ALL THERMOSTATS ON CAMPUS (approx. 1,000) are to be turned back to 65 degrees according to Ray Klinginsmith, dean of administration, due to the unusually low temperatures and energy shortages affecting the community and nation. The University is currently using standby oil fuel which is approximately double the cost of natural gas. This is due to the interruption of our supply by the Associated Natural Gas Company.

Because of the deterioration of heating systems in the older buildings, marked changes in the level of heat may not be noticed. However, students, faculty, and staff are urged to cooperate.

### WHY DO YOU HESITATE TO MAKE AN ASSERTIVE STATEMENT?

You're afraid of offending someone, or embarrassing them, or ... you're not sure what you'll do if they say "no"?

Dr. Margaret Fagin, retired Director of Programs for Women at the University of Missouri-St. Louis, presented some highlights on assertiveness training (also dubbed "personal effectiveness training") during a seminar Tuesday night in conjunction with Ryle Hall's "Sisterhood Week."

Here are some of her major points: Assertiveness training is basically a communication skill, encompassing all forms of communication--oral, written, non-verbal and listening. You have a choice in the type of behavior you display in a particular situation--you can choose to be assertive (using simple language and saying what you feel and what you want), you can be non-assertive (choosing to appease and often not saying what you mean), or you can be aggressive (humiliating someone, often using sarcasm.) The three components of a good assertive statement, which will bring good results approximately 85 per cent of the time, are 1) use simple language and say what you feel, 2) say what you want, 3) add an empathic statement (showing the other person you understand how they feel.)
