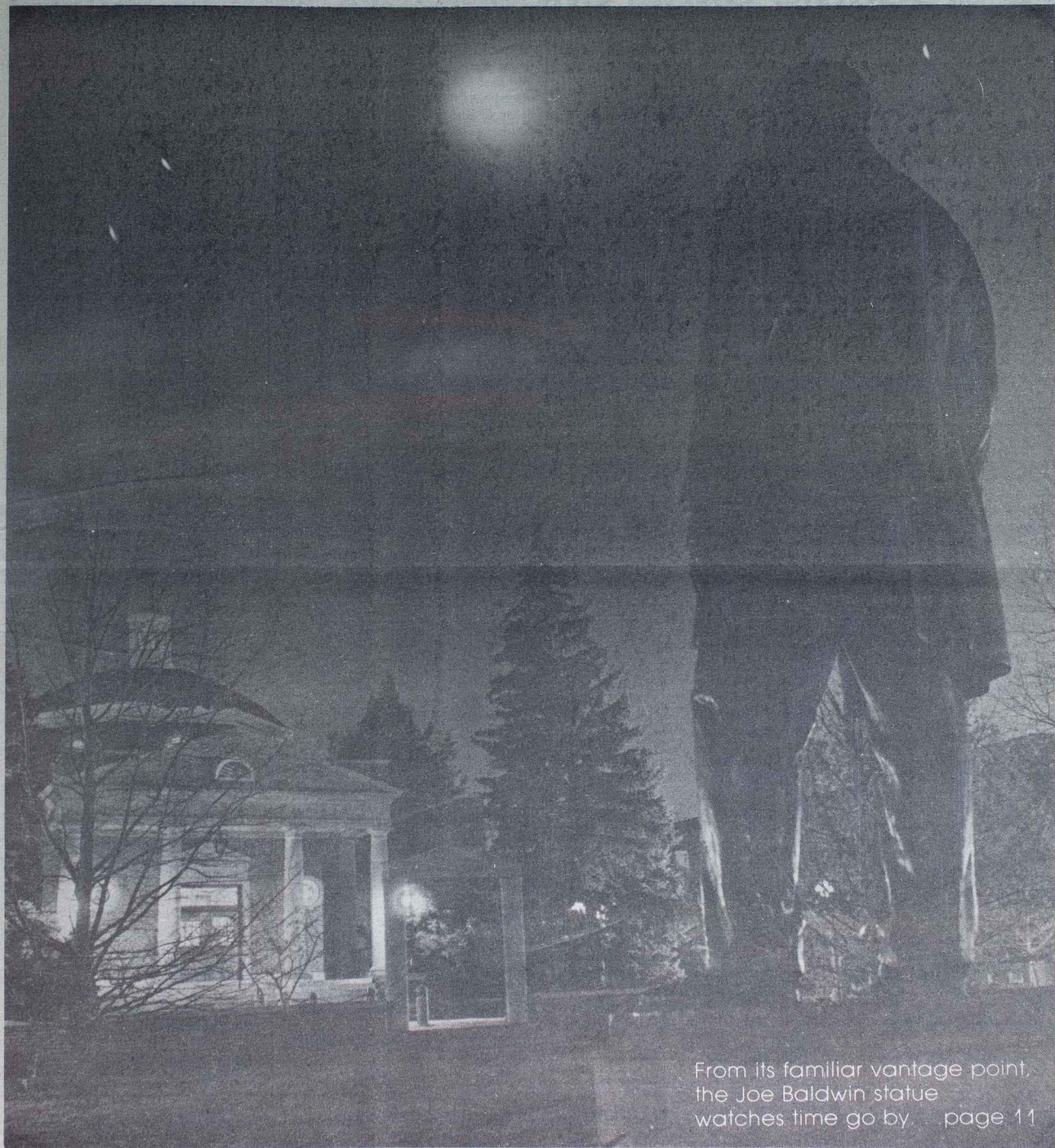

'72 graduate offers encouragement to nurses

I was very pleased to see the article stating that all NMSU nursing graduates had passed the state board exam. It is the highest statement of quality that a nursing program can boast. NMSU is in an elite group with this achievement. I was equally pleased when I read last year that the program received National League of Nursing accreditation.

I graduated from the nursing program in 1972. It was only after I graduated that I realized the fine foundation I was given at NMSU. Our program had an excellent balance between academic and clinical experience. I was not only taught necessary concepts but was more than adequately taught the skills necessary to perform in the clinical area. Many graduates I have worked with from '72 to '82 do not have the strong, balanced nursing education

that NMSU provided me. My cap is off to my nursing professors and clinical instructors.

There were times of uncertainty from '70-'72. At times we feared the nursing program wouldn't continue until we graduated. When Dr. Devitt assumed leadership and became division head in 1971, the program did indeed grow and blossom.

I encourage you to seek a capable individual as the new division head to nurture and maintain the high quality of nursing education that NMSU's program has demonstrated.

The Class of '72 had 16 graduates. I'm sorry to say I have lost contact with many of these. The graduates I have been in touch with are doing well in the nursing profession. **Mary Topinke Bunten** has a son and daughter and is Director of Inservice Education at a hospital in Hannibal,

Mo. She has held several positions, from staff nurse to supervisor, over the past 10 years. **Charol Ertel Clermont** has one daughter and is presently an O.R. nurse in St. Louis. She has held positions ranging from staff nurse to CCU head nurse. At last contact, **Annette Titus** is working in Reno, Nev. She has worked toward her master's in nursing. At last contact, **Johna Berryman Brill** lives in Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, and has two children. She has held various positions including positions in neonatal intensive care. At last contact, **Gwen Curts** was working on her doctorate. I am presently working in post-anesthesia recovery and also do relief supervision from time to time. For eight years, my main emphasis of work was in coronary care. I did supervision for 1 1/2 years before assuming my present position.

As your new graduates will learn, nursing is hard work, but an added benefit is the flexibility it gives you. In these times of economic upheaval, it is indeed fortunate to wake to a job I not only love but provides and equates income with shift flexibility that allows me—not a babysitter—to raise my children. 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NMSU's not recession proof, but we're weathering the tough times

How is NMSU weathering the recession? Quite well, thank you.

Academically, the quality of the instructional program continues to be a primary topic of discussion among faculty and students. Our value-added approach to measuring academic progress has received campuswide—not to mention nationwide—attention during the year.

Students are tested before their freshman year and then again after their sophomore year to measure the "value added" by the general education program. During their senior year, students are tested in their major area and the results are compared to national standards.

Goals vary according to the division and major, but generally faculty are working so most seniors score at or above the 50th percentile. In short, we think a Northeast graduate should be at least as well prepared—and hopefully better—than the average college graduate in the nation.

More good news is that enrollment has stayed up. Since 1977, it has increased by 22 percent, more than any regional college or university in Missouri and the University of Missouri system. We expect to grow slightly for fall 1983, while at the same time continuing to show improvement in the average ability of the freshman class.

The financial picture, in light of the University's reliance on tax revenues, is sound but does not allow much room for growth or expansion.

Money received from the state peaked during 1980-81 at \$13,792,753. A little more than \$12 million was received the next year. For 1983-84, we expect about \$13.6 million, still less than what was received three years ago.

During this time, in order to make up the difference, student fees have increased. In-state students now pay \$620 a year, up from \$340. At one time, the average NMSU student paid about 20

percent of the cost of his education. Now that percentage is about 40 percent.

Statewide, Missouri is spending a smaller percentage of tax revenues on higher education—dropping from 18.7 percent to the current figure of 15.7 percent.

Some people would agree that students should pay a greater share of the cost of their education. Others would argue that our nation needs higher productivity to once again regain world supremacy, in many industrial areas. To meet this challenge, we will need to make an even greater commitment to education.

The trends in higher education in Missouri are clear. NMSU is attempting to make the best of its situation. What is your assessment of the direction we've chosen?

FIRE CLAIMS TWO BUSINESSES

The YMCA has temporarily set up headquarters at Leisure World recreation center on Highway 11. Plans for rebuilding and expanding Too Tall's at its original location are being discussed by the owners, NOMO Inc. Meanwhile, the investigation into the cause of the fire continues.

BONDS FOR BUILDING

Gov. Christopher Bond made a "whistle stop" at NMSU in January to reaffirm his support for the sale of revenue bonds to finance the \$6 million Phase I renovation of Pickler Memorial Library and the \$3 million renovation of Violette Hall. Gov. Bond was referring to money from the \$600 million bond issue passed by Missouri voters last summer. The decision to authorize the sale of the bonds is now up to the General Assembly. If approved this session, construction could begin as early as December.



SCHOOL OF THE MONTH

NMSU was selected the School of the Month for December by a national residence hall organization in recognition of its Residence Hall Association Football Relay Run. The project, which involved numerous

students running the game ball from Kirksville to Macomb, Ill., for the Bulldog vs. Western Illinois University football game, was recognized as an innovative and valuable residence hall project.

MIND PLUS MACHINE

Learning to utilize computers at home, at work and at school is an idea whose time has come. To teach people necessary skills, NMSU has devised several spring and summer workshops on microcomputers in the areas of business, agriculture, mathematics, industrial education, social science, science and health, physical education and recreation.

TOUGHER STANDARDS

The Dean's List is getting more exclusive as of this semester. In a further effort to upgrade standards, the minimum grade point average requirement for the Dean's List has been raised from 3.0 to 3.5. In a survey of similar universities, the Undergraduate Council found 3.5 to be the average GPA required for the list.



Dr. John R. Kirk, president emeritus

President William Howard Taft once slept here.

Distinguished visitors were not uncommon in the house located at 603 S. High in Kirksville. When an important figure visited the First District State Normal School in the early 1900s, proper accommodations were not always available. President and Mrs. John R. Kirk often simply invited them into their home.

The large brick house stands a block north of the High Street entrance to campus. It was built by President Kirk in 1909, the 10th year of his presidency. Since then, it has seen countless faculty, students and Northeast visitors pass through its doors.

Kirk's grandson, John R. Kirk of Seattle, recalls "modern" conveniences such as gas lights that were functional throughout the house long before the widespread use of electricity. The water system was composed of a copper downspout which transferred water to large metal hoppers where it was filtered with grated charcoal. The basement of the structure was carefully built with stones that were cut and fit, providing a basement that did not leak.

Inside the front entranceway, an open walnut staircase led to the second floor. The large, arched windows of the house were "loaded with quite beautiful stained glass," Kirk said.

The President's study, located in the southwest corner of the ground floor, was joined with the dining room by large walnut sliding doors. The dining room had a hardwood floor made of alternate strips of oak and walnut.

President and Mrs. Kirk owned grounds surrounding the house during the 1920s and '30s. Kirk recalls a large vegetable garden, his grandmother's flower garden and an orchard. There were also a three-car garage and chicken coops on the lot. The younger Kirk cared for the grounds until 1943 while he lived with his grandparents. "It was my responsibility to mow the lawn and clip here and there."

He remembers a particular piece of furniture from his grandfather's house—the chair in which Taft sat. The former U.S. president visited the Normal School on two dates, in 1917 and in 1919 to give an address for the YMCA Lecture Course. "I was always fascinated by the story my grandma used to tell... he (Taft) was a big, heavy man, and when he came to visit he said he would need a big, strong chair to sit in. I can still see the chair. It was of carved wood with heavy arms and legs and had an animal's face carved on the back. Grandma said he told them not to worry about a pillow for him to sit on. 'I carry my own.'"

President Kirk retired in 1925 but still spent much time supporting the College in spite of a heart ailment. On a Sunday afternoon, Nov. 7, 1937, President John R. Kirk died in his home at the age of 86.

"The grand old man of Missouri," as he was called by his colleagues, had lived in the house for almost 25 years. His wife and family continued to live there until 1949.

The house then passed through several local owners and was purchased by Phi Kappa Theta fraternity in 1968. The current owner, Mary Novinger, purchased the house in 1975 and

remodeled it for apartments. She said when she purchased it, the interior was in such poor condition it was an "eyesore."

In the remodeling, the stairway was removed, most of the floors were carpeted, the walls were paneled and the walnut woodwork was hidden by a lowered ceiling. The stained glass windows had been sold before Novinger acquired the property.

Now living in the seven apartments are 16 students and, like most old houses with a history, perhaps a ghost. Various stories have been passed on about the ghost of President John R. Kirk, who is said to roam the house. Past tenants have reported seeing him walking on the back stairway and heard him thumping loudly upon an old desk in the house.

One tenant who lives in the attic of the house, sophomore Monica Robe, said she was warned about the ghost when she moved into the apartment.

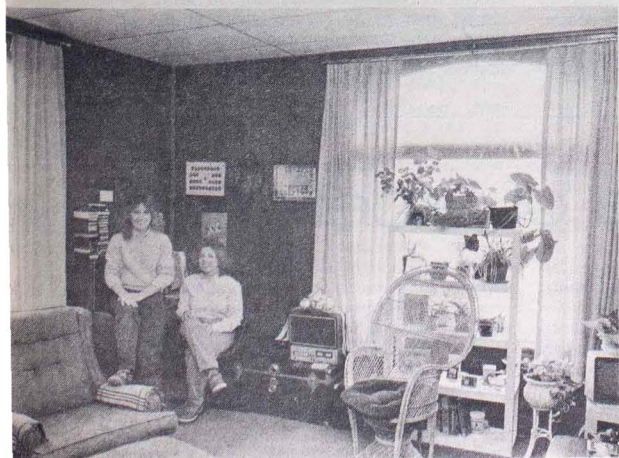
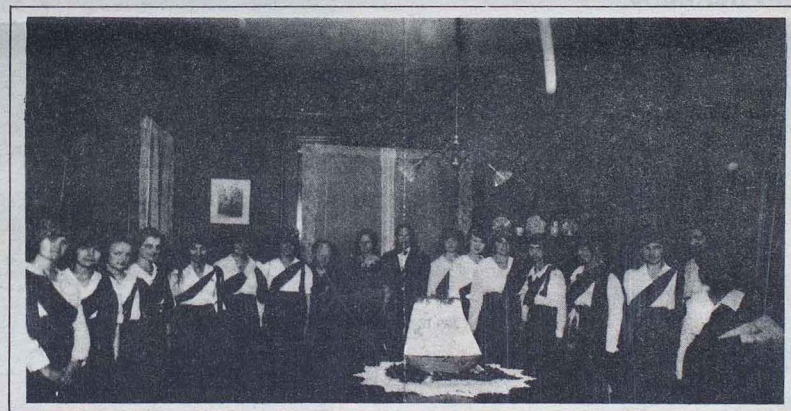
"They say his ghost is still up here. I attic is where it is supposed to stay hear a lot of noises, but I think it is an old house."

Junior Becky Huff and sophomore Nancy Tanase share an apartment of ground floor. Huff said the house's frightening appearance from the outside. "We call it Frankenstein's House and we describe it to a friend." In President Kirk's study, where he often sat debating problems faced by educational institutions, they watch television.

Kirk's grandson visited Kirksville last summer, after being away for years. He said he went for a walk one evening to see the University and the house. "The biggest change I saw was the Dutch elm disease. All of the trees are gone."

In the darkness, he said the house itself looked the same as when President Kirk lived there and made distinguished visitors welcome.

Sig Ep has recently moved into a house behind Ryle Hall, which they hope to purchase within the next few months.

The green and yellow of Lambda Chi Alpha could be seen here and there this fall, with the group making formal application to the Interfraternity Council Expansion Committee in November. If the IFC committee grants the group a charter, it would become the 16th fraternity at NMSU.

NEMOSCOPE wins Award of Excellence

NMSU publications in general and the NEMOSCOPE in particular were singled out for their excellence recently by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

In the Mid-America District VI annual awards presentations, NMSU received six individual awards for various publications. The NEMOSCOPE, which was selected last year as a Merit Award recipient, moved up a level this year to the Award of Excellence category in the university publications/tabloids area. The top award in this class, the Exceptional Achievement Award, went to the University

of Kansas alumni tabloid.

Overall, NMSU ranked with the Big Eight schools in terms of number of awards. The University of Iowa won the region's Sweepstakes Award for best overall entries, followed by the University of Kansas. Other schools winning at least five awards were the University of Missouri-Columbia, Kansas State University, Iowa State University, NMSU and the University of Colorado.

In addition to the NEMOSCOPE, Awards of Excellence were also given to our "Scholarship Packet" and to University Photojournalist Ray Jag-

ger for his photo illustrating "college fashions." Merit Awards were given for two advertisements—one for a performance by jazz musician Maynard Ferguson and one for the performance by cellist Marcus Stocker. NMSU's principal recruitment booklet, "Prospectus," also received an Award of Merit.

Faculty member writes his way to immortality

Rejection is a part of every writer's struggle. Jim Barnes, associate professor of comparative literature, had nearly 100 before his starving artist period ended in 1968. Since then, he's received more rejections, but they have come fewer and farther between.

Barnes was first published in "The Nimrod," one of the oldest literary magazines in the U.S. "I've written my share of garbage and I've written some damn good poems, too," the author of three books of poetry and hundreds of published poems, said.

"I write for the same reasons a carpenter builds a house—he likes his work, he likes the rewards. I write for the same reasons a cabinet builder builds—to shape his work and finish it."

His poetry started taking shape after he graduated from high school and worked as a lumberjack in Oregon for five years.

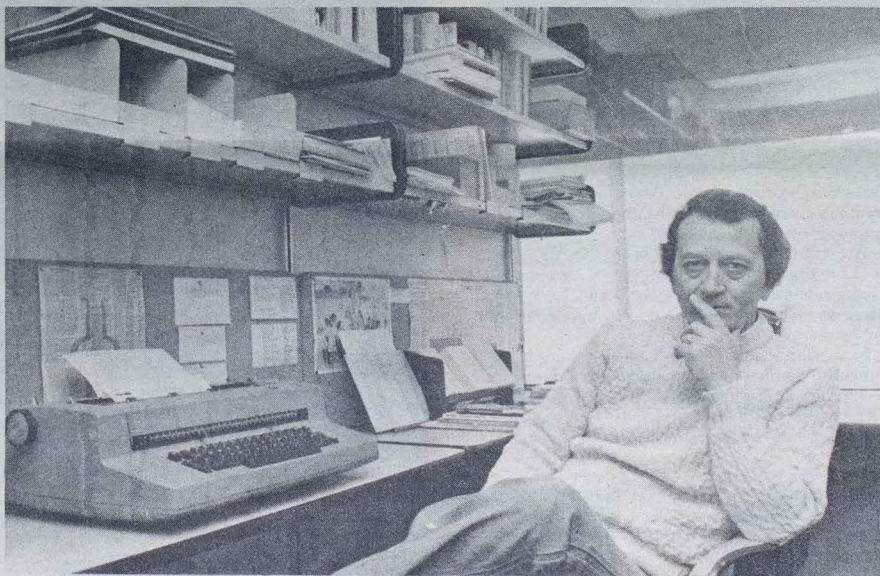
"I was starved for things artistic, so I read voraciously. I discovered Faulkner, Hemingway and Steinbeck." His love for fiction prompted him to write poetry and to earn a Ph.D. in comparative literature at the University of Arkansas (Fayetteville). "Maybe I'm a frustrated fiction writer," he said, laughing.

Frustrated or not, Barnes continues to write one or two poems a month. From 1974-76 he wrote a poem a week that was "good enough to keep." In 1978, his efforts were rewarded by a \$7,500 National Endowment for the Arts Creative Writing Fellowship.

Barnes lives on "a hill" in Macon, Mo., with his wife, Carolyn, and sons, Bret and Blake. Yet his favorite writing environment is his University office in the Administration/Humanities Building.

"I simply sit down and start when I have time. Sometimes an image or a subject comes; usually it doesn't. I almost never have a preconceived form."

He describes his writing as "place poetry" because it is about people or an aura in a particular place. "Each poem has a definite voice and I would hope that voice would not be mistaken for mine. I don't think I've written a poem in which I spoke. In

each I have created a character." As with any writer, however, he draws from his own experiences—childhood memories, places he has been and from his Choctaw-Welsh ancestry.

The results of his work are three books of original poetry; a translation from German of the poems of Dagmar Nick, which won the 1980 Translation award from the Translation Center of Columbia University (New York); and a new manuscript circulating to publishers. In addition, he has given poetry readings across the country and is the editor of the *Chariton Review*, an international journal of poetry, fiction and translation. He also established the *Chariton Review Press*, which prints quality work by writers who have been unsuccessful in placing work with commercial publishers.

Barnes believes his work as a writer/editor complements his teaching career, which began in 1965 at Northeastern Oklahoma State University (Miami). "I can't separate my vocation from my

avocation," he said. "If I hadn't been teaching, I probably wouldn't be writing." He has taught at NMSU since 1970 because he likes "the students, the teachers and the academic freedom."

He instructs language and literature courses—including a poetry workshop—but he is the first to admit that poetry writing is difficult to teach. His workshop, therefore, is more of "a critique session of writers' works," in which students write because they want to. "I didn't learn how to write; it's a combination of reading and living."

That combination is one that Barnes would like to perpetuate. "On the ideal plane I'd like to live forever, I'd like to write forever, I'd like to be read forever. That's part of the reason I write—it's one of the few ways to become immortal."

For the time being he just wants "to write and write well, I would like to write better. A Pulitzer, a Nobel wouldn't hurt, but that doesn't really matter; what matters is that you keep going."

Although it was not so long ago, it certainly seems far, far away.

Northeast Missouri State was still "College" during most of the time when anti-war rallies, sit-ins, hippies and the establishment were buzz words on the nation's college campuses. Perhaps reflecting the sentiment of the times, or perhaps simply because the college was undergoing growing pains from teacher's college to a University, the protests eventually came to Kirksville. If they left any lasting effect, it was a recognition by faculty, administrators and townspeople that college students were mature enough to be treated as adults.

"The administration realized that 'These kids really do have minds,'" Joan Bobeen Marlin ('72) said. As editor of the Index in her junior year and a reporter before that, she was often faced with the task of reporting campus unrest to the student body. She thinks much of the student action was really a reaction—to boredom and apathy. "Tempers flared because there really just wasn't anything else to do. . . . They (the students) just wanted something to be involved in."

It was perceived apathy on the part of administrators and local government officials which led to the first sizeable indication of campus unrest in Kirksville. The college saw its first sit-in.

In May of 1969 at NMSC, the Association of Black Collegians (ABC) was barely a month old. Following a meeting with the Kirksville City Council and a demonstration march around campus, more than 100 black students and a few whites moved into the lower corridor of Baldwin Hall, where administrative offices were located.

They wanted a fair housing ordinance in Kirksville, along with several other demands as listed in the ABC's "Black Manifesto."

Denied the ordinance, the contingent left City Hall for the Student Union Building. Assembled en masse at the east side of the Student Union, the demonstrators marched toward Violette Hall singing civil rights songs and carrying signs.

After gathering food and clothing, the demonstrators proceeded to Baldwin Hall, and occupied the corridor outside the then-president's office for approximately 2 1/2 hours.

According to Alphonse Jackson, the ABC president at the time, "We had intentions of remaining in Baldwin indefinitely, or until we could have some positive answer made available to us by the college administration."

In a subsequent meeting with administrators and faculty members upstairs in Baldwin, discussion was conducted. The end result was a warning that the protestors could be arrested for trespassing at 10:30 p.m. when the doors were locked.

CAMPUS PROTESTS

The demonstrators decided to vacate the building and headed for the Baptist Student Union. This move was complicated by a crowd of some 500 students who had gathered outside of Baldwin Hall yelling epithets, derogatory names and phrases and threatening violence.

Olin "Swede" Johnson, captain of NMSU's Safety and Security, remembers that "those (students) outside were no better than those inside. Maybe worse, but not much different."

Johnson, in his 17th year at NMSU, said it was about this time when the University began to "beef-up" its security forces. At that time, Safety and Security consisted of only a few night watchmen.

Within the next few years, the security force grew to resemble a police force in its own right, and remained so until the late 1970s.

The Safety and Security patrolmen were equipped with firearms, Johnson said, and at the height of the unrest around the state and nation, the decision was made to purchase crowd control equipment. "A lot of it was sold off and all, but we still have a few things stored away in the basement. Riot shields, helmets, gas masks, chemical guns. . ."

Approximately two years later, in February of 1971, things started hopping again.

The Student Senate tentatively sanctioned a three-day student strike over such issues as lack of

student representation at Board of Regent's meetings and in protest over the non-renewal of contracts for Robert Heyen and Steve Stone, two professors of sociology, who, as the administration stated, "could not be recommended for tenure because of their lack of doctorates."

In letters to the Index, these instructors expressed the opinion that their dismissals were a result of one instructor's appearance (long hair, moustache and beard, peace symbol and lack of a suit) and another instructor's affiliation with black students.

In demonstrations protesting these faculty members' dismissals, more than 400 students



gathered before the SUB on Feb. 25, 1971. The following Monday more than 500 students reassembled to further discuss the issue.

Joan Marlin remembers covering the sit-ins in front of the SUB. "No one (in the administration) really believed that the student body was capable of instigating more than just a bunch of people sitting around talking," she said.

In an editorial afterward, she pointed to the possibility that violence might have resulted from the student assemblage. She said the thrust of her editorial was to show how close the college had come to a crisis. "I wanted to say, 'Hey, I don't think you people realize what could have happened here.'"

As it turned out, cooler heads prevailed as the Student Senate assumed a major role in the action. A committee, headed by ombudsman Joe Alloway (who would later write a book about the situation), looked into the reasons for the firings and further investigated the possibility of the student strike.

At the following week's Student Senate meeting, the strike was twice voted down. Then it was decided to put the strike to a vote before the entire student body. This came as a result of opinions expressed by more than 1,300 students gathered in Baldwin Auditorium for more than three hours to view the meeting.

In a special two-page edition of the Index on April 2, it was announced that by a vote of 1,656 to 1,305, there would not be a strike. This was the largest turnout for an all-student campus election, even to date.

Shortly after, however, black problems once again erupted. Following a meeting with President Charles McClain on Feb. 28, 1971, a list of demands was presented, similar to those presented during the Baldwin Hall sit-in two years previously. After this meeting, about 20 students, both black and white, marched around campus carrying placards such as, "Student's Rights," and "Only You Can Prevent Campus Fires."

The event which eventually defused the campus tension was a vacation—spring break 1971. When classes resumed, tempers had cooled and most students settled down to the business of getting their degrees. Before long the Index was back to stories about senate elections and bloodmobiles.

"Nothing really happened," Marlin said. "Other than a lot of kids who missed a lot of classes."

In retrospect, she said the administration was within its rights not to renew the instructors' contracts but the decision was probably announced too suddenly. There were more than 300 sociology majors on campus at the time who believed their program was being eliminated. Once sociology instructors for the next fall were hired, things calmed

down. "I bet 90 percent of the students who were on campus at the time now only vaguely recall that it happened."

Yes, times change. Marlin has used her Index experience well and now writes for the Cedar Rapids Gazette and free-lances for the Des Moines Register and a Dubuque newspaper. She also sells insurance and does a little substitute teaching.

Joe Alloway, the Senate ombudsman, is now a chaplain in the U.S. Navy, currently on a ship in Guantanamo Bay near Cuba. "Joe hasn't changed much," his father says. "He always rubbed people the wrong way, especially the powers that be."

Serge "Frenchy" Senechal, probably the best-known student activist at the time, has not maintained contact with NMSU's Alumni Office. Various reports have put him in Canada, on the East Coast and in Columbia, Mo., working with drug abuse victims.

Alphonse Jackson, the ABC president in 1969, went on to receive a master's degree from Northeast and then a law degree from Washington University in St. Louis. For a time he was on the faculty at the University of Missouri-St. Louis and has also served as the director of public safety for the city. He is currently the deputy director of the St. Louis Housing Authority.

As for the administrators, most of them have moved on or passed away. In fact, one of the sociology professors, Robert Heyen, reportedly died a few years after leaving Kirksville.

Of course, Dr. Charles McClain has remained president of NMSU. The open door policy he instituted has helped prevent similar confrontations between students and administrators.

Once in a while something happens to recall the days when college campuses were the focus of national attention. More than 150 Chinese students and supporters marched around the NMSU campus a few years ago in protest of a United Nations decision to oust Nationalist China. In the fall of 1979, a large group of veterans marched down Franklin Street in protest of actions in Iran. Some Iranian students responded with a subsequent demonstration.

As recently as last September, several Palestinian students assembled in front of the Student Union to protest the United States' actions in their homeland. A few people wandered by to see what was going on. Some derogatory statements were heard from the crowd. The Index did some interviews, along with the local media, and then everyone went home. Probably no one even knew of the 500 students who had angrily assembled in that spot a little more than a decade before.

The place is the same but it all seems far, far away.

Dr. John Black,
professor emeritus

The doctor's adviser enjoys his retirement

They say it's the little things in life that make us happy. For Dr. John Black, former professor at NMSU, reading and listening to his classical records suits him just fine.

Today, Black considers himself to be "pretty much of a hermit." In his earlier years, however, he was by no means a recluse. A professor emeritus of zoology at NMSU, Black served as the first pre-osteopathic adviser in the country, held the position of faculty representative on both the MIAA and NCAA advisory boards, helped his wife raise two sons and published two books.

Black's education includes a B.S. in 1935 from the University of Kansas (Lawrence), an M.A. in 1937 from Indiana University (Bloomington) and a Ph.D. in 1940 from the University of Michigan (Ann Arbor).

Black still makes his home in Kirksville. He says the thing he misses most about NMSU are the students. "I felt I did more good counseling than I did teaching," he said.

The same seems to hold true for his former students. During the Tel-Alumni calling this past fall, many alumni asked about Black and wondered what he has been up to recently. He also receives cards and letters from past students and tries to stay in touch with them by a letter or a visit.

When he's not reading, watching the St. Louis baseball or football Cardinals on TV or visiting his

friends, Black likes to take a break from Kirksville and travel from coast-to-coast to visit his two sons. The older son, John Jr., lives on the East Coast, and Fred, his younger son, lives on the West Coast. Black said he likes to take about a month out of each year to visit his sons.

Although he never had any daughters, Black says, "I have 12 girls I call my daughters." One of these former students is Harlene Wellman Bailey, who now resides in Santa Barbara, Calif. Black says he likes to pay Bailey a visit every year.

While he was at NMSU, Black was asked to upgrade the pre-osteopathic program, since many students at that time were considered poorly prepared. Black then became the first pre-osteopathic adviser in the country and currently has more than 600 doctors of osteopathic medicine in practice today. "There isn't a city where I don't know a doctor," he said.

This year marks Black's 10th year since his retirement from the University. And while 10 years may seem like a long time, Black recalls many happy experiences that he had with the University as if it were yesterday.

Black accomplished quite a lot in his years as a professor. But probably the best accomplishment that he achieved in his 25 years at NMSU is the respect and caring he received from his students and still receives—whether by card or visit—today.

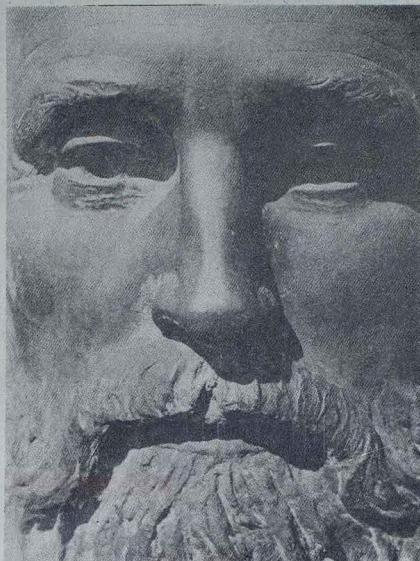

One of the most familiar but least understood sights on campus honors the memory of a pioneer educator and founder of Northeast Missouri State University—the statue of Joseph Baldwin.

The 7-foot bronze statue is located in front of the Kirk Memorial, where it was placed 55 years ago on Oct. 20, 1927. The statue commemorates Baldwin so students will not lose interest in him and his contributions to Northeast, according to "The Centennial History of the Northeast Missouri State Teachers College" by Dr. Walter H. Ryle.

The statue cost \$6,000 and was completed for Baldwin's 100th birthday. The residents of Kirksville donated \$1,000, faculty members gave \$600 and summer school students gave \$500 to help pay for its completion. The remaining amount was borrowed from the Student Memorial Fund.

Baldwin came to Kirksville to open the state's first "normal school." He came on the North Missouri Railroad as far as Macon, then rode a one-horse buggy and arrived in Kirksville on Feb. 13, 1867. He made arrangements with members of stock companies to rent some of their buildings in which to teach.



Baldwin's work in 1870 led to the establishment of the North Missouri Normal School, first district—the first normal school to be state-supported.

The initial school held classes in a building rented from the Cumberland Presbyterians, a one-room floor made into three classrooms.

The school was primarily a teacher-training institution. People began referring to normal schools instead of teacher seminaries. (The French adjective, normal, is derived from the Latin noun norma, which signifies a rule, pattern or a model.)

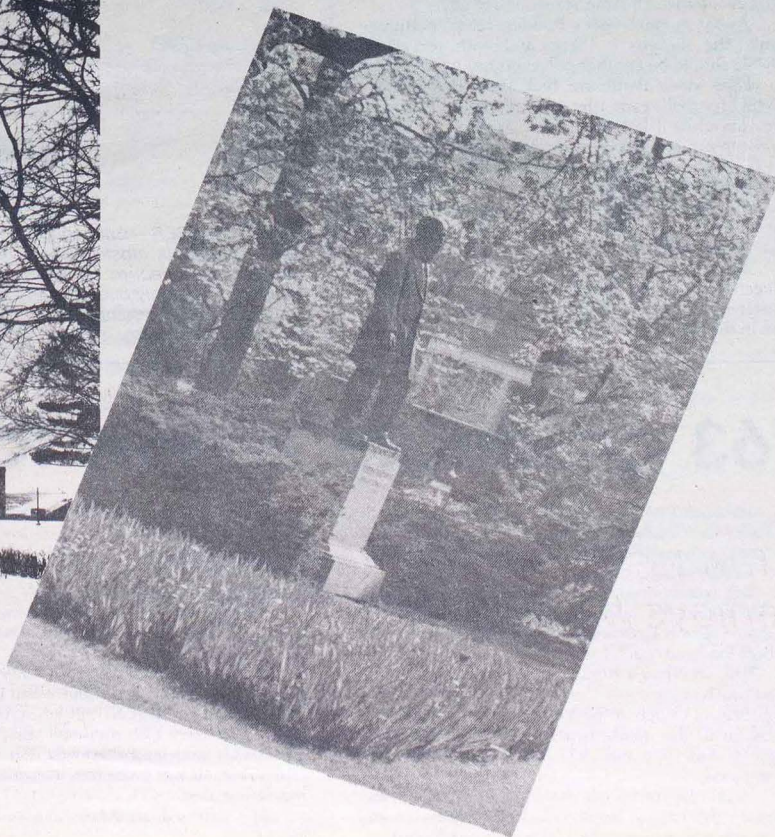
In 1872, Baldwin's school had a total of 75 members, a library of 24,000 volumes, an enrollment of about 1,000 and a 320-acre farm. It may not have been the largest college, but with 220 courses it served its purpose.

When Baldwin's private normal school became the First District State Normal School of Missouri, he was elected president and continued to hold that position until he resigned in the summer of 1881.

Over the years, Baldwin's statue has been spat upon, egged, shown no respect by birds and covered and uncovered for class projects. Yet, he still holds his head high with the same expression.

The statue is a symbol that aids in keeping alive the history, traditions and sentiments surrounding the early days of NMSU. It is a daily reminder to each generation of students that the spirit of Joseph Baldwin still lives on this campus, especially inspiring those who come wishing to be "teacher artists," as he often referred to them.

Lineman wins award for scholastic ability

Athletes are regularly acknowledged for their physical ability. One NMSU athlete is recognized not only for his brawn but his brain as well—senior Roy Pettibone.

Pettibone, defensive end on the 1982 Northeast Missouri State football team, is one of 25 recipients of a \$2,000 NCAA post-graduate scholarship awarded to student athletes in intercollegiate football.

The 5-foot-11, 215-pound performer was a key figure for the 1982 Bulldogs. He is also a student senator, a member of Blue Key honor fraternity and the first recipient of the NMSU Viola Vogel McNeely Scholarship, awarded annually to an outstanding student. Somehow, Roy also finds time to maintain a 3.90 grade point average.

To what does Roy attribute his success? "You must have discipline, study when you have to and not put things off to the last minute," he says. "I also have a very lovely wife who was the backbone of most of it (his success). I hope I can set a precedent for other athletes in the future."

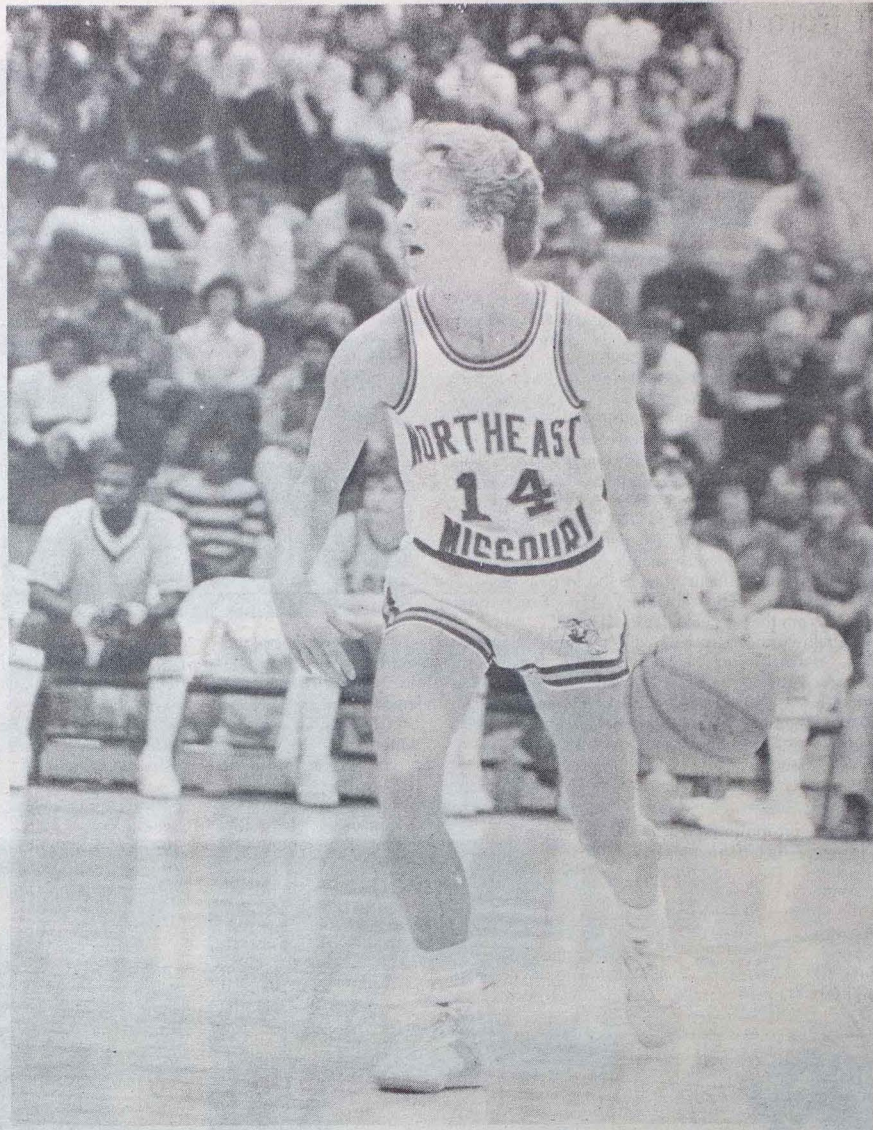
He has been such an example for most of his four-year collegiate football career. Roy was chosen twice to the second MIAA all-conference team and served on the search committee for a new head football coach at NMSU. He was also selected to the 1982 Academic All-America second team.

As far as next year's Bulldog team, Pettibone thinks the nucleus is there, and with recruiting, NMSU should be another powerhouse.

How does Pettibone feel about leaving the NMSU football team after four successful years? "It was fun while it lasted. It's time to move on to different things and experiences. I would like to thank the faculty and administration for all their support."

Before starting his college career, he served in the U.S. Marine Corps. He was an all-conference choice as an offensive guard and linebacker at McCluer High School (St. Louis).

After graduation, Roy plans to continue his education in accounting by enrolling in the NMSU master's program. He hopes to be a graduate assistant in the Business Division.

'63 graduate is new football coach

Jack Ball ('63), 42-year-old head football coach at Parkway Central High School in St. Louis during the past seven years, has been appointed as NMSU's new head football coach.

Ball will succeed Bruce Craddock, who resigned in December to take the head coaching job at Western Illinois University in Macomb after serving as Bulldog head coach for four seasons.

Ball, who had a cumulative record of 35-30-1 as head coach at Parkway Central, was named St. Louis High School Coach of the Year in 1976 after guiding his team to the quarterfinals of the Missouri State Playoffs. His 1976 and 1977 teams were conference champions.

A number of his players have gone on to stardom on the college level, including Conrad Goode, currently a standout at the University of Missouri.

Before going to Parkway Central as an assistant coach in 1971, Ball served as an assistant and head coach at Pattonville High School in St. Louis, 1966-71, and was on the staff at Rich East High School in Park Forest, Ill., 1964-1966.

For several years, he directed the Jim Hart Football Camp in Missouri and Ken Anderson Football Camp in Ohio.

Ball played football from 1959-62 at NMSU, quarterbacking the 1960 and 1961 Bulldogs to the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association title. He made the all-conference first team in his sophomore and junior seasons, but as a senior co-captain his leg was broken in the second game of the 1962 campaign.

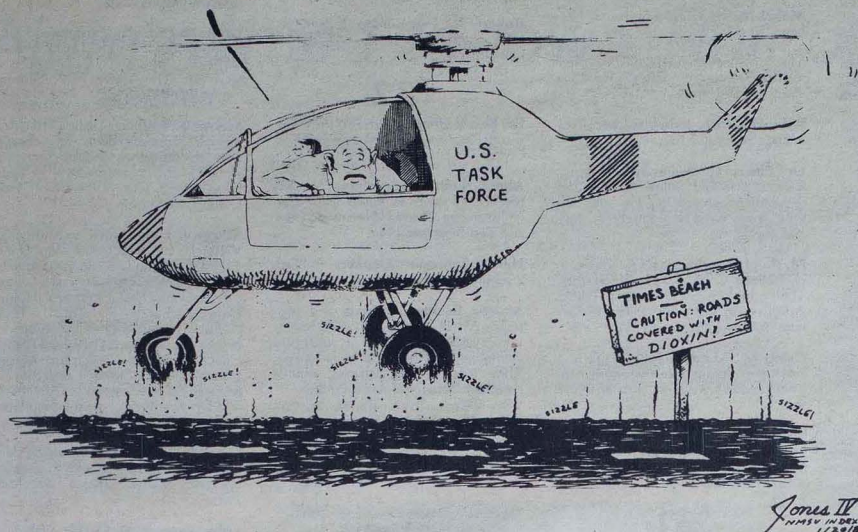
He received an M.A. degree in 1964 from NMSU.

Ball attended Tuley High School in Chicago, where he competed in football, basketball and baseball, winning all-state honors in baseball and all-city recognition in football.

"I'm extremely pleased Jack Ball is joining our athletic department," said NMSU Athletic Director Kenneth Gardner. "I have some deep, personal feelings toward him. When he played at NMSU, I was a member of the coaching staff, and I've followed his career since he graduated. We certainly had some excellent candidates for the coaching job from among about 45 applicants, but Coach Ball is very well qualified to carry on the football tradition at this University as a head coach."

Ball has a son, Christopher, a sophomore at Missouri Western, and a daughter, Kelley, a junior at Webster Groves High School.

NMSU's 'other congressman' wins election

Oshiro recaptured a seat in the upper house of the Japanese diet (parliament) last November. He had earlier served in the lower house, the House of Representatives, as recently as 1979. He was elected into the House of Councilors in an election held in Okinawa.

He was elected to fill a seat vacated by a member from Okinawa, which was turned over to Japan by the United States 10 years ago. Oshiro is a

member of the majority Liberal-Democratic Party in Japan.

He is no stranger to politics, dating back to his days in Kirksville. Oshiro was president of the International Club and a member of the Historical Society and the Romance Language Club.

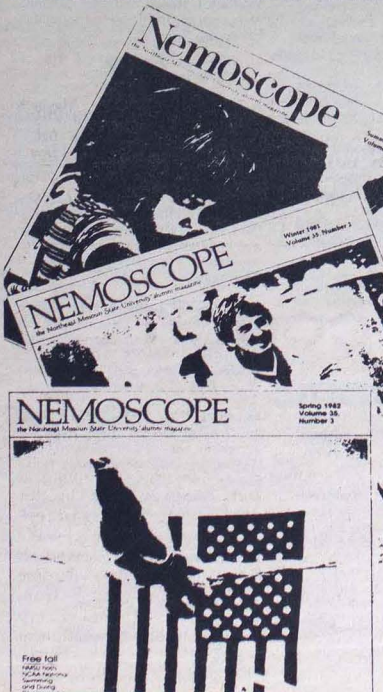

Calculus now required for business administration

Business Administration majors at NMSU will now have to take a calculus course in order to receive their degrees.

The new requirement will not affect current students but will be a requirement for next year's freshmen. The course was added to the business curriculum primarily in an effort to better prepare University students for graduate schools.

"The course will reinforce math skills learned early," Bryce Jones, assistant professor of business administration and chairman of the Business Administration Curriculum Committee, said. "Students need calculus if they go on for their master's of business administration, so we're trying to better prepare them."

Some students objected to the stricter math requirement on the grounds that they did not plan to pursue graduate study. "But students don't realize now that they may continue for their MBA," Jones said.

Darrel Krueger, dean of instruction, said the requirement fits into the University's effort to upgrade standards. "Students should get behind it and support it."

Roberto Norton, senior business administration major, said, "I have to take it anyway, for economics. It hasn't been easy for me, and if I had the chance to substitute it for another class, I would. However, I think it is an important subject for business."

Jeff Luca, junior business administration major, said, "You need a strong math background in anything these days. I might take it (calculus) anyway."

"I don't see any reason why calculus needs to be required for business administration majors," freshman Annette Carron, business administration and accounting major, said. "I don't think it has anything to do with the principles of business."

Alum named to Iowa Hall of Fame

Winning is something for which every athletic coach strives. It can seem like a long, hard battle. But for some coaches like Dr. Robert Thurness, head football and softball coach at Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, winning is just something that seems to come naturally.

Thurness, who was the third person to receive the education specialist degree from NMSU, was inducted into the Iowa High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame on Nov. 12. The ceremony took place at halftime of the Class 4-A state championship in the UNI Dome in Cedar Falls.

EDUCATION UPDATE

Student teaching numbers down by 300

Although NMSU's enrollment has risen to record levels, this growth has not been reflected in the number of student teachers.

Following the trend for students to major in non-education fields, only 200 students planned their student teaching for this school year. Ten years ago, more than 500 students were involved in the program.

Daniel Ball, head of the Division of Education, says the decline is cyclical. A surplus of teachers existed in the 1970s,

and caused many students to choose other fields. Now, the law of supply and demand has caught up with teaching, and openings are once again starting to show up. He expects as many as 350 NMSU education majors to student teach by 1985-86.

Business education and elementary education have remained strong majors during the past decade, unlike other areas. There is currently a statewide shortage of science and math teachers.

Another reason for the drop

in student teachers might be tougher standards. In response to public criticism of education, NMSU has joined the effort to upgrade standards in its education program.

Raising the minimum GPA for education majors from a 2.2 to a 2.5 grade point average was one measure taken. Elementary education majors must maintain a higher 2.75 GPA because it's the "critical place where basic learning takes place—where you're turned on or off to education," Ball says.

"We're not going to take students who aren't qualified (to student teach). We guarantee our teaching majors will be able to read and write and do a little arithmetic before they get out of here."

Efforts have also been made to upgrade some education courses and to better prepare the student teacher. A pre-teaching field experience now allows freshmen and sophomores to observe in schools prior to their entry into upper level education courses.

Grad aces accounting exam

Winning a Silver Medal took Sara Stiles years of hard-work and practice, as well as some natural ability. Sara's medal is not for athletic prowess, though; it was awarded for her outstanding performance on the uniform Certified Public Accountant's Examination.

A December 1982 graduate, Sara won the award for scoring second highest in Missouri on the May exam. The 26-year-old Columbia, Mo., native now works as an accountant with McGladrey Hendrickson and Co. in Des Moines.

"This was the first time that Northeast had a medal winner," William Holper, assistant professor of accounting, said. "She was one of our top students, so it didn't surprise us that she did so well."

Sara's high score also

brought her national recognition with the Elijah Watt Sells Award. She scored in the top 102 out of 65,537 candidates who took the CPA exam in May.

She said a review course, CPA problems, was the key to her success on the test. "It trained me how to take it," she said. In addition, Sara believes her graduate assistantship last spring, teaching elementary accounting, helped her to master basic theory.

She also gives special credit to the individualized attention from her business teachers. "NMSU has a really good business program; they seem to care," she said.

Holper, coordinator of graduate accounting programs, said, "We provide the environment; they do the work for the CPA problems class, which meets 10 hours a

week. Evidently the hard work paid off for NMSU students taking the CPA exam—nearly 50 percent passed the entire test the first time, compared to the state average of only about 15 percent.

"It's no secret why our students do so well—we work our tails off," he said.

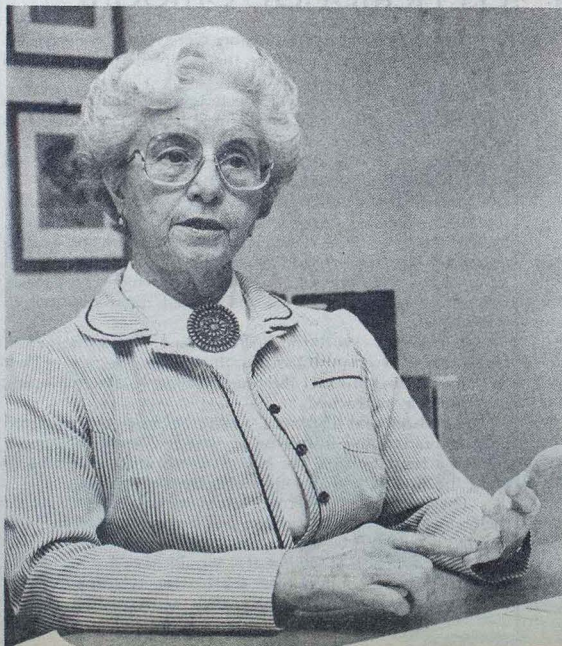

Index earns regional award; one of 22 national finalists

The fall 1981 Index was recognized as a regional Pacemaker newspaper—the highest honor the Index has ever received—at a college journalism convention in St. Louis.

The Index was one of 22 regional finalists for the Associated Collegiate Press National Pacemaker Award, an award given to the top five college newspapers in the United States. The Index placed in the top four percent of the approximately 550 college newspapers that entered.

"I was disappointed we did not win the Pacemaker award, but I was pleased we made it as far as we did, considering the competition," Les Dunseith, Index adviser, said.

The regional Pacemakers were chosen from Five-Star All-American papers. It is an objective award based on newspaper coverage and content, writing and editing, opinion content, design, photography, art and graphics.

The Pacemaker is a subjective award based on in-depth news stories, feature writing, sports coverage, exciting use of graphics, exceptional use of photography and overall excellence.

The newspapers are divided into regions based on the college's location, with NMSU in the southwest region. Other regional Pacemakers are The Shorthorn, University of Texas (Arlington); The Chart, Missouri Southern State College (Joplin); and The Maroon, Loyola University (New Orleans).

MATHEMATICS UPDATE

Computer whizzes: programmed to win

A team of NMSU computer experts came up just a 'bit' short of winning a regional computer test recently. "We were so close we could almost taste it," Wayne Bailey, assistant professor of mathematics, said.

The NMSU team ended up third among 22 schools in its division in the regional contest of the Association for Computer Machinery last October. Bailey, sponsor of the NMSU chapter of ACM, said the University of Illinois (Urbana) placed second and the University of Missouri-Rolla placed first.

The ACM club is considering a campus-wide computer contest, as well as a contest for high school students in the future. Bailey said he considers the third-place finish by NMSU a "nice feather in the cap for the University."

The Mathematics Division will soon earn a second feather. In April, Dr. Kenneth

Stilwell, professor of mathematics, will take over the office of president of the Missouri Council of Mathematics. The council is a professional organization composed of math teachers from all levels in the state.

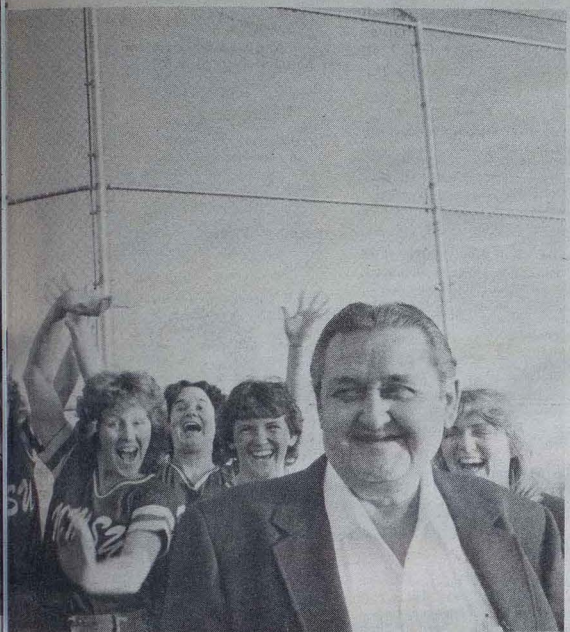

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MILITARY SCIENCE UPDATE

ROTC scholarships aid 35 students

The Army believes that leaders are made, not born. Locally, the Military Science Division at NMSU helps make leaders through its scholarship program.

Major Stephen Lattimore, assistant professor of military science, said an individual interested in applying for a scholarship goes through an involved process. First, an applicant must take a written aptitude test. A physical aptitude test is then administered to test the individual's endurance, strength and coordination. Once those are completed, a medical exam is given to the applicant. The final stretch of the process is an interview conducted by various staff members.

The process is finally completed after the applicant fills out an application. Lattimore said the application is very important because it indicates leadership, aptitude and experience. The panel of interviewers ranks the applicants and sends a list to the Army which then chooses the scholarship winners.

Lattimore said between 8,000 and 10,000 two- and three-year scholarships are awarded annually nationwide. About 35 of those scholarship winners are from NMSU.

Jeff Menz, senior ROTC scholarship recipient, said the ROTC scholarships are for a good cause. "I feel the scholarships are a good way to put a person through school. The commitment is not that bad."

Lattimore said the scholarships are like a "contract between the recipient and the Army." The Army pays for the recipient's books, fees, tuition and any other miscellaneous expenses, along with \$100 per month spending money. The recipient in return agrees to devote some of his time to the Army once he has graduated.

Once a student has received an ROTC scholarship, Lattimore said the individual must enroll in the appropriate ROTC courses each semester and be in the top 50 percent in those courses. The student must also maintain the appropriate grade point average in his major as specified by the University.

What happens if a scholarship recipient fails to live up to his part of the contract? Lattimore says the individual is put on a probation program which lasts for one semester. After the probation period has ended, Lattimore said the student may or may not be readmitted to the ROTC program.

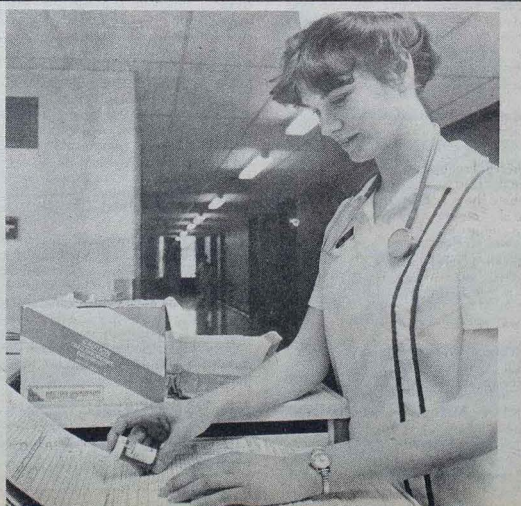
Nurse of the Year Senior gains state award

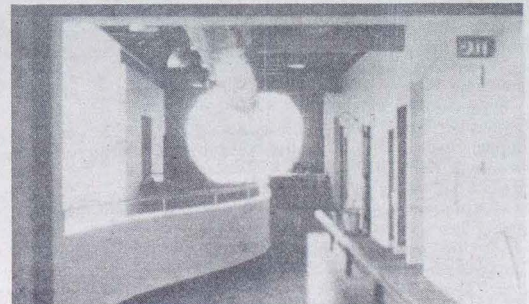
Addition to open soon

Although a tentative date for the opening of the Barnett Hall addition had been set for Feb. 1, a lack of furniture postponed the opening.

The \$1.6 million addition was necessary because "there's been such a growth in the program—and potential for growth—that the facility was not adequate to house it (the agriculture program)," Doug Winicker, campus planner, said.

The 19,000 square foot addition houses four laboratories, 18 faculty offices, a seminar room for 20 students and a large classroom which can be divided into four smaller areas.

Roland Nagel, head of the Division of Practical Arts, said the addition will be used mainly for agriculture students and may be expanded into other areas. "There are a lot of prospective students in the area of agriculture, and in a few years I think the number of students in this area will double," he

said. "Some courses may eventually be added in the area of practical arts, and so will the staff as need be."

Winicker said he was pleased with the construction of the addition. "We feel, overall, they've given us a real good building and we're really pleased," he said.

Construction of the addition began in the fall of 1981 by the Irvinbilt Construction

Company, with Ittner and Bowersox handling the architectural aspects. Both companies are located in Missouri.

The Industrial Education Building was recently renamed Barnett Hall in honor of Otho Barnett, a former head of the Division of Practical Arts.

Nagel said the addition will open when the remainder of the furniture arrives.

Couple tops law school class

The pressure of being No. 1 in law school could put a strain on any marriage.

It helps, though, when you're married to No. 3.

Such is the case with Jeff and Deanna (Apperson) Burns, fourth-year students at the University of Missouri-Columbia School of Law and 1978 NMSU graduates.

"The main thing is we both understand the pressures and tension involved," Deanna says. "A spouse who is not in law school may not understand the time it takes."

Jeff says, "I would just as soon be married to someone in law school because they understand why one is ignoring the other. On the other hand, it would be nice to have a dutiful housewife to have supper ready and to do all the housecleaning. That would be easier, but this way it's kind of exciting. . . it's like having the eel in the barrel of fish."

Consequently, Jeff doesn't mind taking turns fixing meals. After all, they both spend hours working on the Law Review, holding down part-time jobs and studying to maintain their top student status.

"There is a problem with competition, but we try to leave that at school," Deanna says.

Jeff agrees that "once you're there (at the top of the class), it's competitive."

The two are no strangers to competition. They first met as freshmen at NMSU when each ran for the Student Senate from opposing parties and won. The next year, they got to know each other better when Deanna, an English education and mass communication major, interviewed him for the 1976 Echo. Jeff's outspoken ideas on the NMSU administration, long hair and his own future caught Deanna's interest, and they became good friends. But they didn't start dating until the next year.

They both graduated summa cum laude in 1978, attending the first year of law school apart, and got married in May 1980.

"We didn't see much of each other the first year of law school because he went to St. Louis and I went to Columbia. We thought it would be better after we got married, but it's hectic," Deanna says.

She describes their daily schedule as studying, going to school, each teaching a class and eating dinner together. Then Jeff goes to the library to study and she studies at home. Under that heading, Jeff "Slim" Ridgway ('78) and Winston Vanderhoof ('79) took shots at almost anyone and anything they found humorous during their college career. Although Slim started it alone and Winston continued the strip after Slim graduated, the heyday of the cartoon strip was probably during the '77-'78 school year. A few of the "classics" from

that year are included with this article.

Their lives have taken separate turns since graduation, but the two cartoonists stay in touch. They also are still in the news. Vanderhoof recently received an Exceptional Achievement Award for a booklet, "Gifts to the Rare Book Room of Ellis Library," from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education. An entry by Ridgway was recently chosen as the 1983 promotional poster for the Kansas City Eye Bank.

Winston works as a graphic designer in the Publications and Alumni Communications Office for the University of Missouri-Columbia. His win-

ning entry this year won in the Special Events category of the CASE competition for its outstanding visual design.

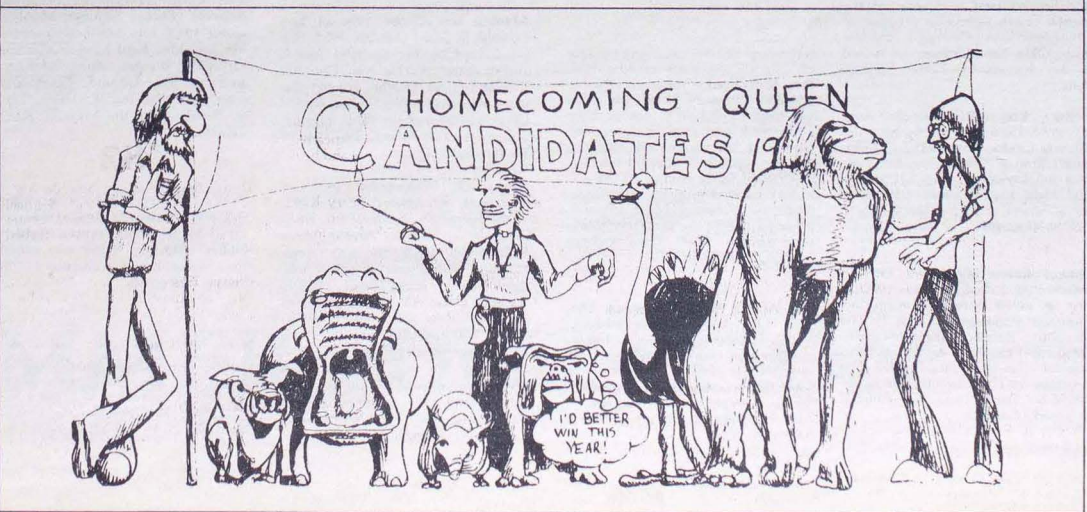
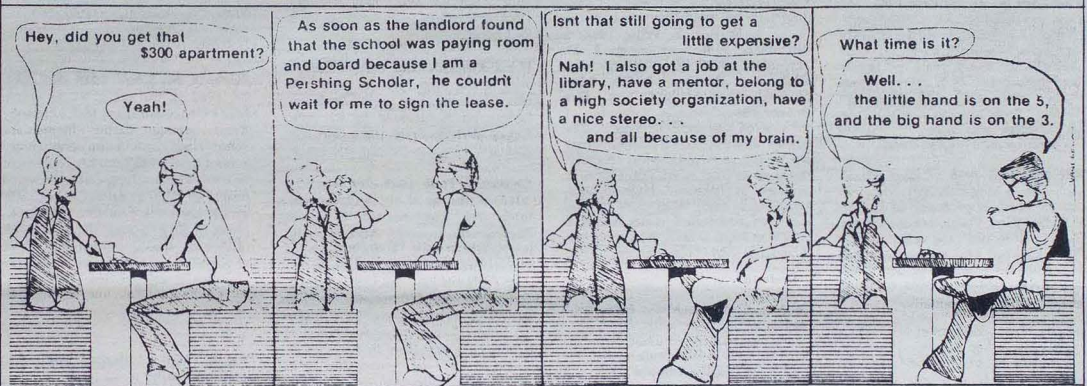
Slim is graphics coordinator for Research Medical Center in Kansas City. His poster was chosen from designs submitted by several Kansas City hospitals. It features a drawing of his 6-year-old daughter, Samantha, looking upwards with what Slim calls "great big, beautiful brown eyes." The drawing is the focal point of the poster's message, "The World is a Wonder to Behold—Give the Gift of Sight."

The poster will be used primarily in hospitals to encourage people to donate their eyes to the eye bank upon

death. Don Hudson, executive director of the eye bank, said, "We could not have commissioned any artist in the United States to do a better job of communicating what we wanted to say."

So, even though they may leave the obnoxious and distasteful side of themselves out of their current work, the two former cartoonists still know how to effectively communicate with their audience. And just because they don't often get the chance to show it, Winston says their wit is still important.

"I still try to be (obnoxious and distasteful). I try to spread it around—there's not enough of our kind of humor in the world."

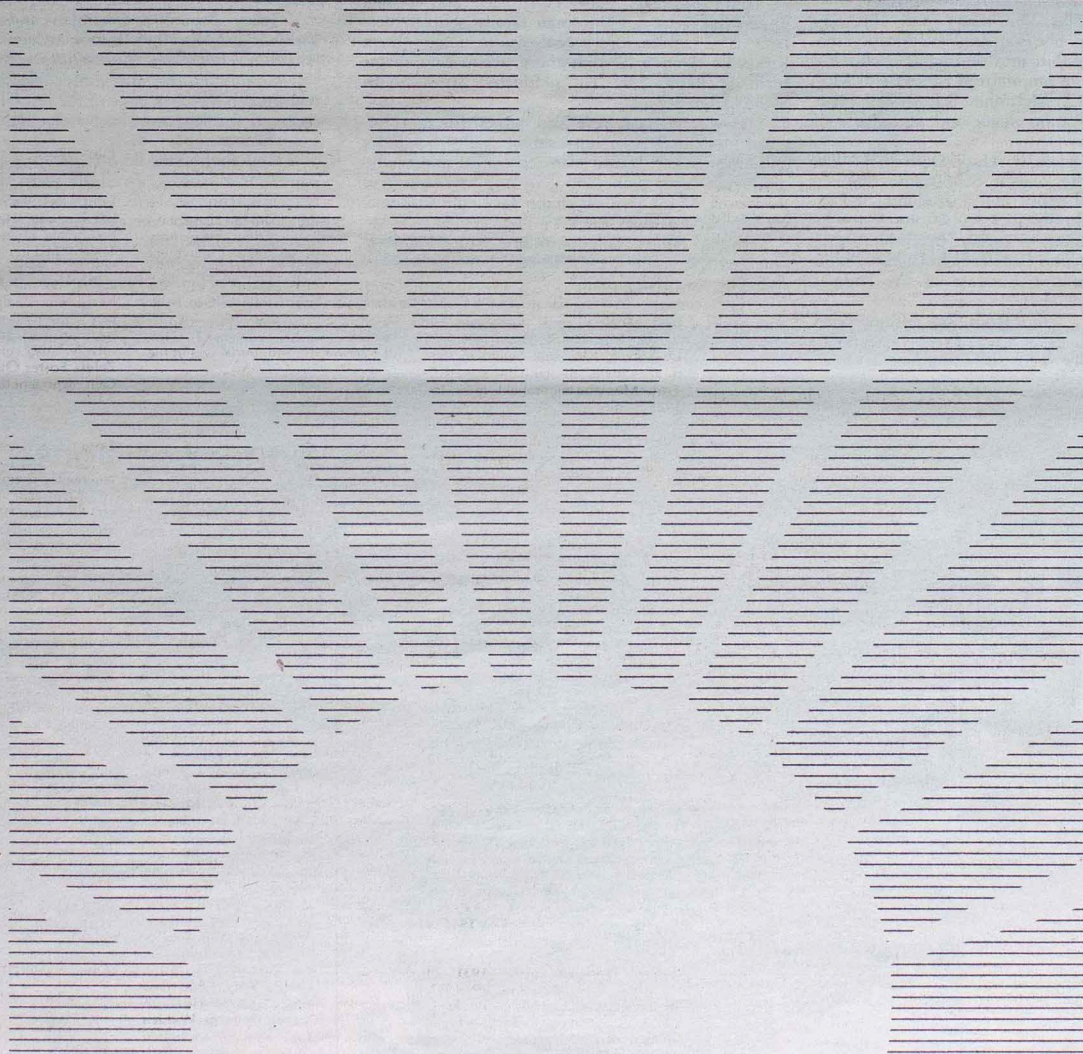

Johnny Latham, a sophomore law enforcement photography major, received the Kaylarian Scholarship. He attended high school in his hometown of Madison, Ill.

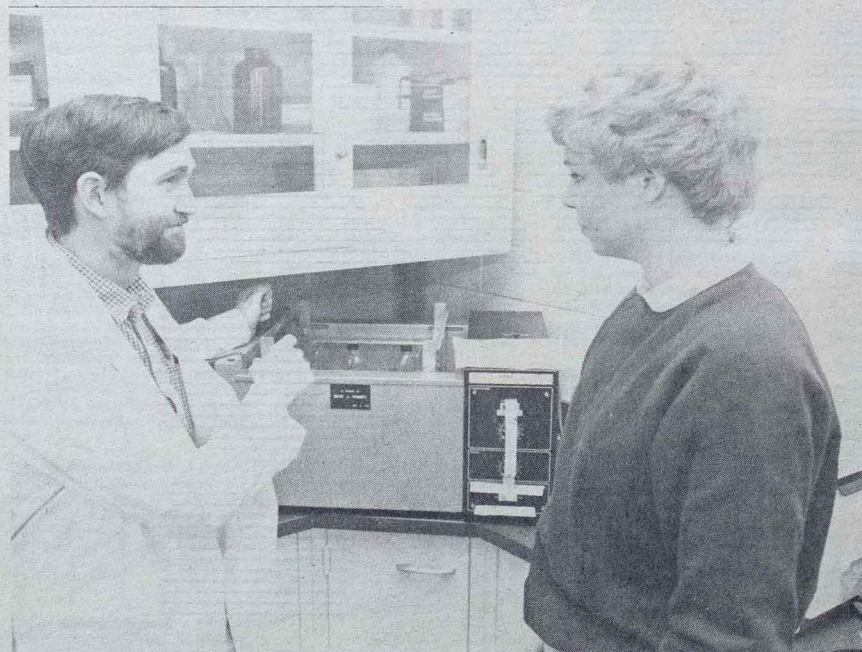
Tracy Bryan, a freshman and graduate of Kirkwood (Mo.) High School, received the Earl H. Laughlin Scholarship. She is a nursing major.

"The initials for the scholarship should be 'E.T.', she said. "Exceptional talent is what I wish to recognize with this scholarship."

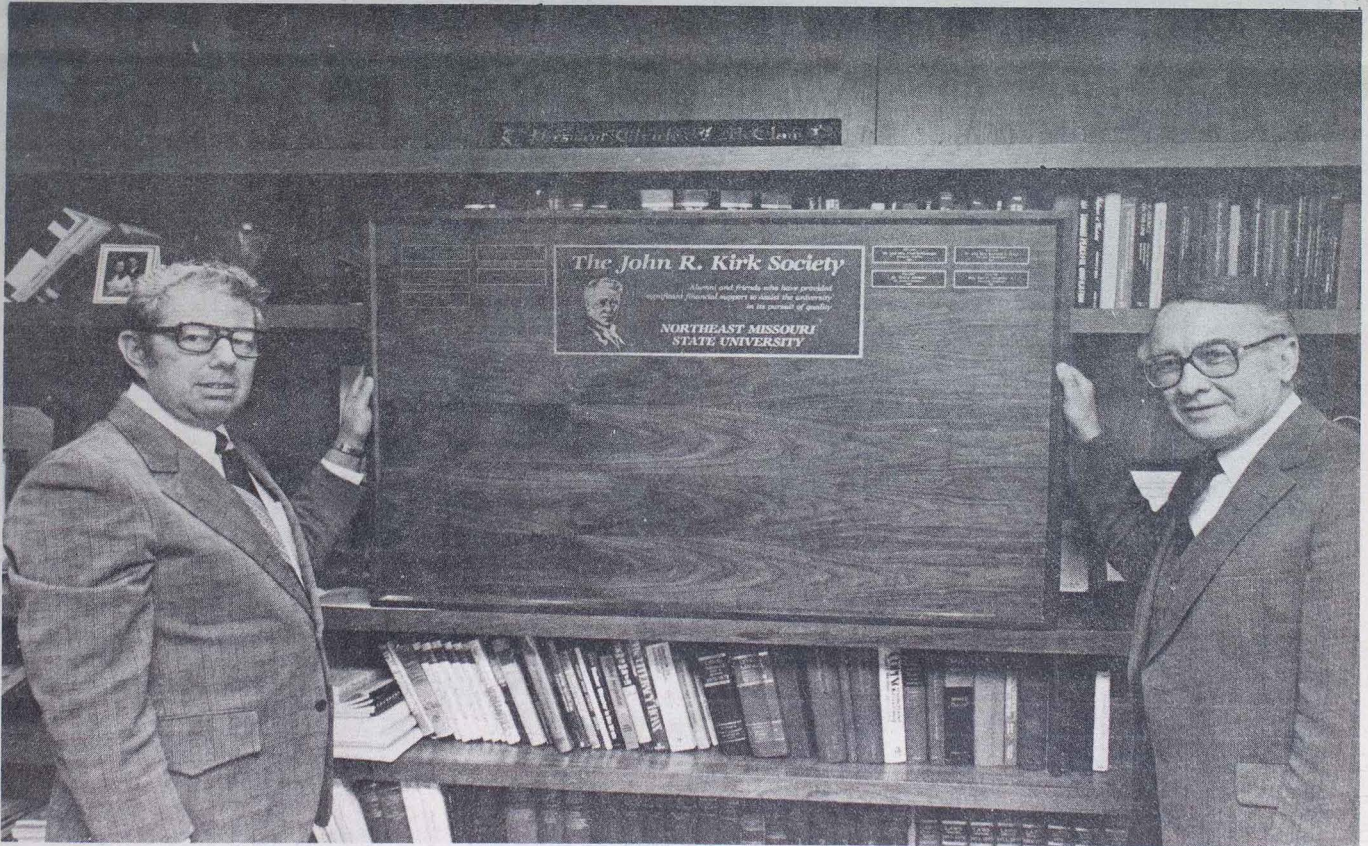

Last in a Northeast tradition

For senior Sherry Dwyer, summer commencement will be the end of the line—a long line of Dwyer sisters to graduate from NMSU, that is.

When the oldest Dwyer, Pam, graduated in 1969 she had no idea six sisters would follow in her footsteps. "I don't think Mom and Dad did either," Pam said.

Gene and Helen Dwyer did know 18 years ago, however, that Northeast seemed to be a good school for their first daughter to attend. "It was close and offered a quality education for the least money," Charles said. "Then they all liked it and followed suit."

For Pam, being the big sister meant the added responsibility of setting an example. "I felt like I had to graduate so I could prove they could make it," Pam, a physical education major, said.

Although the next three sisters, Jeanne (MA '71), Sandy ('72), and Karen ('73), also majored in P.E., they didn't suffer from any identity problems. "We each had our own ideas," Pam said.

They did, however, have several characteristics in common, said Larry Boleach, assistant professor of P.E. "They were friendly, outgoing, good athletes and good students," he said.

"They're kind of a tradition around here," Jack Bowen, assistant professor of P.E., said. He knows all seven of the Dwyer sisters because most of them worked for him in the Intramural Office. "They were good workers, helped each other and were a family," Bowen said.

All the Dwyer sisters participated in varsity or intramural athletics, but the last three are not as familiar to the faculty as their older sisters. Debbie ('76) was a special education major, Cynthia (MA '82) majored in speech pathology, and Sherry is an elementary education major. "My sisters told me to go by and see Mr. Boleach and Dr. (Ralph) Pink (P.E. professor) because they want to see what the last Dwyer girl looks like," Sherry said.

For Sherry, being "the last Dwyer girl" to attend NMSU makes her feel like an almost extinct species, particularly since there are no males to carry on the family name. (Mr. Dwyer's only brother had seven children—all girls.)

Still, Sherry is ready to graduate Aug. 12, get married Aug. 13 and then pursue a teaching career. Her five oldest sisters, Pam Muensterman, Jeanne Kirchoff, Sandy Sullivan, Karen Hull and Debbie Dawdy, are married and live in Missouri. Cynthia teaches in Spartanburg, S.C., where Gene and Helen moved three years ago.

Raised in the small town of Silex, Mo., near St. Louis, Helen said her daughters "gained a bigger outlook on life" when they left home to attend NMSU.

Besides that, they learned how to get along in close quarters when the first four lived in a trailer their parents purchased. Pam recalls the hectic weekend of a spring formal, when 10 girls were staying there. "Our dad and uncle came to work on the trailer that weekend—we had to watch ourselves," she said.

Besides such shared experiences, NMSU holds a lot of special memories for the Dwyer sisters. "I'll always remember the people I've met," Sherry said.

For Mr. and Mrs. Dwyer, the graduation of their youngest daughter makes them feel "proud."

"I imagine the people here in Spartanburg are getting tired of me bragging about the girls," Helen said.

Gene "suspects" some of his 10 grandchildren (yes, a few boys) will go to Northeast someday and keep up the family tradition. The names might not be Dwyer, but perhaps Sherry is not the end of the line after all.

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
