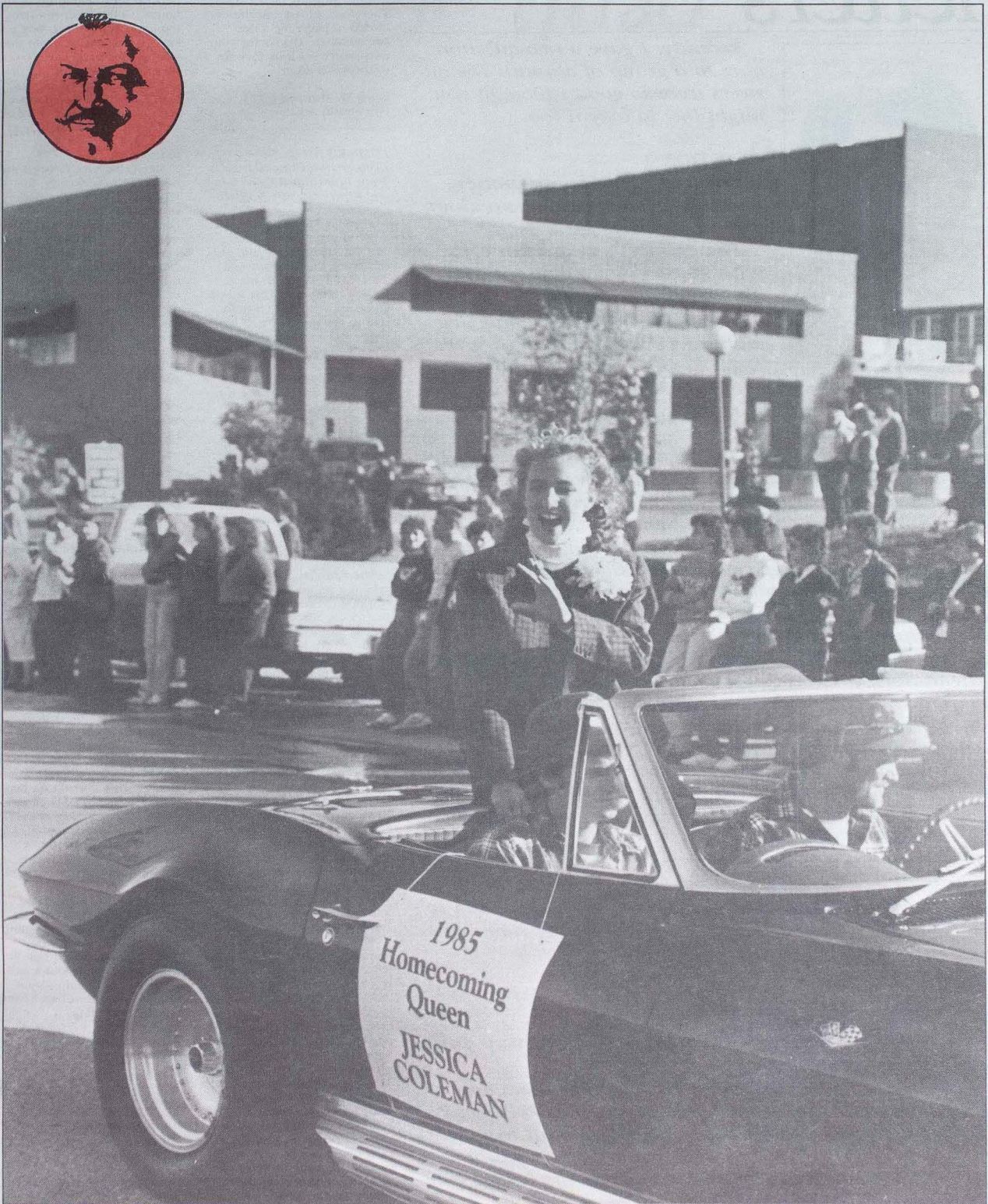




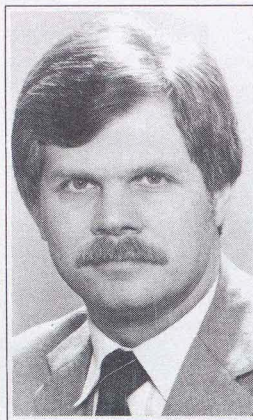

EDITOR'S NOTE: *The following story and letter are taken from the Cardinal Key national honor sorority newsletter.*

The national office received a request from the son of a Cardinal Key member for an official Key pin for his mother. In searching the files, we found that Jim Westwood's mother, Christine Butterfield Westwood, was selected for membership in Kirksville State Teacher's College (now Northeast Missouri State University) in 1942. Her national number was 34 C 125. From the last newsletter, you'll note that her number indicated that the Kirksville chapter was the third to be chartered in 1934 and that Miss Butterfield was the 125th member to be initiated into that chapter. We ordered the Key pin for Jim Westwood and had it engraved with his mother's national number.

We received this heartwarming letter from Mrs. Westwood that provides a personal look at what Cardinal Key meant to her.

The story behind my son's search for this pin is very touching. I was a very poor child of the Depression and for my parents to have found enough money to send me to an inexpensive teacher's college was nothing short of a miracle. Regardless of the economics, those were very happy, meaningful years and I shall always feel an indebtedness to the faculty of that small school who gave us, for its time, a good educational background.

I well remember one of the happiest moments when

I was invited to join Cardinal Key. The chapter was limited to 20 students so that membership represented quite an honor. I remember not having enough money to buy a key. In later years, I told this story to my children and they were determined to find one—hence Jim contacted the Kirksville chapter and was referred to you. You can well imagine how delighted I was that Christmas morning.

Memories have flooded my mind as I have written this letter. Because of the Depression and the mood of the country, my generation grew up to our teen years without much feeling of self-worth. As I look back, I believe Cardinal Key gave me a source of self-worth that stayed with me always. Of course, later the war years and post-war years opened up a world we would have never imagined.

Thank you so much for your help and interest.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter was sent to University President Charles J. McClain by Ralph Bedell, a member of NMSU's faculty from 1933 to 1937.

I hope that my warmth of feeling and admiration for you and the dear old school which you head will make up for what I feel is my negligence in not having corresponded with you more frequently in the last few months. I have a number of excuses, but you know all of them and probably a lot more.

My real purpose is to give the warmest kind of congratulations on the change that is being made in the emphasis of the curriculum at Northeast Missouri State University. As important as this

is, I believe your Value-Added concept is even more important.

For many years, when I was working as a counselor educator in various institutions, I tried hard to get even a portion of the institution to work on the concept of gains or improvement in knowledge of students. It seems that faculty are unusually resistant to this kind of idea. I don't want to be too unmindful of good faculty work, but I think in many of the institutions where I taught other than NMSU, there was a tendency to try to get students into class who could largely learn on their own rather than to emphasize a high quality of teaching which would encourage and enable students to end the class instruction with more knowledge and skill than they brought to it.

Your ability to get this established at Northeast Missouri State University is a tremendous accomplishment. I hope that sometime in the not-too-distant future I will be able to have lunch with you in Kirksville and get first-hand some of the techniques you have used to bring your faculty to an acceptance of the Value-Added concept and to encourage their effective practice of it.

I believe that you are setting a model, not only for colleges and universities in Missouri, but throughout the nation.

It gives me real satisfaction to know that I once was a faculty member at NMSU, and furthermore, during a period of marked changes and improvements. You are adding materially to that long history of leadership which has characterized Northeast Missouri State University.

You have my highest regards and very best wishes.

NMSU's Board of Regents has approved operating budgets of almost \$33 million for the 1985-86 fiscal year. University President Charles McClain told the Board more than 70 percent of that amount would be used to increase faculty and staff salaries. Two of the larger appropriations included \$566,000 for computer science equipment and \$675,000 for library materials.

The National Science Foundation has awarded a grant of \$46,768 to the University's Division of Science. The grant proposal was written by Michael Lockhart, assistant professor of microbiology, and Gary Sells, professor of physiology. NMSU will match the money given, and the funds will be used to buy equipment for laboratory improvement in general biology, cell biology and undergraduate research areas.

Two NMSU students saved a struggling swimmer at Crowder State Park near Trenton, Mo., in late July. Cathy Dietl, a certified lifeguard, and Debbie Gandy were working at a camp, supervising swimmers, when a man called for help more than one-quarter mile from shore. The two rescued the man after he had gone under the lake surface several times. He recovered after resting onshore for several minutes. Dietl is a senior physical education major from St. Louis and Gandy graduated in August with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice. Dietl was featured in the spring 1984 NEMOSCOPE when she received a cochlear implant at Kirksville Osteopathic Health Center.

For the first time since statistics have been kept, NMSU's all-sorority grade point average exceeded the undergraduate women's GPA. In the spring 1985 semester, the all-sorority GPA was 2.88, while the all-women's GPA was 2.84. Statistics on grade point averages have been kept for seven years at the University. Delta Zeta led the sorori-

ties with a 2.94 chapter GPA.

Kirksville continues to be plagued by fires in its downtown area. In April, Mister Jim's, a men's clothing store on the south side of the square, was destroyed by fire. The store reopened in late August. In mid-June, a roaring blaze on the west side of the square gutted Tuck's restaurant, Wright's Sight and Sound, and Glenn's Shoes. In July, Tarkim Discount, located on Highway 6 west of Kirksville, also burned down. Kirksville City Manager Robert Kufrin has appointed a city task force to investigate the fires and study the problem of arson in the Kirksville area.

Civic groups from central and northern Missouri have renewed efforts to get U.S. Highway 63 widened to four lanes from Columbia, north to the Iowa border. Leaders from Kirksville, Macon, Moberly and Columbia held a series of meetings in the summer deciding on a plan of action to convince the Missouri Highway and Transportation Commission to approve the project. The group prepared a formal

proposal and presented it to the Commission this fall, but was told the project would take at least five years to complete.

Developers still hope to break ground for Kirksville's Holidome by the end of this year despite a funding setback. A local group was denied funding through the federal Urban Development Action Grant program. The developers are now looking for alternative funding through the private sector. The project is planned for construction along U.S. Highway 63 near the south entrance to Kirksville.

Thousand Hills State Park will be getting a facelift in the near future. The Missouri General Assembly passed a bill in its last session which allocated money for state park improvements, and Thousand Hills was one of those listed. Park Superintendent Clyde Newman said Thousand Hills would receive nearly \$800,000 to improve buildings, land and services at the park. Almost half the money will be spent to renovate the beach and beach house and to construct two new rental duplexes at the park.

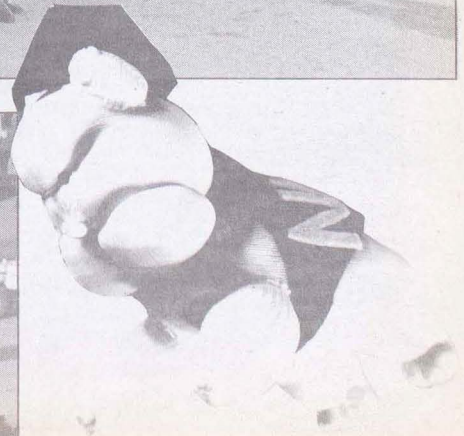
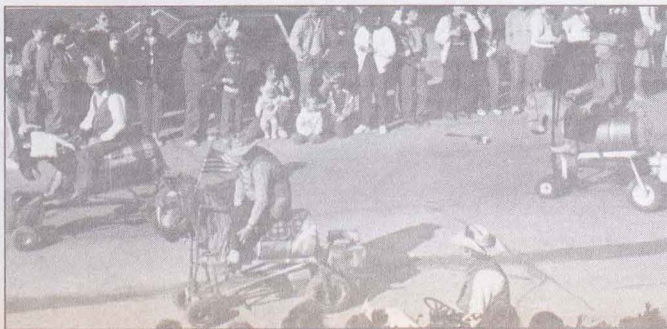

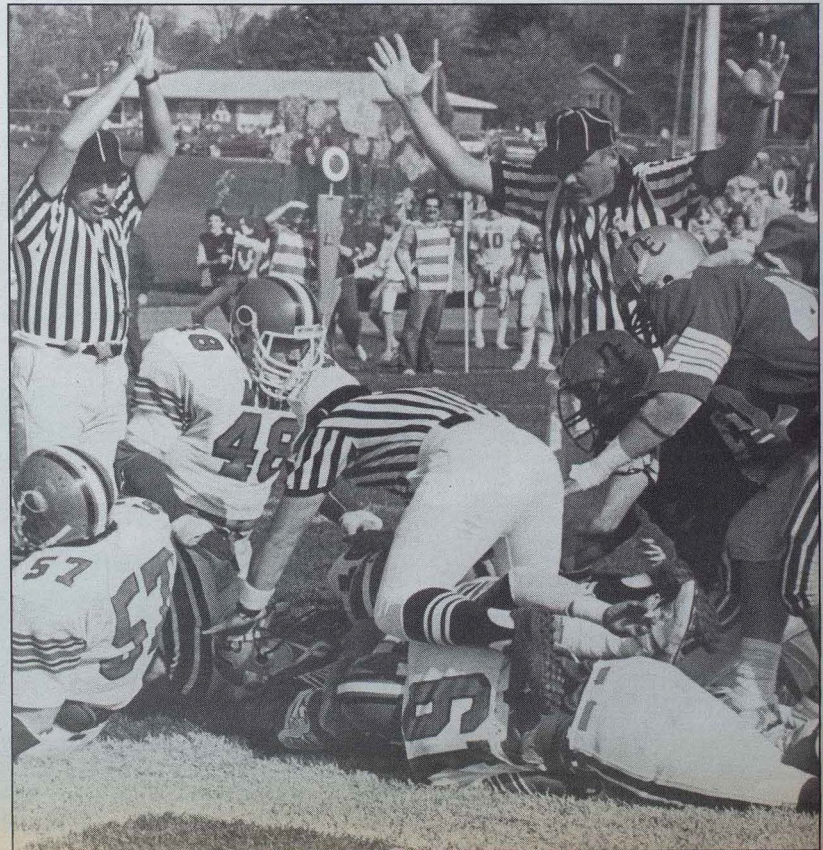

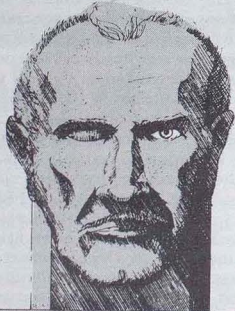

"Hello, this is Susan Lake, a student volunteer at Northeast Missouri State University. Are you Mr. (or Mrs.) . . . ? Great, then I'd like to take a moment to visit with you about the University and its Development Fund."



Sound familiar? This was the general opening statement for about 350 students as they took part in the Sixth Annual Tel-Alumni campaign.

This year's campaign, lasting from Oct. 28 through Nov. 21, raised more than \$96,000. The goal for this year's campaign was \$90,000 in pledges. This goal represented an increase of approximately \$8,000 over last year's final total and \$36,000 over the final pledge total reached in 1980, Tel-Alumni's initial year.

The four-week phonathon was segmented into four parts consisting of Greek, Service, Divisional and All-Star weeks respectively. Volunteers from organizations competed every night for individual prizes and the opportunity to advance themselves and their organization into All-Star week.

The top caller for Tel-Alumni was Dave Mount, who raised \$2,430 for Sigma Phi Epsilon social fraternity and the Student Activities Board. He won a \$1,025 scholarship donated by Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine and Kirksville Osteopathic Medical Center.

Tina Kennell won second place, as she raised \$2,360 for the Alpha Angels. She won a \$500 scholarship courtesy of NMSU. The third-place winner was Robert Norton, who called for Alpha Tau Omega social fraternity and Blue Key honor fraternity. His \$2,145 gave him a \$250 scholarship from the University. Tony Edwards of Alpha Phi Alpha social fraternity won fourth place with \$2,046 and received weekend accommodations in St. Louis courtesy of International Tours.

The group that raised the most money in Tel-Alumni was the Alpha Angels, a Little Sister organization for Alpha Phi Alpha social

fraternity. They raised \$6,459 in two nights of calling and won a trophy and free rental of Theta Psi fraternity. The Angels beat the Student Activities Board, which raised \$5,070. SAB won a trophy and free rental of Kimball's, courtesy of Delta Chi. The third-place winner was Gamma Phi Delta social sorority, which raised \$4,712 and won a trophy and use of the SAB sound equipment for one night. Delta Zeta social sorority won fourth place with a total of \$4,433 and won a trophy and a pizza party courtesy of Ken's Pizza.

Seven divisions and 27 organizations called during this year's campaign. The Division of Business raised \$14,781; the Division of Home Economics raised \$3,370; and the chemistry department raised \$3,003 to lead divisional callers.

Tel-Alumni was originally established to enhance the scholarship program but has since been expanded to include student loans and research stipends. Besides student development, Tel-Alumni has also benefited divisional programs with the purchase of equipment, endowed professorships and recognition projects.

Development Fund growth is not the only benefit derived from Tel-Alumni. Alumni records are updated, permitting the Alumni Office to better communicate with NMSU graduates and friends.

Perhaps Tel-Alumni makes its greatest impact in the area of good will. As NMSU President Charles McClain said, "Our students have a great story to tell alumni . . . They are the best ambassadors the University has."

New Practical Arts head sees changes ahead for division

A move from teaching the "how" to teaching the "why" will characterize the Division of Practical Arts during the 1985-86 academic year, according to new Division Head Robert L. Stephens.

"I think our academic philosophy began changing last year," Stephens said. "There's a feeling

among the faculty that as a division, we've been static too long. We're going to become dynamic. The faculty feels there are program changes needed and it's time to effect those changes."

"I think the faculty is committed to upgrading programs and making our course material more challenging to the students," Stephens said. "We are going to see a de-emphasis of the purely career-oriented courses, especially the one- and two-year programs. I see a greater sense of purpose among the faculty now than at any time."

Stephens said there are several results of this new commitment. "I think you'll see much greater emphasis on science and mathematics in our division. I think you'll see us integrating many more of our programs with programs in other divisions on campus. I also think you'll see us becoming more selective in choosing our students," he said.

Stephens became division head July 1 after teaching as professor of industrial education for 14 years. Stephens also served as an assistant professor at Iowa State University (Ames) for two years before coming to Northeast. He received his bachelor's and doctoral degrees from that university, and earned his master's degree at Nebraska State Teachers College (Wayne).

"The largest change in the division since I've been here has been the shift away from teacher education," Stephens said. "In 1971, we graduated 80 student teachers; last year we graduated 10. At the same time, we've doubled our number of programs in the last decade."

Several changes are in the offing in Barnett Hall during the upcoming year. "Probably the biggest change is of course the agriculture program moving from this division to the Division of Science. They will still be housed in this building, but now our faculty basically consists of industrial educators," Stephens said.

"Also, we're disposing of our driver's education lab and our driver simulators. We're going to change that to a computer lab. That will be our second computer lab, and we're hoping to wire them together so we can do some networking. We also may be getting into computer-aided drafting and computer-aided design in the future," he said.

Stephens finds his new job "actually more enjoyable than I anticipated. I've always liked teaching, and I've been a teacher for a long time. I approached the transition from the classroom to the administrative office with some trepidation. But I'm finding the



position challenging and refreshing.”
 Stephens follows Roland Nagel and Otho Barnett, two division heads who served for 42 years between them. Stephens feels that continuity “promotes a comfortable feeling among the faculty, a feeling that this is a good place to work. I hope I’m able to pro-

mote that same feeling. I hope we can develop and expand our division, yet still feel comfortable.”
 Above all, Stephens feels the Division of Practical Arts will continue to be known for the faculty’s dedication to the student. “That’s something the faculty has always

been diligent about,” he said. “I think this has always been a division where a student could come to a faculty member with a question or a problem and feel he would get an honest, caring answer.”

 McClanahan hasn’t yet received any unsolicited job offers and he has no immediate plans to move from the Kirksville area, but he does have some future goals in mind.
 “I’ve always thought I’d work at a nice station in the South where it never gets cold . . . I’d like to move into the medium market.”
 McClanahan said he’s heard horror stories about the major markets where competition is so fierce and there is so much concern about ratings that job security isn’t too high.
 Even after parades, national television and Marvin McClanahan Day, it’s back to the broadcast booth at KIRX where at 5:05 a.m. daily, you can hear national personality and local hero, Marvin McClanahan in, or rather, on, the air.

in memory

Elizabeth “Betsy” Worrell, professor emeritus of speech, died May 14 at Columbia (Mo.) Regional Hospital. Worrell was 80, and had been a patient at the hospital since March.

Worrell joined the NMSU faculty in 1947, and taught until her retirement in 1970 as professor emeritus of speech. Prior to her arrival in Kirksville, she taught at Hardin Junior College (Mexico, Mo.), Central Methodist College (Fayette, Mo.) and William Woods College (Fulton, Mo.).

Worrell later taught as a visiting professor at the University of Missouri-Columbia for two years and at the University of Arizona (Tucson) in 1972 and 1973.

Worrell was born in Mexico, Mo. and graduated from UMC. She received her master’s degree and doctorate at Northwestern University (Chicago). She enlisted in the Marine Corps women’s reserve in 1942 and was separated from the service in 1945, with her final duty as that of commanding officer at the Officers Training School at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

She was a member of the National Association of Speech, Central States Speech Association, Missouri Speech Association and the American Educators Theatre Association. She was also a member of Beta Sigma Omicron and Kappa Alpha Theta sororities and the American Association of University Professors.

Worrell traveled extensively to Great Britain and Canada. She was the assistant director of the “Miracle and Mystery” plays at Glastonbury, England in 1971. She also won the 1975 award for distinguished service in oral interpretation from Indiana State University (Terre Haute).

Worrell was quite active in work for charities and other causes. She recorded readings for the blind at UMC and served on the board of directors of both the UMC Museum of Art and Archeology and the Mid-Missouri Multiple Sclerosis Society.

Alum named Small-Market Broadcast Personality of the Year by CMA

Kirksville born and Kirksville bred, Marvin McClanahan ('79) has attended school, works and is raising a family in his hometown. But McClanahan recently soared beyond his rural surroundings, right into the national spotlight, after being named the Small-Market Broadcast Personality of the Year by the Country Music Association—the first broadcaster from any of the major-, medium- or small-market categories in Missouri to receive the honor.

A few years ago, former KIRX Program Director Tom Pollard tried unsuccessfully to get either his name or McClanahan’s name on the CMA nominee list, which required five recommendations from other broadcast outlets. To his surprise, Pollard contacted McClanahan a few months ago to tell him he was on the list. So McClanahan completed the necessary applications and tapes for the award and underwent two rounds of balloting before the final decision; from 14 nominees nationwide, to five and on to win. Not only was the victory sweet, but the CMA flew McClanahan and his wife, Rebecca, to Nashville, Tenn., to be recognized with the major- and medium-market winners on national television at the annual Country Music Awards.

Now, Marvin McClanahan is kind of a hero in Kirksville.

“I’ve certainly got a lot of recognition (from winning the award),” McClanahan said. “I’ve been in three parades.”

And, he admits, having the mayor of the city sign a proclamation for November 1, 1985 to be Marvin McClanahan Day isn’t too bad either.

The award represents a peak in McClanahan’s 19-year broadcasting career—

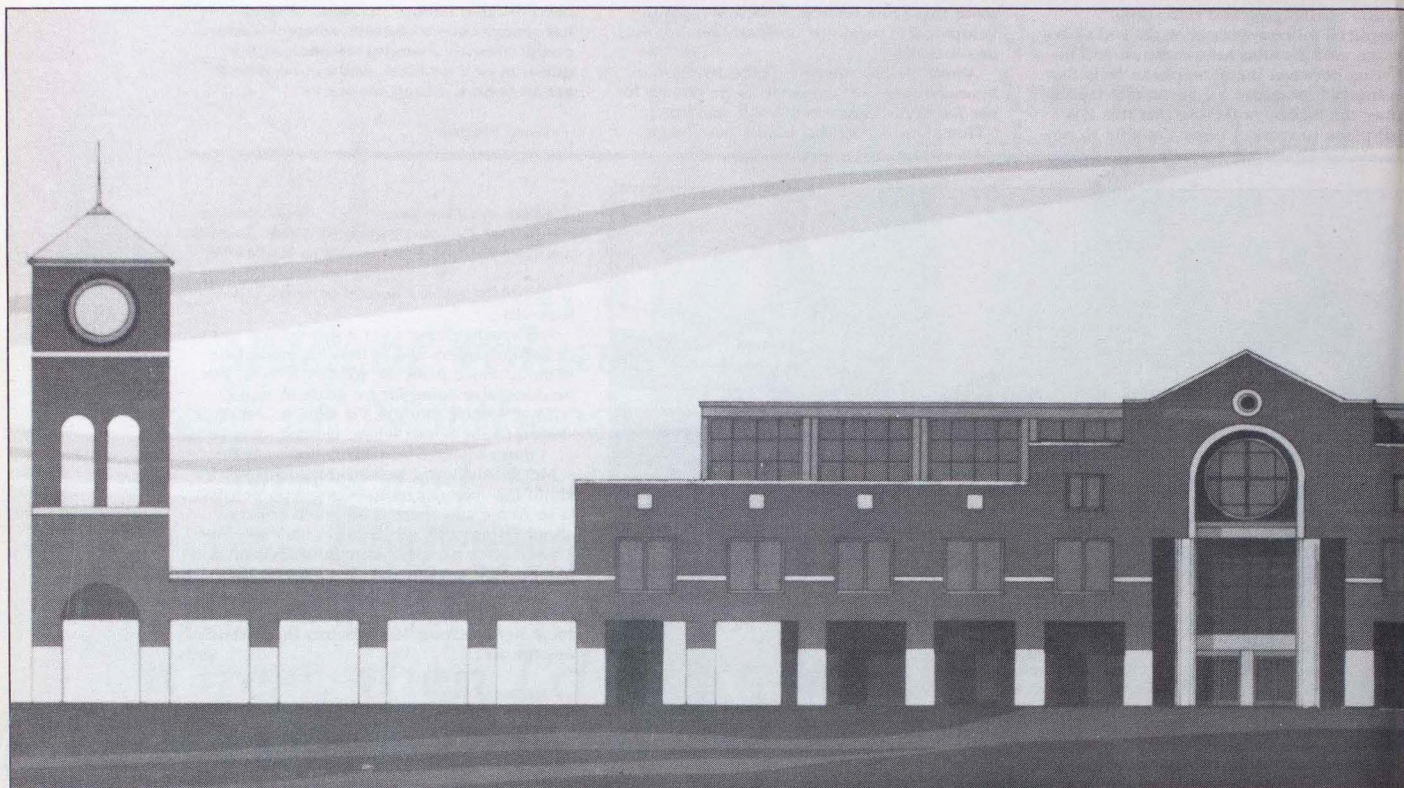
a career he knew he wanted very early in life. “I’ve been interested in broadcasting since I was a small kid and played with my parents’ tape recorder,” McClanahan said.
 McClanahan has gone a long way since his days as a tape-recorder amateur. Despite the fact that he has remained in Kirksville, he began working at KLTI in Macon, Mo., during the summers and weekends, fresh out of high school in 1966. McClanahan was drafted in 1968, served for 15 months, then came back to KLTI and Northeast Missouri State University where he continued working on a social science degree.

Thirteen years ago, McClanahan started working at KIRX in Kirksville. In 1973, he married Rebecca Payne, ('75), now an assistant professor of nursing at NMSU. In 1975, NMSU began offering a mass communications major and McClanahan went back to school part-time, earning his bachelor’s degree in 1979.

After 13 years and a national award, McClanahan is still making the coffee at 4:30 a.m. daily at KIRX-KRXL. In addition to his air shift from 5:05 a.m. to about 10 a.m., McClanahan records commercials and usually winds up his day around 11 a.m. He goes home, catches a little sleep, then waits for his two sons, Andrew, 13, and Bryan, 6, and his wife to return home from school.

What has winning the Small-Market Broadcast Personality of the Year award meant for McClanahan?

“I still have to make the coffee,” McClanahan said. “. . . People know about Kirksville, now. I’ve received (congratulatory) letters and calls from many people . . . It (winning the award) will certainly make



Library renovation will begin in spring

The addition to Pickler Library will be along the entire Quadrangle side of the Library giving it a new face. Featured will be a tower, similar to the original Baldwin Hall Tower that was destroyed by fire in 1924. The original Baldwin Hall stood on the site of the sunken garden, behind Kirk Memorial.

A major addition to and renovation of Pickler Memorial Library will be a reality due to a \$12.3 million appropriation to Northeast by the Missouri legislature. Money for the project had been sought by the University for more than a decade and became available when voters passed a \$600 million capital improvements bond issue in 1982.

Campus planner Doug Winicker said construction is expected to begin this spring.

Plans call for the addition to be along the entire Quadrangle side of the library, giving it a new face. Plans call for the addition to be more than 68,000 square feet, doubling the size of the current facility.

The existing library will be completely renovated as part of the second phase of the project.

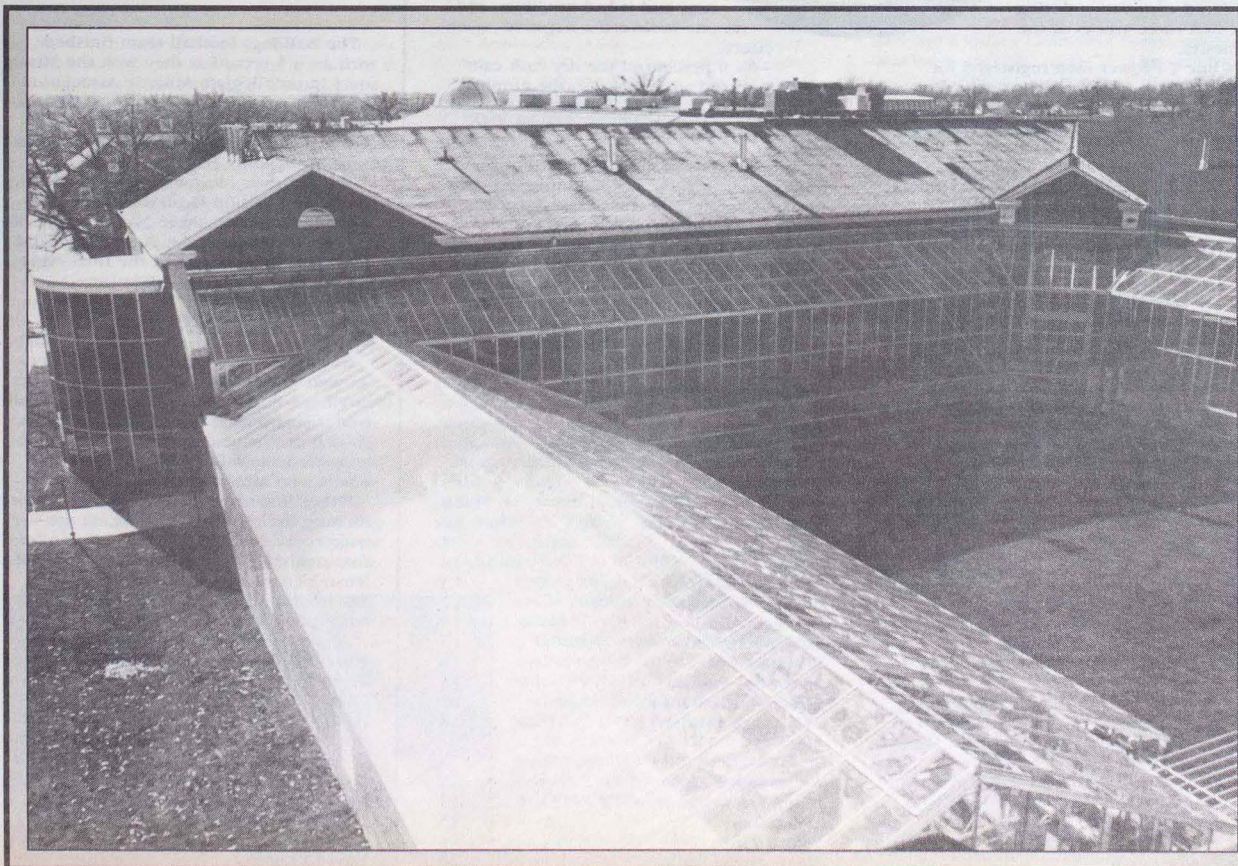
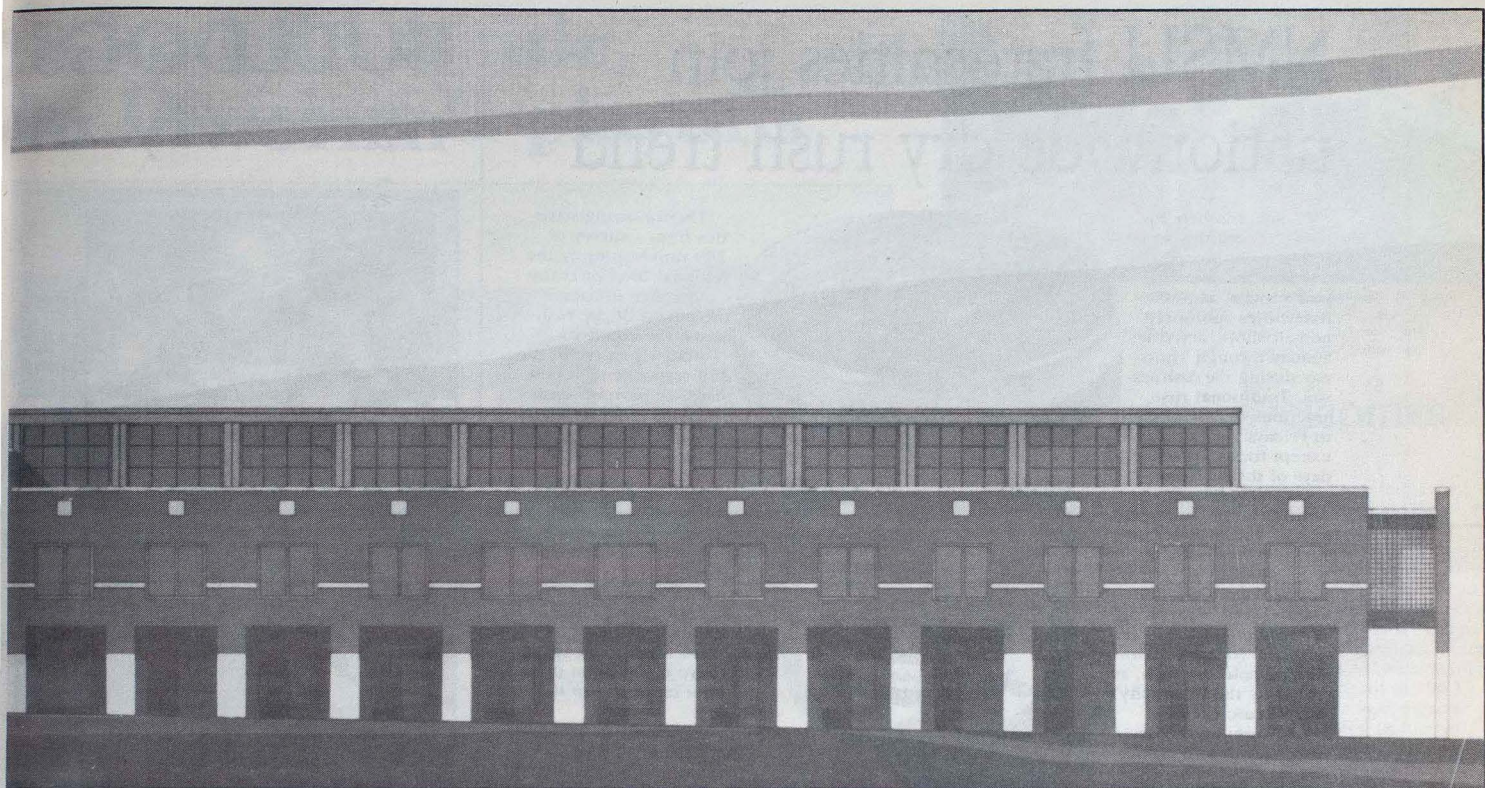
The construction and renovation is especially useful at this time since it allows for full implementation of computer cataloging and other modern technologies planned for the new facility.

The renovation and addition should bring the University's library facilities up to standard for the first time in more than 60 years. The original Pickler Library was built in 1924 after fire destroyed the library that was connected to the old Baldwin Hall.

Funded by insurance proceeds and a \$25,000 gift from former faculty member, Board of Regents member and Kirksville businessman Sam Pickler, the "library" actually was devoted largely to classroom space lost through the fire.

A 1966 addition helped to alleviate some of the immediate needs. However, the growth of the collection, the introduction of computers and the greater need for student studying spaces over the last 20 years taxed the facility.

A 1975 study of university library needs contained a consultant's recommendation for the new facility.

NMSU fraternities join nationwide dry rush trend

Pledge numbers for NMSU fraternities and sororities increased this fall over the previous year's totals, as NMSU fraternities sponsored non-alcoholic activities Sunday through Thursday during the rush/season. Traditional rush functions were restricted to Fridays and Saturdays, except for the first two days of the semester.

Formal rush was Aug. 24 to Sept. 18. The decision to hold a fraternity dry rush was made by the University's Interfraternity Council. The Council is made up of members of NMSU fraternities. NMSU sororities already hold dry rush, as set up by the University's Panhellenic Council.

IFC drew up the dry rush plan to join numerous universities which have instituted similar plans around the country, and to cut down on neighborhood complaints during the first three weeks of the semester.

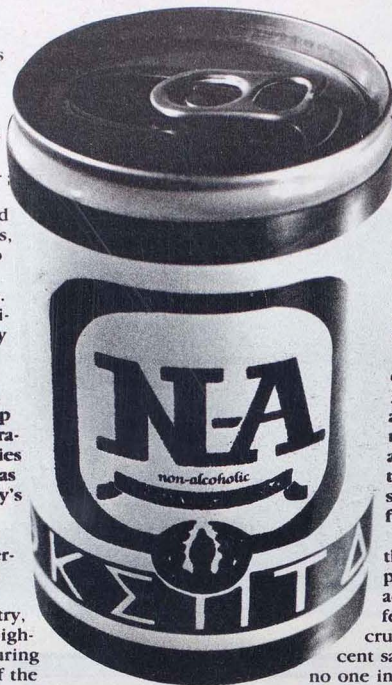
While 74 fewer men registered for rush this fall, NMSU fraternities welcomed 180 pledges this fall, five more than 1984. One hundred and five women pledged a sorority, the second largest pledge class in the last 10 years and the largest since Panhellenic Council adopted a 2.5 minimum grade point average.

NMSU administrators and advisers approved of the plan. "A brother will be faced with the prospect of re-examining his fraternal experience and of assessing the value of his commitment to the organization," IFC Adviser Mike Kacir said. "I believe that the emphasis during rush will move from the rushee and alcohol to the brother and his ability to communicate, demonstrate and personalize the fraternity experience to non-members."

"What happens the first few weeks of school sets the social tone for the year," Dean of Students Terry Smith said. "Given the University's present academic direction, fewer early parties will foster a more studious environment."

IFC President Tom Voss said, "Since some rush functions were non-alcoholic, they (the rushees) could see another side of fraternity life. They saw men who were brothers working together with a fraternal bond. This helped to make rushees more interested."

More than 100 universities and colleges now sponsor some form of dry rush for their fraternities, according to the Association of Fraternity Advisers publication, *The Fraternity Newsletter*. In the March issue, the AFA reported "... that virtually no known fraternity systems have returned to an alcohol rush after experiencing the benefits of dry rush."



The following statistics from a survey of 259 universities by the National Interfraternity Conference illustrate the effects of dry rush across the country.

—59.1 percent of the 259 respondents report that they have dry-rush programs. This figure includes schools that planned to implement dry rush during the 1985-86 school year, as well as schools with partial dry-rush programs.

—Of the schools that do not have dry rush, 34.9 percent said they are considering implementation of a program and 46.2 percent expect to have dry rush on their school campuses in the future.

—Of those campuses that have dry rush, 75.3 percent said non-alcoholic activities had a positive effect on membership recruitment, while 24.7 percent said it had no effect, and no one indicated a negative effect.

—64.9 percent of the dry-rush campuses reported an increase in the number of pledges/associates, 5.3 percent reported a decrease and 29.8 percent reported no change.

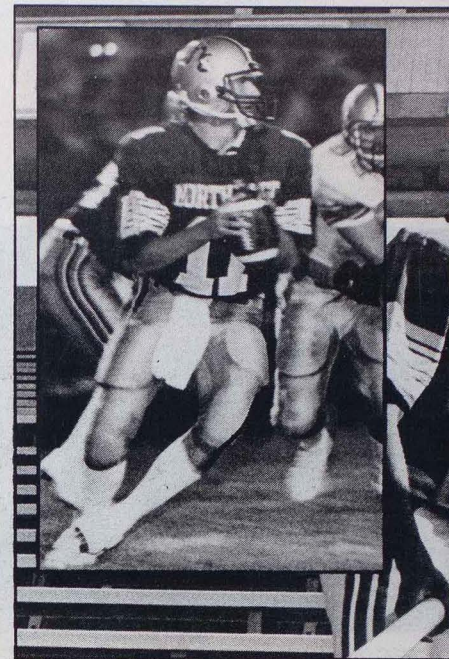
—64 percent of the dry-rush campuses reported an increase in the number of men initiated, while 2 percent reported a decrease in initiations and 34 percent reported no change.

—On the topic of costs, 71.4 percent of the survey respondents reported savings from the switch to dry rush, while 15.7 percent said their costs increased and 12.9 percent said costs had remained constant.

The Bulldogs football team finished with an 8-3 record as they won the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association title with a 5-0 league record. NMSU also finished 11th in the nation in the final National Collegiate Athletic Association's Division II poll.

The Bulldogs narrowly missed a spot in the NCAA Division II playoffs, as the selection committee chose NMSU as one of the top 10 teams in the country, but did not select them as one of the final eight to open the playoffs. This followed Northeast's final-game loss to highly ranked Division I-AA Northern Iowa, 41-24.

Northeast's dominance in conference showed in the MIAA all-conference picks. In all, 17 Bulldogs were named to the all-conference teams. Senior Chris Hegg was chosen as first-team quarterback and the league's Most Valuable Player. Jack Ball was named MIAA Coach of the Year.

Other first-team selections were senior running back Andre Gillespie, senior wide receiver Larry Tisdale, senior offensive tackle Demetrius Mosley, junior offensive guard Pete Simpson, senior defensive lineman Tim Bauer and sophomore safety Pat Fine.

Second-team selections were sophomore center Kevin Urbatsch, sophomore defensive lineman Ernie Myerson, senior linebacker Roydon Richards and junior linebacker Scott Griffith. Receiving honorable mention all-conference were junior wide receiver Russell Evans, senior wide receiver John Busby, sophomore offensive tackle Kevin Gorgal, junior tight end Chuck Clemens, senior defensive back Dallas Duwa and junior defensive back David Kramer.

Northeast clinched the conference title outright with a 39-24 victory over Southeast Missouri State University at Busch Stadium in St. Louis. It was the Bulldogs' first conference title since 1982.

NMSU's biggest win of the season came Nov. 9 when the Bulldogs upset Central State University (Wilberforce, Ohio), 46-45, in Kirksville. The Marauders were ranked first in the nation coming into the game, but the Bulldogs won the game on a Hegg to Tisdale pass with only 43 seconds remaining.

NMSU won its season opener against Division I-AA power Eastern Illinois, 31-24, in the Bulldogs' first home night contest in eight years. They also defeated Missouri Western, 31-30, on the road.

The 'Dogs then lost two straight, to nationally-ranked Division II Northern Michigan, 24-21, and to nationally-ranked Division I-AA Southwest Missouri State, 59-33.

The Bulldogs moved through conference play undefeated as they nipped the University of Missouri-Rolla Miners in Rolla, 21-20; shut out Lincoln, 28-0; blasted Central Missouri State in NMSU's Homecoming contest, 49-6; and won the Hickory Stick by notch-

ing a 35-24 victory against Northwest Missouri State in Maryville, before wrapping up the title against Southeast.

Northeast's strong point during the season was the offense. The Bulldogs ranked near the top nationally in total team offense and in passing offense. The attack was led by Hegg, who topped NCAA Division II players in total offense. Completing 284 of 503 passes for 3,741 yards and 32 touchdowns, Hegg also scored six TDs on the ground.

Hegg spread his passing around, as four Bulldogs caught 40 or more passes. Tisdale caught 61 passes, Gillespie 56, Evans 48 and Busby 41. Tisdale led NMSU in touchdown receptions with 11.

Gillespie was the Bulldogs' biggest ground threat, and led all Division II players in rushing average through 10 games.

Gillespie was the first Bulldog rusher to top the 1,000-yard mark since 1978. He ran for 1,201 yards and eight touchdowns and averaged 5.6 yards per carry.

On defense, Fine intercepted six passes. Richards led the team in tackles with 85, followed closely by Duwa with 80.

Hall of Fame welcomes new inductees

Seven former NMSU athletes and coaches were inducted during the Third Annual Athletic Hall of Fame weekend Oct. 4-5.

Inducted were:

Ralph Alexander (deceased)—earned letters for four years as a halfback on the football team, capturing first team all-conference honors in 1935 and 1936. He also lettered in baseball and was a member of the basketball team. Alexander played professional baseball for the St. Louis Cardinal organization before a career-ending injury. He was an athletic coach in Milan, Mo. for several years before moving to Houston and working as a sales representative. Before his death in 1983, he was a sales engineer for Metco Inc., a metallizing company.

Earl Hatcher (Orange, Calif.)—participated in football, basketball and track, collecting first team all-conference status in football during the 1930 and 1931 seasons. After leaving Kirksville, he was employed as a carpenter and also worked for Lockheed Company in California.

Larry Jones (Lemoore, Calif.)—competed in track and football. He was NCAA Division II outdoor quarter mile champion three times, Division I outdoor champion once and Division I indoor champion twice, winning All-American accolades from 1972 to 1974. After graduation he played professional football, primarily with the Washington Redskins, before retiring in 1978. He is currently working for Mozzarella Cheese Company in Lemoore.

Harold Protiva (Anna Maria, Fla.)—lettered in football and basketball, earning all-league and all-state accolades in football. He also played baseball. Protiva was captain of the 1929 football team. He was athletic coach at Shelbina and Hannibal immediately after graduation. Before his retirement in 1970, Protiva was employed by Coca-Cola for more than 30 years, working his way up to president of Coca-Cola Bottlers in Florida.

John "Hi" Simmons (Columbia)—participated in basketball, football and track. He was captain of the 1927-28 basketball team and received all-conference recognition. Simmons coached baseball at the University of Missouri-Columbia for 34 years and was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame in 1977.

John Spainhower (Kirksville)—was a member of the 1940-42 team as a fullback and the 1946 team as a center. He earned second team all-league honors. After his graduation, Spainhower coached football for 21 years and basketball 14 years at Kirksville High School. He has served as Kirksville athletic director since 1950 and director of transportation since 1966. Spainhower has also taught classes and served as track coach at the high school. In 1981, Tiger Field was renamed and dedicated Spainhower Field in his honor.

Larry Swift (Houston)—three-time all-league basketball player between 1959-61 and a two-time United Press International All-American. Swift was also a school record-holder in the discus while on the NMSU track team. After graduation, he played professionally with the Kansas City Steers of the old American Basketball League, coached basketball on the high school level and has been in private business in recent years, serving at present as senior vice president in charge of marketing for the Drew Corporation, a subsidiary of Lamar Savings and Loan Co. in Houston.

The festivities began Friday with a banquet and formal induction ceremony in the Student Union Building. The new inductees also were featured at halftime of Saturday's NMSU/Southwest Missouri State University football game.

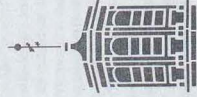
