Senate Creates Environmental Affairs Committee

In order to recognize and effectively deal with the increasing amount of environmental issues raised on campus, Student Senate has created an Environmental Affairs Committee. The committee will serve as a subcommittee of the Student Affairs division of the Senate. Student Senate Associate Loribeth Ford, who presented the concept before the Senate and chairperson of the committee, said "The committee will specifically deal not only with resource management and recycling, but also with repairs, complaints, beautifications, policy preparation and review of construction and renovation."

The committee will deal with small projects this semester, with an emphasis on plotting a course of action

for policy and program implementation in the future. The goal of this committee is to first take action with immediate student environmental concerns, such as recycling. In the future, the direction of the committee will expand to a general awareness of all physical factors which affect the student experience at Northeast, and to find a direction in dealing with these factors.

Senate Student Affairs chairperson Joe Bambenek describes the committee as "Senate's way of recognizing and administratively dealing with the fact that the environment in which members of the University community interact plays an important role in their experience at Northeast."

Senate also believes that this committee reinforces the strength of their associate program as the committee was developed and is headed by an associate. Councilperson-at-large Teri Brickey, who oversees the Senate Associate program, said "The Environmental Affairs sub-committee is a great opportunity for associates to get involved with Student Senate. Anyone interested in any angle of environmental affairs has the opportunity to become an associate and work on that committee."

Lights Out

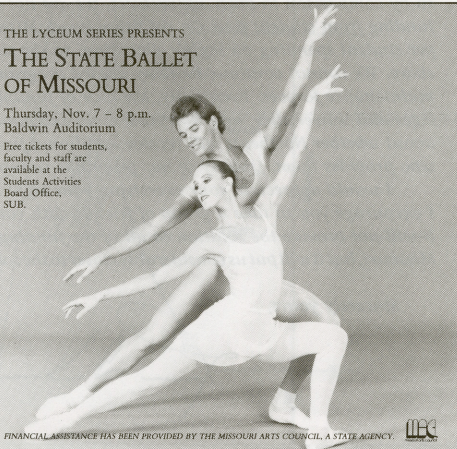

Message from the President

Dear Faculty, Staff and Students:

I am writing to share a few thoughts with you about what I consider to be the most important issue in higher education in Missouri over the past decade. On Tuesday, November 5, an issue called Proposition B will appear on the ballot for Missouri residents to decide. By now you have most likely heard or read about the particular details of the measure, so I will not belabor those matters. Instead, let me localize the question of Proposition B by telling you what is at stake for Northeast.


In simple terms, it comes down to the quality of education offered here, and a decision of whether or not the citizens of the state of Missouri are willing to pay their fair share of the cost of education or whether they will continue placing a greater financial burden on students.

We have already seen Missouri reduce its share of the cost of a student's education. In 1980-81, 78 percent of Northeast's budget came from state appropriations. The remaining portion was primarily made up of student fees. Now, the state provides only 62 percent of our budget—a 16 percent decrease in just over ten years.

According to the recent U.S. News & World Report survey, Northeast is one of the least expensive, quality undergraduate institutions in the entire nation, so by comparison to other universities, we are not receiving a high level of funding from student fees. On the other hand, Missouri is 46th in the nation in per student spending on higher education, so the state is not picking up its fair share. We cannot continue to delay needed program enhancements and to defer maintenance forever. Eventually, the lack of funding will take its toll on colleges and universities, and Northeast is no exception. Thus, Proposition B is not about whether Northeast will receive additional funds—it must. It is about who provides them. Quality of our programs cannot be allowed to decline.

I would appreciate your exercising your right to vote on November 5, and I encourage you to take a group of friends with you. The passage of Proposition B will not provide the solution to all of the funding problems for education in Missouri, but it will put us considerably closer to the solution than we are at present.

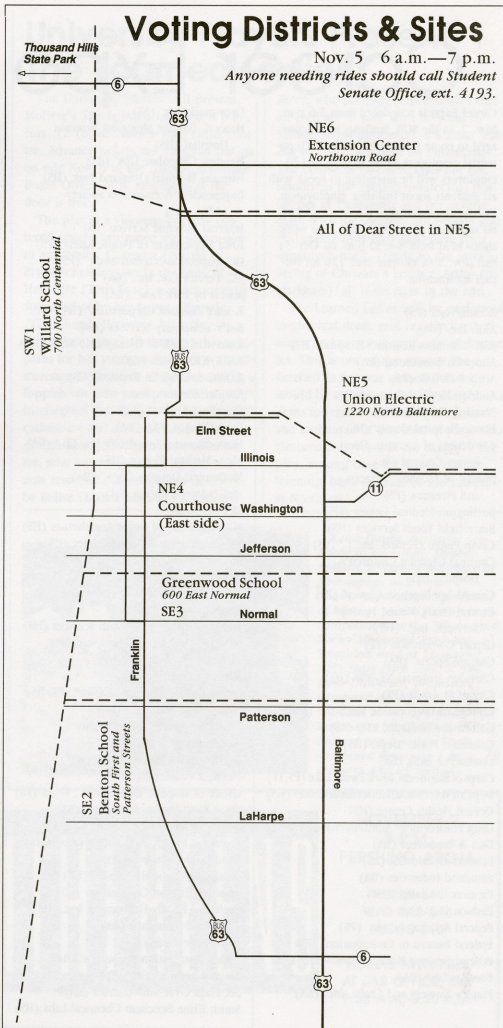

Lehr is recognized as one of the finest jazz sousaphone players in the world, and has performed on several occasions with Richard Hayman and the St. Louis Symphony Pops Orchestra.

Becker, former music consultant with NBC Television Affiliate KSDK in St. Louis, retired to devote all of his time to performance. Joyce performs from 40 to 50 hours per week and is a regular at the Mid-America Jazz Festival held annually in St. Louis. Buerger has performed with the St. Louis Philharmonic and was a guest artist at the annual National Association of Jazz Educators convention. Clarinetist Alberici has played at many jazz festivals and has been compared to a young Benny Goodman. The River City Ramblers are all outstanding Dixieland performers but they do more than just perform old standards—they entertain with humorous tunes and side-splitting antics as they play such favorites as "St. Louis Blues," "Sweet Georgia Brown" and "Waitin' for the Robert E. Lee."

University Players Present The Learned Ladies

The University Players will present Moliere's *The Learned Ladies* at 8 p.m., Nov. 12-16, in Baldwin Hall Little Theatre. Advance tickets are 50 cents and go on sale Nov. 6 in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB. Admission at the door is free.

The play is a vigorous comedy centered around arrogance and pretension in academics. Clitandre (played by Bryan Scheihing) seeks the hand of Henriette (Terri Ince), a match heartily approved of by her father, Chrysale (Tim Chott). However, his wife, Philaminte (Tracy Christeson), has other plans for her younger daughter—namely marriage to Trissotin (Brad Steinmetz), a foppish wit who panders to Philaminte's intellectual pretensions. Further complications are introduced by Armande (Tonya Krueger), Henriette's older sister, who once rejected Clitandre but now resents his attentions to Henriette; by Belise (Luda Chernyak), Chrysale's

sister, who believes (erroneously) that all men are in love with her; and by Vadius (Brain Stemmeler), a scholar jealous of Trissotin's hold on Philaminte. The course of true love does not run smooth as the pseudo-intellectual posturings of Philaminte and her coterie clash with the struggle of Chrysale and Philaminte over who shall have their daughter's hand. Thanks to the maneuvering of Chrysale's brother, Ariste (Jay Markham), all is set right in the end.

The Learned Ladies will be performed in classical dress, said Lee Orchard, director and associate professor of dramatics. This is one of the reasons *The Learned Ladies* was chosen because it would be a good experience for the students to learn to act the style, period and technique of this kind of play. Also Orchard believes that the theme of the play, making time for things besides learning, has a message to the audience at Northeast.

Julie Samson, senior nursing major, completed her term of office as editor of the State Association newsletter, "The Nurses Notes."

Maria Knobeloch ('91) completed her term of office as MoSNA Vice President

by chairing the Resolutions and Bylaws Committee and leading the House of Delegates through debate and passage of these bills. Knobeloch is now working in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Riley Hospital in Indianapolis, Ind.

Iris Mills ('91) attended the meeting as Northeast's SNA Community Consultant. She accompanied Sharon McGahan, assistant professor of nursing and faculty advisor for Northeast's MoSNA, to a consultant/advisor breakfast.

At the Convention Banquet held on Oct. 13, Northeast students received three of the six awards given to individual students.
