FRESHMAN SUMMER PRE-ENROLLMENT began Friday with Pershing Scholar Day. Twenty-one General John J. Pershing Scholarship recipients and their parents visited the University campus. Highlights of the day were a picnic at Thousand Hills State Park and a banquet in the Student Union. More than 1,000 students are expected to attend freshman orientation today through August 4. The program begins at 8:30 a.m. with registration and coffee in the Tangerine Room of the Student Union. At 9 a.m., a University administrator and a head of an academic division greet students and their parents. Rap Time at 9:30 a.m. answers questions about campus life for parents and students. The University ROTC will present a program called "Add Adventure to Your College Life" at 10:15 a.m. Campus Activities and Residence Halls Association will discuss "Everything You Always Wanted To Know About What's Going On, But Were Too Confused To Ask," at 10:45 a.m.

From 12 to 1 p.m., future students and their parents will lunch in Centennial Hall dining room. At 1 p.m., parents will attend an orientation meeting called "One Flew Out of the Cuckoo's Nest," while future students will meet with Freshman Counselors. Campus tours, "All Around NMSU," will begin at 1:45 p.m. During the day, other pre-registration activities will take place.

UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS who will complete degree requirements this August should submit applications for graduation to the Registrar's Office by July 1, 1977.

BASIC RESCUE Techniques in Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) will be taught from 6 to 9 p.m. June 13-14 and June 16-17 in Pershing Arena. Reservations should be made with Gil Etheridge, ext. 3430, because the two classes are limited to 20 students each. Participants will be certified. The course is sponsored by the Red Cross and the Missouri Heart Association. The course is open to the public at no charge.

Program for Thursday evening began with a serenade by the Sweet Adelines, followed by a screening of old-time movies and a tour of the Kirk Memorial. On June 16, Arts in the Park continues with the Warren County String Ticklers, a bluegrass band, from 7-9 p.m. in the University quadrangle. Participants are invited to sit on the grass or to bring their lawn chairs and blankets from which to view the activities.

THE SUMMER BOOK EXHIBIT will be held from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. on June 16 on the first floor of Violette Hall. Tables set up in the hall will exhibit the latest in teaching materials.

SINGERS ARE NEEDED for the chorus of the Gilbert and Sullivan light comic opera, "Patience," to be presented by the Music Theatre Workshop from June 19 through July 8. Directed by Dr. James Severns, professor of dramatics, the opera is about a super aesthetic lover and his romances. Dr. Dale Jorgenson, head of the Fine Arts Division, will direct the music.
