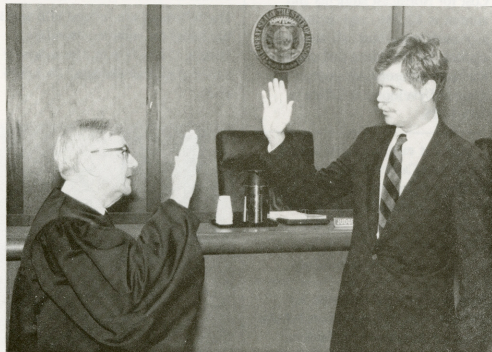

Shrout Named to Board of Governors

Thomas R. Shrout Jr., executive director of the St. Louis Citizens for Modern Transit, was named to the Northeast Missouri State University Board of Governors by Gov. John

Ashcroft. Shrout replaces former St. Louis Mayor James Conway whose term on the Board expired Jan. 1.

As executive director of Citizens for Modern Transit for the past

three years, Shrout has directed efforts to gain approval for and begin construction of the light-rail public transportation system in St. Louis.

Previous to his position with CMT, Shrout was director of academic marketing for the Response Marketing group of St. Louis. From 1971-86, Shrout was director of external affairs at Northeast.

Shrout earned a bachelor's of journalism from the University of Missouri-Columbia in 1970. While in college, he served as a teaching assistant, a newsmen on KOMU-TV and a radio news editor on KFRU radio in Columbia. After graduating, Shrout spent a year at the Associated Press broadcast headquarters in New York City as a wire service writer/editor.

Shrout and his wife Debra Kitts Shrout ('74), coordinator of the journalism magnet school in the Kirkwood, Mo., school district, have two children, Thomas III and Rachel.
