WHERE WERE YOU WHEN THE LIGHTS WENT OUT? Many members of the University family were at Registration in Violette Hall. Gene Schneider, University engineer, said coincidentally the Civil Defense sirens went off on campus at 10 a.m. Monday when the lights started to dim in Violette Hall. Registration continued to go "pretty well considering the power problem," Kent Farnsworth, director of admissions, said. "People seemed to move through all right."

Schneider located the trouble in the campus power plant that caused the lights to dim. About 30 seconds later a short in the first stage of the main transformer to campus caused it to fail. "It was a Missouri Power and Light failure on their system that caused us to turn everything off," Schneider said. The entire campus was darkened to prevent any possible further damage to the equipment. Schneider has no damage estimate of cost to repair equipment at this time. The power to the campus was returned building by building starting at 11:15 a.m.

ARTS IN THE PARK will take a look at "The Good 'Ole Days" at 7 p.m. Thursday in the University quadrangle. The theme of the gathering will be carried out through a serenade by the Sweet Adelines at 7 p.m., followed by a screening of old time movies in the Kirk Memorial classroom, and a tour of the Kirk Memorial at 7:30 p.m. Participants are invited to sit on the grass or to bring their own blankets and lawn chairs from which to view the festivities. Future programs will take place at 7 p.m. Thursdays June 9 through July 28 on the quadrangle.

LATE REGISTRATION for the first summer session will be today for a maximum load of 4 credit hours and Thursday for 3 hours maximum load. The last day to enroll or add a class will also be Thursday, June 9.

THIS SUMMER'S UPWARD BOUND PROGRAM is up and away with 60 high school students from surrounding communities expected to participate.
