Workshop participants will have an opportunity to match their wits with a specially designed analog computer in solving the nation's future energy problems.

SUMMER SESSIONS FOR COLLEGE TEACHERS ... The National Endowment for Humanities Summer Seminars for College Teachers program has set a deadline of March 15 for applications for the upcoming summer. The seminars are open to faculty members teaching undergraduate courses at private or state undergraduate institutions or at junior or community colleges who are concerned primarily with improving their knowledge of the subjects they teach. The seminars provide an opportunity to work with distinguished scholars at institutions with libraries suitable for advanced study. In addition to the work of the seminar, participants will be able to pursue personal study of their own choosing.

Preference will be given to faculty who have been teaching at least three years. Stipends of \$2,000 are awarded for a tenure period of two months full-time study. A travel allowance of up to \$400 also is provided.
