Beast Fable Society Maintains Broad Appeal

The Beast Fable Society of America is an international organization of writers, scholars, critics, translators, teachers, and students; its founder, an NMSU faculty member and its international headquarters located at Northeast.

"I've had the idea for a long time. This past summer I went to Europe to attend the Reynardian Society [named after the fox in the beast epic]... I got a

pretty good idea of what I should do... it convinced me that I should start the Beast Fable Society," Ben Bennani, associate professor of English, said.

Bennani is the president and founder of the Society; however, the officers of the group come from universities around the country and the world. Some of the professors on the editorial

board include: Florence Ridley, UCLA; Susan Bassnett, University of Warwick-Coventry, England; Kenneth Varty, University of Glasgow-Scotland; Prof. Harano, University of Hiroshima; Beryl Rowland, University of Victoria-Canada; George Gopen, Duke University; Harriet Spiegel, Tufts University; and Earl Miner, Princeton.

blind review) which papers from the First International Beast Fable Congress will be published in the Society's annual journal *Bestia* as well as construct a constitution for the group. The deadline for papers (dealing with any aspect of the beast fable in all national literatures, languages and periods) is April 29.

Bennani is optimistic about the group's future. "I knew there was a need for it, but frankly I'm awed at the positive response," Bennani said. "... One large American university has already expressed interest in the Beast Fable Society and would like at least to co-sponsor it next year or in the future."

The Society is the only beast fable society in the world. Because of the Society's broad focus, all literature of all periods are covered, along with comparative studies. Present membership is approximately 50.

According to Bennani, there is a place for everyone in the society. A

20 annual membership fee provides members with *Bestia* and all travel privileges. The Congress will be held in a different world center each year.

This year's Congress will be held Aug. 2-9 in Agadir, the Kingdom of Morocco. For \$730, participants will receive round-trip air transportation from New York, week-long accommodations and two meals daily. The cost will also cover transfers and taxes.

Students can earn up to three credit hours by taking an independent undergraduate reading course (LL 409) in the beast fable this summer. The course was not included in the summer schedule. Those wishing to attend the Congress will receive special student rates.
