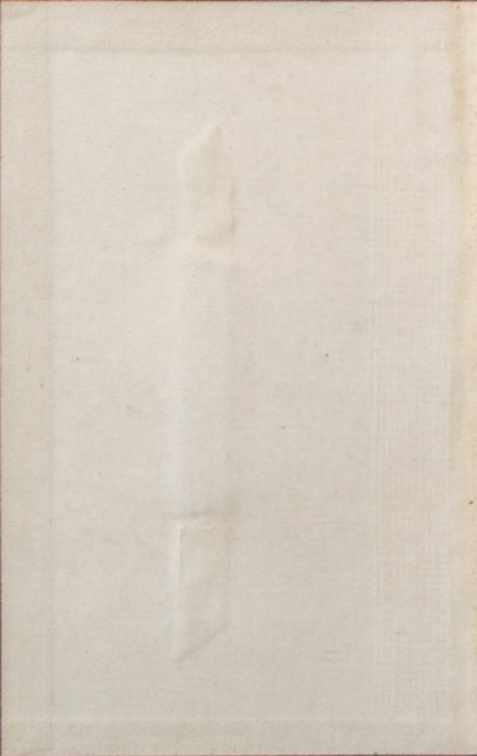
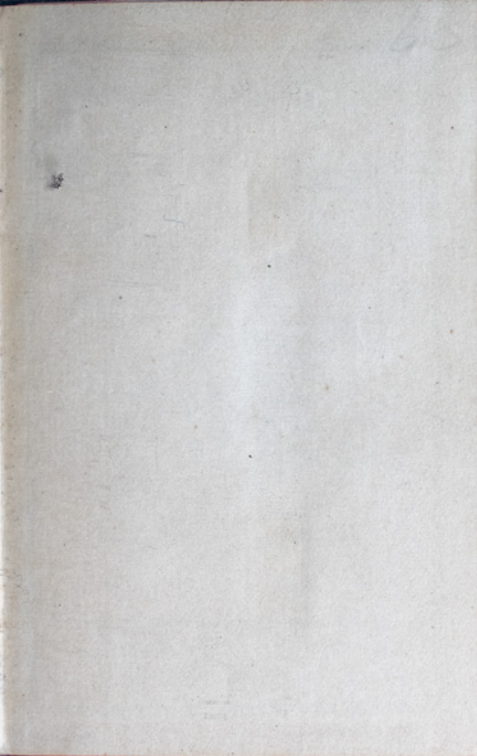
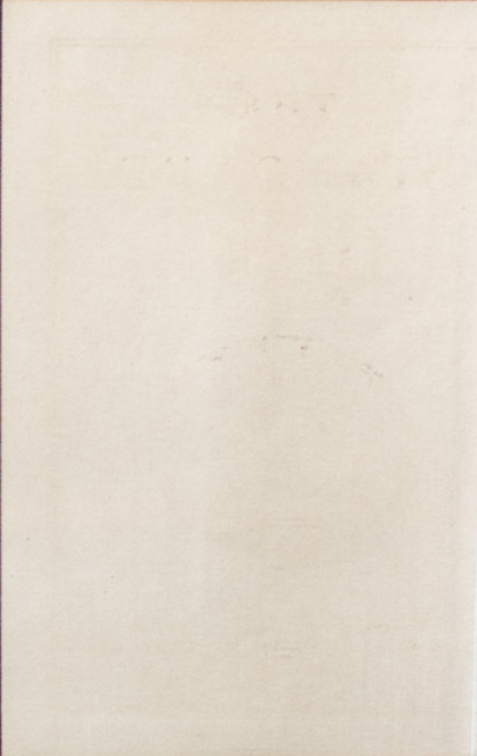

## HELP IN CASE OF ACCIDENTS

**DROWNING.** 1. Turn victim face down, press on lower ribs, one hand on each side, with considerable weight, about twenty times per minute. 2. Take a deep breath and breathe it forcibly into mouth of patient. 3. Compress the chest to expel the air, and repeat the operation. 4. **DON'T GIVE UP!** People have been saved after HOURS of patient, vigorous effort. 5. When breathing begins, get patient into a warm bed, give WARM drinks or spirits in teaspoonfuls, being careful not to choke your patient if still unconscious. Patient should have fresh air and quiet.

**LIGHTNING.** Dash cold water over a person struck.

**SUNSTROKE.** Loosen clothing. Get patient into shade and apply ice-cold water to head.

**MAD DOG OR SNAKE BITE.** Tie cord tight above wound. Suck the wound and cauterize with caustic or white-hot iron at once, or cut out adjoining parts with a sharp knife.

**VENOMOUS INSECTS' STINGS, Etc.** Apply weak Ammonia, Oil, Salt Water, or Iodine.

**FAINTING.** Place flat on back; allow fresh air and sprinkle with water.

**ELECTRICITY.** Release from current—not touching body or wire with hands, metal or a wet stick. Handle body by its clothing, with rubber gloves and shoes, if possible; if not, cover hands with dry, woolen cloth and stand on dry boards. Then induce artificial respiration as in a case of drowning. Rub limbs and massage body.

**FIRE IN ONE'S CLOTHING.** *Don't run*—especially not down stairs or out of doors. Roll on carpet, or wrap in woolen rug, blanket or coat, whichever can be obtained the quickest. Keep the head down so as not to inhale flame.

In the year 1929 there will be two Eclipses, both of the Sun.

I. A TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, May 9. Invisible to the United States. Visible to the central and eastern portions of South Africa, the Indian Ocean, the southeastern part of Asia, Philippine Islands and the northern half of Australia.

II. AN ANNULAR ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, November 1. Visible to the extreme northeastern tip of North America, the eastern portion of the West Indies, Africa, the central and western parts of Europe and the southwestern part of Asia.

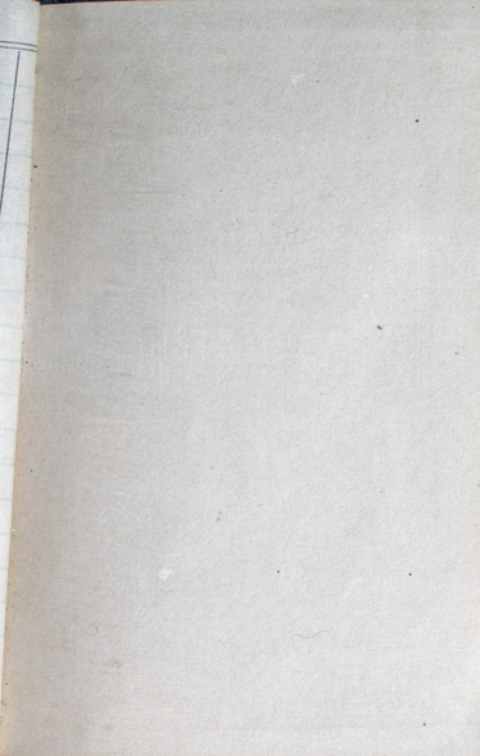

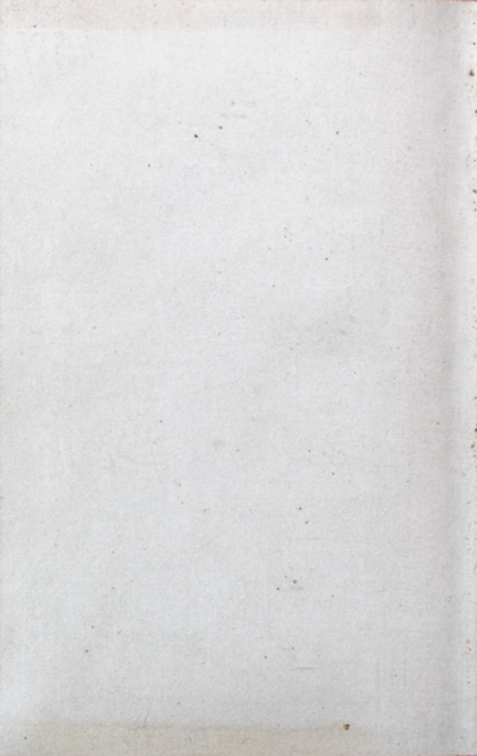
