**Voter registration** continues through 5 p.m., July 6 for citizens desiring to vote in the Aug. 2 primary election. Voters may register in the County Clerk's office at the Adair County Courthouse. It is only necessary to register to vote if you have not previously done so in Adair County.

**A summer workshop in adult basic education** will be offered July 18, 19 and 20. The one-credit course (ED 598) may be taken for either undergraduate or graduate credit. The course, which meets the continuing education requirements of the State Department of Education, will feature several specialists presenting topics around the workshop theme, Making ABE "Literate." Cost of the workshop is \$45. On-campus accommodations will be available. Classes will be conducted 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. on July 18 and 19, and 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. on July 20. His palette consists of various organic and manufactured materials, such as tree bark, plywood, photographs, acrylic paint, barbed wire and glass. Smith recently exhibited nine works in a group exhibition at the Art Museum of Southeast Texas in Beaumont.

**Thirty women are needed** to participate in a study which involves comparing the results from a standard weight loss diet to one with the same amount of calories and a higher level of protein. The study is being conducted by Dr. Leanna M. Hoffman-Francis, assistant professor

of family sciences. Hoffman-Francis is Board certified in nutrition. Participants should be women who need to lose at least 20 pounds and are either pre-menopausal or on estrogen replacement. The diet will last 12 weeks. There will be weekly checks and educational meetings and blood and urine tests will be checked monthly.
