PLANTS will be the topic of the "Area Scene" program on KIRX-AM with Dr. Max Bell, professor of botany. He will be interviewed at 9:07 a.m. on Tuesday.

THE MIDWEST REGIONAL HORN WORKSHOP will perform three community concerts and two campus programs this week. On Tuesday, the horn players will visit the Kirksville Regional Center for the Developmentally Disabled, 1702 E. LaHarpe, from 8:30 to 10 a.m. On Thursday, they will perform at 10 a.m. at the Adair County Nursing Home, 316 S. Osteopathy. On Friday, the workshop participants will play at 10 a.m. at Village '76, 100 Valley Forge Drive. On the campus, they will work with junior high and high school students enrolled in the Piano Camp of the 1000 Hills Summer Youth Program on Wednesday morning. The culmination of the week's activities will be a horn choir concert at 3 p.m. Friday in front of Kirk Memorial. In case of rain, the concert will be in Baldwin Auditorium. No admission will be charged for any of these performances. Guest artist for the workshop is Morris Secon, first horn player with the Rochester Symphony.

A TEXTBOOK DISPLAY by the Missouri Textbook Association will be held from 8 a.m. through 1 p.m. on Tuesday in Violette Hall. The University community is invited to stop by to see the exhibits.

THE MISSOURI VOLUNTEER OFFICE in cooperation with the Social Science Division is offering a one-day workshop called "Effective Management of Volunteer Programs" on Tuesday. Lt. Gov. William C. Phelps, agency coordinator, will speak at the workshop on "Developing a Citizen Involvement Council" late in the day.

A PIPE ORGAN CONCERT will be presented at 8 p.m. Tuesday at Trinity Episcopal Church at 124 N. Mulanix St. by Dr. Tom V. Ritchie professor of music. Selections will feature composers including Frescobaldi, Sebastian Bach and Leo Sowerby. The University community is invited to attend. No admission will be charged.

SUMMER INITIATION for Phi Delta Kappa education honorary will be Aug. 4. PDK members who wish to nominate candidates for membership should do so by July 3. Nomination cards may be secured from the Education or Social Science Offices. The nomination cards should be returned to Jerry Stremel, first vice president, at 217 Laughlin Building by July 3. Any member nominating a candidate must attend a meeting of the organization at 7 p.m. July 5 in the Alumni Room of the Student Union Building to vote on the nominees.

INDEPENDENCE DAY will be observed on Tuesday, July 4, at Northeast Missouri State University. All classes will be dismissed and University offices will be closed. On Monday, July 3, business will be as usual.

SEVERAL ASSISTANT HALL DIRECTOR POSITIONS will be open for qualified graduate students for the 1978-79 academic year. Candidates should submit a letter of application to the Housing Office, 101 Administration/Humanities Building.

THE SENIOR TEST will be given twice this summer, once each five-week session. The test will be given at 3:30 p.m. June 27 and July 27 in 103 Administration/Humanities Building. A HOLOGRAPHY WORKSHOP will be offered from 12-3 p.m. July 10-28 through the Science Division. The workshop is designed to let students make their own holograms (three-dimensional pictures made with a laser light) as well as present the basic principles of holography. The course carries three hours of undergraduate or graduate credit. No previous courses in physics or mathematics are required although they would be helpful. Several art majors have taken the workshop and performed very well with it. A minimum of 18 students is required to hold the workshop. Any interested student should contact
