AN EVENING OF COMMUNICATION will be presented by the Society for the Development of Human Potential Wednesday from 5:30-6:30 p.m. in the Georgian Room of the SUB. The program will feature musical performances, displays of art and crafts, movies, slides and exhibits. Everyone's invited to attend.

DEATH AND PSYCHICAL RESEARCH will be Dr. Russell Noyes' topic next Monday at 7 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium.

A noted authority on death and dying, Noyes has published more than 50 articles in scientific journals and has been quoted in magazines such as Time and Newsweek. His research has involved nearly 200 persons who have been psychologically close to death. His most famous research has dealt with depersonalization in the face of life-threatening danger and probes the three divisions of death which he labels as resistance, review, and transcendence.

Noyes is an assistant professor of psychiatry at the University of Iowa College of Medicine and will be on campus in conjunction with Harold Eastman's class "The Sociology of Death and Dying."

A gerontology area of concentration would train students to work with the elderly and study problems that often come with aging.
