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## Student Named Goldwater Scholar



Anthony Ballmann, a sophomore biology major, has been selected as a 1990 Barry M. Goldwater Scholar. The scholarship covers eligible expenses for tuition, fees, books and room and board to a maximum of \$7,000 annually, for two years.

The United States Congress established the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Program in 1986 to honor Sen. Barry Goldwater and to respond to the critical shortage of scientists and mathematicians. Goldwater Scholarships are awarded on the basis of merit to students who will be college juniors in the forthcoming academic year and who have outstanding potential for a career in mathematics or the natural sciences. All candidates were nomi-

nated by their college or university.

Though only a sophomore, Ballmann has participated in several research projects.

"One of the reasons why I attended [Northeast] is because undergraduates can do research. That was one thing that really impressed me. I really like being able to do the research," Ballmann said.

As a freshman, he co-wrote a computer program for the statistical analysis of ecology plots. The program was used in a federal grant proposal to help restore a mining area with natural vegetation. He has also worked on other science-related programs.

In addition, he is learning to use an electron microscope and the microtome to analyze the structure and function of a chaetognath, a group of marine wormlike animals. The description will be published as a chapter in a multi-volume book on invertebrates.

At Northeast, Ballmann has maintained a perfect 4.0 grade point average. Ballmann, a graduate of Hickman High School, is the son of Anthony and Lynne Ballmann of Columbia, Mo.

After Ballmann receives a Bachelor of Science degree in biology from Northeast, he hopes to attend graduate school at the University of California at San Diego. Ultimately, he aspires to earn a doctorate in molecular biology and continue to do research work.

## Nursing Division Receives \$25,000 Grant

Northeast's Division of Nursing has been awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Helene Fuld Health Trust, the nation's largest charitable trust devoted exclusively to the welfare of undergraduate student nurses. The Marine Midland Bank, headquartered in New York City, made the announcement.

A spokesman for the bank stated that the grant was made in recognition of the outstanding contributions to the nursing profession being made by the

Division of Nursing at Northeast in educating undergraduate nurses to render bedside care to patients. The funds will be used to purchase interactive video equipment and programs for the Nurse Independent Learning Center.

Since the creation of the Trust in 1969, Midland Bank as trustee has made grants to nursing schools in excess of \$67 million. The trust has a present value of more than \$80 million.
