The Northeast Missouri Midwest Regional 1988 Triathlon will be held at 8 a.m., Sept. 10 at Thousand Hills State Park. The course consists of a 3/4-mile swim, 18-mile bike ride and 5-mile run. Graduate students are able to study abroad for one academic year. The Institute of International Education through the ITT International Fellowship Program offers a program which allows a U.S. university graduate to study abroad. The Missouri London Program (MLP), a study abroad program, is accepting applications from students for the spring 1989 semester. Students can earn from 12-15 academic credits that can be used to satisfy their degree requirements at their respective universities. Courses for the spring semester will be offered in economics, history, political science, philosophy, management and English. The courses are taught in London by faculty from the Missouri universities that are members of the Missouri Consortium for International Studies. The cost of the program is approximately \$3,300 per student for 16 weeks. This cost does not include the student's regular tuition, registration fees at NMSU or round-trip airfare to London. Wrestling Program Reinstated

NMSU intercollegiate wrestling, which was terminated two years ago, will be reinstated during the 1988-89 academic year by the University. Sam Lesseig, athletic director, said the reason for reinstating the sport was the re-evaluation of the sports program and the interest in wrestling at the

collegiate level.

The new coach is Michael Knight. He is the head wrestling coach at Gainesville (Fla.) High School and was the Florida/USA junior director and national head wrestling coach for the 1987 national championships. Before the University dropped wrestling, the

Bulldogs had competed in the sport for 21 years. Between 1965-86, NMSU captured five Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association championships and produced three All-Americans. Nine meets have been scheduled for 1988-89.
