry, Speech Communication, Elementary Functions, Logic, World Literature, Music Appreciation, Introduction to Philosophy, Basic Approaches to the Arts, Plane Trigonometry, Mass Media and Zoology.

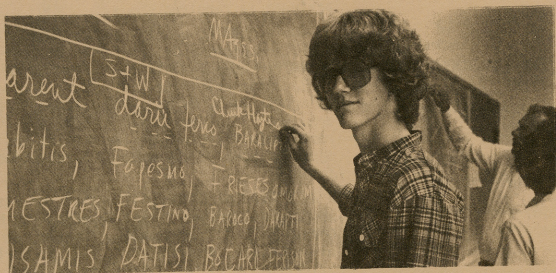
