SUMMER ENROLLMENT for the first summer session at the University amounts to 2,157 students. David Rector, assistant to the Dean of Instruction, says the total is a 2 percent increase over last year's figure of 2,112.

ORIENTATION AND PRE-REGISTRATION FOR TRANSFER STUDENTS will be Friday July 8 and Friday July 15 from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. in the Tangerine Room of the Student Union Building. Transfer students will have the opportunity to have previous college credits evaluated and to pull course cards for the Fall 1977 semester. Those students planning to attend may call the Admissions Office so that transcripts will be available for evaluation on pre-registration days.
