## Funding For Results Grant Guidelines to be Announced

Using a plan developed by the Faculty Senate and an ad hoc committee, Northeast has begun implementing a campus-based Funding for Results (FFR) program. The statewide FFR initiative will reward institutions for achieving specific goals for student learning. Each Missouri school developed preliminary plans based on institutional mission and local benchmarks.

Northeast's FFR program highlights three major goals of the University's new long-range plan, which focus on achieving.

- **Excellence in the major**, allowing Northeast students to compete with graduates from the nation's best universities for admission to graduate and professional programs;
- **Excellence in meeting the university's liberal arts and sciences objectives**, including students' gaining a broad knowledge base; improvement of existing skills in communication, computer literacy, and math; and development of interdisciplinary thinking and other higher order thinking skills; and
- **Continuous improvement of the lib-**

**eral arts culture on campus**, contributing to an optimal teaching/learning environment.

Northeast has specific outcome objectives for the FFR program. Achieving excellence in the major includes gradually increasing the percent of students scoring above the 80th percentile and above the 50th percentile on a nationally recognized senior test, as well as the percent going on to graduate or professional school. The liberal arts and sciences objectives are training faculty to use student portfolios and establishing a benchmark data base to assess students' interdisciplinary thinking. The objectives of a liberal arts culture involve setting up a benchmark data base, to evaluate the extent to which students use interdisciplinary strategies.

Northeast will gain financial rewards for reaching FFR objectives. Based on its progress, the University will begin a new internal grant program. Details on the grants will be distributed soon, with the first grants available for summer 1996 and academic year 1996-97.

## Anthropologist to Speak at URS

Tal Simmons, assistant professor of anthropology at Western Michigan University, will present the luncheon talk at the Undergraduate Research Symposium at 12:20 p.m., March 29, in the SUB Georgian Room. Her talk, "The Archaeology of a Crime Scene," will reflect her activities as a member of the Kalamazoo Forensic Identification Team.

Simmons received her bachelor's degree in anthropology from Bryn Mawr College, her master's degree from Sheffield University in England (Paleopathology and Funerary Archaeology) and her doctorate from the University of Tennessee-Knoxville. Her doctoral dissertation discussed the origin of modern humans, and she received a National Science Foundation Doctoral Dissertation Improvement Grant that allowed her to trav-

el extensively in Africa and Europe to examine and measure skulls of pre-modern hominids, including *Australopithecus* and *Neanderthal* specimens. In addition to her specialization in human evolution, she has published articles on forensic pathology, including one on blunt force trauma and another concerning the estimation of height from partial skeletal remains. An archaeologist as well, Simmons is currently preparing the publication of the bird bones from a paleolithic site in Israel.

Previously, Simmons taught at Loyola University and lectured at the Northwestern University medical and dental schools. She has taught courses in physical anthropology, human evolution, forensic anthropology and primates, among other subjects.
