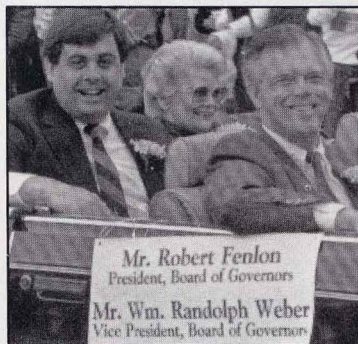
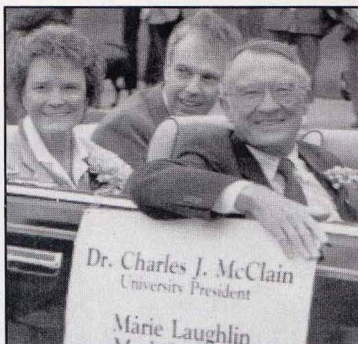
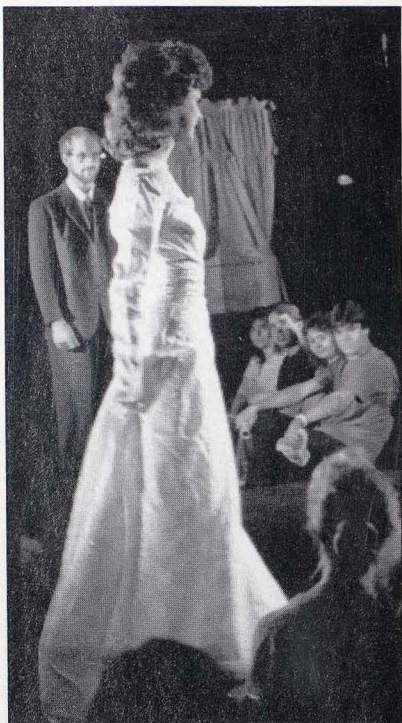

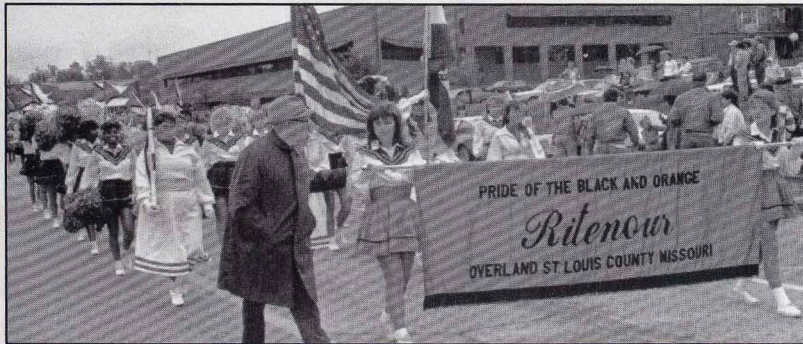

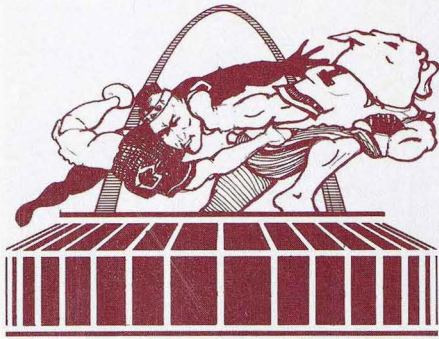

“... grasp the opportunity when it arises.”

The Amedco head office in Chesterfield, Mo., is buzzing with a typical day's activity, and B.D. "Bud" Hunter ('50), whom I have come to see, is still in a meeting. The brief wait gives me the opportunity to scan the fascinating figures in the Service Corporation International (SCI) 1986 annual report lying on the coffee table. It wasn't a bad year.

For many of us, corporate mergers and acquisitions involving millions of dollars are items we skim over in the business section of the newspaper. For Bud Hunter, they're all in a day's work.

In 1969, Hunter founded Amedco Inc., which became a multi-million-dollar-a-year producer of funeral supplies, healthcare and steel products. In 1985, 13 years after Hunter took his company public, Amedco's funeral supply division merged with Service Corporation International in Houston, one of the largest funeral suppliers in the country. The \$131 million merger left Hunter SCI's second largest shareholder and vice chairman of the corporation. In a separate transaction, Hunter acquired the remaining Amedco divisions, healthcare and steel, to add to the growing list of private companies which comprise his private enterprise, Huntco Inc.

Hunter's mergers and acquisitions may seem confusing, but he's not at all confused.

"I always had a philosophy that it would be nice to become financially independent. You find that once you achieve that, that's not really the reason you probably get into business," Hunter said.

Why does he do it? Hunter thrives on a sense of accomplishment and the fun of business, and he has accomplished much indeed.

B.D. Hunter was born on a farm in now non-existent Wilsontown, Mo., not far from Kirksville. Hunter earned his degree in physical education while holding down several jobs in Kirksville. Those jobs were supposed to be part time, but he worked an average of 48 hours per week.

"I felt that a college degree was important but I thought I'd learn more through the different businesses that I worked for," Hunter said.

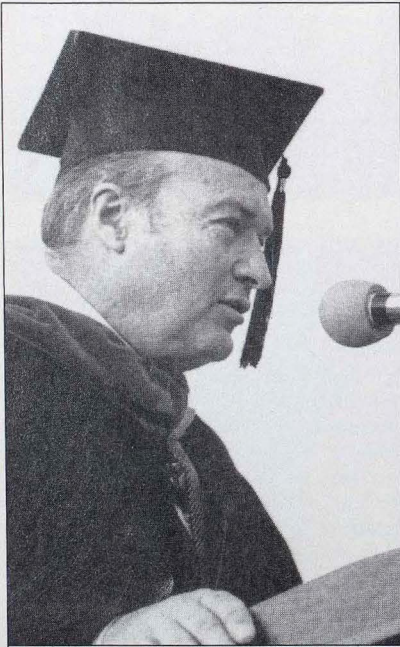
Indeed, he did. He worked for a grocery store and a printing company that both went bankrupt, and pumped gas at a station run by a man who owned several failing businesses.

"It was interesting watching why (the businesses failed)," Hunter said. "I learned what not to do and what to do."

But Hunter had one job in Kirksville with a business that didn't fail—J.C. Penney.

"I met the manager (while) pumping gas at the local station, working my way through school. He liked the way I cleaned the windshield, pumped the gas, checked the tires and all that, and he gave me a job with flexible hours while I finished college. At the same time, I learned something of the Penney Co., and upon graduation, (he) had a full-time job for me. He kind of took me under his wing to train me," Hunter said.

Hunter's managerial education was interrupted by the Korean War, but the parameters of his worldly education would expand when he left Kirksville for Scott Air Force Base in Belleville, Ill. Only 350-450 cadets were being accepted for training every three months, and with a backlog of 30,000 applicants at Scott AFB, Hunter's competition was keen. To become a cadet, applicants had to undergo a written exam and a personal interview. Although Hunter thinks he performed fairly well on the exam, he believes he earned an exceptional score for his interview.

"This particular colonel (who interviewed Hunter) said he was going to retire. He was studying the Penney Co., management; he was going to do some management consulting. So, I scored unusually high," Hunter said.

Hunter graduated in the class of 1951 and remained in the Air Force for slightly less than five years. His last tour of duty brought him to Springfield, Ill., which is still "home" to Hunter. There, he went to work for a small company which he later acquired. It was that company that Hunter built up into a management consulting organization for funeral homes throughout the United States and in many foreign countries. One of his many clients was R. L. Waltrip, owner of SCI. After helping Waltrip set up his retail funeral-supply business, Hunter founded his own company, Amedco, which took the wholesale market in funeral supplies.

Throughout the 17 years Hunter headed up Amedco, the company evolved. Since Amedco manufactured metal caskets, Hunter formed a service center, a second business, through which he could purchase steel at a more competitive price. As the country's population began aging, Hunter formed a third business focused on healthcare products needed for the growing nursing-home and homecare industry.

The Amedco-SCI merger has created a funeral-supply giant. The two companies acquired by Huntco, on the other hand, have created a challenge. Hunter bought the healthcare and steel operations for \$38 million in cash and debt plus \$27 million in assumed liabilities. He knows he will have to put his business genius into fourth gear to turn this latest acquisition into a profitable one. Starting over consumes a lot of time and energy, but Hunter obviously possesses the energy and knows how to make the time.

"I keep thinking that I'll take it easy one of these days, but one of these days never seems to arrive," he said. "It's (business) fun, and you don't get tired of having fun."

Hunter usually begins his week at SCI by flying himself to Houston via corporate jet, followed by a few days in St. Louis (still headquarters of Amedco), followed by a weekend in Springfield spent running the other companies of Huntco. His miscellaneous endeavors include interests in a nursing home chain, Illinois Savings Bank in Peoria (of which he is chairman and 25 percent owner), radio stations, several aircraft, restaurants, commercial real estate and more than 7,000 acres of Missouri and Iowa farmland.

Success in business is what Bud Hunter has been about for years. But does it ever get easier?

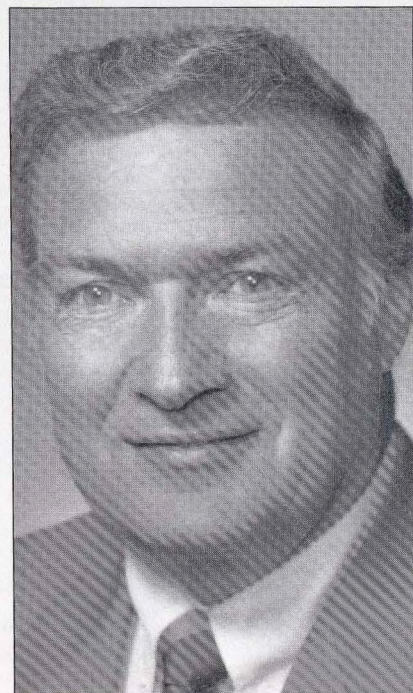
"I still think that probably . . . success in any endeavor, whether it be in business or a profession, is represented by 90 percent perspiration and 10 percent inspiration. . . . And the ones that are willing to put in the extra hours and go the extra mile are the ones who will definitely be promoted or be more successful in whatever field they go into. That hasn't changed a bit over the years," Hunter said.

It seems an odd coincidence that Bud Hunter worked at the station where the Kirksville J.C. Penney manager bought his gas. And that the interviewing colonel at Scott AFB had been studying the Penney Co., management. And that his last tour of duty found him in Springfield, Ill., where he acquired his first company. But Hunter wouldn't call it luck. He would call it a continual string of seized opportunities.

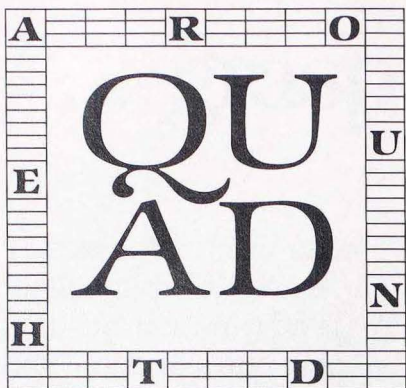

After Amedco's success, Bud Hunter is ready to start over—just for the fun of it.



MAY IN Value added truly gained an international flavor in May when President Charles McClain and Dean of

Instruction Darrell Krueger presented a paper before the international convention of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (I'OCDE) in Paris. Following a nationwide poll of educators, the OCDE chose NMSU and the University of Tennessee-Knoxville to participate, along with educators from England, Switzerland, France, Germany and the Netherlands. A few months later, a French magazine, *Le Monde*, featured an article, "Les universites au microscope" (Universities by Microscope), in which NMSU's value-added model was cited:

Northeast Missouri State University has developed a very sophisticated system of 'Value-Added Evaluation' which seeks to determine what the total individual gained in the course of his or her stay at the university, as well as progress in knowledge, ability to analyze, aptitudes, moral sense, general culture and other qualities. This "greater" staff is measured by a series of questionnaires administered to students at the principal stages of their education. Combined with tests on the disciplines themselves and with studies among members of professional environments, this group of data allows each department of the university an image of its efficiency. These evaluations are very useful in budgetary negotiations with the State of Missouri, which does not hesitate to award additional monies to departments with the greatest performance or those who make the

greatest effort to improve results.

LAUGHLIN President Charles McClain transplanted a vine of Boston ivy from Laughlin Hall in a ceremony, Aug. 1, on the NMSU campus.

The vine was taken from the now-demolished Laughlin Hall to be potted and stored until it can be replanted following the completion of the Pickler Library addition.

In his comments during the ceremony, McClain told those in attendance about an old rumor that Northeast students transplanted the ivy on Laughlin from the Harvard University campus.

"I don't know whether the story is true or false, but the idea is certainly appropriate at this time in our University's long history," McClain said.

The ceremonial transplant was symbolic of Northeast's new mission as the statewide public liberal arts and sciences university.

"Ivy has long been a symbol of academia; its name used in the early 1900s when the Ivy League schools gathered to discuss athletic, and later, academic concerns. There are two main characteristics of the Eastern Ivies—a long history and selective admission standards. Northeast Missouri State University shares these traits," McClain said.

lecture during his eighth visit to the University with an animated-film clip made for his voice. Besides the cartoon, the 75-year-old lectured on clips from some of his old movies.

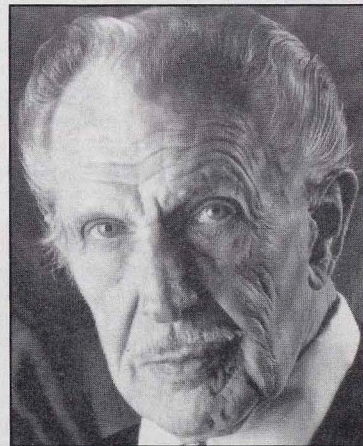
Movies and cartoons are all part of Price's life and love of the arts. Price said education in the arts is the only appropriate education. That's why he keeps coming back to Northeast.

The actor currently is working in Maine on a new movie. He plays the "juvenile role" alongside Lillian Gish and Bette Davis in "The Whales of August."

Will he return to Northeast for a ninth visit? "Give me a break," he said. "I'm just trying to make it to (age) 76."

"We realize that parents are vitally important to and vitally interested in the education process," she said.

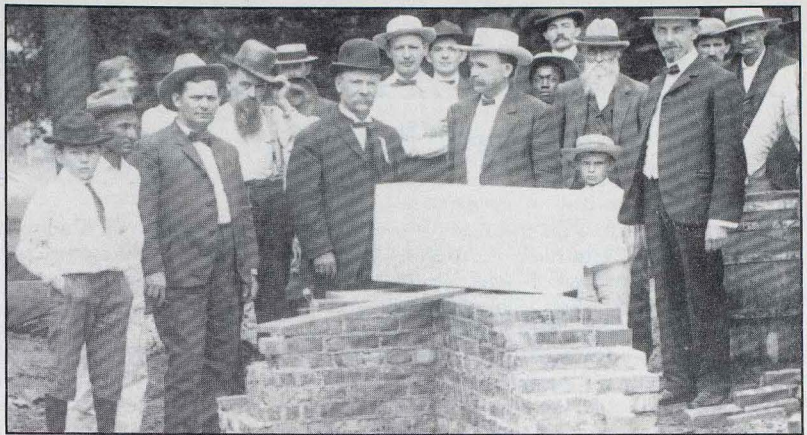
More than 5,000 parents, relatives and students registered for this year's event. It was the largest crowd NMSU has seen for the 35 years it has held Parents Day.

"They hear a great deal about NMSU through publicity. Parents Day is their chance to check out the campus," he said.

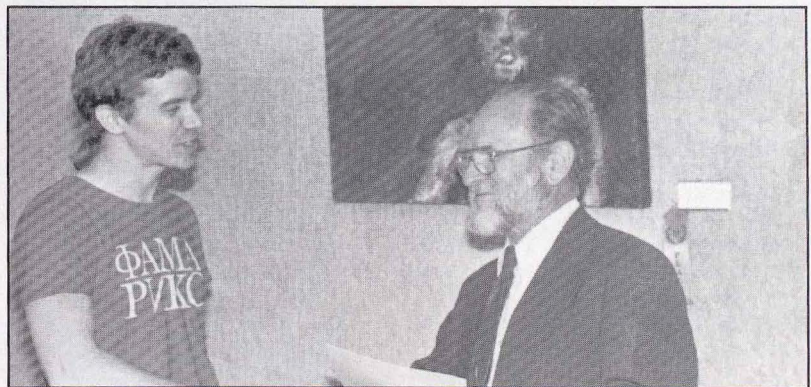

Dry Rush Taps Fraternities for New Activities

The layer of dust on the fraternity beer cooler marked a new beginning. For NMSU fraternities, the 1986 fall rush season was "dry."

The University's non-alcoholic or dry-rush policy was introduced during the spring 1986 semester. A partial non-alcoholic rush was first; alcohol could be served, but only on specified dates. While chapter rush chairmen worried about low rushee turnouts, future pledges were looking for the dotted line.

According to the NMSU Interfraternity Council (IFC), overall pledge numbers increased from 99 during spring 1985 to 112 during the partially dry spring of 1986.

Pledges of Delta Chi fraternity, for example, increased dramatically, from five pledges in spring 1985 to 17 in spring 1986.

With the initial stage of the program over, fall 1986 introduced a complete non-alcoholic rush. The policy prohibited the serving of alcohol by any University-chartered organization at any function where potential members might be present.

Without alcohol, fraternities had to find other ways to attract potential members. Phi Kappa Theta served non-alcoholic beer at their annual band night, and Pi Kappa Phi held a pinball and video night. With these examples of non-alcoholic rush, almost all of the fraternities tried new ideas.

"We had barbecues, football games and TV nights. We tried a lot of different things," Roger Cooper, Phi Lambda Chi member, said.

With new activities attracting potential members, the number of rush cards given out increased from 240 last fall to 269 this fall. Still, according to the IFC, the number of men who pledged dropped from 180 last fall to 137 this fall. Fraternities have not determined whether or not the drop was caused by dry rush.

"On a national scale, the number of guys going through dry

rush is supposed to go down, and the number of guys pledging is supposed to go up. With NMSU, it was the reverse," Robert Norton, IFC assistant adviser, said.

Terry Smith, dean of students, said the pledge reduction might be attributed to academic decisions.

"I think more of our freshmen are choosing to defer this major time-involvement decision until they get a better feel for how much work is going to be required to achieve their academic goals," Smith said.

Dry rush has its supporters, but it also has opposition. The main opposition comes from fraternity members of legal drinking age who feel the policy is an infringement on their personal rights.

"If I'm 21 years old and I can't go to my home, which happens to be a fraternity house, and drink a beer, something is wrong," said one fraternity member who chose to remain anonymous.

Smith says the age principle is not a product of dry rush.

"It's the same argument we receive from people over the legal drinking age that live in residence halls. If we wanted to take it to extremities. . . we could require fraternities to card people at all the parties. It's just for those two weeks during the year, we are telling them that they can't drink during those hours at that place," Smith said.

Despite the problems, the reaction to dry rush has been mostly positive. And, regardless of the opposition, it will probably be the way of the future for NMSU fraternities.

"I don't think there is any question. The dry rush will continue," Smith said.

So, for at least the first three weeks of school each semester, the dust on the fraternity beer cooler will remain.

NMSU publishing opportunities

An English translation of a German mathematics text, a biography of a relatively obscure musical composer, a text on nursing in the home. . . . You won't find these on any best-seller list, but they are necessary publications in communicating research findings and specific areas of knowledge.

Because specialized scholarly works, or monographs, don't produce large profits like best sellers, academicians are often hard-pressed to find publishers to accept their scholarly works. The American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), University Publishers Association and Northeast are trying to change that.

Northeast has established University Press Associates to help alleviate the publishing problems of its faculty, staff and alumni.

University Press Associates is part of University Publishers Association of Lanham, Md. Through this connection, NMSU gets all the advantages of a university press—recognition for the University and faculty through publishing—without the usual costs. The University provides the camera-ready copy, and University Publishers Association carries the printing, marketing and distribution costs. University Publishers and AASCU contracted in an effort to provide a university press for all AASCU members who often can't afford presses or don't want to be encumbered with an in-house operation.

Under the direction of Robert Schnucker, professor of history and religion, the Press will publish music, books, plays and some poetry. Published works will bear the imprint of the University and will be copyrighted under Northeast's name.

Stephen Pollard, assistant professor of philosophy, credits the new press for the publication of *Das Kontinuum*, a world-renowned German mathematics and physical science text he co-translated.

"It is doubtful that I could have published this work anyplace else for financial reasons. The University Press can make the small printing run that's necessary and not look for the profits," Pollard said.

Northeast uses a double-blind peer review system after a manuscript has been accepted. An editorial board does the internal screening then sends the manuscripts to two experts in the field for review. The experts will not know the author's name and vice versa. Only after both experts approve the work will University Press publish it. If they disagree, a third expert will be consulted.

University Press will have to accept six manuscripts per year in an agreement with University Publishers. Schnucker said they should have that many contracts by the second year of operation.

"It is fortunate that AASCU started this arrangement . . . at this time in Northeast's history. As a liberal arts and sciences institution, it is important for us to emphasize faculty scholarship," Darrell Krueger, dean of instruction, said.

Golden Olympian returns to NMSU

Billy Mills “won his Olympic gold medal in a pair of borrowed shoes,” as Robby Benson puts it in the movie “Running Brave.” It was alumnus **George Wilson ('36)** who helped Mills find those shoes.

“Billy came to me the day before his Olympic meet and he said his shoes were old, and he needed a different pair to run in. I went around and . . . borrowed a pair from one of the other athletes,” Wilson said.

Seventy-five-year-old Wilson has done much

more for the Olympics and modern athletes than just find shoes. He was the behind-the-scenes runner for the Olympics for many years. Wilson is to managing sports events what Mills was to winning them. Some of Wilson's most significant accomplishments:

- ★ Manager of the U.S. Olympic track and field team in the 1964 Olympic games in Tokyo. Head manager of track and field in the 1972 games in Munich, Germany.
- ★ Organized the certification and supervision of athletic officials for the first time in the United States.
- ★ Former president of the United States Modern Pentathlon and Biathlon Association. Developed the handicapped start for the pentathlon to get quicker official times—used for unofficial time in the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics.

- ★ Developed amateur-boxing headgear for the Army that is now used across the United States.
- ★ Through the U.S. Army, worked with and developed Olympic gold medalists like Mel Pinder, Ross Wales, Jay Silvester and Fred Newhouse.

Wilson said his success goes back to his college football days.

He was guard No. 62 back in the early 1930s when Northeast was setting a record of 27 consecutive wins under coaches Don and Fred

Faurot. Wilson said he never played in a losing game for the Bulldogs. Fifty years since graduation, Wilson is still setting records. His philosophy on football is his philosophy on life.

“You must have the fundamentals of the game down, only then will you know how to cope in the situations you're put in, only then can you move forward with force,” he said.

Wilson said he does his homework when he wants something. He tells of his efforts to establish track and field clinics in the U.S. Olympics to attract top-notch athletes nationwide to the national sport. The Olympic Development Committee originally turned down his request for \$8,000 to fund the clinics.

“I went back and did my homework and surveyed the results of the last four years of competition that showed where we were declining. I developed the clinic program and

presented it at the next Olympic Board Meeting. I got \$230,000. That was the start of the entire Olympic Development Program."

That is how Wilson's persistence has paid off over the years and how changes he institutes often catch on elsewhere. Wilson has even made an impact overseas. He spent 11 years in Germany, first as an administrator for the U.S. Army at the Athletic Staff School in Stuttgart, then as athletic adviser until he became deputy chief of the Athletic Branch at the Army headquarters there.

The handicapped start he developed for the pentathlon is being used by Italy, Germany, England and Korea. Wilson is now working on the time clock for the 1988 Olympic games to be held in Seoul, Korea.

The 75-year-old calls for a return to the old virtues of maximum physical fitness, concentration and hard work in athletics.

"In college during our winning years, we were high. And that was the best high of all. No drugs, no steroids, no crutches that are harmful in the long run. We were high on success," he said.

Wilson's success is still high. He is currently on the Olympic committee representing modern pentathlon and biathlon. He is involved in the reorganization of the Junior Olympics, and he represents the initial union of the Modern Pentathlon and Biathlon Association as an intermediary to work out timing requirements. Korea has asked him to the pre-Olympic and Olympic games to train officials. Wilson is also still on the Olympic men's track and field committee.

Originally from Milan, Mo., Wilson now lives in Falls Church, Va. His eldest son, **George ('66)**, also played football for Northeast. He now works for McDonnell Douglas in St. Louis. His daughter, Charlotte Koger, trains special-education teachers in Michigan; son, John, has a civil engineering consulting firm in Orlando, Fla.; and his youngest son, Scott, is a civil engineer in New Jersey. Wilson married Northeast graduate **Nadine Bondurant ('36)**.

He said he's proud of his Northeast education. "This University is an example of one of the greatest developments of education in this country."

He describes the University as "an institutor of change," "ahead of the times," and "strong and goal-oriented"—the 1936 NMSU graduate could be describing himself.

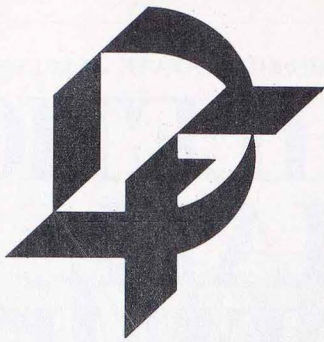

NMSU opened its seventh year of active fund raising July 1 with a Development Fund balance exceeding \$1.7 million. Goals for the upcoming year include adding \$300,000 in cash gifts to the Fund and achieving a list of 6,500 contributors by the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1987. The number of contributors represents 23 percent of all NMSU alumni.

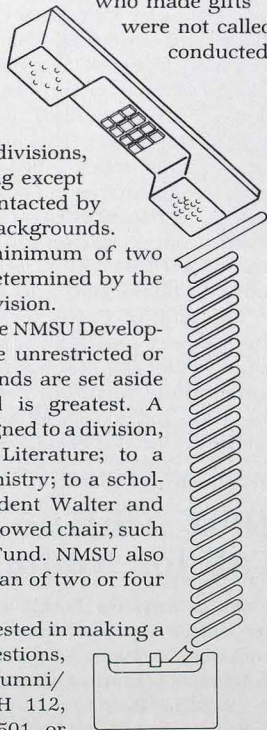
One of the major activities for the NMSU Development Fund is the annual Tel-Alumni Campaign. Previously this phonathon was held in the fall, but was moved to February this year. Student and faculty volunteers called alumni from Feb. 1-26, in an attempt to contact more than 12,000 people. The campaign pledge goal was \$92,000, a \$2,000 increase over the previous year.

According to David Clithero of the Alumni/Development Office, Tel-Alumni was scheduled later to allow more time for NMSU alumni and friends to respond to Development Fund mailings from Vincent Price. Those individuals who made gifts prior to Jan. 30, 1987, were not called.

Tel-Alumni was conducted each evening, Sunday through Thursday, from 6:30 to 9:15 p.m. Calls were made by academic divisions, with all areas participating except Nursing. Alumni were contacted by volunteers with similar backgrounds. Each division called a minimum of two nights. Scheduling was determined by the number of alumni per division.

As in the past, gifts to the NMSU Development Fund may be made unrestricted or restricted. Unrestricted funds are set aside for use where the need is greatest. A restricted gift may be assigned to a division, such as Language and Literature; to a department, such as chemistry; to a scholarship, such as the President Walter and Maurine Ryle; or to an endowed chair, such as the Eugene Croarkin Fund. NMSU also offers a gift installment plan of two or four annual payments.

Endowment Fund Comparisons

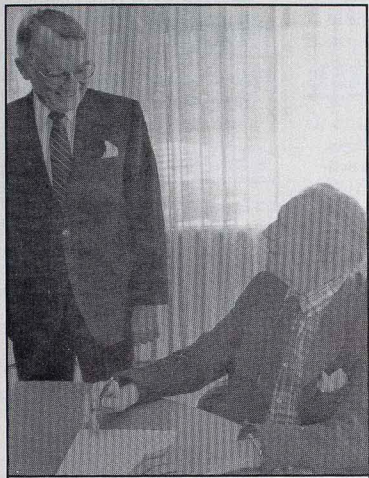

Mayfield was a graduate of Macon High School, NMSU ('27) and the Teachers College of Columbia University in New York City. Mayfield was the dean of the Southern College of Fine Arts in Houston and taught at Southeast (Louisiana) University, the University of Kentucky, Greensboro (North Carolina) College, University of Richmond (Virginia) and Hannibal-LaGrange College in Hannibal, Mo. She spent the last several years of her life as a music educator in Macon.

Mayfield studied voice at the Juilliard School of Music, Conducting of Sacred Music at Union Theological Seminary, the Chicago Conservatory of Music and with Phradie Wells of the Metropolitan Opera. As a member of the New York Oratorio Society, Mayfield sang in the “Messiah” with the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra in Carnegie Hall. She was listed in the first edition of “Who’s Who of American Women” and “Who’s Who of Music in America,” in addition to five other Who’s Who publications. She was an honorary life member in the National Association of Teachers of Singing and an award winner of the National Federation of Music Clubs (NFMC).

Mayfield was a member of Alpha Sigma Alpha social sorority and an honorary member of Sigma Alpha Iota national music sorority. She founded the Macon Music Club of the NFMC and was a member of the First Baptist Church of Macon for more than 50 years.

Wilbur (’28) and Foreste Kimbley have established a second scholarship at NMSU, the **Foreste Ross Kimbley Scholarship**. The new award will help fund the education of a pre-medicine or pre-veterinary science major. The Kimbleys established the **Wilbur Kimbley Scholarship** in 1982. The Kimbleys live in Leavenworth, Kan.

Aileen Corbin of Kirksville died, Aug. 20, at the Kirksville Osteopathic Medical Center. She was the wife of former NMSU professor William Corbin. Upon his retirement in 1983, Mr. Corbin established the **Aileen F. Corbin Pi Kappa Delta Award**. The scholarship is awarded annually to an active member of Pi Kappa Delta who is also an active participant in forensics.

Northeast's accounting program achieved national ranking on the Certified Public Accounting Exam three times in the past four years. A high percentage of graduates in accounting from the University pass all parts of the exam the first time.

The increased recognition of the quality of the accounting program led to changing the name of the division. The Division of Business is now the Division of Business and Accountancy.

"The primary reason for the name selection is because the accounting program has grown to become one of two major programs available in the division," Robert Dager, head of the division, said.

The name change also reflects the programs under the new mission, he said.

"The liberal arts and sciences core has increased to where liberal arts and sciences will be 60 percent of the degree," Dager said.

Specific curriculum changes are: business administration majors are required to take a foreign language; business and accounting majors must take nine hours of economics and a calculus course; and the admissions standards are tougher for getting into junior-level courses in accounting and business administration.

William McClelland, program director of Communication Disorders, suggested the change more than one year ago.

"Communication is much more representative of what our field is about because the title includes all aspects of speech, language and the ability to hear," McClelland said.

FAMILY SCIENCES

UPDATE

The Division of Home Economics is now the Division of Family Sciences at NMSU. The change marks one of the effects of Northeast's new mission as the statewide public liberal arts and sciences university.

A curriculum change accompanies the name change. More liberal arts and sciences courses are now required, intensifying the core curriculum. The total number of family-science courses has been reduced almost 25 percent, resulting in intense study of those courses and reduced redundancy. The division believes the larger liberal arts base gives students the resiliency to succeed in any field they enter after college.

"I guess I like to call it family arts and sciences," Lois Korslund, head of the division, said.

Students can now receive a bachelor of arts degree as well as the bachelor of science. The division is also offering honors courses for the first time. Korslund said the name change better describes these changes as well as the broader liberal-arts base. The Division of Family Sciences, she said, will tackle more complex issues of the family in its social and cultural setting.

"Other programs, even on the land grant, regional and private Missouri university levels, have fewer general education programs than we do," she said.

Korslund also believes the original name was equated to home economics on the high school level. Family Sciences connotes a more serious study, she said. This change belongs to a growing trend among universities nationwide to move away from the phrase, home economics.

The only problem with the name change is recognition. "It's extremely important that some key words are used in the admissions materials so students know who we are," Korslund said.

UPDATE

The Edwin Mellen Press of Lewiston, N.Y., calls *Moritz Hauptmann of Leipzig* one of the most brilliant works they've accepted this year.

The biography of a famous 19th-century German music theorist is the result of a three-year effort by the head of the Division of Fine Arts at Northeast, Dale Jorgenson. It is the first definitive biography of the theorist who was also a music teacher and composer.

"It is a biography of a very interesting man who lived during an exciting period. His observations on everything from musical theory to aesthetics and politics . . . are very worth listening to as an index to the period," Jorgenson explained.

H. Richardson of The Edwin Mellen Press said Jorgenson is very worth listening to.

"Not only is Jorgenson a well-trained scholar, he also has an extraordinary cultural breadth with the ability to illuminate with richness. He gives essential perspective and balance to the piece. Finally, he writes brilliantly," Richardson said.

Jorgenson became interested in Hauptmann while working on his doctoral dissertation. Hauptmann was cantor of St. Thomas School in Leipzig (a position Johann Sebastian Bach once held), leader of the society that gathered and published a complete edition of Bach's music and a music teacher under Felix Mendelssohn at a Leipzig conservatory. Trained to be an architect, Hauptmann brought a strong conservative emphasis on form and structure to his ideas on music, the visual arts, literature and life.

This is Jorgenson's first major book. He collected information through the Library of Congress, the music library at Indiana University and Pickler Memorial Library. Jorgenson made a two-month sabbatical to Leipzig, Germany, during the summer of 1984, where he visited the Karl Marx University and the St. Thomas School.

"I probably have the best Hauptmann library in the U.S.," Jorgenson said.

University support made the book possible.

"The University did the preparation of the manuscript. There was the sabbatical and encouragement, especially from Dean (of Instruction Darrell) Krueger, who suggested I not only write an article but a book. My colleagues in Fine Arts also read some of the manuscript and critiqued it," Jorgenson said.

Moritz Hauptmann of Leipzig has been available since December 1986. Jorgenson said the book will mostly be used by advanced scholars and graduate students.

"Perhaps, this book will be of larger interest. Our readers were certainly impressed," Richardson said.
