Codys Travel to China

Roger Cody, professor of music, and his wife, Marcalene, an elementary music teacher in the Kirksville public schools, will join a delegation of 20 American music educators in China this summer. The Codys were invited by the Committee for International Friendship, a government unit of the People's Republic of China, through the delegation leader, James Standifer, professor at the Univer-

sity of Michigan.

The U.S. sponsor of the delegation is the People-to-People organization, established by President Eisenhower in the 1950s. The primary mission of the delegation is to assist the Chinese in the study and preservation of the music of several minority populations in remote areas of the country.

The delegation will spend two days of orientation in Seattle,

beginning Aug. 11. They will fly to Beijing for two days of orientation and then begin a tour of China.

The actual study tour begins in the north-central region of Inner Mongolia and ends in the mountainous region in the south (near the Vietnamese border). After 18 days in China, the tour will end in Hong Kong. The Codys will return to Kirksville on Sept. 3.

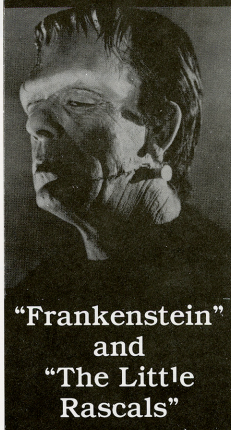
