Jim Barnes, professor of English, recently had five poems accepted for publication. *River Styx*, a St. Louis-based literary magazine accepted "Deer Camp: Blue Mountain," "Paraglyphs" and "Below the Sans Bois Mountain" were accepted by *The Bloomsbury Review*, a Denver magazine of literature and the arts. *And Hayden's Ferry Review*, a national literary magazine at Arizona State University, accepted "Going After the Milch Cow" and "Souvenirs."

Paula Cochran, assistant professor of communication disorders, has been appointed to a three-year term on the Committee on Educational Technology of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. The committee explores, examines and recommends new educational training strategies that will enhance the training of speech/language pathologists, audiologists and speech and hearing scientists. Cochran also presented a paper, "Peer Support for Clinicians in the Field: An Electronic Conference," with Glen Bull, University of Virginia, at the annual conference of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association held in New Orleans, November 1987.

Junior **Kevin Fitzpatrick** was awarded a scholarship worth more

than \$6,000 from the Dow Jones Newspaper Fund for their summer newspaper editing program. He will be working as a copy editor this summer at the Tulsa (Okla.) World.

Senior **Kristen Lesseig** has been selected an At-Large GTE Academic All American, 1986-87, first team, in golf. This is the second year that GTE has sponsored the Academic All American Teams, a program that honors the best student-athletes in the country.

Jia-yuan (Jason) Lin, assistant professor of business administration, has been selected as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America for 1987. The award honors professional achievement and exceptional service in the recipient's field.

Betty McLane-Iles, assistant professor of French presented a paper, titled "Le Déracinement/enracinement chez Simone Weil" at the October meeting of the Western Society of French History in Las Cruces, N.M.

Ken Stilwell, professor of mathematics, had his solution to a number theory problem published in the November 1987 edition of *School Science and Mathematics*.

Tel-Alumni Begins Sunday

Tel-Alumni, the annual phonathon fundraising drive, will be extended to a five-week period running Jan. 24 through Feb. 25.

David Clithero, staff assistant in Alumni/Development, said the University's \$100,000 goal, an \$8,000 increase from last year, should be attainable with the extra week of calls.

Student and faculty volunteers from various academic divisions will attempt to contact 14,500 alumni during the drive.

Clithero said the first four weeks of the drive will be handled by the academic divisions and the last week will be organized by the Student Senate.

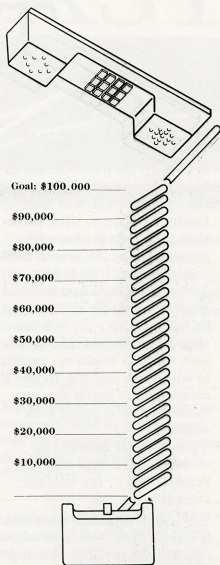
The Senate will contact campus organizations to participate during the final week.

"This is the first year every academic division has participated," Clithero said.

Each evening, volunteers will receive an orientation dinner in the Georgian Room and then participate in three hours of calling.

Clithero said five or six prizes will be awarded nightly, in addition to prizes from the divisions.

Money raised from the drive will go into the Development Fund for scholarships, loans, equipment purchases, faculty support and other needed areas.
