New Education Head Appointed



President Russell G. Warren has announced the appointment of Miles H. Lovelace as the head of the University's Division of Education. Lovelace, currently professor of education, will assume duties as Division head March 18.

Lovelace holds a doctorate in education administration from Harvard University, master's degrees from Harvard (education) and the University of Mississippi (history), and a bachelor's in history from Memphis State University, with minors in philosophy and geography. Prior to his appointment at Northeast in 1987, he served in several administrative and teaching positions in the United States and abroad.

His administrative experience includes serving as chair of a division of

academic affairs at Bunker Hill Community College in Boston, 12 years as superintendent of the Stavanger American School System in Stavanger, Norway, vice president and chief academic officer of Anatolia College in Thessaloniki, Greece, and headmaster of University School private college prep school in Birmingham, Ala.

Lovelace is listed in *Who is Who in Europe*, *Who is Who in the World*, *Who is Who of Intellectuals*, *Men of Achievement*, *Dictionary of International Biography*, *Who is Who in American Education* and *Who's Who in Educational Administration*.

Lovelace and his wife Nancy, who is an assistant professor of English at Northeast, reside in Kirksville.

CBHE Commends Northeast's Progress

The Missouri Coordinating Board for Higher Education (CBHE) praised Northeast at the Board's Feb. 8 meeting for the progress made toward the implementation of the University's mission as Missouri's liberal arts and sciences university.

Barbara Taylor of the CBHE staff made a statement summarizing Northeast's Third Year Update of the Institutional Plan. Following an enthusiastic report of Northeast's progress by Taylor, the

CBHE unanimously approved the recommendation of the CBHE staff: that Northeast Missouri State University be commended on "its progress toward its new mission as Missouri's public, state-wide liberal arts institution."

The CBHE approved Northeast's Five-Year Planning Document in April 1987. Each year, the University submits an update on its progress toward achieving the goals outlined in the planning document.
