STUDENT SECURITY EMPLOYEES are needed to work 25 to 30 hours per week. Applicants must be junior level students or above and must have a 2.8 GPA to apply. Students will be paid minimum wage. Application forms are available at the Safety and Security Office.

THE FINANCIAL AID application (ACT Family Financial Statement) used to apply for the Pell Grant, National Direct Student Loan, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant, Work-Study and the Missouri Grant, is available now in the Financial Aids Office, 100 Administration/Humanities Building. Students should stop by the office between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday to pick up applications.

NATIONAL DIRECT STUDENT Loan, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant or Work-Study program aid applications should be completed and mailed by mid-March. These programs have limited funding and are normally provided for qualifying students if the results of the application from ACT and the Missouri Student Data Form are received by April 30. Because it takes ACT from four to six weeks to process an application and mail the results, students must apply by mid-March. This deadline does not apply to students interested only in the Pell Grant.

THE CHEMICAL SKILLS STUDY Laboratory will begin operation Feb. 3. The study laboratory is designed as an auto-tutorial sequence to strengthen basic skills before enrollment in the General Chemistry I and II sequence.
