NOTES...

Several NMSU faculty, staff and students have received recognition inside and outside the University. In the Language and Literature Division, Edwin Carpenter, head, has assumed responsibilities as chairman of the Educator Academy of the International Association of Business Communicators. He was also appointed to serve a three-year term on the IABC Foundation Board. Betty McLane-Iles was selected as one of the Outstanding Young Women of America for 1984. Roy Tanner presented a paper at the Louisiana Conference on Hispanic Languages and Literatures at Tulane University in New Orleans. Tanner also chaired a divisional session on Latin American literature at the Modern Language Association conference in Washington, D.C. In the Science Division, the American Chemical Society appointed David Wohlers to its Board Committee for the Handicapped for 1984-86. Wohlers will be working with the ACS at the national level. The National Science Foundation awarded a continuing grant to Peter Cornell for his research of liver regeneration. Cornell will receive \$42,000 this year, \$44,000 in 1986 and \$47,000 in 1987. The Board

of Directors of the American Institute of Chemists designated NMSU the official repository for the Institute's archives. Founded in 1923, the Institute has shaped the chemistry profession in the United States. Roger Festa is a former member of the board and is an active member of the Institute's History Committee. The Science Division also established the Chemical Communication Development Center at NMSU. Engineered by Festa, the Center provides the opportunity to introduce students to scientific communication networks and to the skills of science writing and provides service to the faculty for manuscript development and publication assistance. The Center receives and distributes written material submitted by experts in every field of chemistry and education from around the world. Marlow Ediger of the Education Division, has had his manuscript, "Objectives and Learning Activities" accepted for publication in "Education Magazine," a professional journal for teachers and supervisors. The Columbia Scholastic Press Association has named the 1984 ECHO to a first place award with four marks of distinction. The Association also honored the publication with the Silver Crown Award; the first on record received by the ECHO. Debra ShROUT is the publication's adviser. Editors for the 1984 ECHO were: Kevin Smith, Steve Willis, Liz Mossop, Heather Bruce, Laurie White, Elly Ardan, Lisa Burger, Tracy Dreesen, Karen Gordy, Janice Burger and Keith Greenwood. In Greek news, Alpha Phi Alpha social service fraternity won the Outstanding Chapter of the Year for Missouri for the second consecutive year at the fraternity's annual state convention in Jefferson City. Alpha Phi Alpha has more than 100,000 members nationwide, with eight undergraduate chapters in Missouri. At the National Regional Convention in Kansas City, Sigma Phi Epsilon social fraternity took first place in the Fund Raising Idea Competition and won the Scholarship Cup for having the highest cumulative grade point average. Sig Ep chapters from seven states attended the convention. Michael Taylor has been named regional director of the Sig Ep national. Taylor will serve as a link between regional chapters and the national.
