Higher Education

State support remains far below potential

Recently the Kansas City Star published the following editorial which I thought would be appropriate for reprinting in the NEMOSCOPE:

State higher education officials are thinking how nice it would be if Missouri could move up to average funding of public higher education. They're not unambitious. Just realistic.

Right now, Missouri is at the bottom in financing. Not near the bottom. At the bottom. Fiftieth among the 50 states. From that hole, average looks like a mighty leap up the ladder.

In May, the National Institute of Education released a detailed examination of what kind of money the states are putting into their higher education systems. Wait, you protest, Missouri has been steadily raising its support for state colleges and universities. So it has, which D. Kent Halstead in "How States Compare in Financial Support of Higher Education" carefully documented. Using the many factors involved in evaluating state spending such as revenue available and the tax effort made,

however, Mr. Halstead found that other states have simply left Missouri behind.

Certainly few state officials deserve any credit for beating loud drums in behalf of making the public higher education system in Missouri something to be proud of. Or even competitive. Obviously the way to high political office is to get out of Missouri for college.

One of the most striking comparisons in the report is that while Missouri ranks 15th in the nation in potential tax revenue to finance public higher education relative to student enrollment, it ranks 46th in state appropriations per student. And when you combine appropriations and tuition income, Missouri ranks No. 50.

If the "product" of this system, presumably educated young adults equipped to begin taking over the work and leadership of their communities and state, are better than inferior, it's probably in spite of their institutions. Or give the credit to self-starting, determined students and the unsung teachers and professors donating their expertise and souls to a cause.

and then come back and dazzle the folks with a superior education. Sen. Thomas Eagleton is a graduate of Amherst and the Harvard Law School. Sen. John Danforth went to Princeton and Yale. Gov. Kit Bond went to Princeton and the University of Virginia.

Sen. Ed Dirck, Appropriations Committee chairman, has appointed a three-member Special Select Committee of Appropriations on Higher Education and Its Financing to be chaired by Kansas City Sen. Harry Wiggins.

If the committee lawmakers do their job well, if university administrators, educators and citizens who are ashamed of being No. 50 raise angry voices, some rational proposals for improvement can be ready when next year's appropriations process begins.

PUT TO THE TEST

More than 400 high school seniors attended the President's Distinguished Scholar Weekend at NMSU in October. About 360 students competed for 10 University scholarships during the weekend by taking a national achievement test. In addition, students attended a Bulldog football game and toured the NMSU campus.

At a banquet honoring the students, Mary Rhodes ('80) spoke about her job in Jefferson City as an attorney for the Missouri Supreme Court. "This is an exciting time to be in college. Education is off the back burner," she told the students.

COMPUTERS FOR RENT

Northeast's residence halls are now equipped with microcomputers available for student use. Forty-five Commodore computers have been purchased following the Board of Regents' approval in August. Installation was completed Nov. 1.

Of the computers, 15 were installed in the halls in special rooms. Use of these computers is free to students. The other 30 computers are available for individual students to rent for a semester on a first come, first serve basis. The tentative rent charge for these computers is between \$75 and \$100 per semester.

Northeast is probably the only university in Missouri to offer this type of system, and one of only a few in the nation, Ron Gaber, director of residence life, said.

BARNETT HALL: A WINNER BY DESIGN

The agriculture addition to NMSU's Barnett Hall recently won an award for its unique architectural design. The American Institute of Architects presented an award of merit for distinguished architectural design to the St. Louis firm of Ittner and Bowersox, Inc., designers of the new addition.

The addition was one of only 11 award winners selected from 128 en-

tries. The addition is unique in its design because it includes many traditional forms found in older buildings on campus, a recent trend in architectural design known as "Post Modernism." Ittner and Bowersox also designed the award-winning Administration/Humanities Building at NMSU.

WARM MEMORIES

Four hundred and thirty-one NMSU students received their degrees in summer commencement ceremonies Aug. 12. The graduates included 211 bachelor's degree candidates, 210 master's degree candidates, and 10 education specialist candidates.

Radiologist Dr. Irving Waldman of Miami, Fla., gave the commencement address. Waldman stressed the importance of keeping college friendships alive after graduation, saying he thought one of his most important achievements was his longstanding friendship with Dr. Carl Mitten of Houston. Waldman and Mitten are 1954 NMSU graduates, and were University roommates and fraternity brothers.

Three retiring members of the NMSU faculty were granted Emeritus status. They are: Dr. Lydia Inman, dean of Graduate Studies and head of the Home Economics Division; Dr. John Biggerstaff, head of the Student Health Clinic; and Dr. Leon Karel, professor in the Fine Arts Division.



TEAM MAKES HISTORY

The Northeast basketball team became a part of history last December when it played in the first inter-collegiate game above the Arctic Circle. The University of Alaska-Anchorage edged the Bulldogs, 74-72, in Kotzebue, Alaska. NMSU Coach Willard Sims holds a plaque commemorating the game. The game ball from the contest is now on display at the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. where it will be enshrined.



BRONZE MEDALIST

A former Olympian's sculptures were displayed in September at NMSU. Larry Young, who won a bronze medal in the 50-kilometer walk in the 1968 and 1972 Olympics, brought an exhibition of 18 pieces to NMSU. Young's wife, Candy, is an assistant professor of political science at the University.

Two of the large sculptures, "Dance" and "The Bathers," were displayed outdoors near the Administration/Humanities Building. Young has completed 130 of the bronze sculptures in the last three years.

FOREIGN TRADE: A CULTURAL EXCHANGE

A

fter two months of intensive study of the Japanese language at Northeast Missouri State University and one day of intensive convincing by my mother not to pack 23 1/2 pairs of tube socks, I was prepared to depart to the land of the rising sun.

I was leaving a life I knew so well—one of friendly neighbors in a small town (Atlanta, Mo., population about 400), wide-open fields of ripening corn and soybeans, and friends with beliefs and values much like my own.

I was to enter a world which few Americans understand. One of a race of people different from my own, a city in which I would become a minority (Tokyo, population about 12 million), congested streets and living quarters with every open space taken up by industry or housing, and strangers whose beliefs and values developed from centuries of self-imposed isolation from most of the world's advancing societies.

thanks to our patient sensei (teacher), Keiko Komiya. By the end of our studies at NMSU we had a base on which to build a future understanding of the Japanese language and were ready to practice our skills in Japan.

We left Kirksville July 3 for Kansas City to board a jet that took us to Los Angeles. In L.A. we boarded a 10-hour non-stop flight to Tokyo. While most Americans were celebrating Independence Day on July 4, we were passing over the international date line and arrived in Tokyo that evening. Needless to say, there were no fireworks in Japan when we landed.

At first glance out of our airplane windows, it looked as if we had never left the American Midwest. The vegetation near Tokyo is similar to our own, and the climate is comparable. A closer look at the small pagodas and rice paddies below, however, was proof of our arrival in Japan.

We boarded a bus provided by Hosei University that took us past what looked like an endless city of factories, office buildings and houses placed in no particular order. Next to towering office buildings sat family homes of simple Japanese architecture with slanted roofs, wavy tiles and the afternoon wash hanging from the windows.

Hosei University is quite different from American colleges. Its main campus consists of one multi-storied building with thousands of students entering and leaving. The total enrollment of Hosei is close to 27,000 students, most of whom still live at home with their parents. Japanese universities do not usually have residence halls.

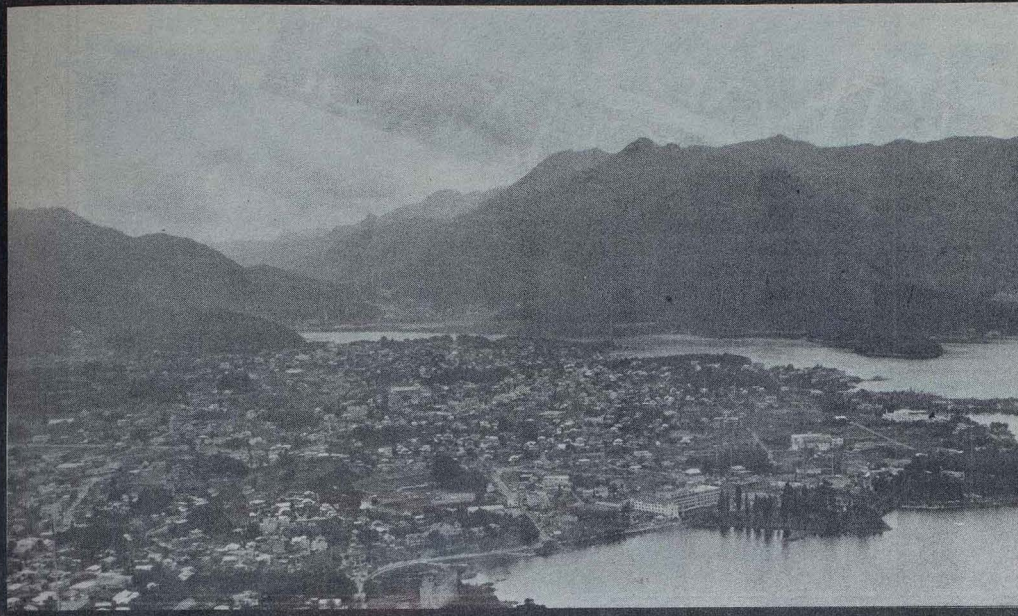

Japan seemed so far away, so mysterious. To visit there was becoming an adventure to me and 14 other NMSU students. An adventure made possible by the Japanese Language and Cultural Studies Program between our university and Hosei University in Tokyo.

We were the third group of students to earn 15 hours of college credit in this program since its beginning in the summer of 1981. Throughout the preparation we were plunged into a language that is unfamiliar to the ears of students raised on nothing but English and small portions of other Germanic languages.

It took many hours of patient study in and out of the classroom to master, as best we could, the required curriculum for the course. Our efforts were made easier

The first week in Tokyo we attended classes at Hosei in the mornings, took various field trips in the afternoons and experienced the Tokyo night life.

Once again the mixture of that which is traditionally Japanese and that which is borrowed from the West is apparent in the entertainment attractions of Tokyo. The Tokyo metropolitan area is divided into several different areas, somewhat like the burroughs in New York City. Each division has a style unique from the others.

Two sections of Tokyo attract hordes of teenagers and college students, Roppongi and Harajuku.

The Harajuku section on a Sunday is like stepping back 20-30 years in America's past. Hundreds of high school students migrate from suburban Tokyo to dance in the streets wearing vintage 1950s rock 'n' roll attire, complete with bobby socks and greased back hair. Gangs of street dancers surround portable stereo systems blasting forth tunes by Bill Halley, Chuck Berry, Little Richard and Elvis Presley. Some of the young people arrive on Harley Davidson motorcycles and in '57 Chevys. It reminded me of episodes of "Happy Days" in which the gangs would gather at "Arnold's" for an afternoon, or perhaps the scene from "American Graffiti." One Japanese teenager told me the adoption of the 1950s American style reflects the rebellious attitude of modern Japanese teens against the traditional lifestyle.

Roppongi is a district located near many of the foreign embassies in the governmental section of Tokyo. Thousands of Japanese and foreign young people flock to discotheques lining the streets of the district.

One of my favorite evenings in Tokyo was spent at Roppongi. A fee of 3,000 to 3,500 yen (about \$13 to \$15 in American currency) allows admittance into a disco. Once inside the establishment, drinks and food are provided for the rest of the night. High fidelity sound systems and colorful lights enhance what is predominantly American and British music.

We soon became quite an attraction at the disco. As you know, Americans usually dance in couples with those who have no partner missing out on the dancing. But the Japanese have done away with this wallflower restriction. Very few Japanese dance in couples. They usually dance in groups or alone. Mirrors surrounded the dance floor and those dancing alone would keep themselves company with their reflections. We soon found out that Japanese women are very eager to dance with American men. We took immediate advantage of this opportunity.

Probably the two most famous districts in Tokyo to Americans are the Ginza and Shinjuku. The Ginza is a shopping district directed toward the affluent adult buyer.

More popular with students and budget-minded shoppers is Shinjuku. It is said there is more neon in Shinjuku than in any other city in the world. The crisscrossed streets of the Shinjuku district are lit at night by massive, animated neon billboards. The largest collection of skyscrapers in Tokyo can be found here. On almost every street corner salesmen bark out unbeatable bargains.

Japan leads the world in the manufacturing and marketing of electronic equipment, and nowhere is this fact more apparent than in the Akihabara section of

Tokyo. Severe competition between manufacturers of stereo equipment, cameras, computers and home entertainment systems characterizes Akihabara.

We ended our two weeks in Tokyo with weekend home stays with Japanese families. These families, a different family for each member of our group, took us into their homes and treated us as honored guests. They filled our stomachs with the best of Japanese food and our minds with the best of Japanese thought. Within the Japanese family there is a deep respect for the parent and in turn a deep parental love for the children. For thousands of years the family has been the primary force in Japanese society.

Our next stop was Mt. Fuji for a two-day rest. Fuji-san is considered one of the most beautiful mountains in the world. With lush green forests covering rolling hills and crystal clear lakes created by the mountain runoff, it is a vacationer's dream. Small villages dot the surrounding plateau of the mountain. Fresh air and summer breezes contrast heavily with the city air and rushing people of Tokyo.

Our two days spent at Hosei's Mt. Fuji Seminar House were a welcome break between our visits to Tokyo and Kyoto. It gave each of us a chance to appreciate the beauty of Japan's natural scenery and to imagine ourselves in Japan—the way it used to be.

Our next stop was Kyoto with a one-day visit to Nara. Kyoto and Nara are two past capitals of Japan. Kyoto is the center of historical study of Japan. Well-kept temples and shrines house priceless works of religious art, amidst tranquil gardens once used by Buddhist monks and samurai warriors to escape periods of civil war.

After nearly a week of living in Kyoto it was time to leave the quiet and peaceful aura of the old capital and travel back to Tokyo for two more days before our return to the United States.

In many ways we were eager to return to the comfort of our own homes in America, but we dreaded saying sayonara to a new country and new friends which we had only begun to know.

As we headed into the Japanese sunset on board our return flight to America, we were also heading toward the international date line once again and an interesting phenomena. Just a couple of hours after entering darkness, the speed of the jet and the rotation of the earth coupled with crossing the international date line took us into a sunrise. Oddly enough, it was the second sunrise our group experienced on July 25. This time, however, the sunrise welcomed us into a new day in the United States. It let us place our previous Japanese sunrise into a special world all its own. There are two July 25, 1983s now. One is reality of where we are and what we wish to become; the other is a memory of where we were and the special life we left behind.

TOWNE FINDS PLACE IN NMSU'S HISTORY

In the third grade

... Ruth Warner Towne grew bored with the Bobbsey Twins. Instead, she read about kings and queens; presidents and pioneers; war and politics. By the fifth grade she had polished off the historical novels in her father's rather extensive collection and was one of the public library's most reliable cardholders.

A professor of history at NMSU for 30 years, Towne's early fascination with history is still going strong. However, there is not as much time to read about it as she would like. Towne is the new acting dean of graduate studies in addition to her teaching duties, and she says she finds just enough time to keep up on current events, with little time left to read for pleasure.

Dean Towne uses her vast knowledge of history to help her students understand the world they live in. "Understanding the past helps us to understand the present and future, and we can make more intelligent and moderate reactions to current events," Towne said.

Named an Outstanding Educator in America in 1974, Towne believes her major responsibility as a university professor is "to teach my students something. A college-trained person should have a broad, liberal view of life. They can gain that through the humanities, and history is one of those. A person who knows no history is handicapped."

English is another one of the humanities that Towne holds in high esteem. "Most of my students know I teach almost as much English as history. In class I emphasize the writing angle. Speech and writing must convey clear ideas. People who don't communicate well, don't think well, and it takes practice to think."

The diminutive teacher is also well known among present and former students for employing a seating chart and generally, being a "tough" instructor.

"Dr. Towne was probably one of the hardest professors I've ever had here, but, I really learned a lot about American history," Jodi Carlson, a senior with a 4.0 grade point average, said. "When I got my grade card and saw that 'A' it meant more to me because I had to work harder to earn it."

Good grades have always been important to Towne, who was valedictorian at the Kirksville Senior High School and the first honor graduate at the Northeast Missouri State Teachers College. Towne studied under a curator's scholarship and graduate assistantship at the University of Missouri-Columbia where she earned a M.A. and Ph.D. in history.

Towne's high academic expectations carry over to Delta Zeta social sorority, which she has sponsored for many years. Each year Towne presents a Standards (self-improvement) Program on proper English usage. Overall, she finds her sponsorship "enormously time-consuming, but rewarding." She keeps in touch with DZ alumnae through the Deltascop, which she founded and still edits today.

Editing a publication was not a new enterprise for Towne, who served as NEMOSCOPE editor from 1954 to 1967. "Dr. (Walter) Ryle asked me to edit the NEMOSCOPE—he was quite persuasive. I was a brand-new member of the faculty. He had a habit of asking people to do things if he knew they would do them the way he wanted them to be done.

"He wanted the NEMOSCOPE to be a history magazine—a semi-professional journal. We did a series on railroads and stories on the old colleges and industries in northeast Missouri...I found out things I didn't know about the history of this area. Gradually I began to slip in more alumni notes and retirement stories because that is what people want to read about," Towne said.

In addition to writing articles for the NEMOSCOPE, Towne has recorded history through articles in "A Book of Adair County History" and the Americana Annual Encyclopedia Year Book. She is the author of "A Winner Never Quits; The Life and Times of Walter Harrington Ryle" and "Senator William J. Stone and the Politics of Compromise."

Preserving history for present and future generations is an important life goal for Towne, who is particularly interested in preserving the history of NMSU and northeast Missouri. Towne has lobbied for years to use Kirk Memorial as the University museum. University artifacts are now displayed in the basement of Kirk and are available for viewing by appointment only. "My will is made out to the University for the purpose of establishing a museum," Towne said. "But maybe while I'm still alive we can get it done."

Board reviews financial picture

The NMSU Board of Regents took several financial actions at its meetings in July and August. The Board approved almost \$27 million in capital improvements requests to go to the governor and legislature for the 1984-85 fiscal year. Major items on the capital improvements list include \$15,764,000 for a major addition to and renovation of Pickler Memorial Library. Also, over \$5 million was requested to renovate Violette Hall, and over \$2 million for other maintenance and repair projects.

The University received no appropriations for capital improvements during the current fiscal year, but the top items are expected to be considered at the special session of the state legislature in October. Those items would be funded from the state capital improvements bond issue, which totalled \$600 million dollars and was approved by Missouri voters last year.

Also, the Board approved a general revenue request of \$16,753,781 for the 1984-85 fiscal year. NMSU's request will now go to the governor and the state legislature for their consideration and recommendations. If approved, the total would represent a \$2,800,000 increase over the 1983-84 general revenue fund, or about a 20 percent increase in the University's general revenue.

The Board authorized the University to borrow \$625,000 on a short-term basis. The State of Missouri will be delaying that amount of appropriations until next spring, at which time the University will repay the short-term notes.

In its July meeting, the Board of Regents approved a new student fee schedule for the 1984-85 academic year. In-state undergraduate students will pay \$690 per academic year, an 11 percent increase above current fees, while in-state graduate fees will increase to \$720 per academic year. This represents a 16 percent increase over current fees.

NMSU has been forced to raise its fees in order to comply with a recent Coordinating Board for Higher Education policy which says that students at Missouri's regional institutions should pay 28 percent of the cost of their education by 1986-87. NMSU students have been paying about 20 percent of their education costs, so it appears student fees will continue to rise.

The smoke has cleared and the battle for pledges is over. Pledge numbers were down this year, as 19 fewer women pledged a sorority than last year. Fraternity pledging fell by about 45.

Fraternity and sorority advisers agree the increased Greek emphasis on academics probably accounted for the decrease in pledging.

"There may be some freshmen who know of the grade requirement and wanted to wait on rush. I suspect there were people who waited to see if they can handle college life before they become involved with a sorority," Vonnie Nichols, Panhellenic Council adviser, said.

The Panhellenic Council raised its minimum GPA requirement for pledges from 2.0 to 2.5. Interfraternity Council instituted its first formal rush as prospective members were asked to register their ACT scores, cumulative GPAs, and class load.

Individual rush figures were as follows for sororities: Alpha Sigma Alpha—19, Alpha Sigma Tau—8, Delta Zeta—22, Sigma Kappa—9, and Sigma Sigma—17. Individual rush figures for fraternities read: Alpha Gamma Rho—5, Alpha Kappa Lambda—18, Alpha Tau Omega—8, Delta Chi—37, Pi Kappa Phi—14, Phi Kappa Theta—7, Phi Lambda Chi—17, Phi Sigma Epsilon—18, Sigma Phi Epsilon—16, Sigma Tau Gamma—23, and Tau Kappa Epsilon—5.

ENROLLMENT RECORDS

"We're right where we want to be."

Once again, the fall semester brought a new enrollment record for NMSU. At the beginning of the fall semester, 6,990 students were attending the University, an increase of 30 over last year's total.

"We are exactly where we want to be," Dave Recor, director of computer services, said. "We made the decision several years ago to reach and maintain enrollment at about 7,000 students as the maximum number the University could serve effectively."

Although freshman admissions are down by over five percent from last fall, a larger number of returning students compensated for that decrease. More than 100 additional students returned to NMSU this fall compared to last fall. Also, more students are transferring to NMSU than ever before.

Applications for admission have been increasing

each year at the University. "The value-added concept of education is improving NMSU's reputation and making us a sought-after school among high school students in the tri-state area. The economy does not seem to have hurt our enrollment at all," Katie Steele, associate director of admissions, said.

The freshman class will be the highest in class rank in NMSU's history. In fact, the University denied entrance to more students this year than ever before due to the tougher admissions standards, Steele said. The average freshman at NMSU ranked in the 72nd percentile of his class and in the 65th to 75th percentile in national test scores. This is the highest among Missouri's regional universities. In addition, NMSU admits fewer students from the bottom quarter of their high school class than any other university in the state.

The makeup of this year's freshman class differs a bit from years past. For one thing, there are more males and fewer females. For the first time since 1976, the number of females attending the University is down. This year, 56 percent of the students are women, 44 percent are men. Many more students will be coming from northeast Missouri, western Illinois and the Kansas City area than last year.

At a time when many schools are experiencing a decline in overall enrollment, Steele said the University expects the trend here to continue toward increased admission applications, stricter standards in application acceptance and an increasing retention rate because the University is attracting higher quality students.

Tradition Marches on at Northeast

The names evoke images from the past: the Marching 100, the Purple Regime, the Showboat Gamblers. But they are not names out of your old history book. They are some of the names that have been used to identify the marching band at NMSU.

Two factors are important in the marching band's long and reputable history at the University. First, the instrumental music sequence in the Division of Fine Arts has long been recognized as one of the best in the area. Second, only three men have directed the marching band since its inception in 1947: Paul Strub, Tom Duden, and Dan Peterson. This stability of leadership has allowed the program to progress and grow in an orderly way.

Today's band, the Showboat Gamblers, features 220 members and awards from several area band competitions. In addition, it will be featured in an upcoming article by a national band magazine.

Changes for the marching band were in store when Dan Peterson became director of bands in 1978. Peterson changed the name of the band to the Purple Regime, and he changed its style of marching to corps marching, which emphasized sliding steps and a more varied repertoire of music.

The following year brought even bigger changes as the Showboat Gamblers were born. Peterson researched the area, and found that a "Mark Twain, riverboat theme" would provide the band with a unique look and sound. In addition to the new purple and white riverboat uniforms, the Gamblers' music changed. Mississippi River music like "Old Man River" and "Shenandoah" became a part of every halftime show, and brought the Gamblers many standing ovations.

The theme is extremely popular with band members. "It seems everyone is the Marching Somebodies," drum major Curt Fitzpatrick from New London says, "I think the Gamblers' theme makes us unique. It doesn't mean we don't want to associate with the University, it just means we have our own particular style of entertainment."

Apparently, the theme has caught on quickly. The Gamblers have grown in number every year since Peterson arrived, and this year's edition features over 100 freshmen. That's no accident, according to Peterson.

"We don't just sit around during the summer; we recruit," he said. "We attend band camps and run clinics all summer long. That brings a lot of people here. We draw students from as far away as Chicago, Des Moines, and Omaha pretty frequently."

Julie Bair, a sophomore who choreographs the flag corps routines, agrees. "When I was in high school (in Oskaloosa, Iowa), we got to march with the Gamblers," she said. "It was a lot of fun, and I think that had a lot to do with me coming to school here."

The consensus among those in the program is that the band has reached its limit in numbers. "We're reaching our optimum size for this size school. We're as big as the major universities' bands right now, and I don't see us getting any larger at this point," Peterson said.

Fitzpatrick agrees, saying, "I think the size of the band is just right. We've got the sound and look we want, now we should concentrate on keeping good musicianship."

Although the band is full of talented musicians, they have to work hard at their talents. When the

band arrives on campus in August, they practice full time for three days. "You have about enough time between practices to run home, eat and change clothes," Fitzpatrick said. The sessions teach fundamentals and establish the Gamblers' work habits for freshmen.

During the school year, the band practices about nine hours a week. But the band members don't seem to mind the work. "Sure, it's a lot of hard work, but I think it pays off in our performances. Besides, the University says you should spend two hours studying outside of class for every hour in class. That covers our weekday practices, and as far as our Saturday morning practices, that's just time I'd spend sleeping in anyway," sophomore trombonist Gary Lamprecht from Montrose, Iowa, said.

Actually, all the hard work breeds a special kind of social life unique to the Gamblers. "When you get through that first weekend as a freshman, it's great," Lamprecht said. "You immediately know 200 people. You're not a stranger anymore. There's somebody to sit with on the first day of classes."

"The band gives people an opportunity to have a social life without any real big commitments," Fitzpatrick said. "When I first came here, I didn't even know what a fraternity was. The band gives you a way to ease into the lifestyle here and find things out from upperclassmen."

Anyone who attends a Bulldog football game knows that the band has fun in the stands as well as on the field. "We always support the team, and we do the cheers the cheerleaders are doing," Ruth Murray, drum major from Hannibal, Mo., said. "But when no cheers are being done, we like to do our own. It's just our way of getting both school spirit and the spirit in the band going," the junior added.

That spirit is evident from talking with everyone associated with the Showboat Gamblers. "The kids are really enthusiastic. They take a lot of pride in what they do out there," Peterson said.

"This is going to be the best year we've ever had, not only number-wise, but performance-wise," Barry Bernhardt, assistant marching band director said.

"Pete (Peterson) tells us if we flub up, he can always hide under the bleachers. He's kidding, but really, he has a point. The staff can help us all they want, but ultimately, we're the ones out there on Saturday, and we're the ones responsible for putting on a good show," Lamprecht said.

Good shows are what fans have become accustomed

to. The Gamblers have won several band competitions, both nationally and regionally. The drum line finished third in a national competition last year, and it finished second in the same competition the previous year. The Gamblers will be featured in the magazine, "Marching Bands and Corps," in an upcoming issue.

Are the awards and recognition justified? "You bet," Peterson said. "Stylistically, we're the leading band in the Midwest, and I think high school band directors know that."

"I've seen quite a few major university bands," Fitzpatrick said, "and I don't think anyone's better than the Gamblers. I mean, you see a band like Michigan's, and they're very impressive because of their numbers and the sound they produce. But as far as their actual ability to play music and to march and put on a good show, they're not any better than us."

But to appreciate the success of the current band, one must look at the years of tradition supporting them. Records show a brass band existed on the campus as early as 1892, but the first real marching band was organized in 1947 by Paul Strub. Strub received his bachelor's degree from the University in 1939, and became the first person to earn a master's degree in music education at Northeast in 1948.

Strub organized the first marching band while he was still a graduate assistant. There were 38 members, and they participated in the Homecoming Parade, and played at athletic contests.

By the time Strub left in 1962, the marching band had 77 members, it had played hundreds of concerts, and was recognized as one of the finest bands in the Midwest. Strub was quite active in community and campus affairs, and among many other honors, he served as president of the Missouri Music Educators Association and edited Missouri School Music magazine. He was inducted into the Missouri Bandmasters Association Hall of Fame in 1974.

Strub was replaced as director of bands by Tom Duden, who marched under him for four years and served as his assistant for one year. He also received bachelor's and master's degrees from Northeast.

Under Duden's leadership, the quality of musicianship was raised still further, and by the University's centennial year of 1967, the marching band numbered an even 100 members. Duden named his band the Marching 100, and it gave a halftime show during the 1967 season celebrating the University's centennial.

Duden also began the tradition of taking the band to a professional football game each fall to perform. That tradition continues to this day; the Showboat Gamblers are performing at a St. Louis Cardinals game on Nov. 20. Duden retired in 1978 as director of bands, but continues to teach in the Division of Fine Arts at NMSU.

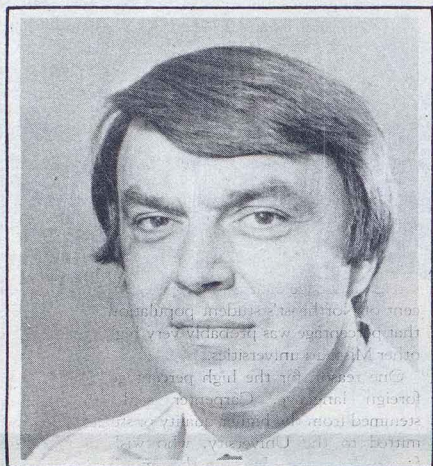

Division of Education puts quality back into the classroom

As Northeast's value-added program continues to spread through all the levels of the University environment, the Division of Education has taken steps to ensure quality graduates from education programs.

Daniel Ball, head of the Division of Education, said the steps the division has taken to toughen standards and the University's value-added program complement each other.

"The division (education) and the University were foresightful enough to change admission standards for teacher education and elementary education in 1979," Ball said.

Students whose grade point averages are below 2.75 are not admitted to the education program. Next summer, Ball said the state of Missouri plans to make a minimum score of 18 on the American College Test (ACT) and/or an 800 composite score on SAT a requirement for teacher education applicants. These scores lie in approximately the 50th percentile among college-bound students.

Ball said Northeast's teacher education program has taken several measures toward a higher quality education for its students. He said the division reviewed the curriculum, revamping weak parts within it, implementing more rigorous student teaching requirements, adding some courses and dropping others.

Since 1979, the division has dropped courses such as Issues in Education and Education Seminar. In addition, it has added such courses as Teaching of Language Arts in the Elementary School and Individual and Career Planning.

In 1979, education majors were required to spend the equivalent of five days of observation and minor participation in a public or private school classroom for no credit. Majors entering in 1983 are required to attend seminars and a minimum of 30 hours in the classroom for one hour of credit, prior to the end of the sophomore year. In addition, the student must take Preteaching Field Experience II; a similar course requiring more involvement in the classroom.

"We want our best people to become teachers," Ball said.

Another part of the value-added program is identifying and devoting resources to areas which appear to need it most. Ball said the Division of Education concentrated on hiring outstanding faculty members. By hiring quality, students involved in the program would benefit.

"If you don't have very good faculty, you don't have a good program," Ball said.

Jack Reiske, professor of education, said he agreed with toughening standards but he is concerned with certain aspects of the process.

"If we raise the standard GPA to 2.75 and raise grading standards at the same time, we'll be putting ourselves in a box," Reiske said.

Reiske also said that now that standards were raised, the University could not lower them to compensate for the grade inflation/deflation paradox. He said such a move would require an explanation. Reiske said he thought the division would work out the problem.

A major portion of the effectiveness of the value-added program lies in measures individual instructors take to toughen course standards. Reiske teaches primarily graduate-level courses and the graduate program has always been strong. He also teaches some 500-level courses which are open to graduates for graduate credit and senior education majors for undergraduate credit.

"I'm probably making a more concerted effort to distinguish in class between undergraduates and graduates," Reiske said.

Reiske said he was attempting to require more from graduate students in classes with an undergraduate/graduate mix.

Reiske also said he was probably requiring more writing from all his students as well as trying to define to them, from the beginning, exactly what he expects of them.

Repositioning present resources cannot account for all the changes necessary to upgrade the education program. Ball said extra money is required for value-added related measures such as program improvements and faculty salaries.

Ball also said several members of the faculty within the division volunteered much time to upgrade stand-

ards. Faculty members worked on curriculum committees, standards committees, etc., as well as volunteering extra time devoted to helping students more directly. Ball said some faculty members carry much more of the volunteer load than others, but in time, the division hopes to even that out.

Feedback concerning the value-added program is a vital part of its success. Reiske said he had not seen much reaction from his graduate students, but that the measures had not affected them much. He also said the seniors in his 500-level courses did not show too much concern since none of them were in "academic jeopardy."

Ball said feedback concerning the division's toughened standards would make a good survey to which the division could add items when necessary. He also said surveys would provide only a good indication of the effects, but not a scientific measurement.

"We now have only crude instruments for evaluation (of the present program) and until we come up with a more efficient measurement, sure feedback is tough," Ball said.

In light of the current controversies concerning the effectiveness of education, Northeast's program in the Division of Education is evidence of concern with quality.

"Several national reports have come out, criticizing our education program," Ball said. "I'm proud of the fact that this institution has implemented some of the suggestions made recently. We're a few years ahead of them (critics of education). Northeast took the initiative and I think it will pay off."

NMSU breaks the language barrier

Northwest Missouri State University offers three, Southeast Missouri State offers six and Southwest Missouri State and the University of Missouri-Columbia each offer seven. Northeast offers eight. Eight what? Eight foreign languages.

By the spring semester, Northeast will offer eight foreign languages to its students. Elementary and intermediate levels are currently offered in Greek, Hebrew, Latin and Russian, and Japanese will be added to that list in January of 1984. Teaching certification is now offered in German and bachelor degrees are available in Spanish and French.

Edwin Carpenter, head of the Division of Language and Literature, said rising interest in foreign languages and the need to offer a wide variety of languages for students achieving bachelor's degrees were two primary reasons for the expansion of the language program.

"To be a quality institution as a multipurpose university, certain experiences need to be provided for students, and this institution believes that foreign language acquisition is one of these experiences," Carpenter said. "To offer language experiences in a variety of ways, it is necessary to offer a variety of languages."

Carpenter said the University deliberately set out to offer Russian since the language has gained prominence in world issues. The hiring of two new full-time foreign language faculty members has made the program expansion possible. Constance Reid, associate professor of German, and Gregory Richter, assistant professor of foreign languages, began teaching within the Language and Literature Division this fall.

Reid came to Northeast from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn. and teaches German. Richter left the University of California-San Diego to teach German and Russian at Northeast.

"I think the addition of our two new faculty and their quality, indicates that our program is able to attract distinguished foreign language faculty and that the program itself will become better almost daily," Carpenter said.

The Japanese program, which has grown during the

last three years, is expanding in the spring of 1984. Since the summer of 1981, the Division of Language and Literature has offered an exchange program with Hosei University in Tokyo. Students are required to take eight weeks of language for four hours each day and Japanese culture and history for one hour each day. Then, they travel to Hosei University for a three-week stay during which they tour Tokyo and surrounding areas and attend three hours of class for 10 days, learning more of the language and listening to lectures on Japanese economics, history and literature. (see related story on pages 4 and 5.)

Beginning in January, Michael Lewis will teach an extension of the budding Japanese program. Lewis, who is finishing work on his doctorate at Stanford University in Stanford, Calif., will teach three courses in the Division of Social Science and one Japanese course in the Division of Language and Literature. The course, Japanese Language and Culture III, will be offered to students with some background in the subject.

Carpenter said nearly 500 students were enrolled in foreign language courses, or approximately seven percent of Northeast's student population. He also said that percentage was probably very high compared to other Missouri universities.

One reason for the high percentage is interest in foreign language. Carpenter said this interest stemmed from the higher quality of students now admitted to the University, who wish to continue foreign language education they may have begun in high school.

Plans for further expansion are not foreseen at present, however, Carpenter said the University will expand if there is a demand for it. The present program expansion is a step toward reaching quality goals the University has set.

"Our goal is to have a quality program in foreign language, to meet the needs of a student body which is not only more capable when they come to us, but more sophisticated in their expectations and achievements," Carpenter said.

Former Regent dies: William O. Lee

William O. Lee, former president of the Board of Regents, died Sept. 22 after a brief illness at his home in Moberly.

Lee, a longtime member of the Moberly law firm of Hunter, Chamier, and Lee, served on the Board of Regents from 1971-1977. He was president of the Board his last two years in office.

Charles McClain, University president, praised Lee for his leadership throughout his association with NMSU. "Bill Lee was a scholarly gentleman who used his life to serve others," McClain said. "He made enormous contributions to this University, both during and after his term of office."

Lee mentioned several times as president that physical changes were "the most graphic signs of progress" on the NMSU campus. Under his presidency, construction was completed on the University's Administration/Humanities Building. The building has won several national awards for its design. The mall connecting Baldwin Hall and the A/H Building with the Student Union was also constructed during this time.

McClain added that Lee was interested in every

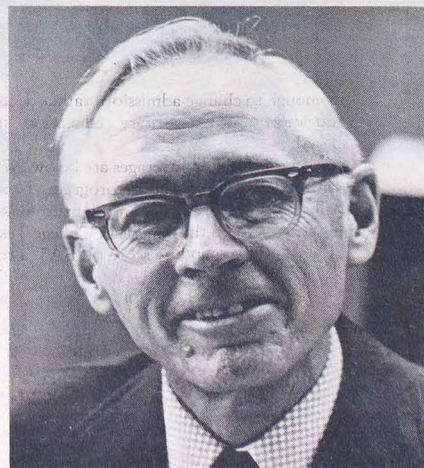
aspect of campus life. He often wrote to McClain with his thoughts on everything from food service in the residence halls to a particular sequence of courses offered to undergraduates.

"He supported the University in many ways, but what I valued most was his interest in high-caliber students whom he knew and referred to this University," McClain said.

Lee was born in Richmond, Va. in 1918. He later received his bachelor's degree from Yale University and graduated from the Law School there. He taught at the University of Missouri-Columbia Law School and served on the Board of Trustees at Columbia College and the Missouri School of Religion at UMC.

He was also quite active in community affairs in Moberly, serving as a member of the Masons and the Rotary Club. He was also an elder at Moberly's Central Christian Church.

Lee was the son of William and Lucy Brooks Lee. He married Jeanne Stephens in 1945, and they have three children, William Stephens, James Jay, and Lucienne Alma Lee.

Student teachers followed Terry's lead

People say experience is the best teacher. If that is so, many NMSU graduates have benefited from the experience of the late Dr. Howard M. Terry—a teacher, principal and superintendent before serving as a professor of education at NMSU from 1964 to 1975. He died at the age of 74 in June 1983.

Terry served first as teacher and then principal from 1930 to 1940 at Braymer, (Mo.) High School. He was superintendent of schools in Pierce City, Mo., from 1941 to 1944, until becoming a lieutenant in the U.S. Naval Reserve for two years. Terry taught mathematics at the University of Missouri-Columbia for one year and then served as superintendent of schools in Bonne Terre, Mo., from 1947 to 1964.

It was these varied working experiences that Terry drew upon as a professor, supervisor of student teachers, adviser to the State Association for Elementary Principals, and long-time sponsor of the Missouri State Teachers Association, student section.

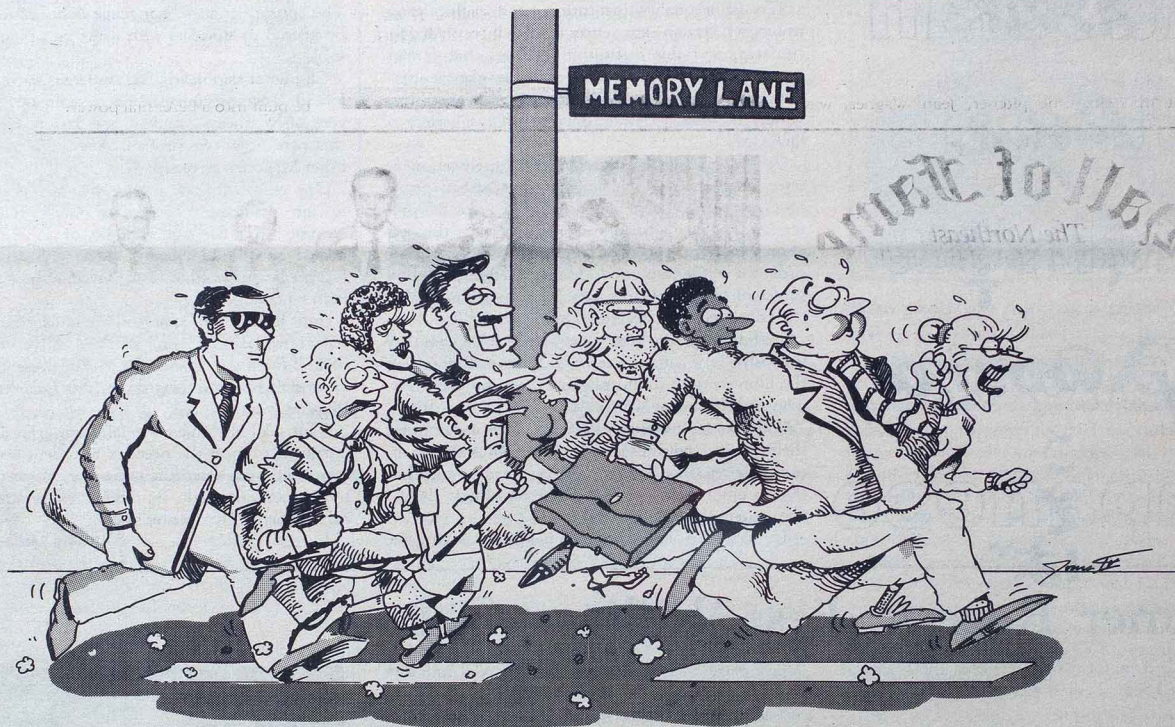
"He was a low-key teacher with a lot of knowledge and experience in education," said friend and colleague, Dr. Gordon Richardson, professor of education. "He was concerned about students' and spent quite a bit of time with them."

Terry also devoted time to bringing about changes in education law in Missouri and in 1946, he worked with other school superintendents to establish one of the first area vocational schools in the state.

His leadership capabilities were called upon in several community and professional organizations. He was president of Rotary Clubs in Braymer and Bonne Terre, the Southeast Missouri School Administrators Association and president of Phi Delta Kappa, education honorary.

Terry received a bachelor's degree from Drury College in Springfield and a master's and doctorate in education from UMC.

He is survived by his wife, Claudine, and three sons.

Parrish returns to coach at alma mater

After a six-year absence, Tarry Parrish is back at NMSU, but not as a student this time. Parrish took over the head coaching position of the women's basketball and softball teams, following the resignation of former Head Coach Mary Jo Murray.

While Parrish attended NMSU as an undergraduate, she started in a wing position on the women's basketball team, then coached by Jo Ann Weekley, instructor in the Division of Physical Education and Recreation. After graduating with a bachelor's degree in education in 1974, Parrish began teaching girl's physical education at Putnam County R-1 High School in Unionville. During the summers between 1974 and 1977, Parrish attended graduate courses at NMSU, achieving a master's degree in physical education/health in August of 1977.

From 1977 until 1980, Parrish taught co-educational education at Perry Community High School in Perry, Iowa. She returned to NMSU during the summers of 1978-1982 to help instruct annual high school girls' basketball camps.

In 1980, Parrish moved from secondary to higher education by becoming the physical education/health coordinator and head women's softball and basketball coach at Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

As a junior college softball coach, Parrish racked up such honors as leading her team to win the state championship and placing fifth in the national tournament in 1980. One pitcher, Jean Wagner, was

chosen as an All-American that year, with a personal record of 28-6. In 1981, Parrish's team again won the state crown and moved to a fourth-place finish in the national tournament. Another Kirkwood pitcher, Jennifer Wagner, won second-team All-American honors with a 28-12 record.

When Parrish took over Kirkwood's basketball team, she faced a team which had never before, completed a winning season. In 1980, the team compiled a 13-10 season and finished fourth in the state tournament. In 1981, the team was even more successful, finishing the season with a 17-11 record. Although Kirkwood did not place in the state tournament that year, it produced the leading scorer among Iowa junior colleges and a first-team All-State selection, Sheryl McCormick. Parrish led Kirkwood to a 28-5 record in 1982 as well as a second-place finish in the state tournament. Team member Shelley Smith was selected first-team All-State and Iowa's selection for the All-American Award.

Now at NMSU, Parrish inherits a nationally-ranked softball team and a basketball team which finished its 1982-83 season with a 6-12 record. Parrish said she intends to concentrate on improving the basketball team.

"My main goal is to turn this (women's basketball) program around and put them above a .500 season," Parrish said.

Parrish opened the 1983-84 year with pre-season conditioning workouts for both teams. So far, Parrish said she is pleased with the potential in NMSU's female athletes. During basketball season, Parrish plans to continue conditioning among softball team members by a weightlifting, running, and batting program, two or three times per week.

As for basketball, Parrish considers defensive aspects of the game as areas needing much improvement.

"I probably stress defense more than offense," Parrish said, "and we will work a lot on fundamentals. I really do enjoy defense. I love to press."

Parrish does not feel she is overly compared to Murray. She believes the former coach did a good job at NMSU, but she also has a motto for her athletes.

"They either do it my way or hit the highway," Parrish said.

Parrish is enthusiastic about both of her upcoming premier seasons as head coach at NMSU.

"We want both women's softball and basketball to be built into a perennial power."

Hall of Fame

The Northeast
Missouri State University
Athletic Hall of Fame

After years of planning, the Northeast Missouri State University Hall of Fame is finally a reality. Thirteen Charter members were inducted in ceremonies Sept. 30 on the NMSU campus.

"The criteria for induction is, of course, athletic accomplishment. But, and maybe more importantly, the athlete's success in school and accomplishments in later life are taken into consideration," said G.E. "Shag" Grossnickle, chairman of the induction committee.

All of the inductees were involved in athletics before 1940. The charter members are: James Chevalier, all-conference football player; Levi Craig, all-conference football and basketball player; Orval Craig, All-American football player and all-conference basketball player; William Downing, all-conference football player; Arnold Embree, All-American football player; Carl Noble, All-American football player; Jack Robinson, All-American football player; and Fred Schwengel, All-American football player and track star who led NMSU to its first conference championship in that sport.

Five athletes were inducted not only for their playing careers, but for their coaching accomplishments as well. They include: James Dougherty, first full-time athletic director at NMSU; Kenneth Gardner, coach of 34 championship track teams at the University and athletic director for the past nine years; Maurice Wade, who had the longest tenure of any football coach at NMSU (16 years) and won eight conference championships; Boyd King, basketball coach for 25 years at NMSU and winner of seven conference championships; and Don Faurot, whose football teams in the 1920s and 1930s at the University were 63-13-3 and won 27 games in a row.

The inductees were honored at a dinner on Sept. 30 and were also introduced at the NMSU football game on Oct. 1. Dougherty, Chevalier, and Levi Craig were inducted posthumously.

"Each of you has a set mark, a mark that becomes the standard for all who follow and strive for the excellence that has become your hallmark," University President Charles McClain told the inductees. **"Each of you has carried the mantle of leader well, not only on the athletic field, but throughout your lives as workers, citizens, family members, and alumni of your University."**

All of the honorees expressed their thanks for their induction, and many used the opportunity to reminisce about their careers. By far the most common theme was the importance of Faurot, who coached many of the athletes during his nine-year tenure as Bulldog football mentor.

Several of the inductees-remembered how Faurot did more than coach them, at times helping them with their finances, classwork, and personal lives. Schwengel called Faurot "the greatest coach that ever lived."

"Coach Faurot devised game plans that were examples of how great coaching can make ordinary players look awfully good," Noble said.

Faurot, too, was touched by the proceedings. "I'm very happy to see all my former players; this is really a great thrill. They had a lot of fun playing together and they were fine, fine athletes," he said.

The induction ceremonies will be held annually, and the Hall of Fame plaques will hang at a site yet to be determined on the NMSU campus.

DIVISION UPDATE: BUSINESS

A variety of factors combined to give NMSU students the highest rate of success nationally among students taking the Certified Public Accountant examination.

About 85 percent of the University students who took the examination last year passed, which gives the University the highest composite average in the nation.

According to a report prepared by William Holper, assistant professor of accounting, NMSU's percentage was more than 10 percent higher than Grand Valley State College (Mich.), which had the next highest composite percentage. Holper prepared the report for the National Association of State Boards of Accountancy.

"It (the high percentage of passing students) was due to a combination of good students, good faculty, and the aid of a CPA review class offered by the University," Holper said.

The report analyzed results from candidates in 36 states, and it included 12 CPA candidates from the University.

In a related development, students will be able to take the CPA examination while still in school, instead of having to wait until after graduation.

The Missouri legislature passed a bill last summer which allows students to apply to take the examination the semester before graduation. The bill was proposed by state representative Harry Hill of Novinger. Students were previously required to wait until after they graduated before applying.

"This allows students who don't have their degrees yet to take the test rather than having to wait until they're out in the job market," Tina Taggart, accounting club member, said. "Before, you'd take your CPA review course in the spring, and all through the summer, you had the chance to forget what you learned."

Taggart also said that a CPA degree is necessary for advancement in the accounting field, and the earlier a student can earn a certificate, the better off the student will be.

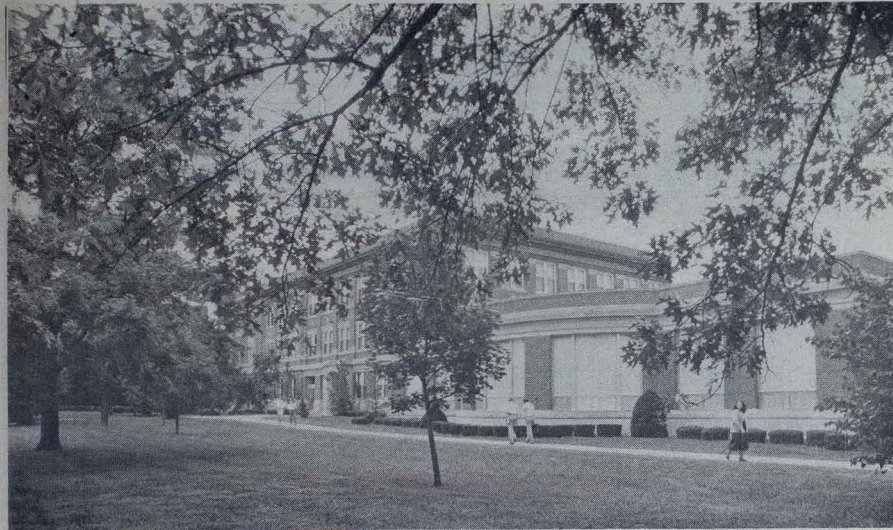

A recent report from the U.S. Department of Education predicts trends in the job market for librarians. It says there will be an increase throughout the 1980s in job opportunities at public and special libraries. However, fewer jobs will be available in academic libraries at both the secondary and university levels.

George Hartje, director of Pickler Memorial Library, said this trend does not apply at NMSU. "No cuts will be experienced at the library. In fact, no retirements are even expected for a period of about ten years," Hartje said.

Hartje attributes this to the fact that "there is no fat to trim," since the University has not expanded the library since 1968, when the current library was constructed. Presently, the library employs 11 librarians, 17 clerks, and between 70-90 students, depending on the semester.

Within the last year, the library has experienced a budget increase which has added a number of new materials. Future expansion of the library is planned. The Board of Regents has proposed almost \$16 million in improvements to Pickler. If the money is approved by the legislature, an addition will be built on to the library and more staff members will be hired.

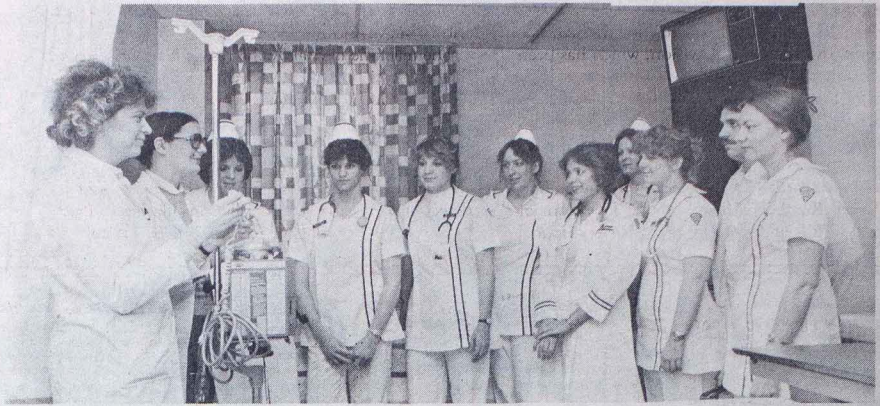
DIVISION UPDATE: NURSING

For the second year in a row, all NMSU nursing graduates taking the National Council of Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses in Missouri have passed. Of Missouri's baccalaureate nursing programs, NMSU's was the only one to receive a 100 percent pass rate.

The NCLEX-RN, a two-day exam, replaced the State Board Licensing Examinations last year.

Dr. Elsie Simms, who began her duties as head of the Division of Nursing in July, says her main responsibility this year will be to "maintain the quality of the program at NMSU. It's unusual to have a school with a repeated good record, such as NMSU's nursing program. The curriculum looks particularly good to me." Simms is also pleased with the quality of faculty this year. "We have a more fully credentialed faculty." One area she hopes to improve is the freshman retention rate.

DIVISION UPDATE: SCIENCE

There comes a time in every machine's life when it must be retired. That time has come for the scintillation counter in the Science Division, which has been termed "outmoded" by the researchers using it. The purchase of a new scintillation counter at a cost of about \$24,900 has been approved by the Board of Regents.

"The state of the art changes so rapidly in this high technology era that it's hard to keep everything up to date," Dean Rosebery, head of the Division of Science, said. "It is one of the more expensive pieces of

equipment we have, but it is necessary for the research within our division."

The machine is vital to the research of Dr. George Schulte, assistant professor of physiology and Dr. Robert Peter Cornell, associate professor of physiology. In addition, it is an important instructional tool in the radiological surveillance program.

A scintillation counter is an instrument used to detect and measure the scintillations (flashes of light) induced by ionizing radiation in a crystal or

phosphor. Schulte uses the counter in his research into membrane-transport mechanisms. By understanding how these mechanisms work, Schulte hopes to pave the way for cures to diseases involving organ systems such as the nervous system, gastrointestinal system and kidneys.

The counter is also essential to Cornell's research into the process of liver regeneration and its relationship to diabetes. Cornell was recently awarded an \$18,000 grant from the American Diabetes Association to continue his research.

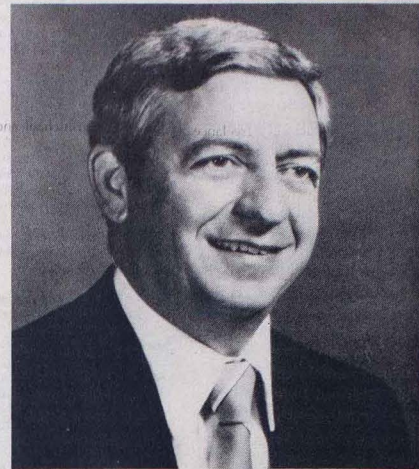
Alumnus takes helm of unique college

Browning receives award

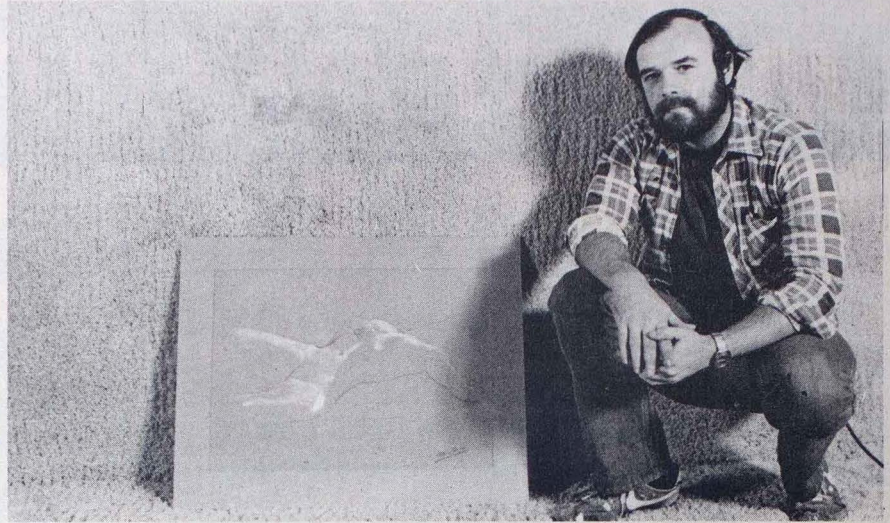

University philanthropist dies: Durward G. DeWitt

A University delegation, led by President Charles J. McClain, attended the funeral of Durward G. DeWitt (25) July 21 in St. Joseph. The 83-year-old NMSU alumnus and philanthropist had been ill a short time.

DeWitt was the inspiration behind the formation of the John R. Kirk Society, according to President McClain. "Through his leadership in assisting the University, financially and otherwise, many others have helped him build a strong support for higher education at NMSU," McClain said.

DeWitt was honored as a Fellow of the Kirk Society last year for his scholarship development. He has for several years sponsored a scholarship at NMSU, and in 1982, with his former business partner, Noma Glahn (28) of LaPlata, established a student loan program through the NMSU Development Fund.

He also sponsored a scholarship through the Goetze Educational Foundation of Sigma Tau Gamma Fraternity. He was a significant contributor to the fraternity's building fund and the new 24-man

residential wing of the Beta Chapter fraternity house has been named in DeWitt's honor.

DeWitt insured that his philanthropy would continue after his death. His will provides for approximately \$36,000 to be divided among his University scholarship, the DeWitt/Glahn loan fund and the Sigma Tau Gamma building fund.

DeWitt was born in Green City, and lived in St. Joseph most of his life. He graduated from the University in 1925 with a bachelor's degree in science, and later received his master's degree in education from the University of Missouri-Columbia.

He taught for about 20 years at Benton High School in St. Joseph, and was employed for almost 40 years with Farmland Industries. He served as director of youth activities for 20 years, then worked until his death as a securities investor for the company. He was also a life member of the Future Farmers of America.

DeWitt is survived by his wife, Anna Mae, two daughters and one son.

Computers and music do mix

Remember taking those matching tests at school? The student is supposed to match a word and a definition or two similar terms. If you matched "concertmaster" and "computer programmer," for instance, that would be incorrect. Or would it?

The choice would be correct, at least in the case of Scott Reed. Reed is a graduate student and a temporary part-time teaching assistant in the Division of Fine Arts. He is concertmaster of the University's orchestra, but he also advises the division on its use of computers.

"People think they (playing music and using computers) are so different, but they aren't. There is a lot of talent needed in both," Reed said.

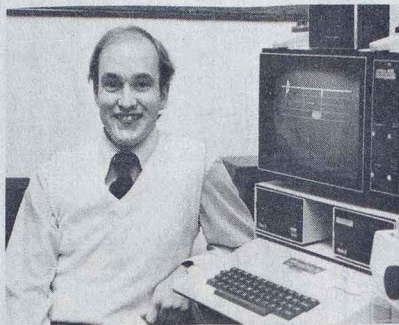
Of his two talents, Reed was involved in music first. He began playing the violin at a young age, and he was undecided whether to major in mathematics or music at NMSU. He decided on a mathematics degree, which he received in 1981.

He says two things decided his fate. First, Reed says, he didn't consider himself an outstanding violinist, and wondered if putting in "about four hours of practice a week for every hour of credit you get" was worth it.

But more importantly, "I took a FORTRAN computer course as a freshman," Reed said. "I loved it. It was fun and it was easy."

Now, Reed is trying to convince the Fine Arts Division of the uses of computers in music. "Presently, we just use computers for education, like a basic computer course we're trying to develop for Fine Arts students. But you can use them (computers) for lots of other things.

"For instance, we train students in recognizing melody lines. Right now, the professor usually plays something for them, and then they identify it. But, we

can program a computer to play basic melodies, and then the professor can use the computer to teach. That makes a professor more versatile in his teaching methods. Computers don't take over the classroom, they're just education tools, like the blackboard," Reed said.

Reed leads the string quartet as well as his duties with the orchestra. "I enjoy string quartet," he says. "Not only do we give our own concerts and recitals, but we get to play at University banquets and receptions, and also on Music Appreciation Day, so we get some really nice audiences."

Remember taking those matching tests at school? The student is supposed to match a word and a definition or two similar terms. If you matched "concertmaster" and "computer programmer," for instance, that would be incorrect. Or would it?

So which of his dual talents will win out after he earns his master's degree in two years? "It will probably be in a non-music setting," he says. "I'd like to become a computer programmer, and maybe move up to a systems analyst later." But he'll continue to play music. Not only because he enjoys playing the violin, but because Scott Reed likes to keep people guessing.
