LEONARD NIMOY, co-star of the science fiction television series "Star Trek," will present "Spock and I" tonight at 8 in Baldwin Auditorium as the University's 1977-78 Lyceum Series concludes. The program will compare the television role with the man himself. In addition to his role as Spock in "Star Trek," Nimoy has played various roles on the television series "Mission: Impossible." On stage, he has appeared in several plays including "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof" and "Fiddler on the Roof." In addition to his acting career, Nimoy has proved himself a talented director, writer and photographer. Tickets for tonight's performance are available from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. today in the Student Union Building Office and are free to students, faculty and staff members.

A JOINT CONFERENCE of the District 4 of Missouri Junior Academy of Science and the Regional Science Fair of Northeast Missouri will be held today when 200 junior and senior high students visit the University. Many students attend both events so each conference was scheduled at the same time to save energy. About 130 science projects will be open for public viewing at 4-5:30 p.m. in Pershing Arena. Papers will be given in four categories including physical, biological, environmental and behavioral sciences with a winner to be selected in each in the Missouri Junior Academy of Science conference.
