FRESHMAN ORIENTATION will kick off this summer when the Pershing Scholarship winners visit campus for orientation Friday. More than 1200 new students are expected for freshman orientation, which will last until June 29. The college freshmen will pre-register for fall classes, meet with instructors in their majors and visit campus facilities. Approximately 60 students are expected daily during the three weeks. The Gen. John J. Pershing Scholarship provides enrollment fees and residence hall room and board and is renewable for the sophomore, junior and senior years.
