RUNNER-UP IN INDUSTRY COMPETITION -- that's the distinction the University's team captured in the 11th annual Intercollegiate Business Game sponsored by Emory University. The team made its final presentation at a conference held last week at Emory and was awarded a plaque for 2nd place in their industry which consisted of teams from the University of Mississippi (1st), the University of Arkansas at Monticello, Kentucky State University, Freed-Hardeman College and St. Andrews Presbyterian College.

REP. JERRY LITTON is the author of a bill before the House of Representatives to "take the 'e' out of HEW." He discussed a variety of legislation relating to education before a capacity crowd during the Northeast Missouri Teachers Association meeting Friday in Baldwin Auditorium.

The above bill, which was introduced in the Senate by Hubert Humphrey, calls for the creation of a Secretary of Education.

Litton said he is working on legislation that would establish a voucher system for post high school education. Such a system would give each high school student a voucher either at his graduation or six months after he drops out of school to redeem for further education at any time in the future.

The dinner will begin at 6:30 and the lecture at 8. Ticket reservations should be made with division and department heads.
