POSITIONS ON THE STUDENT SENATE are open for the spring semester. A senior representative and a councilman are needed to fill two Senate vacancies. Applications are available in the Student Senate Office, Student Union Building, and are due by 5 p.m. Wednesday. Senior representative applicants must have completed 90 credit hours to qualify; councilman applicants must have completed 12 hours. All applicants must have a minimum 2.2 grade point average. Interviews will be arranged.
