

## The Albert McNeil Jubilee Singers To Perform Jan. 16



The Albert McNeil Jubilee Singers will present the first Lyceum Series performance for 1995 at 7:30 p.m., Jan. 16, in Baldwin Auditorium. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff are available in the SAB Office, SUB.

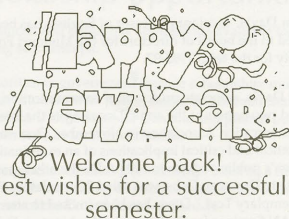
A traveling company of 14 and a resident group of 42, The Albert McNeil Jubilee Singers have garnered international acclaim and focused worldwide attention on the vast body of folk music termed "African-American."

Twenty-six years ago, the Singers undertook their first European tour. Today, after 16 sold-out European tours, eight tours of the United States, and tours of the Middle and Far East, Africa, and South America, they are among the most honored singing ensembles in the world. They were selected three times to serve the U.S. State Department and USIS Cultural Exchange Program in areas of the world including East Germany, Hungary, Romania, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Iran, India, and the United Arab Emirates.

Founder/Director Albert McNeil is well-known to the national choral community, having been honored on two occasions with command performances before the prestigious American Choral Directors Association in 1981 in New Orleans and in 1985 at their Salt Lake City Convention. In 1989, they performed with the world-famous Mormon Tabernacle Choir.

The choir was heard via National Public Radio on the series "Beverly Sills Presents," a live two-hour broadcast of their concert in the Ambassador Auditorium, and on The Smithsonian's 26-week series "Wade In The Water."

The Lyceum Series will feature three other performances during the spring semester, including The Rainmaker on Feb. 28, the State Ballet of Missouri on March 14 and Othello on April 3. ☺



## Mayor Bosley to present keynote address

St. Louis Mayor Freeman Bosley Jr. will present the keynote address during one of several events planned in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The theme of this year's celebration is "We Are The Dream."

On Jan. 12 at 3:30 p.m. in the SUB Activities Room a symposium will be sponsored by the Social Science Division. The topic is King's "Letter from Birmingham Jail." According to Dwyane Smith, assistant dean of multicultural affairs, the symposium will encompass faculty, staff and students discussing the meaning and message of King's letter. At 7 p.m., a program featuring Bosley will be held in the SUB Georgian Room. The program will also include a performance by the Unique Ensemble Gospel Choir. A reception will follow in the Quiet Lounge.

Bosley became St. Louis' first black mayor in 1993. In 1982, he began his political career as the first black Circuit Court Clerk in Missouri's history. He was re-elected to this position in 1986 and 1990, when he became St. Louis' first black Democratic Party chairman.

**Tom Bultman**, associate professor of biology, had a manuscript, "Induced resistance to fall armyworm mediated by fungal endophyte," accepted in the peer-reviewed journal *Environmental Entomology*. His manuscript "Mutualistic and parasitic interactions between *Phorbia* flies and *Epichloe*: convergence between a fungus and entomophilous angiosperms" has been accepted in the peer-reviewed journal *Canadian Journal of Botany*.

**Adam Davis**, assistant professor of English, has been named to the board of directors for the Missouri Folklore Society for the term 1995-97.

**Janet Davis**, associate professor of communication, presented two papers at the annual meeting of the Speech Communication Association in November. One was on theoretical and critical implications of an examination of women's public address to 1000 A.D.; the other, part of a tribute to Donovan Ochs, was titled "Consolatory Rhetoric as Exemplary Text." Davis has been invited to attend the C-SPAN Seminar for Professors in Washington, D.C., in January.

**Griff Freeman**, assistant professor of chemistry, has had his paper "Self-Assembled Metal Colloid Monolayers: A New Approach to SERS Substrates" accepted for publication in *Science*.

**Huping Ling**, assistant professor of history, recently had an article, "Chinese Merchant Wives in the United States," published in *Origins & Destinations: 41 Essays on Chinese America*, a publication by the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California and the UCLA Asian American Studies Center.

**Judy Mullins**, controller, has been appointed by the

Central Association of College and University Business Officers (CACUBO) to the Drive-In Workshop Committee. The committee will develop, promote and present regional drive-in workshops on current issues confronting business officers and their staffs. CACUBO represents 600 institutions in the North Central region of the United States.

**Betty McLane-Iles**, associate professor of French, chaired the Simone De Beauvoir panel session of The Modern Languages Association of America national conference in San Diego on Dec. 28. McLane-Iles taught at the Henri IV Lycee (school) of which Simone De Beauvoir and Sartre were graduates.

**Joyce Ragland**, associate professor of education and coordinator of field experiences, presented a paper, "Northeast Missouri State University and the Kirksville Public Schools, A Collaboration for At-Risk Students," at the annual conference of the Renaissance Group in San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 14. Ragland represented the Division of Education at the Missouri State Teacher's Convention in Kansas City, Mo., in November. She has been invited to attend a conference jointly sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education and the National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C., "to help develop new strategies that will further the local, state and national partnerships to improve teaching and learning for all children."

**Lisa Sprague**, director of Public Safety, has been elected to serve as the 1994-95 vice president of the Missouri Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators. The organization promotes standards and criteria to be used as guidelines for the protection of faculty, staff, students and the general public and the properties on the various campuses statewide.


