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Shoaff Named Graduate Dean

Susan Shoaff, associate professor of art, was recently named Associate Dean for Graduate Studies. She assumes responsibilities, July 1. Shoaff replaces Ruth Towne, professor of history, who was appointed graduate dean in 1983. As associate graduate dean, Shoaff will administer and coordinate eight University graduate programs.

Shoaff began teaching at NMSU in 1980. She received her bachelor's and

master's from Florida State University and her doctorate from North Texas State University. Her professional affiliations include the Missouri Art Education Association, the National Art Education Association and the College Art Association.

Recently, Shoaff was elected president-elect of the 400-member Missouri Art Education Association for 1988-89. She will serve as president from 1990-92.

Jim Barnes, professor of comparative literature, attended an international conference on the state of poetry May 27-29 in Thonon-les-Bains, France. Barnes' expense-paid trip was provided by the conference organizers because of his involvement with poetry and editing *The Chariton Review*. He also attended the Writers At Work Conference May 15-18 at Park City, Utah. Barnes has two poems, "Behind the Lumberyard" and "The Light Above the Store," appearing in the 20th anniversary issue of *Confrontation*, a New York literary magazine. The poems are part of a long poem "The La Plata Cantata" which gives its title to his next book from Purdue University Press. Barnes had another poem, "After the Funeral," accepted for publication by *Poetry East*, a Chicago magazine. Barnes also had an essay and a photograph accepted for publication in a new anthology, *From the Heartlands*.

Irma Beets, director of Printing Services, received a certificate of recognition from UMR-ACUHO. Beets was cited for her outstanding support of residence halls through her work in Printing Services.

The Jazz Combo won the combo division of the Wichita Jazz Festival, April 29. The NMSU combo was one of 12

university combos from Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas that competed. By winning first place, the NMSU group was given a performance on the Sunday Show at Century II, which also included Doc Severinson and the Tonight Show Orchestra. Three members of the group, **Kenny Kehner-piano**, **David Kobberdahl-trumpet** and **Randy Budd-trombone**, received outstanding soloist recognition. The other members of the ensemble are **Tim Nutting-drums** and **Greg Morey-bass**. The combo's winning program consisted of compositions and arrangements by **Willie Thomas**, artist-in-residence in the Division of Fine Arts. The director of the group is Professor of Music **Roger Cody**.

David Partenheimer, assistant professor of English, had his article "American Teaching Internships and the German Vorbereitungsdiens" published in *Educational Considerations* (Spring 1988).

Arnold Zuckerman, professor of history, had his paper "Disease and Ventilation in the Royal Navy: The Woodenship Years" included in the November 1987 issue of *Eighteenth Century Life*. The book is published tri-annually for the College of William and Mary by the Johns Hopkins University Press.
