Arkansas Rep to Perform



The Lyceum Series presents the Arkansas Repertory Theatre April 2 at 8 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium. The Rep will perform A.R. Gurney's *The Dining Room*, a play gently satirizing and celebrating the traditional American family in the face of changing contemporary values.

The play, set in the dining room, is a series of vignettes in which the six performers portray a total 57 characters who have eaten in the dining room throughout most of the 20th century.

They relive the speculation of the 1920s, the retrenchment of the 1930s, the fulfillment of the American Dream in the 1950s, the revolutions of the 1960s and the disintegrations of the family in the 1970s.

The cast of *The Dining Room* includes Don Bolinger, Cynthia Goodale, David Johnston, Jonna McElrath and Susan Sargeant. Bolinger's credits include *Evita*, *The Mystery of Edwin Drood*, *My Fair Lady* and *Oklahoma*.

The third annual Missouri Minority Affairs Directors Workshop will be held at Northeast April 5. The two featured speakers for this cross-cultural event are Dr. Na'im Akbar and Dr. Wendell G. Rayburn. All students, faculty and staff are welcome to attend Akbar's lecture on "Enabling and Empowering the Student of Color" at 10 a.m. in the SUB Activities Room.

Akbar is a celebrated lecturer, author, scholar, teacher and one of the most recognized experts in the field of African-American psychology. He has

appeared on "Donahue," "Geraldo," and "The Oprah Winfrey Show." Rayburn is the 16th president of Lincoln University, Jefferson City, Mo. He has published a number of articles in leading professional journals, has presented papers throughout the country, and is a human relations consultant.

The Missouri Minority Affairs Directors Workshop was first initiated in 1989 by Bonita Butner, director of multi-cultural affairs at Central Missouri State University, with the objective of

enhancing the quality of services provided to students of color at Missouri institutions for higher education. Since the workshop's inception, it has grown to encompass deans, admission officers, advisers and professionals outside of Missouri. The workshop is designed to find innovative methods to better educate students of color.

The Police Recruitment and Education Program was signed into law by President Bush. This amends the Higher Education Act to extend the Perkins Loan cancellation programs to students and in-service officers who pursue a career as local, state or federal law enforcement and correctional officers. The Perkins Loan program provides low interest loans to students with financial need in post secondary education. Loans can be granted up to \$18,000 for those in graduate or professional programs, \$9,000 for a student who completes two years of a bachelor's program, and \$4,500 for any other student.

PREP provides that the Perkins Loan be completely forgiven at the rate of 15 percent for each of the first two years of service, 20 percent for the third and fourth years, and 30 percent for the fifth year of service as sworn officers.

Scholarships for the 1991-92 school year are available from the International Water Conference for students who qualify. Undergraduate students in chemical engineering or chemistry who are planning a career in water technology may apply for the Joseph Levensky Memorial Scholarship with funding up to \$7,000 per year. Graduate students in science or engineering pursuing studies in the field of industrial water technology may apply for the IWC Merit Award worth up to \$10,000 per year.
