**The automated circulation system** begins 7:30 a.m., July 11, at Pickler Memorial Library. Checking out library material will require the use of a special library card. Library cards will be issued 8 a.m.-5 p.m. in the main lobby of Pickler Library. NMSU faculty, staff and students must present one of the following forms of identification to get a library card: a driver's license, a paid fees receipt (current semester), a passport or a social security card. Adair County residents 16 years of age or older may obtain a library card by presenting a current Adair County Public Library card (which shows an Adair County address) and one of the following forms of identifica-

tion: a driver's license, a passport or a social security card.

**The Missouri London Program (MLP)**, a study abroad program, is accepting applications from students for the spring 1989 semester. Students can earn from 12-15 academic credits that can be used to satisfy their degree requirements at their respective universities.

Courses for the spring semester will be offered in economics, history, political science, philosophy, management and English. The courses are taught in London by faculty from the Missouri universities that are members of the Missouri Consortium for International Studies. The cost of the program is approximately \$3,300 per student for 16 weeks. This cost does not include the student's regular tuition, registration fees at NMSU or round-trip airfare to London. Financial aid is available to eligible students.
