**Jim Barnes**, professor of comparative literature and editor of the *Chariton Review*, had the opening poem in his most recent volume of poetry, *La Plata Cantata*, featured in the spring issue of *The Missouri Review*. The poem, in three parts, is "Gill Netting the Beaver Pond." An essay by Barnes, "The Blacksmith Shop," appears in the first issue of *The Midnight Lamp*, a new literary magazine from Denver. The essay first appeared in the anthology *Heartlands: Photos and Essays From the Midwest*. The essay is scheduled to be reprinted in a journal in England called *Margin*.

**David Partenheimer**, assistant professor of English, presented a paper, "Henry Adams: The German Education," at the society for German American Studies in Chicago, April 29.

**Linda Scheffer**, a sophomore accounting major, has been awarded an Association of Government Accountants Scholarship. Scheffer is one of three national winners of the \$1,000 prize that includes an expense paid trip to the association's Personal Development Conference, June 25-29, in Los Angeles.

**Linda Twining**, associate professor of science, presented the results of a collaborative research endeavor with **Patricia Yu**, graduate student in biology, and **Donald Kangas**, professor of science, at the 41st meeting of the American Midwest Conference of Parasitologists on the campus of Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, June 2-3.

**David Williams**, assistant professor of speech communication, presented a paper titled, "Kenneth Burke's Philosophy of Rhetoric: Modern, Postmodern, and Beyond" at the 80th Annual Meeting of the Eastern Communication Association in Ocean City, Md., May 6.

**The NMSU Men's Golf Team**, coached by Bill Richerson, head of the division of health and exercise science, placed 14th in the NCAA Division II National Championships, May 23-26 in Erie, Penn. It was the fifth consecutive trip to the national championships for the MIAA Conference Champion Bulldogs.

Four NMSU students presented winning papers in the collegiate division of the

Missouri Academy of Science annual state competition, April 21-22, in Joplin, Mo. **Barbara Buelter**, a senior secondary education major, received first place in the biological sciences division for her paper titled "Effects of Grazing and Trampling on Shoot Proliferation in Western Ironweed." **David Huss**, a junior biology major, presented "Overwintering Longevity of *Vernonia baldwinii* Seeds," and received third place in the biological sciences division. Both students were sponsored by **Michael Kelrick**, assistant professor of biology. **Jason King**, a May 1989 graduate with a bachelor's degree in chemistry, received first place in the chemistry/geology division for his paper, "The Crystal and Molecular Structure of a Novel Cu(I) Complex." **Jay Allen**, a May 1989 graduate with a bachelor's degree in pre-med/chemistry, received third place in chemistry/geology for his paper, "The Crystal and Molecular Structure of the Organophosphorus Pesticide Azinphos Ethyl." **Russell Baughman**, associate professor of chemistry, sponsored King and Allen.

## Faculty and Student Grants

The Fulbright College Faculty Exchange Program offers grants in research and university lecturing abroad for professionals, retired faculty and independent scholars. The awards for 1990-91 include about 1,000 grants for periods ranging from three months to a full academic year. There are openings in more than 100 countries and, in many regions, the opportunity exists for multicountry research. The 1990-91 competition for Fulbright grants and other grants for graduate study abroad in academic fields or professional training in the creative and performing arts has officially opened. Fulbright grants are available for study or research. Travel grants are available to selected countries to supplement maintenance awards from other sources

that do not provide funds for international travel or to supplement the applicant's personal funds.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens at the time of application and hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent by the beginning date of the grant. Creative and performing artists are not required to have a bachelor's degree, but they must have four years of relevant training or study. All applicants are required to have sufficient proficiency in the language of the host country to carry out their proposed study or research.

Currently enrolled students who are interested in the programs should contact Terry Smith, Dean of the Colleges, A/H 204, for brochures, application forms and further information. The deadline for the receipt of applications is Oct. 2, 1989. Both Fulbright Full and Travel Grant applications will be reviewed on campus prior to being forwarded for the Oct. 31, 1989 deadline.
