GOV. BOND AND LT. GOV. PHELPS will be among the participants in the Governor's Conference on Education to be held June 23 on campus. The meeting is the fourth in a five-part series sponsored to provide citizen input into the Governor's Conference. It is being co-sponsored by the Kirksville-Adair County League of Women Voters.

The forum will begin at 7 p.m. in the Student Union with remarks by Gov. Bond. Immediately following, Dr. J. Alan Thomas, professor of Education Administration, University of Chicago, and Dr. Willard Abraham, chairperson, Department of Special Education, Arizona State University, will respond to the five issues the Governor's Conference is studying. Phelps is acting as chairperson of the Kirksville meeting.

Citizens will have an opportunity to participate in a discussion group of their choice on the issues of Accountability, Early Childhood and Parent Education, Educational Finance, Governance, and Vocational Education. Panelists for the discussion groups include University faculty Edwin Carpenter, Gilbert Kohlenberg, Robert Schnucker and Dale Schatz.
