COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES, featuring guest speaker Sen. Jack Danforth, will begin at 10 a.m. Friday at Stokes Stadium. The traditional academic procession through the Quadrangle will start at 9:30 a.m. from Baldwin Hall. Approximately 820 graduate and undergraduate students will receive degrees.

THE ROTC COMMISSIONING CEREMONY, featuring guest speaker Dr. James O. Preston, director of University of Missouri-Rolla extension services, will be held at 1:30 p.m. Friday in the Quiet Lounge of the Student Union Building. Fifteen ROTC seniors will be commissioned as second lieutenants upon graduation.

THE TRADITIONAL PINNING CEREMONY of the Nursing Division will be at 7 p.m. Thursday in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building. Thirty-eight nursing graduates are expected to receive their pins. In nursing history, pinning conveys an informal acceptance into the profession. Speaker will be Mary Pough, assistant professor of nursing at Mt. St. Mary's College in Los Angeles.

ATTENTION OFF-CAMPUS STUDENTS WITH TELEPHONES: If you will be leaving for the summer you must get your phone disconnected. Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., 216 E. Washington, will extend business hours until 5:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday for all disconnections. If your phone will be disconnected, follow these steps: 1) Leave a forwarding address and telephone number with the company, 2) Pay new bill at disconnection or make other arrangements with the company, 3) Remember that you and any roommates will receive another phone bill after disconnection, 4) If your phone is a modular desk or wall phone that unclips or lifts off, bring it to the company for a \$5 credit on final bill. If it is non-modular desk phone, clip the cord close to wall and bring it to the company for credit. If it is a non-modular wall phone, leave it.
