THE BOARD OF REGENTS will meet at 1 p.m. Thursday in the Conference Room of the Student Union.

GABE KAPLAN, star of "Welcome Back, Kotter," will be on campus two weeks from today, March 29. Limited tickets are available for his performance at 7:30 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium. Tickets at \$3.50 are available in the Student Union from 8:30-4:30.

Kaplan's appearance is being sponsored by Phi Delta Kappa, education honorary.

ERIC F. GOLDMAN, Rollins Professor of History at Princeton University, will be the featured speaker at the annual banquet/lecture of the Nu Chi chapter of Phi Alpha Theta and the University Historical Society at 6 p.m. Thursday in the Student Union. A limited number of banquet/lecture tickets at \$4 will be available through Thursday in the Business Office or from members of the sponsoring organizations.

Tickets to the lecture, beginning at 8 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium, will be available at the door. General admission will be \$2; University faculty, staff and students will be admitted free with validated I.D.'s.

The lecture is part of the Lyceum Series.
