Lesseig Named Athletic Director



Samuel Lesseig, associate professor of mathematics and computer science and women's golf coach, has been named acting athletic director at the University, effective July 1.

Lesseig, a faculty member of the University since 1963, will succeed Kenneth Gardner, assistant professor of exercise science, who is retiring at the end of June. Gardner has been athletic director since 1974.

"The job certainly has some big challenges," Lesseig said. "But I believe my biggest challenges are coordinating the recruitment of student-athletes and striving to make the University competitive in all sports."

Under Lesseig's direction, the University women's golf team finished third this spring and fifth in 1987 at the National Golf Coaches Association National Division II Championships. Last fall, the Lady Bulldogs placed third at the National Small College Invitational.

Lesseig received his bachelor's from Fort Hays State (Kansas) and his master's from Kansas State University.

CoSIDA Honors Cable

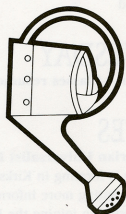
Bill Cable, director of Sports Information, has been selected for membership in the Citizens Savings-CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors Association) Hall of Fame. Sports information directors making outstanding contributions to the profession are chosen by their peers each year for induction. There are presently 95 Hall of Fame members. Cable will be recognized at the annual CoSIDA Workshop that will be held July 1-6 in Kansas City, Mo.

Cable received his bachelor's from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He began working at Northeast in 1956, directing the institutional publications office; he also served as the student

newspaper adviser for one year.

Cable contributed to the creation and organization of the Sports Information Office at Northeast, and in 1972, he was named the first full-time director of Sports Information at the University. Today, Northeast has 10 women's and 11 men's sports.

This year's CoSIDA Workshop will mark the 15th which Cable has attended since he joined the organization in 1971. He has worked on several committees within the group including the Future of CoSIDA, the Academic All-America Committee and workshop panels. Twenty-three of his publications have received CoSIDA awards.
