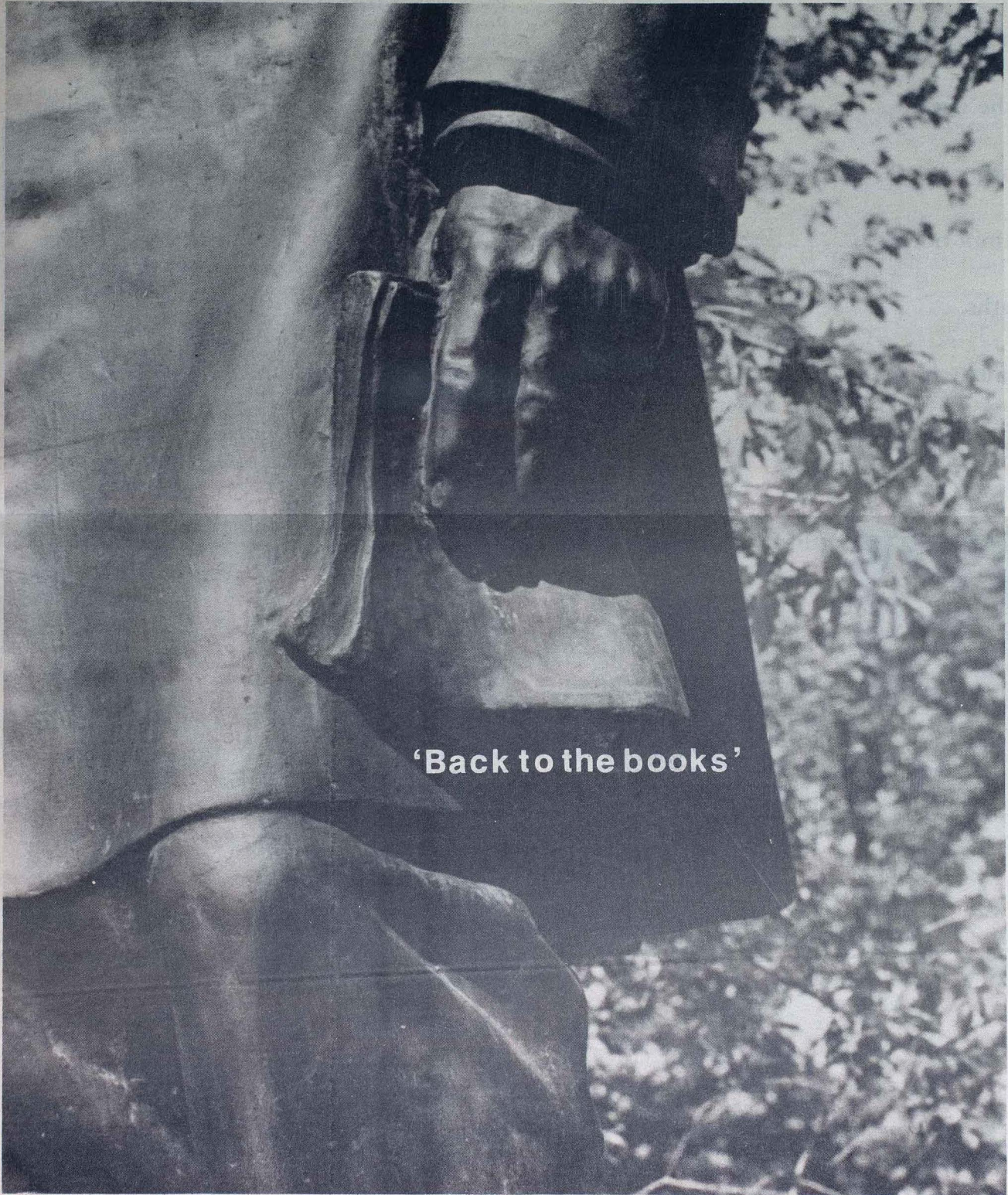

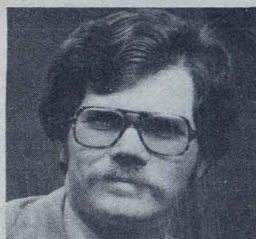

Editor's comments



There is a new manuscript soon to be out, "The Life and Times of Eugene Fair." The author, of course, is P. O. Selby, dean emeritus, who describes himself as Eugene Fair's "friend."

Dr. Selby, through the life of President Fair, offers a look at the campus as it was around the turn of the century through the mid '30s.

Fair, who was from Harrison County, enrolled at Northeast in 1896. About that time the Normal School installed showers for its athletes.

Selby writes, "These showers were also available for any student who wanted to take a bath, and it was a common sight on Saturdays to see men crossing the campus with suitcases. These suitcases contained wash cloths, soap, a drying towel, and a change of underwear. The rooming houses generally did not provide bathrooms. But when the weather was suitable there was also quite a bit of walking out to a pond, a swimming hole, or to the Chariton River for cleansing purposes."

Eugene Fair was named to the faculty of the Kirksville Normal School in 1905. Before being named president in 1925, Fair taught history and political science courses. Dr. Selby joined the faculty in 1916.

During the Fair era, faculty meetings were quite regular, often once a week. "The president was inclined to bring most of his problems to the faculty meeting for an airing, though he might not follow what the faculty, in its deliberations, had recommended."

Some of the problems were quite petty—what might be typical of a junior high school faculty meeting. "I recall the case of a student who insisted on wearing a mackinaw to classes instead of a suit coat. The faculty thought that was improper, and I was nominated to tell the man he must wear the same kind of coat as other men wore. It is hard to believe (60 years later) that a faculty would be concerned with such matters," Selby writes.

Off campus, Fair was active in several state and national organizations. He served a term as president of the Missouri State Teachers Association and the American Association of Teachers Colleges. He also served a term as a Republican State Representative from Adair County prior to becoming president of the teachers college.

Selby says that Fair made his name in the AATC for his work investigating conditions at the teachers colleges in Louisiana, Oklahoma and New Mexico. "In these states there was evidence that the teachers colleges were being manipulated by politicians, and the AATC opposed that. In one college, for example, the governing board had chosen a president because he was a brother to the governor."

Fair's impact on Northeast is still felt today by students. It was Fair's idea to have the first two years of college work conducted by a special institution to be known as the General College. Today we don't have a special institution, but we do have a broad-based curriculum for two years, and we call it general education.

Some of the courses that were required of all students included Background of the Modern World, Problems of the Modern World, Man and the Scientific World, World Literature and Freshman English. Sound familiar?

One section of the manuscript is about Selby's personal relationship with President Fair, from the time Selby helped him get elected to the Missouri Legislature until Fair's death in August 1937.

"The evening before (Fair's death) he visited with his daughter's family. Elizabeth said to him: 'Daddy, when you retire who do you want as your successor?' Mr. Fair said, 'I want P. O. Selby to succeed me, and I intend to help bring that about.'"

Selby continues, "After Mr. Fair's death, the Board met to select a new president. They considered Walter Ryle, L. A. Eubank and Felix Rothchild. I got no consideration.

"Thank you again, Board of Regents."

And so the manuscript continues, filled with anecdotes about Northeast under the Fair administration. I think you will find it interesting. If you would like a copy when it is published, write to us at the Alumni Office. There will be a small charge.

1917 alumna recalls early days

a boat in the lake (west side) and staged the operetta, "Pinafore." Ben Jones as Deadeye Dick was nearly thrown overboard. Phradie Wells rowed a canoe from shore to ship singing "Buttercup"—her role.

Walter Ryle and his sister, Texie, were students who lived in a town east of my home in Lancaster, Mo. They, with a number of other students, rode the 10 o'clock night train on Sunday evening to Glenwood Junction, where we waited 1

1/2 hours for the Wabash to Kirksville.

I was saddened to read of the deaths of Jean Hanks, Lois and June Selby—sisters of Paul Selby.

I have visited the college at different times thru its rejuvenation to the present form. I still enjoy the memories of my early days.

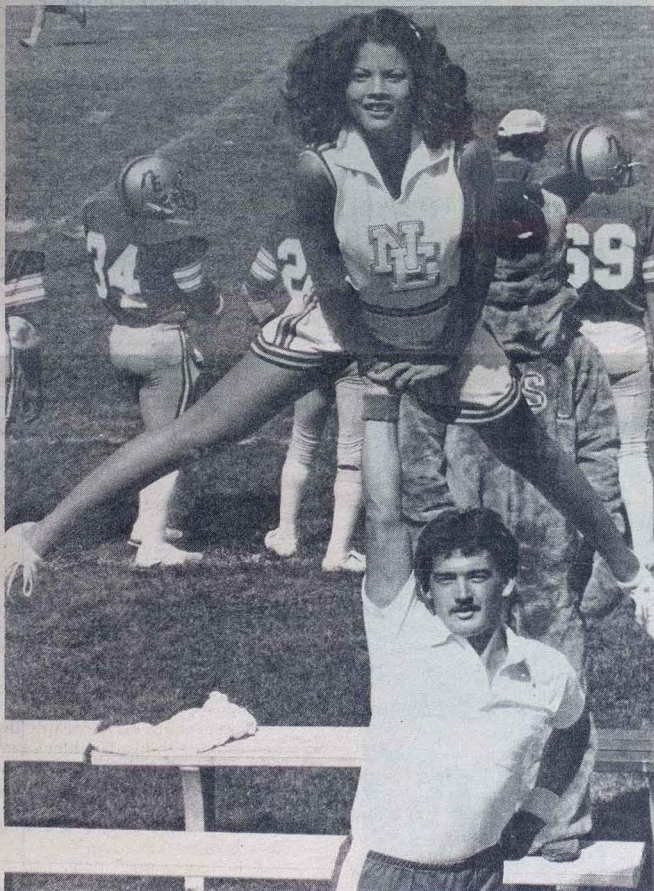

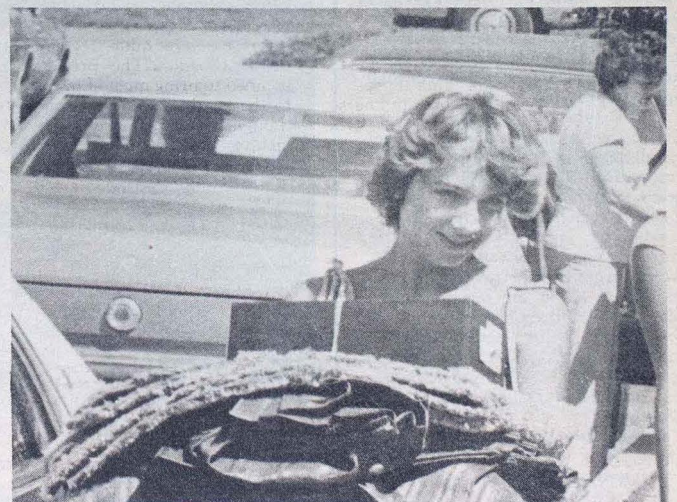
Better 'n average

Royal recollections . . .

First Homecoming queen Remembers reign of 1940

What was it like to be selected as the first Homecoming Queen at Northeast back in 1939?

"Good heavens, it was the most unexpected thing I could imagine," Martha Decker Blair (B.S.E. 1940) said.

She was chosen by a vote of the student body from three senior candidates to be the first Homecoming Queen, or as the Index called the title at the time, the Football Queen. The queen was attended by the other two senior candidates and two representatives of each class. Blue Key National Honor fraternity organized the first Homecoming.

Blair said some of the surprise was missing on that first Homecoming day because she had been told of her selection as queen a week before the coronation. Nan Wade, professor emeritus of modern language, who was assisting Blue Key with the queen contest, told her but made her promise not to tell.

"I couldn't tell anyone else that I had won. I was the only one who knew, including the other candidates," she said.

The secret was kept until Friday, Nov. 3, 1939, when Martha Decker Blair took her place in the seat of honor at the front of the first Homecoming parade on the Blue Key float. Seventeen other floats from various campus organizations followed the queen and her attendants in that parade. The actual crowning of the queen took place immediately before the football game, Blair recalled.

Blair, who is originally from Callao, has taught elementary school for all but six of the 40 years since her graduation. She currently is a third grade teacher at Mary Benton Elementary School in Wichita, Kan.

At the time of the first Homecoming, there were only three women from Callao at Northeast and they were all in the queen's court. Mary Ann Dunham Noble was one of the other senior candidates and Margaret Neff was a junior class attendant. The other senior candidate was Jane Ann Dailey Smith from Kirksville.

Smith, who now lives in Nashville, Tenn., said the queen competition was based primarily on popularity. The qualifications included leadership ability and extracurricular activities and had very little to do with beauty, at least in theory.

"Martha Decker was a very beautiful queen," Smith said.

The voting for Homecoming queen took place in Kirk Building, and the campaigning was "very relaxed,"

Smith said. "They just had a box for anyone who cared to vote."

This relaxed atmosphere surrounding the queen selection may have led to a little election-fixing, as Blair remembers. "I do recall a student saying, 'I hope you win. I voted for you five times.' Was that the way to win?"

Blair, Smith and Noble were chosen as the queen candidates by the senior class after being nominated by their individual sororities. Blair was an Alpha Sigma Alpha while Smith and Noble were both members of the Delta Sigma Epsilon sorority, which is now Delta Zeta.

The first Homecoming Queen had no official duties. "It was just the honor of being selected," Blair said.

She is planning to return to Kirksville for the 40-year class reunion during the 1980 Homecoming, Oct. 26. Plans are being made so that 41 years after the first Homecoming, Martha Decker Blair will once again ride in a place of honor in the parade as Northeast Missouri State University's first Homecoming queen.

For student body President, Vote—

Paul Craig Barry Green Emil McNeely Ralph Evans

"It takes a special kind of person" to be president of the student body, says 1970 student government president Paul Craig (B.S.E. 1970, B.M. 1973).

Although the responsibility of being president of the student body may require special people, the diversity among those who have held that post is remarkable. Take Craig, for instance, and the presidents of 25, 40 and 50 years ago.

Craig majored in industrial arts and now teaches school in Creston, Iowa.

In 1955, Barry Green (B.S. 1955) was a general science major with a chemistry minor. Today he is Dr. Barry Green and is president-elect of Wadley Hospital in Texarkana, Texas.

The 1940 president, Emil McNeely (B.A. 1940) was an English and history major. He is now a businessman in La Jolla, Calif.

A biology major and 1930 Student Council president at Northeast, the Rev. Ralph Evans is now a preacher in Santa Fe, N.M.

"It was a pretty natural move from one to the other," Evans says of his

transition from biology major and student council president to student of divinity at McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago.

That may be because by the time he entered college Evans knew what he wanted to do with his life. "I was committed to the ministry," he says.

When asked by his Phi Sigma Epsilon fraternity brothers to run for Student Council president, Evans says, "I was very much surprised."

But he accepted the responsibility and set out to improve the pep organization. The attempt was apparently successful because he says he remembers, "There was a good feeling in the student body. There was good school spirit surrounding the athletic events."

Being Student Council president helped Evans "leadership-wise," he says. "I think I had an early beginning in leadership through that. I've had lots of administration and that gave me a start on it."

Evans defines administration as issues, management and responsibilities. In his theological career, he says, "I've held all the offices in the judicatories of the church."

The Student Council president of 1940 did not pursue the writing career he had planned while in college, but McNeely did make good use of his presidential past. He joined the Wickes Corp., a retailing, wholesaling and manufacturing business, in 1964 as director of marketing. By May 1969 he was named president of the corporation. Two years later his title changed to president and chief executive officer, and he is now chairman of the board.

Though obviously successful, McNeely's present occupation is a far cry from the future he envisioned while a student at Northeast. "I was going to be a writer. I thought when I got through with school the world was waiting for me," he says. "I failed."

His failure was actually "a matter of making a living." He was a stringer for several newspapers while still in school. After graduation, when he looked into working full time for the Kansas City Star, he found "they thought it was a privilege to work for them" and paid "practically no money."

So he entered the business world and with "a little luck here and there" made his way up the proverbial ladder.

McNeely says he has considered a political career "every once in a while" and has even been approached to run for senator of California a few times in recent years, but has chosen to refuse. He claims he has no talent for public office.

The campus issues of 1940 were "not earthshaking," McNeely admits, but he does remember some controversy surrounding the selection of George Friedmeyer's band to play at the All-School Dance.

It was the first time a name band had appeared on campus, he says, and the Student Council feared the faculty and Board of Regents might consider it frivolous. But no such criticism was voiced.

Music was also an issue 15 years later, when Dr. Green was Student Council president. "We wanted to have some decent bands come," he says.

After 25 years, other major issues of the day do not immediately spring

to mind. But, Dr. Green says, "I had a great time, I remember that."

Like Evans, Dr. Green was nudged into the presidential race by friends. He says the experience has helped him "in meeting people" throughout his life. "I liked it because it was a small school and you got to know so many of the people," he says. In 1955, Northeast had about 1,200 students.

After graduating from Northeast, Dr. Green received his M.D. from Baylor University in Waco and was recently elected chief of staff at Wadley Hospital.

So he, too, has benefited from his term as student government president. He has even passed on his leadership qualities to his 14-year-old daughter, who is president of her seventh grade class.

Although his experiences in student government convinced Craig he was not cut out for politics, he says, "I learned a lot about people."

Craig compares the position of president of the NMSU Student Senate to his current job as a public school teacher. "I think there's a lot of correlation there," he says.

He remembers "having a good time. It's a heck of a way to meet a lot of people."

But, he says, "I bowed out. I had too many irons in the fire."

In addition to his educational commitments and senate activities, Craig was involved in Sigma Tau Gamma, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, the Industrial Arts Club and the Aeolian Club. He felt he had to decide which interests to pursue and which to drop. He resigned as Student Senate president on Feb. 16, 1970, after five and a half months of service.

Craig chose to withdraw from student government rather than his other activities. "You've got to please a lot of people," he says. "I have one view on things, and it's awfully hard to represent all the people."

"I think I had the leadership ability. It's just that I had never done anything that full scale before."

He is glad he had the experience, though. "I had a lot of fun," he says. "I think you've got to try everything."

And that's what these "special" people have done.

Senate President McMasters typifies student trends

Student Senate President Barb McMasters, a senior from Edina, reflects several trends that have emerged on campus in the last few years.

McMasters, the first woman to be elected student body president at NMSU since Brooke Williams Morehead (B.S.E. 1971) held the position in 1970-71, is one of many women assuming leadership roles in campus organizations that were once male-dominated.

She is only the fourth woman to be elected as student body president. Two other women, Virginia Fahrner in 1945 and Margaret Richardson in 1944, were elected during World War II when there were few men on campus.

This male dominance of student government is a result primarily of the organizational ability of Greek organizations, McMasters says. Until the formation of the Residence Hall Association on campus, the independents were never organized well enough to mount a successful campaign to defeat a fraternity's candidate. In recent years, independents have consistently won the Homecoming Queen competition, and this trend toward unity among non-greeks helped McMasters gain the Senate victory. She says, however, that much of her campaign was organized by the Greek members of her political party, the Students Independent Party.

Another trend McMasters reflects is the tendency for more women to enroll in business majors. She is a business administration and business education double major and a past president of the Business Administration Club. The Business Division is now the largest division on campus, primarily because of the influx of women into majors such as business administration and accounting.

McMasters is also a member of Pi Omega Pi business education fraternity, Purple Packers and Cardinal Key. In 1979 she was a Miss Kirksville contestant, and last year she was first runner-up in the Homecoming Queen contest.

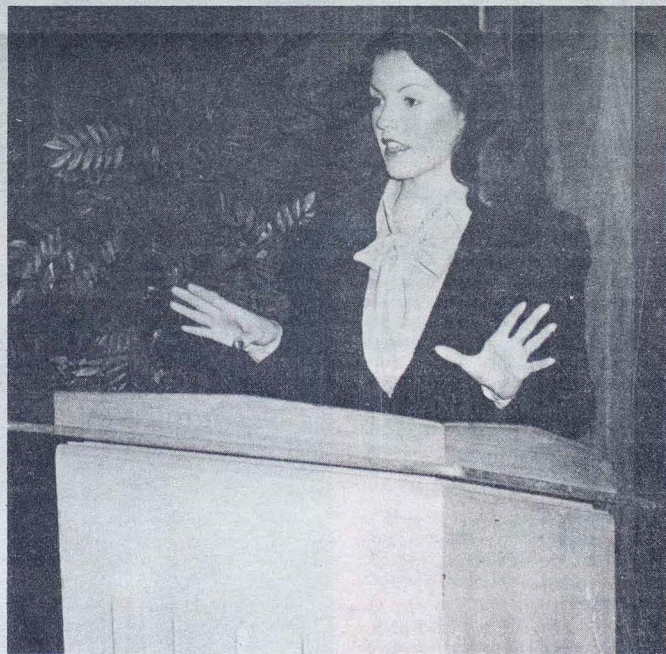
When she graduates, McMasters would like to get a job in a corporation, preferably in personnel work. She expects her experience with student government to be valuable to her career opportunities.

"I think it will be an asset in finding a job, and in doing my job once I am hired. It will be a valuable experience in working with people," she says.

The challenges of the upcoming year for Student Senate include getting better concert facilities and insuring that incoming students have available space in the residence halls. Students at NMSU also need to become more aware of the campus and their responsibility for its upkeep and improvement, McMasters says.

McMasters reflects the concerns of her generation as well. "Young people today are more pessimistic," she says. "They're worried about inflation, unemployment and the limitations of the job market. This accounts for some of the influx into the business majors."

The changes in students today are also reflected in changes in the University. McMasters says the University still feels "homey," but the quality of education does not indicate a small school. "We have many of the best divisions in the state."

Her trust in the quality of the institution has been reaffirmed by the willingness of the administration to work with students. The faculty and administration at NMSU are very competent, she says.

Barb McMasters represents many of the shifts that have taken place in the NMSU student body in recent years. It was only a matter of time before a student body president was elected who embodies the characteristics of the majority of students.

Greek Row planned as positive statement

The University is continuing to purchase property on the west side of campus along First Street for a proposed Greek Row even though none of the 14 campus fraternities have decided to build on the site yet, President Charles J. McClain said.

The purchase of the land along First Street from Patterson to Normal Streets was included in the master plan for University expansion in the 1970s. Several years after the commitment had been made to purchase the property, the idea of Greek Row was developed.

"It was our intent to find something positive that would be a statement for the dream of Greek life on our campus," McClain said. The idea of making this land available to Greeks at the appraised value of the property for the construction of new houses was intended as a statement of support for the fraternities, he said.

Dr. Terry B. Smith, dean of students, said some of the fraternities

have been reluctant to commit themselves to build on the property because they suspect the University wants to keep a closer eye on their activities. The reality of the project is just the opposite.

"Actually there would probably be less of that," Smith said. "Our current problems with fraternities usually result from neighbor complaints. On Greek Row, a fraternity's neighbors would be other fraternities."

McClain said the general reaction to the proposal has been very positive, especially from the community. Many of the city leaders view the Greek Row project as a progressive idea and are enthusiastic about the possibility of centralizing the fraternities.

As part of the project, the University will develop recreational and parking facilities in the Greek Row section of campus. The houses would face east toward campus and have an access road. No plans have been made for the land should the fraternities decide not to build on Greek Row, Smith said.

One fraternity seriously considering the possibility of moving to the row is Sigma Tau Gamma, which has already raised \$115,000 toward the construction of a new house. The Sig Taus are considering several options, one of which is Greek Row, but a decision has not yet been made, Keith Dinsmore, alumni chairman for the fund-raising effort, said.

The final decision will be made within the next year. This decision will be influenced in large part by the success the chapter has in finding a buyer for its property. Also important to the Sig Taus' final decision is when the University would be able to convey the land to them, Dinsmore said.

Included in the current plans for Greek Row is a move of the sororities from Brewer Hall to Centennial Hall, thus locating all the Greeks together on the west side of campus. No move has yet been made and the decision to relocate the sororities may depend on current renovation plans for Brewer Hall. If the renovations will take more than one summer, the hall will

have to be vacated for a semester and the sororities relocated, Smith said. Current plans for renovation of Brewer Hall are for the 1982 fiscal year.

A major factor discouraging many fraternities from committing to build new houses on Greek Row has been financial considerations. Even though the University will sell the land to the fraternities at the lowest possible price, the cost of the land and house together could easily run \$250,000. The current economic situation has made cost a prohibitive factor for some fraternities at this time, Smith said.

The acquisition of the land is being made as the property becomes available, so there is no rush to complete the Greek Row project in only a few years. The University is prepared to hold the land for the fraternities until their alumni and undergraduate members can secure the loans and raise the amount of money necessary to build on Greek Row, Smith said.

Essays honor NMSU alum

"There are few teachers who have a deep and profound effect on both the personal and intellectual lives of their students. Claude L. Shaver, 'Prof,' is one of these teachers."

So reads the introduction to a collection of essays written in honor of Dr. Shaver (B.S.E. 1926), who received his teacher education at Northeast Missouri State University.

The 14 essays in "Theatre Byways" were selected from articles by former students, colleagues and other scholars of the theater who wanted to thank Dr. Shaver for what he contributed to their lives.

The first chapter of the book is biographical notes on Dr. Shaver. It describes Kirksville State Normal School and establishes Northeast's influence on Dr. Shaver's career.

In addition to classes and weekly one-act plays, Dr. Shaver participated in the traveling plays of the Lyceum circuit and the summer Chautauqua.

In his "formative years" at KSNS, the book says, Dr. Shaver went through a teacher training program and practice teaching and "... was introduced to drama and the theater that was to be much of his life."

Dr. Shaver taught at Northeast from 1926-1928 before moving to Baton Rouge, where he taught at Louisiana State University until his retirement in 1973.

New masters program

Accounting degrees offered

The annual deficit of nearly 7,000 accounting graduates expected during the next five years will be partly alleviated by the addition of two new master's degree programs at Northeast Missouri State University.

Beginning with the 1981 fall semester, NMSU will offer the degrees, Master of Accountancy and Master of Science in Accounting.

The need for advanced education in accounting has been expressed by professional accountants and business educators during the past five years, according to a report from the Missouri Department of Higher Education to the Coordinating Board for Higher Education.

A proposal drawn up by the NMSU accounting faculty indicated that graduates with a Master of Accountancy should command the best entry positions in the accounting field and would advance within their

careers more rapidly than colleagues with M.A., M.S. or undergraduate degrees.

The Master of Accountancy program at NMSU is open only to those who hold an undergraduate accounting degree and who have passed a rigid screening process. Enrollment will be limited to 15 students per year.

The Master of Science in Accounting program will admit only 15 students whose undergraduate majors were in fields other than accounting. Its purpose is to take students with diverse academic backgrounds who wish to become Certified Public Accountants and put them through an accelerated graduate accounting plan.

The two programs were approved by the CBHE June 14 in Jefferson City.

Dinsmore elected president of Sigma Tau Gamma

Keith C. Dinsmore (B.A. 1973) was installed as the national president of Sigma Tau Gamma national fraternity at its 60th anniversary convention held in Kansas City in August. The NMSU chapter brought home two top awards from the convention, including the fraternity's distinguished chapter award.

The distinguished chapter award is given to the chapter that best exemplifies the principles of the fraternity, Dinsmore said. The NMSU chapter became the first to win the award two years in succession.

The local chapter received the award for the best chapter newsletter, and was runner-up for scholarship and charitable project awards. The NMSU chapter adviser, Walter H.

Ryle IV (B.A., B.S.E. 1954, M.A. 1956), professor of history, was awarded recognition for outstanding service as chapter adviser.

During the convention, four NMSU alumni were honored as initial members in the "Society of the Seventeen," an order which honors outstanding service to the national fraternity. The society will be restricted to 17 living members, commemorating the number of founders of Sigma Tau Gamma.

Dr. Ollin J. Drennan (B.A. 1949), distinguished professor of physics and natural science, of Kirksville and Basil D. Hunt (B.S.E. 1958, M.A. 1959) of St. Louis were present to receive the honor. Drennan is a former national president and is currently vice president of the Sigma

Tau Gamma Foundation. Hunt also formerly served as national president and completed four years as foundation president at the convention. He is currently director of elementary education for the Normandy School District.

Thomas M. Hutsell (B.A. 1927) and Robert Nagel Jones (1930) were honored posthumously as members of the Society of the Seventeen. Hutsell served as executive secretary from 1927 to 1938 and Jones was a national president and legal counsel to the fraternity.

Two other NMSU alumni, O. Glen Hocker (B.S. 1920) of Mexico and William F. Koch (B.S.E. 1967) of Liberty, were elected trustees of the foundation at the convention.

Dinsmore is the owner of several

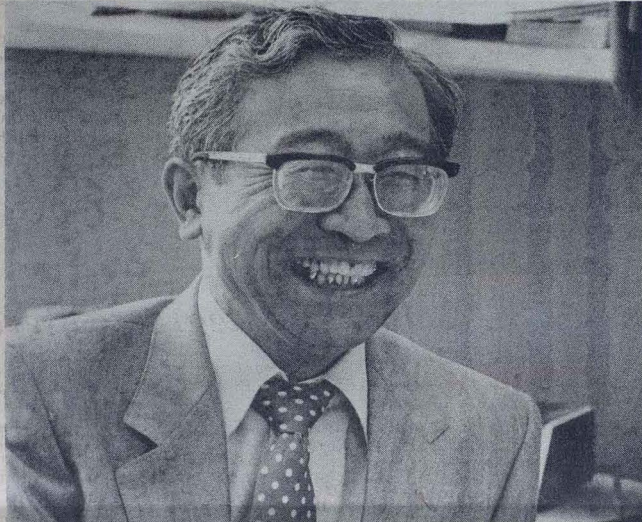
small-town newspapers in north Missouri and southern Iowa. He served several years as the executive secretary of Sigma Tau Gamma. He is currently living in Unionville where he publishes the Unionville Republican. He and his wife, Sandy, fund the Dinsmore mass communication scholarship at NMSU.

Shortly before the national convention, NMSU alumni of Sigma Tau Gamma met in Kirksville and established a new scholarship. The scholarship was established by Mrs. Frank Ficke of Belleville, Ill., in memory of her husband, a former NMSU athlete. Worth \$500, it will be presented in 1980-81 to a member of the NMSU chapter of Sigma Tau Gamma who excels in physical education or athletics.

Long distance alum returns as unique parent

Many a father has made the long trip back to Kirksville to watch his son or daughter begin a college education at the old alma mater. But none of these proud alumni parents ever brought along as unique a group of "children" as has Professor Tokuhiro (Tom) Miura. And certainly very few has ever made quite this long a trip.

Miura acted as temporary father for the group of 30 students from Hosei University in Tokyo, Japan, who visited NMSU and the Kirksville area in August. He was here as a student himself more than 20 years ago, receiving his

Northeast hosts the Far East

Japanese students teach as well as learn during visit

"Do you like taco?" the smiling Japanese student asked. He leaned forward, waiting for the unsuspecting American to take the bait.

"Well, yes, I like tacos," came the response.

The Japanese visitor's eyes lit up—the trap had been sprung.

"Do you know what word, taco, mean in Japanese?" He paused and grinned widely before applying the coup de grâce, "Octopus!"

The 30 students from Hosei University in Tokyo, Japan, were not afraid to teach their American hosts a few things during their 27-day visit to Kirksville and the northeast Missouri area. The purpose of their visit was to study America, however, and a great deal of their time was spent on tours and activities designed to give them an idea of what living in the United States is like.

"Your country is very large," Noriko Mase, a junior sociology major at Hosei University, said as she gestured to explain the long airplane trip across the U.S. The Japanese students were awed by the immense open spaces in America, but were

also amazed at the small size of Kirksville compared to their home city.

"Kirksville is not so large. We can see this entire area in only one or two hour drives," Sakae Morita, a sophomore English literature major at Hosei, said. During their stay at NMSU the visiting Japanese students toured much of the northeast Missouri area, as well as Hannibal, Jefferson City and Macon. They also toured Kirksville extensively and spent the last three days of their visit in homes in the Kirksville area.

In addition to the various tours, the students attended class for three hours a day during the week, studying the English language and American culture and history. While the students did not receive credit at Hosei University for the class, they found it very valuable in helping them learn about the language and culture of America.

The Japanese students made a few friends among the students living in Centennial Hall near the rooms where the visiting students lived. For the most part, however, they were reluctant to approach Americans.

"Perhaps they are very busy," Eiko Oki, a junior English literature major

at Hosei University, said. "I hesitate to talk to them."

Tom Miura, professor of English at Hosei University and director of the students during the visit, said the Japanese students all had studied at least six years of English. In addition to these six years of junior high and high school English, the students also take at least two years of English at Hosei University. Most of the visiting students were juniors with eight years of English studies, but the group included students from all classes. The visiting students were 18 to 22 years old.

Selection of the students who visited the United States is very strict. The applicants were interviewed and had to meet certain grade requirements. The students at Hosei University were more aware of the difficult selection process this year, and only 31 students applied to go on the trip. Just one unlucky student had to be refused, Miura said.

The academic majors of the students varied widely. A few are in majors such as business or law that could one day lead to a job in the United States, but this was not a requirement. Each of the students in the visiting group had a genuine

interest in studying this country, Miura said.

This was the fourth year that a group of students from Hosei University visited the United States. In the past, the groups have gone to Baylor University in Waco, Texas, and another group went to Baylor this year. This was the first time that a group had come to NMSU from Hosei University.

Hosei University is a prestigious Tokyo university with students who study all over the world. They have exchange agreements with NMSU, Baylor, and the Berkeley, San Diego and Davis campuses of the University of California.

Miura said Hosei University is very interested in having American students visit their university. Language is a big problem, however, because few Americans study Japanese. If any Americans were to attend Hosei, a class in Japanese for foreign students would have to be established, he said.

If current efforts prove successful, perhaps some students from NMSU will soon be visiting Japan. If so, they would do well to remember one important thing.

William Unger: A friend who Will be missed

Bill Unger died August 11. He had been ill for about a year with cancer. On Wednesday of that week his family and friends gathered in Kirksville's Mary Immaculate Church for the memorial services. Here is what President McClain so eloquently said about our friend:

Bill and Heddie had just returned from a marvelously exhilarating visit to the country of Mexico when he rushed into my office and said, "Charles, take a good look at me. The next time you see me, I won't have any hair." This was Bill's way of telling me that he would soon be taking chemotherapy treatments. That day we talked for more than an hour. I knew the prognosis for his type of cancer as did he. But somehow I could not accept the reality that this artistic giant would so soon be taken from us. Indeed, even now the time is much too soon for our mortal minds to comprehend the real meaning of his death or the great significance of his life.

It is to the latter—the significance of his life—that I address myself.

He had the advantage in his early years of life of studying in Paris where the recognized, and indeed, the highest talent were all assembled, and by daily conversation, criticism and emulation, mutually instructed each other—where the noblest works of both art and nature were there for daily observation—and in that environment he developed his creative genius.

Suddenly, he was in neutral American space with the challenge of a new beginning. He accepted the challenges of his new environment; and the evidences of his victory are all around us and his creative works will continue to show artists and non-artists that the human spirit can resist, must resist, and indeed, triumph.

Through his creative works of art he leaves us a legacy rich in form and beauty, but he also leaves us another legacy:

He gave us love and friendship.

He shared with us his personal warmth and his humanistic outlook.

He taught us to be compassionate by his example.

He showed us the joy that can come by caring more for others than for self.

He taught us the value of living fully with one's self for whatever time one is allotted on Earth.

And above all, he showed us how to be courageous and to always have hope in the face of adversity and uncertainty.

Because of the kind of man he was, Bill Unger's life has special significance for each of us.

In the tribute of Mark Anthony to his friend 2,000 years ago:

His life was gentle, and the elements so mixed in him, that nature might stand up and say to the world, "This was a man."

Bill Unger was a man. We shall miss him—and I shall miss my friend.

Bulldogs plan on patience and determination

Bruce Craddock's answer to a frequently asked question reflects a degree of caution on the part of the second-year Northeast Missouri State football coach.

The question: How much improvement have the Bulldogs made since the 1979 season when they were 4-7 overall and third in the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association?

The answer: "I think we'll be better this year, but we're still a sophomore-dominated team. So logically, we'll need a lot of time and effort to build a successful team. However, we'll get there if we're patient, determined, work hard and gain confidence."

Craddock says the play of the sophomores will be a critical factor. Eight second-year men could start on defense, and five more sophomores may be in the offensive lineup.

Only five senior lettermen were included on the pre-season roster. When August drills started, Craddock welcomed back 22 letter recipients and 26 squadmen who didn't play enough last fall to earn monograms. The coaching staff was also watching the work of more than 30 newcomers. Some freshmen and transfers will have to play well for the Bulldogs to make the improvement Craddock is counting on in 1980.

"We hope at least 10 of our newcomers can play as freshmen," Craddock says. "If they can help us immediately, it's been an exceptional recruiting year for us."

The schedule will provide a stiff challenge, especially with only four games at Stokes Stadium. Two NCAA Division I-AA teams, University of Akron (Ohio) and Tennessee Tech, opened the campaign. The Bulldogs only scored seven points to Akron's 31 in the first contest. Against Tennessee, however, they were in the lead until the last quarter, when the Golden Eagles gained on them and finally won, 28-20.

Akron and Tennessee were to be followed by two formidable Division II foes, Eastern Illinois and Western Illinois. Eastern was the 1978 Division II national champion.

Craddock's men will start Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association action Oct. 11 at home against Southeast Missouri State. Three of the six conference games are at home. The final game of the season will be the Moila Shrine Classic at St. Joseph, matching NMSU against the winner of the Central States Intercollegiate Conference.

Craddock's top lieutenants this fall are offensive coordinator Donnie Gaddis and defensive coordinator John Smith. They were on his staff last year. Graduate assistants Rusty Dowling, Paul Wernsman, Dave Egofski and Bill Wilt are also helping with coaching duties.

In terms of numbers, the offense has more experienced players than the defense. Ten offensive players who started many of the last year's games are back.

The pass catching appears to be in good hands, although depth may be a problem. Returning wide receivers are seniors Eric Holm (32 receptions last fall) and Bob Theard (38), plus senior squadman Hank Jackson and sophomore squadman Rich Otte.

Theard injured his knee in the Akron game and may miss the rest of the season, however.

Sophomore John Homeyer is expected to handle the center slot again, and his understudy should be sophomore squadman Dan Overpeck.

The battle for the quarterback spot is wide open. Junior Greg Dolence handled the assignment during the first part of the 1979 campaign, but junior Craig Towbin held the job for the final four games. Dolence is more of an option-type signal-caller, while Towbin is noted for his pin-point passing.

"Dolence and Towbin may be pushed hard by Bob Zumbahlen, though," Craddock says. Zumbahlen is a transfer from Illinois Valley Community College, which was undefeated last year.

"The running back positions are also up for grabs," the coach continues. "We brought 14 ball carriers to pre-season camp."

From this group of candidates, the coach hopes a player or two will emerge to handle tailback duties. The Bulldogs mustered only 76.7 yards on the ground per game in 1979. Junior squadman Dennis Bardwell is a top prospect who would like to show Craddock he is the ball carrier the coach is seeking. Graduate assistant Paul Wernsman was last year's starter at tailback when he wasn't hobbled by injuries.

Two performers appear to be the chief contenders for the fullback post. Garry Tobias is a fast, quick runner, while Rob Triulzi, a transfer from Baker University (Kan.), is a strong, physical ball carrier.

The ability of several players to bounce back from surgery may hold the key to the defensive platoon's success this fall.

Leading candidates for the defensive end positions are sophomores Brian Hattendorf, Jeff Stowe, Roy Pettibone and Mike Morris. Pettibone was a 1979 squadman linebacker.

The situation at tackle and nose guard will be influenced by players who sustained injuries last season. Sophomore tackle Ligo Letuli was a starter until he was sidelined, as was nose guard Elijah Lockhart.

Four other returnees and a transfer will have an opportunity to win nose guard and tackle jobs. Sophomore squadman Dan Ahern looked good in a brief starting role last year, and sophomores Peter Higgins and Tim Gildehaus were 1979 squadmen. Matt Harnisch is a junior who transferred from Wake Forest University.

The linebacking corps was depleted by the graduation of Doug Kreighbaum, honorable mention All-American, and Keith Driscoll, who was second team all-conference. Their successors will likely be picked from a list composed of senior Jack Vassar and sophomore Steve James, both lettermen, senior squadman Randy Lierman, junior squadman Bob Phillips and sophomore Mark Wise.

Northeast's secondary will be stocked with experienced personnel. "But we have to find the right combination to play there," Craddock says.

Only strong safety Charlie Calhoun is missing from the 1979 defensive backfield. Senior Craig Patton, a first team all-conference choice, and sophomore Darren Blair handled the cornerback slots last season. Junior Jon Walton was the free safety again this year until he broke his hand in practice before the Tennessee Tech game. Other candidates with some service in the secondary are junior squadmen Vincent Fulton, Andre Washington and Kevin Hayes, and sophomore Kelvin Cunningham. Sophomore squadman Dennis Yokeley will also vie for one of the deep back posts.

The Bulldogs lost a fine place-kicker and punter in Bob Fletcher, who was drafted by the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League. Craddock will probably use Dolence and sophomore squadman Dan Dollens as place-kickers. Zumbahlen did the punting during the first two games. Dolence did most of NMSU's place-kicking two years ago, and Dollens was a member of the 1979 junior varsity.

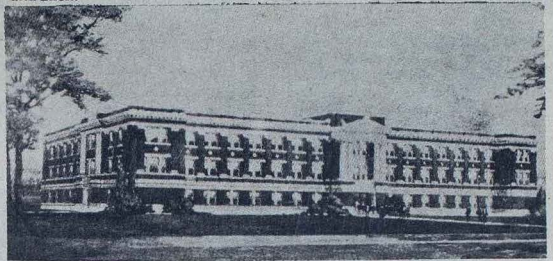

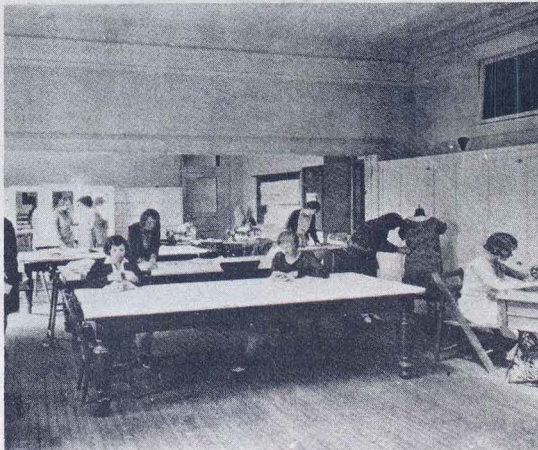

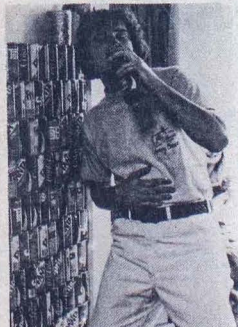

Grads soon to hear, 'Hello, NMSU calling'

President Charles J. McClain has announced that the University will be seeking to boost alumni investment in the scholarship program through a new program called "Tel-Alumni '80." In the "Tel-Alumni '80" program, student volunteers will contact alumni by phone and ask for their support by investing in the scholarship fund.

The name "Tel Alumni '80" was selected for two reasons, President McClain said. "The name communicates the idea of a telephone campaign to the alumni. Also, it suggests the callers have something to tell the alumni they are contacting."

"We have a great story to tell alumni," the President said. "We want to tell alumni that almost three-fourths of all NMSU students need financial aid in order to attend college. We want to tell alumni that a great many students work in order to pay their way through four years at the University, just as Northeast alumni did when they were students in Kirksville."

"And finally, we want to tell alumni that many of the scholarships offered to our deserving students depend on alumni support for their continuance," he said.

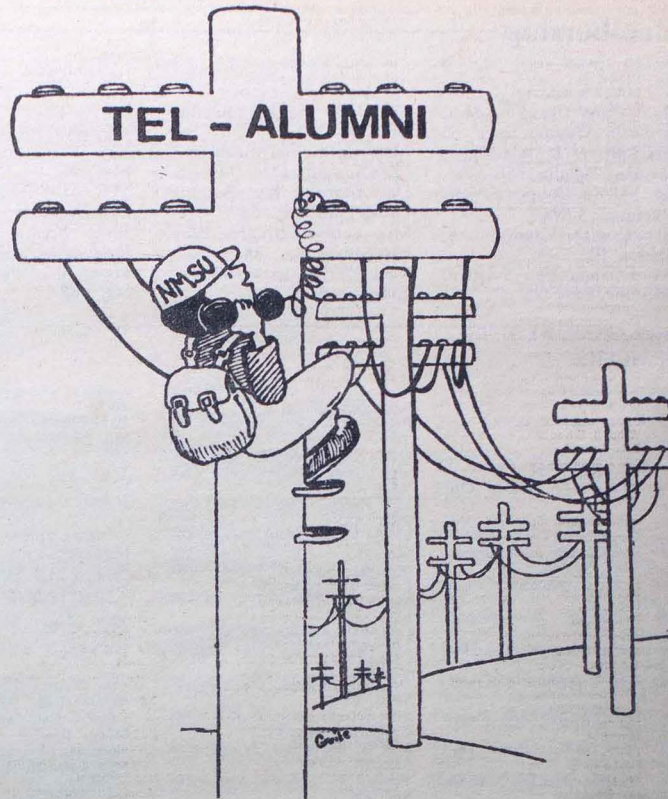
President McClain also announced that the student body president, Barb McMasters, would be the chairman for the Tel-Alumni program.

"I am pleased with Barb's commitment to this program and her ability to win Student Senate support for this scholarship effort," President McClain said.

In addition, the Student Senate is mobilizing the support of more than 30 clubs and organizations who will do the calling.

Each night a different group of callers from the University will spend up to three hours contacting alumni.

"Our students have a great story to tell alumni in 1980, and the students will be the ones telling it. They are the best ambassadors the University has," President McClain said.

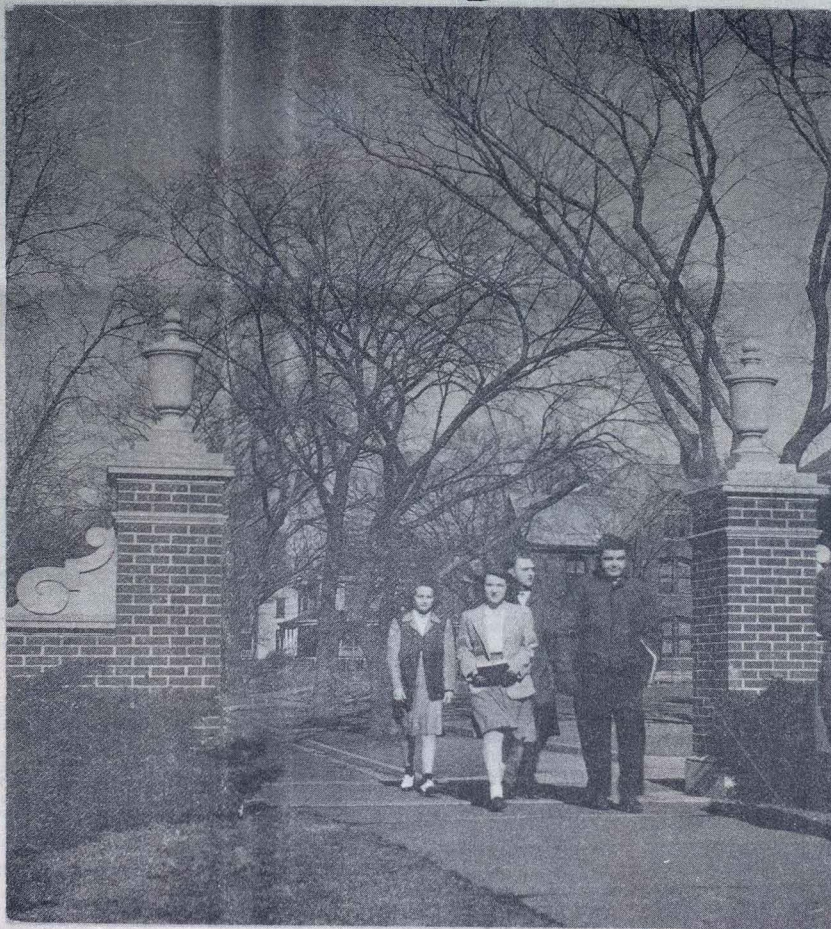

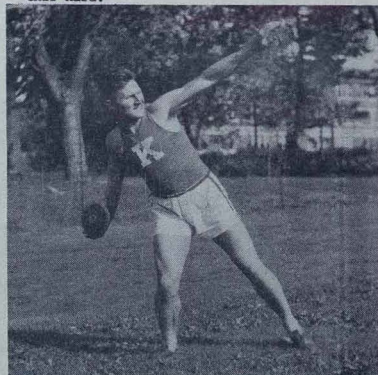

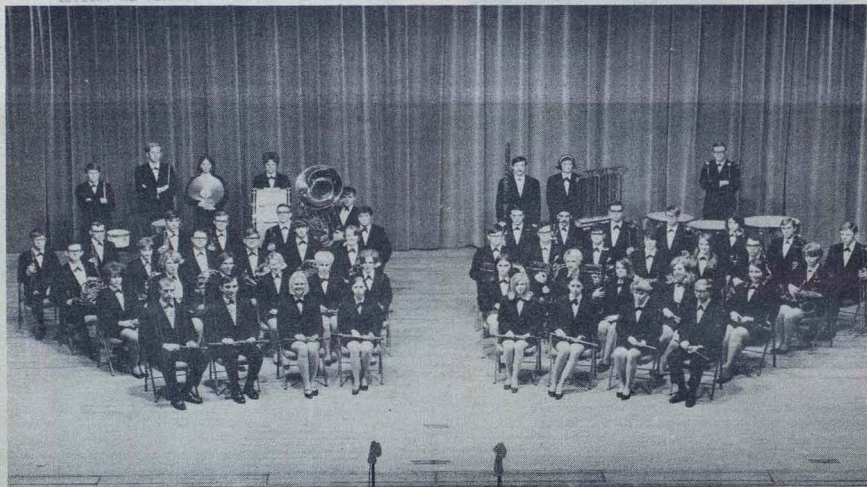
